### **PUBLIC INPUT GUIDELINES**

A period of public input shall be included at the regular meetings of the Board at which time the Board may receive information from the public subject to the Rules of General Application as adopted by the Board.

### Rules of General Application

- 1. Time Limit no speaker may speak more than five minutes. Time may be extended beyond the original five minutes for an additional three minutes by the consent of the majority of the Board;
- 2. Identification each speaker should identify himself or herself by name and residence, tell the Board what item or items they wish to address, and proceed to address them;
- 3. Written testimony during the public input time, any person may provide written material to the Board, provided they furnish sufficient copies so that there will be one for each Board member and one for the Department;
- 4. Subject matter the topic or topics must be directly related to the agenda of the regular meeting or shall refer to the policies adopted or proposed by the Board. Public comment is not an open forum for general discussion of values, politics, religion or philosophy. It is also not a forum for electioneering or the praise or criticism of individuals in or out of government;
- 5. Unless the topic addressed is on the agenda for that meeting, neither the Chair, any other Board member, nor any staff member should respond to public input except as follows:
  - a. To acknowledge the contribution;
  - b. To determine that the issue will or will not be placed on a future agenda for discussion or action; and,
  - c. To refer the speaker to the Department for attention to the issue;
  - d. Neither the Chair, any other Board member, any staff member should engage in discussion or exchange with the speakers except for clarification of the issue. If the Chair, any other Board member, or any staff member wishes to follow up directly with the speaker on the matter, that may be done outside of the meeting;
- 6. This "public input" agenda item does not limit the Chair or Board from inviting or permitting comment from any person on a topic then properly before the Board.

# Mental Illness FACTS AND NUMBERS

# Numbers of Americans Affected by Mental Illness

- One in four adults—approximately 61.5 million
   Americans—experiences mental illness in a given
   year. One in 17—about 13.6 million—live with a serious
   mental illness such as schizophrenia, major depression
   or bipolar disorder.<sup>1</sup>
- Approximately 20 percent of youth ages 13 to 18 experience severe mental disorders in a given year. For ages 8 to 15, the estimate is 13 percent.<sup>2</sup>
- Approximately 1.1 percent of American adults about 2.4 million people—live with schizophrenia.
- Approximately 2.6 percent of American adults—6.1
   million people—live with bipolar disorder.
- Approximately 6.7 percent of American adults—about 14.8 million people—live with major depression. 4,6
- Approximately 18.1 percent of American adults—about 42 million people—live with anxiety disorders, such as panic disorder, obsessive-compulsive disorder (OCD), posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD), generalized anxiety disorder and phobias.<sup>4,7</sup>
- About 9.2 million adults have co-occurring mental health and addiction disorders.
- Approximately 26 percent of homeless adults staying in shelters live with serious mental illness and an estimated 46 percent live with severe mental illness and/or substance use disorders.
- Approximately 20 percent of state prisoners and 21 percent of local jail prisoners have "a recent history" of a mental health condition.
- Seventy percent of youth in juvenile justice systems have at least one mental health condition and at least
   20 percent live with a severe mental illness.

# **Getting Mental Health Treatment in America**

• Approximately 60 percent of adults<sup>12</sup>, and almost one-half

- of youth ages 8 to 15 with a mental illness received no mental health services in the previous year. <sup>13</sup>
- African American and Hispanic Americans used mental health services at about one-half the rate of whites in the past year and Asian Americans at about one-third the rate.<sup>14</sup>
- One-half of all chronic mental illness begins by the age of 14; three-quarters by age 24. Despite effective treatment, there are long delays—sometimes decades—between the first appearance of symptoms and when people get help.

### The Impact of Mental Illness in America

- Serious mental illness costs America \$193.2 billion in lost earnings per year.<sup>17</sup>
- Mood disorders such as depression are the third most common cause of hospitalization in the U.S. for both youth and adults ages 18 to 44.<sup>18</sup>
- Individuals living with serious mental illness face an increased risk of having chronic medical conditions.
   Adults living with serious mental illness die on average 25 years earlier than other Americans, largely due to treatable medical conditions.
- Over 50 percent of students with a mental health condition age 14 and older who are served by special education drop out—the highest dropout rate of any disability group.
- Suicide is the tenth leading cause of death in the U.S. (more common than homicide) and the third leading cause of death for ages 15 to 24 years.<sup>22</sup> More than 90 percent of those who die by suicide had one or more mental disorders.
- Although military members comprise less than 1 percent of the U.S. population<sup>24</sup>, veterans represent 20 percent of suicides nationally. Each day, about 22 veterans die from suicide.<sup>25</sup>

Hospitalizations for self-inflicted wounds per 100,000 people


• Eau Claire County's rate of injury hospitalizations for self-inflicted injury from 0-24 years is higher than the state rate

(151.2 compared to Wisconsin's rate of 125.5)

- About ½ of self-inflicted injuries occurred in 25-44 year olds
- About ¼ of self-inflicted injuries occurred 15-24 year olds
- In 2014, there were 87 self-inflicted injury ER visits
- Average hospital charge of \$2,249 per person.

# Suicide

- 1 in 6 Eau Claire County 10<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> grade students indicated that they had considered suicide "sometimes", "often" or "a lot"
- In 2015 through September, Eau Claire County has had 23 suicide deaths.
- In 2014 there were 11 suicides, 3 of whom were adolescents




### Mental Illness in Eau Claire County

Based on national data.....

- About 20,000 adults in Eau Claire experience a mental illness in a given year, and 4,600 suffer from severe mental illness.
- Around 2,800 children in Eau Claire suffer severe mental illness in a given year.
- It is estimated that 70% of youth in the juvenile justice system have a mental health issue
- Almost ½ of homeless people have a mental illness and/or substance use disorder and a ¾ of inmates have a recent history of mental health condition.
- People with mental health issues have an increased risk of chronic diseases and early death.



# WCCF Applauds the Bi-Partisan Effort to Give Many Youthful Offenders a Second Chance

Bill to Return Non-Violent, First-Time 17 Year-Old Offenders to Juvenile Court Enjoys Strong Bipartisan Backing with 71 Sponsors

WCCF applauds the introduction of a strongly bi-partisan bill, SB280, to return first-time, non-violent 17 year-old offenders to the juvenile justice system. With strong leadership from Senator Jerry Petrowski and Representative Rob Hutton, the bill has garnered 71 sponsors from both sides of the aisle. We expect introduction in the Assembly soon as well.

"This is one of those all-too-rare situations in which practically everyone agrees on the policy," said Ken Taylor, executive director of the Wisconsin Council on Children and Families (WCCF). Jim Moeser, deputy director of WCCF said: "Promoting long-term community safety while at the same time holding youthful offenders accountable and giving them the skills to get back on track makes common sense and is supported by years of great research."

The proposal recognizes the changes that have occurred since all 17 year-olds were automatically moved to the adult system in 1996, including: (1) practitioners have developed cost-effective services to better assess and meet the needs of youthful offenders - focusing resources where they are most needed; (2) research that confirms youth dealt with in the juvenile system are less likely to reoffend than similar youth in the adult system; and (3) research about adolescent brain development confirms that youth at this age are very much capable of learning new decision-making and other skills.

# Key features of SB280 include:

- The focus is on first-time, non-violent 17 year olds so, more violent and repeat
  offenders would remain in the adult system automatically;
- A 17 year-old can still be waived to adult court on a case-by-case basis for any
  offense by the court; and

 17 year-olds who remain in the juvenile system will not have a permanent adult record that otherwise can have lifelong consequences including facing challenges related to housing, education, and employment.

A similar proposal in the last session garnered support from two former Governors, Governor Tommy Thompson and Governor Jim Doyle, and has drawn support from a wide range of organizations that know it is time to be smart about how we deal with youthful offenders.

Wisconsin is one of only nine states that treat all 17 year-olds automatically as adults. In the past five years, Connecticut, Massachusetts, and Illinois have all raised their age of adult court back up to 18, with minimal cost or impact on their juvenile system.

"The vast majority of offenses committed by young people are more minor, non-violent offenses, and they should be held accountable. At the same time, we also know that teens that get the right services are able to move forward in their lives and contribute positively to their communities," said Moeser. He added "We can no longer afford to invest resources sending these youth into an adult system that is ill-equipped and under-resourced to redirect these youth's future."

# Few details available about FoodShare drug testing program

Very little is known about how state officials plan to implement a newly minted law requiring them to drug test some food stamp recipients, despite longstanding support from Republican Gov. Scott Walker. Walker recently launched a legal battle challenging federal regulations that prohibit such a law.

The law requires the Wisconsin Department of Health Services to develop and implement policies to drug test those able-bodied adults without dependents who are required to take part in the employment and training program associated with FoodShare, the state's food stamp program. Recipients who test positive for drugs are required to participate in substance abuse treatment to remain eligible for the employment and training program and are subject to random drug tests, according to the law.

Before Walker signed the bill into law as part of the state budget last month, officials at the U.S. Department of Agriculture, which oversees the federal food stamp program, told the state that drug testing recipients is illegal. Walker's administration responded by filing a lawsuit, requesting a federal judge to determine if the state has the right to drug test welfare recipients. The plaintiff, Wisconsin Department of Health Services Secretary Kitty Rhoades, argues in the lawsuit that she faces a legal conundrum – either break state or federal law – a conflict created by Walker when he signed the bill into law.

Department of Health Services officials have been unable to provide details on how the agency plans to implement the law, such as what type of drug testing will be conducted, who will perform the tests, who will have access to the test results and what the program is expected to cost.

"The Department of Health Services does not comment on pending litigation," wrote Claire Yunker, a spokeswoman for the department, in an email.

Several officials at organizations in Milwaukee that help individuals apply for FoodShare benefits said they have no information from the state in regard to the new law.



"We have not heard anything yet," said a caseworker with the Milwaukee Enrollment Services Center. She did not provide her full name and was not authorized to discuss the issue.

An official with the Social Development Commission in Milwaukee, who asked not to be identified, said that her organization, which helps individuals enroll in entitlement programs, has yet to hear about how the state plans to administer the drug test.

The cost of the federal lawsuit is also unclear. Department of Justice spokeswoman Anne Schwartz said her department will not hire outside lawyers to fight the case and therefore will not be tracking hours and will not know what it costs.

The concept of drug testing welfare recipients in Wisconsin is not new. The governor campaigned on the idea last year and has spoken publicly in favor of drug testing.

"We want people to know the dignity that comes from work. (This program) will encourage personal responsibility and workforce readiness," he wrote in a budget document describing his line-item vetoes.

Legislation requiring some FoodShare recipients to be drug tested was also introduced in the Republican-led Assembly in April. Legislative documents contained no substantive information on how the law will be implemented and how much drug testing will cost taxpayers. A Legislative Fiscal Bureau report on May 19 noted the lack of details in the proposed measure, including whether all program recipients would be screened, when they would be screened and what role local agencies and counties would have — if any — in administering, enforcing or funding drug testing.

The report also said the state Department of Administration has indicated that some of the program details would be included in a waiver application and through negotiations with federal officials. Wisconsin did not submit a waiver application to the USDA as of Aug. 6, according to federal officials. A waiver is required for a state to change the terms of its food stamp program.

In addition, the non-partisan fiscal bureau detailed some of the legal arguments that could be made if the measure is challenged in court, including the possibility that the law is unconstitutional.



"The Governor's proposal is suspicion-based, in that it would require a positive screen to administer a drug test, so it is not known whether a court would consider it an unreasonable search," the report said.

A similar Republican effort in Florida failed both legally and economically. Florida spent more than \$45,000 from July to October of 2011 to determine that less than 3 percent of the 4,086 welfare recipients who were tested actually used drugs, according to the New York Times. The state paid \$118,140 in reimbursements to recipients who passed drug tests, more than it would have paid out in benefits to the people who failed the test, according to the newspaper. The Florida law has since been struck down as unconstitutional by a federal judge.

"This isn't a serious policy proposal. This is an attempt merely at partisan politics to help one individual's ambitions and it's unfortunate that it comes at the cost of people who need food," said Michael Bare, a research and program coordinator at the Public Policy Institute, referring to Walker and his presidential campaign.
