

This ordinance updates the county code regarding flying clubs at the Chippewa Valley Regional Airport to comply with changes in Federal Regulations issued March 9, 2016.

ORDINANCE/16-17.001

- TO AMEND SECTION 12.10.001 OF THE CODE: PURPOSE; TO REPEAL AND RECREATE SECTION 12.10.040 OF THE CODE: CLUB SERVICES -

The County Board of Supervisors of the County of Eau Claire does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. That Section 12.10.001 of the code be amended to read:

12.10.001 Purpose. This chapter shall govern the functions of flying clubs in compliance with FAA Order 5190.6B.

SECTION 2. That Section 12.10.040 of the code be repealed and recreated to read:

12.10.040 Club Services.

- A flying club may permit its aircraft to be used for flight instruction in clubowned aircraft as long as both the instructor providing instruction and person receiving instruction are members of the club owning the aircraft, or when the instruction is given by a lessee based on the airport who provides flight training and the person receiving the training is a member of the flying club.
- A qualified mechanic who is a registered member and part owner of the aircraft owned and operated by a flying club may perform maintenance work on aircraft owned by the club.
- A member of the flying club providing flight instruction in club-owned aircraft or providing aircraft maintenance services on club-owned aircraft may receive monetary compensation for flight instruction or maintenance work or may be compensated by credit against payment of dues or flight time, but not both concurrently.

It shall be the policy of the County that certain contractors, subcontractors, lessees and recipients of financial assistance doing business with the County shall be subject to the requirements of this chapter. This living wage ordinance shall apply to all contractors, subcontractors, and recipients of financial assistance as defined herein party to an agreement covered under this chapter with any County unit, division, office, department, or subunit thereof, and County quasi-public entity including:

- A. A service contract as defined in 2.95.005 A. or an agreement to provide personal care and supportive home care to persons with disabilities or the frail elderly provided by agencies that exclusively contract with the County, involving an amount greater than or equal to \$30,000; and,
- B. A lease agreement involving the County funding or a public asset involving an amount greater than or equal to \$30,000; and
- C. A concession agreement involving an amount greater than or equal to \$30,000; and,
- D. Economic development financial assistance involving an amount of financial assistance from the County greater than or equal to \$1,000,000.

<u>2.95.005 Definitions</u>. For all agreements covered under this chapter, the following definitions shall apply:

- A. Service contract means an agreement between the County or related entity and another party that provides a set of services, primarily related to staff services including, but not limited to, housekeeping, security, landscaping, maintenance, clerical services, food services, and other non-professional services, as well as personal care, or supportive home care provided to persons with disabilities or the frail elderly by a preferred provider.
 - 1. Service contracts do not include:

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- a. Purchase of goods or commodities or its delivery.
- b. Equipment lease and maintenance.

- Having an agreement or arrangement with a contractor to operate on a property that is subject to a lease or concession agreement with the County that would be covered under this chapter; or,
- Purchasing or leasing from a recipient of financial assistance; or, managing or operating an enterprise employing people on the premises of property developed or improved as a result of financial assistance.
- Recipient means a person or entity receiving economic development financial assistance as defined in 2.95.005 D. but does not include a person or entity indirectly benefiting from incidental effects of County policies, regulations or ordinances.

2.95.010 Standards Requirement.

- All employees performing part- or full-time work for a contractor, subcontractor, lessee or recipient of economic development financial assistance covered under this chapter and all direct employees of the County, shall be paid the Living Wage rate defined in 2.95.005 E., except as provided in paragraph 3. of this section.
- Tipped employees, employees paid on commission, or employees whose compensation consists of more than hourly wages shall be paid an hourly wage, when coupled with the other compensation, that will at least equal the minimum wage rate.
- Contractors and subcontractors as defined in 2.95.005 G. 1. and 2. shall be subject to the requirements of this chapter for the duration of the agreement with the County. Employees of contractors and subcontractors shall be covered under the requirements of this chapter for the hours worked in performance of covered agreements.
- Recipients of economic development financial assistance and subcontractors as defined herein shall be subject to the requirements of this chapter for a period equal to one year for every \$100,000 provided in economic development financial assistance, rounded to the nearest whole year; and employees of such recipients and subcontractors shall be covered under the requirements of this chapter for work performed on the premises of a project benefiting from financial assistance.
- 4. The living wage rate requirement will be updated annually on the last business day of September.
 - В. Excluded employees:
 - The provisions in this chapter shall exclude:
 - Student learners as defined by Wis. Stat. ch. 104.01(7); and, a.
 - Employees of sheltered workshops as defined by Wis. Stat. ch. b.
 - Employees under the age of 18; and, c.

- concession, or lease; and, Employees not working in a financially assisted economic development project; and,
 - Interns; and, f.
 - Volunteers receiving stipends; and g.

Employees of a contractor, subcontractor, concessionaire or recipient of financial assistance otherwise covered under this chapter where the employer otherwise subject to the provisions of this chapter employs no more than 20 employees and where the employer otherwise subject to the provisions of this chapter is not an affiliate or subsidiary of another business entity dominant in its field of operation.
- j. Employees of a member who receives personal care and supportive home care through a self-directed service program model in the County.
- 2. The requirements of this section may be modified or waived as regards employees who are covered by a collective bargaining agreement between the employer and a bona fide union, where the parties to such collective bargaining agreement expressly specify their intent in the agreement.

2.95.020 Contracting Requirements.

- A. Department heads or their designee shall include requirements for compliance with this chapter in:
- 1. Every bid, request for proposal, or request for qualifications for services, leases, concessions or economic development financial assistance covered under this chapter,
- 2. All new service, lease, and concession agreements, and all new agreements involving financial assistance; and,
- 3. All renewals or amendments of agreements for services, leases, concessions, or economic development financial assistance covered under this chapter after the effective date of this ordinance.
- B. Contractors, subcontractors, and recipients of economic development financial assistance must submit to the department a notarized affidavit certifying that they will comply with the requirements of this chapter prior to contract or subcontract award or receipt of any financial assistance.
- C. Contractors, subcontractors and recipients of financial assistance shall not use the requirements of this chapter to reduce the wages of employees.
- D. County reserves the right to inspect and audit any payroll records of any contractor or subcontractor or recipient of financial assistance for which this chapter applies, for any reason and at any time.
- <u>2.95.030 Maintenance and Monitoring of Records</u>. The Purchasing Department will maintain all records required by this chapter. The Purchasing Department will:
 - A. Retain a log of all contracts, noting which contracts are covered by this chapter.
- B. Retain notarized affidavits from all contractors subject to the provisions of this chapter that they understand and will comply with its provisions.
- C. Retain a one-page document, filled out annually by all contractors subject to the provisions of this chapter, asserting that they remain in compliance with the provisions of this chapter and providing the required wage range information.
- <u>2.95.040 Severability and Savings.</u> If any provision of this chapter or application thereof is judged invalid, the invalidity shall not affect other provisions or application of the chapter which can be given effect without the invalid provisions or application, and to this end the provisions of this chapter are declared severable.
- 2.95.050 Waiver by County Board/Rights of Enforcement. The County recognizes that from time to time it may be in the County's best interest to enter into contracts, leases or other agreements, including agreements involving financial assistance, which have been negotiated,

bid for, or otherwise entered into in a manner which is not in strict conformity with the terms of 1 this ordinance. Beaver Creek Reserve has successfully received three prior Knowles Nelson Stewardship grants in the last three years under the Federal Trails Act Grants. We have improved trail infrastructure, signage and now part of the Nature Center's remodel with these grants. Annually, \$40,000-\$45,000 has been awarded; \$130,000 has been received in matching funds that have been applied to these projects to date.

- Beaver Creek Reserve contractually receives Capital Repair and Replace funds to maintain buildings and grounds at our location.
- This year we are staged to update paved sections of walkways and sealcoat existing blacktop.
- We are working with Ayres Associates on a campus plan for BCR to help with the flow of people and activities. This plan has been paid for through donations
- Trails Act Grants allows improvements to infrastructure leading to Trailhead locations including parking lots and walkways.
- If successful we could leverage the \$45,000 dollars from the Capital Repair and Replace dollars to complete \$90,000 worth of infrastructure improvements
- Friends of Beaver Creek Reserve seek approval to apply for the Knowles Nelson Stewardship Grant.

Grant is due by May 1, 2016.

At the March 15, 2016 County Board of Supervisors meeting, Resolution 15-16/154 was referred back to the Committee on Human Resources. At its April 8, 2016 meeting, the Committee on Human Resources denied a request by a vote of 3 against, and 1 for, to support a change in state law to make County Civilian Correctional Officers protective status under the Wisconsin Retirement System.

The following items we discussed during regarding the proposed change:

- 1) A survey was completed of counties throughout Wisconsin regarding Correctional Officers and their status under the Wisconsin Retirement System. Thirty-four (34) counties responded and results are as follows:
 - a. 29 'General status'
 - b. 1 'Combination of Protective & General Status'
 - c. 4 'Protective status'
- 2) If approved, the fiscal impact for the 2016 Budget year includes the following:
 - a. General category annual contribution is 6.6% for the employer & employee.
 - b. Protective service category annual contribution is 10.36% for employer & 6.6% for employee.
 - c. With the current correctional officer and jail sergeant wages, the additional 3.76% employer contribution would cost the County an additional \$111,000 for 2016.
- 3) The committee discussed and acknowledged:
 - a. That the civilian correctional officers do not qualify as protective occupation participants since they do not meet the criteria for protective status as set forth in Wis. Stat. § 40.02(48)(a) as interpreted by Wisconsin appellate court decisions.
 - b. That we have several employees who work in challenging work environments on a daily basis and all bring an incredible value to the service we provide in the community.
 - c. That if correctional officers met the criteria for protective status then they would be definition be eligible for full collective bargaining rights.

WHEREAS, correctional officers are classified as general employees under the Wisconsin Retirement System and deputy sheriffs are classified as protective service.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors support a change in state law to make county civilian correctional officers protective status under the Wisconsin Retirement System.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors directs the county clerk to forward this resolution to the governor, assembly members and senators representing Eau Claire County and the Wisconsin Counties Association.

FACT SHEET

TO FILE NO. 15-16/125

This Resolution requests the state legislature to initiate the process of changing the elected position of county treasurer to an appointed position. Currently under Wis. Stat. § 17.21 (3) a vacancy in the county treasurer is filled by appointment by the county board. This process was used in 2013 when a select committee consisting of the county board chair, 1st vice chair, 2nd vice chair along with the finance & budget committee chair and vice chair was responsible for reviewing and interviewing candidates for the county treasurer position and forwarding a recommendation to the county board to fill the vacancy in the office of county treasurer. The recruitment process used was the same as recruitment for all appointed county positions. This process resulted in 33 applications for the position which was narrowed to 7 applicants by the select committee. The select committee reviewed each applicants training and experience and interviewed the prior to making its recommendation. This process resulted in adoption of a Resolution on July 16, 2013 appointing Glenda Lyons as Eau Claire County Treasurer effective September 7, 2013 through January 2, 2017.

Under Article XII of the Wisconsin Constitution, amending the constitution requires a majority vote of both houses of the legislature, then after the next general election another majority vote of both houses of the legislature and final approval by a majority of the popular vote cast by Wisconsin citizens.

WHEREAS, amending the Wisconsin Constitution requires the majority vote of both houses of the legislature, in two successive legislative sessions and final approval by a majority of the popular vote cast by Wisconsin citizens.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors that it requests state legislature begin the process of changing the position of county treasurer from elected to appointed ultimately giving the voters of the state of Wisconsin the opportunity to make the final decision.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors directs the county clerk to forward this resolution to the governor, assembly members and senators representing Eau Claire County, and the Wisconsin Counties Association.
