- 4. Subject matter the topic or topics must be directly related to the agenda of the regular meeting or shall refer to the policies adopted or proposed by the Board. Public comment is not an open forum for general discussion of values, politics, religion or philosophy. It is also not a forum for electioneering or the praise or criticism of individuals in or out of government;
- 5. Unless the topic addressed is on the agenda for that meeting, neither the Chair, any other Board member, nor any staff member should respond to public input except as follows:
  - a. To acknowledge the contribution;
  - b. To determine that the issue will or will not be placed on a future agenda for discussion or action; and,
  - c. To refer the speaker to the Department for attention to the issue;
  - d. Neither the Chair, any other Board member, any staff member should engage in discussion or exchange with the speakers except for clarification of the issue. If the Chair, any other Board member, or any staff member wishes to follow up directly with the speaker on the matter, that may be done outside of the meeting;

### Crisis Program Update - Ron Hon

<u>New Crisis Coordinator</u> – Ron reported the new crisis coordinator will begin with DHS on April 25.

<u>Crisis Facility</u> - 4 bed facility will open hopefully in May (after Adult Family Home licensed by state) Board members are interested in the degree of education the Crisis facility manager must possess. Any chance for expansion of the 4-bed facility? Asked to track outcomes including diversion statistics and success rate. Winnebago budget should see a decrease and ED's should be less. \$25,621 cost per month.

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- SUPPORTING STATE LEGISLATION EXAMINING ALTERNATIVE JUVENILE JUSTICE **MODELS-**

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin State Juvenile Correctional Institution (JCI), Lincoln Hills School for Boys (Lincoln Hills) was raided by law enforcement on December 5, 2015, in response to allegations of physical abuse of a child, second-degree sexual assault, and victim and witness intimidation; and

WHEREAS, Lincoln Hills is located in North Central Wisconsin, and more than 50% of the juvenile inmate population is from Milwaukee County; and

WHEREAS, on December 17, 2015, the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors passed legislation requesting that judges refrain from placing juveniles at Lincoln Hills and urging the Governor of Wisconsin and the County Executive to find alternative secure placements near Milwaukee; and

WHEREAS, the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel reported on January 11, 2016, that 16 state employees were placed on paid leave due to the ongoing investigation at Lincoln Hills and the Department of Corrections refuses to provide details on how much these paid leaves are costing taxpayers; and

WHEREAS, one of the many repercussions of the issues identified at Lincoln Hills may be the increased cost due to the investigation, e.g., paid leave of staff, overtime caused by the loss of 5.6 percent of its staff, and legal costs; and

WHEREAS, the investigation of Lincoln Hills illustrates what numerous studies have shown that juvenile delinquency services are more successful and cost efficient when they are provided locally in small, community-based programs; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County has advocated for community-based, locally-operated, outcome-driven programming to improve outcomes for youth; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County has developed a number of alternatives to placement at Lincoln Hills, including the 180 Program, a post-dispositional program at the Northwest Regional Juvenile Detention Center which allows a maximum secure detention option for up to 365 days per Wis. Stat. § 938.34(3)(f); and

WHEREAS, under current law state judges order the placement of juveniles in the state-run JCI's and counties are charged daily rates, set by the state for the care of adjudicated juveniles; and

WHEREAS, the state legislature has pending legislation, (2015 Assembly Bill 746), that advocates the creation of a committee to study a successful model for juvenile corrections in Missouri and directs the committee to develop a plan for implementation here in Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, the extent of the investigation at Lincoln Hills is evidence of a larger. institutional problem making it imperative for the County to ensure the safety of Eau Claire County youth by providing a local, evidence-based alternative or having a regional alternative to Lincoln Hills. NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors supports the legislation (2015 Assembly Bill 746), creating a Juvenile Rehabilitation Study Committee to review the Missouri Model of juvenile rehabilitation and to prepare a plan for development and implementation in Wisconsin and any other model of service delivery that better meets the needs of youthful offenders.; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, any additional costs incurred as a result of this investigation of Lincoln Hills should be assumed by the state and not the counties; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the county supports the federal and state investigations of civil rights violation involving youth placed at Lincoln Hills; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors directs the county clerk to forward this resolution to the governor, assembly members and senators representing Eau Claire County and the Wisconsin Counties Association. #### FACT SHEET

#### TO FILE NO. 16-17/006

This ordinance creates Chapter 2.95 of the county code, Living Wage.

Last year, the county board implemented a new salary matrix for county employees, based on equity, adequacy, transparency, and social justice. The purpose of this ordinance is to continue this with contractors of Eau Claire County, to ensure that those entities with which the county does business follow the same principles.

The current federal minimum wage is \$7.25/hr., last adjusted in 2009. Minimum wage, however, is not a living wage, that is, it does not provide for the livelihood of a person or a family; it merely establishes a "floor" of payment. A better measure is a "living wage," that is, a wage which provides a livelihood for persons and families. Any adjustments in minimum wage over time have been far and quickly outpaced by inflation. Thus, persons at this level of income will always fall below the Federal Poverty Level. Any employer paying minimum wage is relying on the availability of public assistance or some other form of support to ensure adequacy of resources. The current minimum wage is below poverty level. This means that the government effectively subsidizes all of those making minimum wage through various forms of public assistance, and employers paying minimum wage rely on that external support, e.g., Walmart counseling its lowest paid employees how they might apply for and receive Food Stamps, Medicaid, etc.

The Federal Poverty Level (FPL) is established annually by the Department of Health and Human Services in order to determine eligibility for a number of public assistance programs. This means that persons whose income is at or below the FPL (or often within 120% of the FPL) will qualify for a number of assistance programs, such as Food Stamps, Medicaid, subsidized health care coverage under the PPACA, etc. The current Federal Poverty Level for a family of four is \$24,300 (Federal Register, 1-25-16). The hourly wage (\$24,300 divided by 2080 hours in the work year) is \$11.68/hr.

This ordinance requires that all contractors with Eau Claire County pay their employees at least 110% of the 2016 FPL (\$12.84/hr.), on an hourly basis, beginning January 1, 2017. The wage requirement increases each year by 5% to a maximum of 130% of FPL by 2021. Thus, the wage requirement is annually indexed to inflation and set at 130% of FPL. The fiscal impact of this ordinance will be reviewed by the respective units in the light of 2017 contracts. It is anticipated that the major impact will be felt in the Department of Human Services because non-profit organizations frequently pay minimum wage or just above that wage. The ordinance may also require some minor adjustments to the recently established salary matrix.

### 2.95.020 Contracting Requirements.

- A. Department heads or their designee shall include requirements for compliance with this chapter in:
- 1. Every bid, request for proposal, or request for qualifications for services, leases, concessions or economic development financial assistance covered under this chapter,
- 2. All new service, lease, and concession agreements, and all new agreements involving financial assistance; and,
- 3. All renewals or amendments of agreements for services, leases, concessions, or economic development financial assistance covered under this chapter after the effective date of this ordinance.
- B. Contractors, subcontractors, and recipients of economic development financial assistance must submit to the department a notarized affidavit certifying that they will comply with the requirements of this chapter prior to contract or subcontract award or receipt of any financial assistance.
- C. Contractors, subcontractors and recipients of financial assistance shall not use the requirements of this chapter to reduce the wages of employees.
- D. County reserves the right to inspect and audit any payroll records of any contractor or subcontractor or recipient of financial assistance for which this chapter applies, for any reason and at any time.
- 2.95.030 Maintenance and Monitoring of Records. The Purchasing Department will maintain all records required by this chapter. The Purchasing Department will:
  - A. Retain a log of all contracts, noting which contracts are covered by this chapter.
- B. Retain notarized affidavits from all contractors subject to the provisions of this chapter that they understand and will comply with its provisions.
- C. Retain a one-page document, filled out annually by all contractors subject to the provisions of this chapter, asserting that they remain in compliance with the provisions of this chapter and providing the required wage range information.
- 2.95.040 Severability and Savings. If any provision of this chapter or application thereof is judged invalid, the invalidity shall not affect other provisions or application of the chapter which can be given effect without the invalid provisions or application, and to this end the provisions of this chapter are declared severable.

# Comprehensive Community Services (CCS) program Supervisor & Service Facilitator

We are requesting your approval for a new Comprehensive Community Services (CCS) program Supervisor and Service Facilitator. Effective April 1, 2016 the State of Wisconsin approved our application for implementation of the Comprehensive Community Services Program.

Comprehensive Community Services (CCS) is a program for individuals of all ages who require ongoing services for a mental illness, substance use disorder, or a dual diagnosis beyond occasional outpatient care, but less than the intensive care provided in an inpatient setting. The individual would work with a dedicated team of service providers to develop a treatment and recovery plan to meet the individual's unique needs. The goal of this community-based approach is to promote better overall health and life satisfaction for the individual and reduce the likelihood of higher end services such as institutional or residential care.

The Department is in the process of developing specific position descriptions for the CCS program supervisor and facilitator. After review and approval by the Human Services Board, the next steps will be to meet with the Committee on Human Resources and the Committee on Finance and Budget.

# STEPPING UP: A National Initiative to Reduce the Number of People with Mental Illnesses in Jails

THERE WAS A TIME WHEN NEWS OF JAILS serving more people with mental illnesses than in-patient treatment facilities was shocking. Now, it is not surprising to hear that jails across the nation serve an estimated 2 million people with serious mental illnesses each year —almost three-quarters of whom also have substance use disorders —or that the prevalence of people with serious mental illnesses in jails is three to six times higher than for the general population. Once incarcerated, they tend to stay longer in jail and upon release are at a higher risk of returning than individuals without these disorders.

The human toll—and its cost to taxpayers—is staggering. Jails spend two to three times more on adults with mental illnesses that require intervention than on people without those needs,<sup>4</sup> yet often do not see improvements in recidivism or recovery. Despite counties' tremendous efforts to address this problem, they are often thwarted by significant obstacles, such as coordinating multiple systems and operating with minimal resources. Without change, large numbers of people with mental illnesses will continue to cycle through the criminal justice system, often resulting in missed opportunities to link them to treatment, tragic outcomes, inefficient use of funding, and failure to improve public safety.

### The National Initiative

Recognizing the critical role local and state officials play in supporting change, the National Association of Counties (NACo), the Council of State Governments (CSG) Justice Center, and the American Psychiatric Foundation (APF) have come together to lead a national initiative to help advance counties' efforts to reduce the number of adults with mental and co-occurring substance use disorders in jails. With support from the U.S. Justice Department's Bureau of Justice Assistance, the initiative will build on the many innovative and proven practices being implemented across the country. The initiative engages a diverse group of organizations with expertise on these issues, including those representing sheriffs, jail administrators, judges, community corrections professionals, treatment providers, people with mental illnesses and their families, mental health and substance use program directors, and other stakeholders.

The initiative is about creating a long-term, national movement—not a moment in time—to raise awareness of the factors contributing to the over-representation of people with mental illnesses in jails, and then using practices and strategies that work to drive those numbers down. The initiative has two key components:

- 1. A CALL TO ACTION demonstrating strong county and state leadership and a shared commitment to a multi-step planning process that can achieve concrete results for jails in counties of all sizes.

  The Call to Action is more than a vague promise for reform; it focuses on developing an actionable plan that can be used to achieve county and state system changes. As part of this Call to Action, county elected officials are being asked to pass a resolution and work with other leaders (e.g., the sheriff, district attorney, treatment providers, and state policymakers), people with mental illnesses and their advocates, and other stakeholders on the following six actions:
  - Convene or draw on a diverse team of leaders and decision makers from multiple agencies committed to safely reducing the number of people with mental illnesses in jails.









- Collect and review prevalence numbers and assess individuals' needs to better identify adults entering jails with mental illnesses and their recidivism risk, and use that baseline information to guide decision making at the system, program, and case levels.
- Examine treatment and service capacity to determine which programs and services are available in the county for people with mental illnesses and co-occurring substance use disorders, and identify state and local policy and funding barriers to minimizing contact with the justice system and providing treatment and supports in the community.
- Develop a plan with measurable outcomes that draws on the jail assessment and prevalence data and the examination of available treatment and service capacity, while considering identified barriers.
- Implement research-based approaches that advance the plan.
- Create a process to track progress using data and information systems, and to report on successes.

In addition to county leaders, national and state associations, criminal justice and behavioral health professionals, state and local policymakers, others with jail authority, and individuals committed to reducing the number of people with mental illnesses in jails should sign on to the Call to Action. Stepping Up participants will receive an online toolkit keyed to the six actions, with a series of exercises and related distance-learning opportunities, peer-to-peer exchanges, and key resources from initiative partners.<sup>5</sup> The online toolkit will include self-assessment checklists and information to assist participants working in counties in identifying how much progress they have already made and a planning template to help county teams develop data-driven strategies that are tailored to local needs.

2. A NATIONAL SUMMIT to advance county-led plans to reduce the number of people with mental illnesses in jails.

Supported by the American Psychiatric Foundation, a summit will be convened in the spring of 2016 in Washington, DC, that includes counties that have signed on to the Call to Action, as well as state officials and community stakeholders such as criminal justice professionals, treatment providers, people with mental illnesses and their advocates, and other subject-matter experts. The summit will help counties advance their plans and measure progress, and identify a core group of counties that are poised to lead others in their regions. Follow-up assistance will be provided to participants to help refine strategies that can be used in counties across the nation. After the 2016 summit, participants will be notified of potential opportunities for sites to be selected for more intensive assistance through federal and private grant programs.

Although much of the initiative focuses on county efforts, states will be engaged at every step to ensure that their legislative mandates, policies, and resource-allocation decisions do not create barriers to plan implementation.
