This ordinance regulates pawnbrokers, secondhand article and secondhand jewelry dealers. These businesses provide opportunities for individuals to readily transfer stolen property unless regulated. The City of Eau Claire recently updated its ordinance to address concerns addressed by the City of Eau Claire Police Department regarding stolen property being sold in these businesses. The sheriff's office has requested a similar ordinance be drafted for Eau Claire County.

This ordinance mirrors very closely the City of Eau Claire ordinance so that there will be uniform regulation of pawnbrokers, secondhand article and secondhand jewelry dealers within the City of Eau Claire and outside the City of Eau Claire. The forms and procedures used by the City of Eau Claire are easily adaptable for use by Eau Claire County. It is hoped that this ordinance will discourage these types of businesses currently located in the City of Eau Claire from moving outside of the city limits. The county ordinance has an exception for secondhand book dealers, since there has been no criminal activity associated with secondhand book dealers. The only second hand book dealer that is located in the county would be put out of business if this ordinance applied to it.

Wis. Stat. § 134.71 (7) (a) authorizes counties to regulate and license pawnbrokers. The ordinance meets the test set forth in <u>Mommsen v. Schueller</u>, 228 Wis. 2d 627, 630-631, 599 NW 2d, 21, 22-23 (Ct. App. 1999). In addition this ordinance is consistent with the county home rule power as set forth in Wis. Stat. § 59.03 in which the legislature confers broad power to counties to pass ordinances on matters of local concerns and ordinances that do not conflict with existing state law or policy. <u>State. ex. rel. Ziervogel v. Washington County Bd. of Adjustment</u>, 2004 WI, 23, 37, 269 Wis. 2d 549, 676 NW 2d 401.

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<u>9.96.020</u> Definitions. In this chapter:

A. "Article" means any item of value.

11 B. "Billable transaction" means every reportable transaction except renewals, 12 redemptions, voids, or extensions of existing pawns or purchases previously reported and 13 continuously in the pawnbroker's possession.

C. "Charitable organization" means a corporation, trust, or community chest, fund, or foundation organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific, literary, or educational purposes, or for the prevention of cruelty to children or animals, no part of the net earnings of which insures to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual.

18 D. "Customer" means a person with whom a pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, 19 or secondhand jewelry dealer or an agent thereof, engages in a transaction of purchase, sale, 20 receipt, or exchange of any secondhand article.

E. "Pawnbroker" means any person who engages in the business of lending money on the deposit or pledge of any article or purchasing any article with an expressed or implied agreement or understanding to sell it back at a subsequent time at a stipulated price. To the extent that a pawnbroker's business includes buying personal property previously used, rented, leased, or selling it on consignment, the provisions of this chapter shall be applicable. A person is not acting as a pawnbroker when engaging in any of the following:

Any transaction at an occasional garage or yard sale, an estate sale, a gun,
 knife, gem, or antique show, or a convention.

29 2. Any transaction entered into by a person engaged in the business of junk 30 collector, junk dealer, or scrap processor, as described in Wis. Stat. 70.995(2)(x).

31 3. Any transaction while operating as a charitable organization or conducting 32 a sale, the proceeds of which are donated to a charitable organization.

4. Any transaction between a buyer of a new article and the person who sold
the article when new that involves any of the following:

35 36 a. The return of the article.

b. The exchange of the article for a different, new article.

5. Any transaction as a purchaser of a secondhand article from a charitable organization if the secondhand article was a gift to the charitable organization.

Any transaction as a seller of a secondhand article that the person bought
from a charitable organization if the secondhand article was a gift to the charitable organization.

F. "Reportable transaction" means every transaction conducted by a pawnbroker in which an article or articles are received through a pawn, purchase, consignment, or trade, or in which a pawn is renewed, extended, voided, or redeemed, or for which a unique transaction number or identifier is generated by their point-of-sale software, and is reportable except:

1. The bulk purchase or consignment of new or used articles from a merchant, manufacturer, or wholesaler having an established permanent place of business, and the retail sale of said articles, provided the pawnbroker must maintain a record of such purchase or consignment that describes each item, and must mark each item in a manner that relates it to that transaction record.

1 2. Retail and wholesale sales of articles originally received by pawn or purchase, and for which all applicable hold and/or redemption periods have expired. 2 "Secondhand" means owned by any person, except a wholesaler, retailer, or 3 4 licensed secondhand article dealer or secondhand jewelry dealer, immediately before the 5 transaction at hand, "Secondhand article dealer" means any person, other than an auctioneer, who 6 H 7 primarily engages in the business of purchasing or selling secondhand articles other than books, 8 except when engaging in any of the following: 9 Any transaction at an occasional garage or yard sale, an estate sale, a gun, 1. 10 knife, gem or antique show or a convention. 11 Any transaction entered into by a person while engaged in a business for 2. which the person is licensed under Wis. Stats. §§ 134.71(2) or (4), or while engaged in the 12 business of junk collector, junk dealer or scrap processor as described in Wis. Stat. § 13 14 70.995(2)(x). 15 Any transaction while operating as a charitable organization or conducting 3. a sale the proceeds of which are donated to a charitable organization. 16 Any transaction between a buyer of a new article and the person who sold 17 4. the article when new which involves either: 18 The return of the article; or 19 a. The exchange of the article for a different, new article. 20 b. 21 Any transaction as a purchaser of a secondhand article from a charitable 5. organization if the secondhand article was a gift to the charitable organization. 22 Any transaction as a seller of a secondhand article which the person 23 6. bought from a charitable organization if the secondhand article was a gift to the charitable 24 organization. 25 "Secondhand jewelry dealer" means any person, other than an auctioneer, who 26 27 engages in the business of any transaction consisting of purchasing, selling, receiving or exchanging secondhand jewelry, except for the following: 28 Any transaction at an occasional garage or yard sale, an estate sale, a gun, 29 1. knife, gem or antique show or a convention. 30 Any transaction with a licensed secondhand jewelry dealer. 31 2. Any transaction entered into by a person while engaged in a business of 3. 32 smelting, refining, assaying or manufacturing precious metals, gems or valuable articles if the 33 person has no retail operation open to the public. 34 Any transaction between a buyer of new jewelry and the person who sold 35 4. the jewelry when new which involves either: 36 The return of the jewelry; or 37 a. The exchange of the jewelry for different, new jewelry. b. 38 Any transaction as a purchaser of secondhand jewelry from a charitable 39 5. organization if the secondhand jewelry was a gift to the charitable organization. 40 Any transaction as a seller of secondhand jewelry which the person bought 41 6. from a charitable organization if the secondhand jewelry was a gift to the charitable organization. 42 43 44 9.96.030 Inspection of items. At all times during the term of the license, the pawnbroker, 45 secondhand article dealer, and secondhand jewelry dealer must allow the sheriff's office to enter 46

the premises where the licensed business is located, including all off-site storage facilities, during normal business hours, except in an emergency, for the purpose of inspecting such premises and inspecting the items, wares, merchandise, and records therein to verify compliance
 with this chapter or other applicable laws.

<u>9.96.040 License</u>. No person may operate as a pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer in the county unless the person first obtains a pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer license under this chapter.

<u>9.96.050 Display of license</u>. Each license issued under this chapter shall be displayed in a conspicuous place visible to anyone entering a licensed premise.

11 <u>9.96.060 License application</u>. A person wishing to operate as a pawnbroker, secondhand 12 article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer shall apply for a license to the county clerk. The 13 clerk shall furnish application forms approved by the sheriff's office that shall require all of the 14 following:

15 A. The applicant's name, place and date of birth, residence address, and residence 16 addresses for the 10-year period prior to the date of the application.

B. The name and address of the business and of the owner of the business premises.

C. Whether the applicant is a natural person, corporation, limited liability company,
 or partnership, and:

1. If the applicant is a corporation, the state where incorporated and the names and addresses of all officers and directors.

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If the applicant is a partnership, the names and addresses of all partners.

3. If the applicant is a limited liability company, the names and addresses of all members.

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The name of the manager or proprietor of the business.

Any other information that the clerk may reasonably require.

D. A statement as to whether the applicant, including an individual, agent, officer, director, member, partner, manager, or proprietor, has been convicted of any crime, statutory violation punishable by forfeiture, or county or municipal ordinance violation. If so, the applicant must furnish information as to the time, place, and offense of all such convictions.

E. Whether the applicant or any other person listed in D. above has ever used or been known by a name other than the applicant's name, and if so, the name or names used and information concerning dates and places used.

F. Whether the applicant or any other person listed in D. above has previously been denied or had revoked or suspended a pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer license from any other governmental unit. If so, the applicant must furnish information as to the date, location, and reason for the action.

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<u>9.96.070 Investigation of license applicant</u>. The sheriff's office shall investigate each
 applicant and any other person listed in 9.96.060 C. above for a pawnbroker, secondhand article
 dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer license. The department shall furnish the information
 derived from that investigation in writing to the county clerk. The investigation shall include
 each agent, officer, member, partner, manager, or proprietor.

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<u>9.96.080 License issuance.</u>

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A. The county clerk shall grant the license if all of the following apply:

At the time of any reportable transaction other than renewals, С. extensions, or redemptions, every pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry 29 dealer must immediately record in English the following information by using ink or other 30 indelible medium on forms or in a computerized record approved by thesheriff's office: 31 A complete and accurate description of each item, including, but not 32 1. limited to any trademark, identification number, serial number, model number, brand name, or 33 other identifying mark on such an item. 34 2. The purchase price, amount of money loaned upon or pledged therefore. 35 The maturity date of the transaction and the amount due, including 36 3. 37 monthly and annual interest rates and all pawn fees and charges. Date, time, and place the item of property was received by the 38 pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer, and the unique alpha 39 and/or numeric transaction identifier that distinguishes it from all other transactions in the 40 pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer's records. 41 Full name, current residence address, current residence telephone number, 42 5. date of birth, and accurate description of the person from whom the item of property was 43 received, including sex, height, weight, race, color of eyes, and color of hair. 44 The identification number and state of issue from any of the following 6. 45 forms of identification of the seller: 46 Current, valid Wisconsin driver's license; 47 a. Current, valid Wisconsin identification card; 48 b.

4 Renewals, extensions, and redemptions. The pawnbroker, secondhand 8. 5 article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer shall provide the original transaction identifier, the date of the current transaction, and the type of transaction for renewals, extensions, and 6 7 redemptions. 8

9 date of transaction.

9. Record retention. Data entries shall be retained for at least 1 year from the

10 10. For every secondhand article purchased, received, or exchanged by a pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer from a customer off the 11 pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer's premises, or consigned to 12 the pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer for sale on their 13 premises, the pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer shall keep a 14 15 written inventory. In this inventory the pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer shall record the name and address of each customer, the date, time, and place of 16 the transaction, and a detailed description of the article that is the subject of the transaction. The 17 customer shall sign his or her name on a declaration of ownership of the secondhand article 18 identified in the inventory and shall state that he or she owns the secondhand article. The 19 pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer shall retain an original and 20 a duplicate of each entry and declaration of ownership relating to the purchase, receipt, or 21 exchange of any secondhand article for not less than one year after the date of the transaction, 22 except as provided in E., and shall make duplicates of the inventory and declarations of 23 ownership available to any law enforcement officer for inspection at any reasonable time. 24 D.

25

Holding period.

26 1. Except as provided in D. 3., any secondhand article purchased or received by a pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer shall be kept on the 27 28 premises or other place for safekeeping for not less than 30 days, unless a shorter holding period is expressly permitted by state law, after the date of purchase or receipt, unless the person known 29 by the pawnbroker to be the lawful owner of the secondhand article redeems it or unless the 30 secondhand article dealer or secondhand jewelry dealer takes and maintains a digital photograph 31 32 of the item in which case the holding period shall be 21 days.

During the period set forth in D. 1., the secondhand article shall be held 33 2. separate from saleable inventory and may not be altered in any manner. The pawnbroker, 34 secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer shall permit any law enforcement officer 35 36 to inspect the secondhand article during this period. Within 24 hours after a request of a law enforcement officer during this period, a pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand 37 38 jewelry dealer shall make available for inspection any secondhand article which is kept off the premises for safekeeping. 39

3. 40 D. 1. and 2. do not apply to a secondhand article consigned to a 41 pawnbroker.

E. 42 Redemption period. Any person pledging, pawning or depositing any item for security must have a minimum of 60 days from the date of that transaction to redeem the item 43 before it may be forfeited and sold. During the 60-day holding period, items may not be 44 removed from the licensed location. Pawnbrokers, secondhand article dealers, and secondhand 45 jewelry dealers are prohibited from redeeming any item to anyone other than the person to whom 46 the receipt was issued, to any person identified in a written and notarized authorization to redeem 47 the property identified in the receipt, or to a person identified in writing by the pledger at the 48 time of the initial transaction and signed by the pledger, or with the approval of thesheriff's 49

1 office. Written authorization for release of property to persons other than the original pledger must be maintained along with the original transaction record in accordance with C. 9. 2

Sheriff order to hold property. F.

4 Investigative hold. Whenever a law enforcement officer from any agency 1. 5 notifies a pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer not to sell an item, the item must not be sold or removed from the premises. The investigative hold shall be 6 confirmed in writing by the originating agency within 72 hours and will remain in effect for 15 7 days from the date of initial notification, or until the investigative order is canceled, or until an 8 order to confiscate is issued, pursuant to 2., whichever comes first. 9

Order to confiscate.

If an item is identified as stolen or evidence in a criminal case, the 11 a. sheriff's office may physically confiscate and remove it from the shop, pursuant to a written 12 order from thesheriff's office. 13

14 When an item is confiscated, the person doing so shall provide b. identification upon request of the pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry 15 dealer, and shall provide the pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry 16 dealer with the name and phone number of the confiscating officer and the case number related 17 to the confiscation. 18

When an order to confiscate is no longer necessary, the sheriff's 19 c. office shall so notify the pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer. 20 21

Daily reports tosheriff. G.

2.

Pawnbrokers must submit every reportable transaction to the sheriff's 22 1. office daily in the following manner. Pawnbrokers must provide to the sheriff's office all 23 information required in C. and other required information, by transferring it from their computer 24 to the APS via modem. All required records must be transmitted completely and accurately after 25 the close of business each day in accordance with standards and procedures established by the 26 sheriff's office using procedures that address security concerns of the pawnbroker and the 27 sheriff's office. The pawnbroker must display a sign of sufficient size in a conspicuous place on 28 the premises which informs all patrons that all transactions are reported daily to the department 29 and APS. 30

Billable transaction fees. Pawnbrokers will be charged for each billable 31 2. transaction reported to thesheriff's office. These fees are intended to pay for the cost of 32 participation in the APS and costs of enforcing this chapter. 33

34 3. If a pawnbroker is unable to successfully transfer the required reports by modem, the pawnbroker must provide the sheriff's office with printed copies of all reportable 35 transactions by 12:00 noon the next business day. 36

If the problem is determined to be in the pawnbroker's system and is not 4. 37 corrected by the close of the first business day following the failure, the pawnbroker must 38 provide the required reports as detailed in 3., and shall be charged a daily reporting failure fee of 39 \$10.00 until the error is corrected, or, if the problem is determined to be outside the 40 pawnbroker's system, the pawnbroker must provide the required reports in 3. and resubmit all 41 such transactions via modem when the error is corrected. 42

Regardless of the cause or origin of the technical problems that prevented 43 5. the pawnbroker from uploading the reportable transactions, upon correction of the problem, the 44 pawnbroker shall upload every reportable transaction from every business day the problem has 45 46 existed.

The provisions of this section notwithstanding, the sheriff's office may, 6. 47 upon presentation of extenuating circumstances, delay the implementation of the daily reporting 48 49 penalty.

1 7. G. shall not apply to businesses that did not have 200 reportable 2 transactions in the past calendar year. However, any such pawnbroker must follow the daily 3 reporting procedure for each reportable transaction by submitting a written transaction form 4 approved by the sheriff's office to the department on the business day following the date of the 5 reportable transaction.

6 H. Exception for customer return or exchange. Nothing in this section applies to the return or exchange from a customer to a pawnbroker of any secondhand article purchased from 7 8 the pawnbroker.

10 <u>9.96.100 Receipt required</u>. Every pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer must provide a receipt to the party identified in every reportable transaction and 11 must maintain a duplicate of that receipt for 3 years. The receipt must include at least the 12 13 following information:

Α.

The name, address, and telephone number of the licensed business.

Β. The date and time the item was received by the pawnbroker, secondhand article 15 16 dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer. C.

Whether the item was pawned or sold, or the nature of the transaction.

D. An accurate description of each item received, including, but not limited to, any 18 19 trademark, identification number, serial number, model number, brand name, or other identifying 20 mark on such an item.

21 E. The signature or unique identifier of the pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer or employee that conducted the transaction. 22

23 24 F. The amount advanced or paid.

The monthly and annual interest rates, including all pawn fees and charges. G.

25 H. The last regular day of business by which the item must be redeemed by the pledger without risk that the item will be sold, and the amount necessary to redeem the pawned 26 27 item on that date.

28 T. The full name, residence address, residence telephone number, and date of birth 29 of the pledger or seller.

30 J. The identification number and state of issue from any of the following forms of 31 identification of the seller:

Current, valid photo driver's license or identification card issued by 34 3. another state or province of Canada. 35

9.96.110 Label required. Pawnbrokers, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry 40 dealer must attach a label to every item at the time it is pawned, purchased, or received in 41 inventory from any reportable transaction. Permanently recorded on this label must be the 42 number or name that identifies the transaction in the shop's records, the transaction date, the 43 name of the item and the description or the model and serial number of the items as reported to 44 thesheriff's office, whichever is applicable, and the date the item is out of pawn or can be sold, if 45 applicable. Labels shall not be reused. 46

9.96.120 Prohibited acts.

2 No person under the age of 18 years may pawn or sell or attempt to pawn or sell Α. 3 goods with any pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer, nor may any pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer receive any goods 4 5 from a person under the age of 18 years, except as permitted by 9.96.090 B. 2.

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No pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer may Β. 7 receive any goods from a person of unsound mind or an intoxicated person.

8 No pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer may C. receive any goods unless the seller presents identification in the form of a valid driver's license, 9 a valid state of Wisconsin identification card, or current, valid photo driver's license or 10 identification card issued by the state of residency of the person from whom the item was 11 received. 12

13 D. No pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer may receive any item of property that possesses an altered or obliterated serial number or other 14 15 identification number, or any item of property that has had its serial number removed.

No person may pawn, pledge, sell, consign, leave, or deposit any article of 16 E. property not their own, nor shall any person pawn, pledge, sell, consign, leave, or deposit the 17 property of another, whether with permission or without, nor shall any person pawn, pledge, sell, 18 consign, leave, or deposit any article of property in which another has a security interest with any 19 pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer. 20

21 No person seeking to pawn, pledge, sell, consign, leave, or deposit any article of F. property with any pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer shall 22 give a false or fictitious name, nor give a false date of birth, nor give a false or out-of-date 23 address of residence or telephone number, nor present a false or altered identification or the 24 identification of another to any pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry 25 dealer. 26

9.96.130 License denial, suspension, or revocation.

А. A license issued hereunder may be denied, revoked, or suspended by the county 29 administrative determination that the licensee has committed fraud, 30 clerk upon misrepresentation, or provided a false statement in the application for a license, or violated this 31 chapter or Wis. Stats. §§134.71, 943.34, 948.62 or 948.63, or violated any local, state, or federal 32 law substantially related to the businesses licensed under this chapter. 33

The county clerk may deny, suspend, or revoke any license issued under this В. 34 section upon administrative determination that the applicant is not a citizen of the United States 35 or a resident alien, or upon whom it is impractical or impossible to conduct a background or 36 financial investigation due to the unavailability of information. 37

Appeal from a determination made under this section shall be made to the 38 C. committee on judiciary and law enforcement. 39

Notice of Appeal. Appeals to the committee can be made by any person 40 1. having a license denied, revoked or suspended within 30 days after the decision by filing a 41 written notice of appeal with the county clerk. The committee shall hold a hearing within 30 42 days of the filing of the appeal, or at such time as agreed upon by both parties. The appellant 43 shall be notified at the address provided on the appeal by either certified mail receipt requested 44 or registered mail post marked at least 10 days before the hearing. The county clerk shall 45 provide the committee all of the papers constituting the record upon which the action appealed 46 was taken 47

2. 1 Hearing. At the hearing the appellant and the county clerk may be 2 represented by counsel, many present evidence, and may call and examine witnesses and cross-3 examin witnesses of the other party. The chair or acting chair shall conduct the hearing.

If applicable, the presiding member may administer oaths to witnesses, issue subpoenas and seek 4 5 advice of counsel. The rules of evidence provided in Wis. Stat. § 227.45, for administrative 6 proceedings shall be followed. The clerk of the committee may receive and mark all exhibits, if 7 any. If either or both parties request that the hearing be recorded on audio or video tape or 8 requests a stenographic recording, the staff shall make the necessary arrangements bu the 9 expense shall be borne by the requesting party, or split equally if requested by both parties. Such 10 request shall be made at least 5 days before the hearing.

11 Decision. The board may issue an oral decision at the time of the hearing. 3. 12 Within 10 days of the completion of the hearing, the aggrieved person may request the board to 13 reduce its decision to written form, which the board shall do within 10 days of receipt. The 14 board shall have the power to affirm or reverse the administrative determination. Such decisions 15 shall be consistent with applicable law and, when issued in written form, shall be final 16 determinations for the purpose of judicial review. 17

9.96.140 Fees.

19 Α. The license fee under this chapter for the pawnbroker shall be \$210, for a second 20 hand article dealer \$27, for a second hand jewelry dealer \$30 and for a mall/flea market \$165.

21 В. A billable transaction fee of \$1 shall be charged for each billable transaction, and 22 such fees shall be billed to each pawnbroker monthly and are due and payable within 30 days of 23 the billing date. Failure to pay within that time period is a violation of this chapter. 24

25 9.96.150 Penalty. Any person who is convicted of violating any of the provisions of this 26 chapter shall forfeit not less than \$5 nor more than \$2,000, plus the costs of prosecution, and in 27 default of such payment, shall be imprisoned in the county jail until such forfeiture and costs are 28 paid, but not exceeding 90 days. Each day of violation shall constitute a separate offense. 29

SUBJECT: PAWNBROKER ORDINANCE

Since the August county board meeting the committee on judiciary and law enforcement has met three times on this issue and has heard concerns expressed form two secondhand dealers. The committee directed Detective Henning to obtain additional information regarding the APS system and for me to follow-up with the Eau Claire City Attorney's office. I also reviewed a copy of the September 9, 2016 letter from Town of Ludington Chair Randall Horlacher addressed to county board members. At the committee's December 1 meeting, the committee asked that a Q& A document be drafted to address the questions that had been raised in the county board and committee meetings. Subsequently the committee chair requested an updated Q&A be prepared that also addressed the questions asked at the December 20 county board meeting. See questions 12-18.

Question 1:

Who requested this ordinance be drafted? The Eau Claire County Sheriff's Office.

Question 2: <u>Is the county authorized to regulate and license pawnbrokers?</u> Yes under Wis. Stat. §134.71(7)(a).

Question 3: <u>What types of business does this ordinance regulate</u>? Pawnbrokers, secondhand dealers and secondhand jewelry dealers.

Question 4:

<u>Do any other municipalities within Eau Claire County regulate these types of businesses</u>? Yes, the City of Eau Claire does. This ordinance mirrors very closely the City of Eau Claire ordinance so there will be uniform regulation. County Board February 3, 2017 Page 2

Question 5: Are secondhand book dealers covered?

No, there has been no reported criminal activity associated with secondhand book dealers.

Question 6:

Does the ordinance apply to antique shops that only purchase items from licensed antique dealers?

No.

Question 7:

Does the Town of Ludington have authority to enact an ordinance regarding pawn brokers and secondhand article and jewelry dealers?

Yes, Wis. Stat. § 134.71 authorizes towns to adopt a local ordinance.

Question 8:

What is required for implementing the APS system?

The APS system is only required for pawnbrokers. Computer hardware and software is required. The cost of the APS system software can run from approximately \$2500 to \$5000 depending on the number of computers used in the business. If there are no computers currently being used the hardware cost of the computers would be added to the software cost.

Question 9:

Is the APS software system required for secondhand article and jewelry dealers? No.

Question 10:

Would secondhand dealers have to record all the transactions?

No. For secondhand dealers there is a free APS Capture Program to enter transactions and upload them to APS. Otherwise what is used in the City of Eau Claire is the official State of Wisconsin Property Transaction Record, a copy of which is attached.

Question 11:

What types of items are excluded from the ordinance?

In addition to books, items received from occasional garage or yard sales, estate sales, gun or knife, general antique shows or a convention, from licensed dealers including auctioneers, from charitable organizations where articles where donated to the charitable organization and from scrap dealers.

Question 12:

If a town, village or city within Eau Claire County passes a pawnshop ordinance would the county ordinance apply.?

No. The town, city or village pawnshop ordinance would supercede the county ordinance within that town, village or city.

Question 13:

Is the pawnshop ordinance a zoning ordinance?

No. The authority of the county to adopt a pawnshop ordinance is in Chapter 134 of the Wisconsin Statutes titled Miscellaneous Trade Regulations and the proposed ordinance would create Chapter 9.96 of the County Code which is under consumer protection and public health and welfare.

Question 14:

<u>Are there any pawnshops currently located outside of the Eau Claire city limits?</u> No. However, there are some secondhand dealers that would be subject to the ordinance.

Question 15:

Is there a connection between the meth problem and stolen goods being sold to pawnshops? Yes. A number of meth and other substance abuse addicts support their addictions by stealing property and selling it to pawnshops. An FBI report for the State of Wisconsin released January 11, 2017 stated: "Property crimes will continue to grow, as this type of activity is one of the main ways meth users support themselves...The lack of information sharing between property recovery systems will continue to present a challenge to law enforcement and pawnshops as they attempt to identify stolen items." Enforcement of the City of Eau Claire pawnshop ordinance has resulted in a majority of the stolen goods being sold in the twin cities area.

Question 16:

Does the \$2,500 bond requirement in section 9.60.080 A.2. apply to secondhand dealers? No. By the terms of the ordinance the bond requirement does not apply to secondhand dealers. This has been confirmed by the Eau Claire City Attorney's Office. However, to eliminate any possible ambiguity the amendment on page 5, line 3 adds language limiting it to a pawnbroker's license.

Question 17:

How long has the City of Eau Claire Pawnbrokers Ordinance been in place? The original ordinance was adopted in 2003. It was amended in 2016.

Question 18:

Are there any typos?

Yes. Three typos, a missing word, inserting spaces between words and replacing "or' with a comma are addressed in 2-12 of the amendment referred to in question 16.

GENERAL:

Completion of this form is required for every transaction that occurs. Multiple transactions may be recorded on one form unless duplicate items are the subject of the transaction and then separate forms may be necessary. This form must be retained by the dealer for not less than one year and made available to any law enforcement officer for inspection at any time during this period. Additional forms may be obtained by contacting the County or Municipal Clerk.

BUSINESS AND SELLER IDENTIFICATION:

Enter the business name and specify if the item is being purchased or pawned. The business can specify its own number in the "business transaction number" block. Be sure to indicate the full name of the individual. Use M (Male) or F (Female). Authorized abbreviations for Race are: W (White), B (Black), I (American Indian or Alaskan Native), A (Asian or Pacific Islander) or U (Unknown). The height should be entered as feet and inches (e.g., 6'4"), and the hair color using BRO (Brown), BLK (Black), BLN (Blonde), GRY (Gray), RED (Red), SDY (Sandy), WHI (White) and XXX (Other). Eye color abbreviations are: BLU (Blue), BRO (Brown), GRY (Gray), GRN (Green), HAZ (Hazel), PNK (Pink) or XXX (Other). Be sure to enter the complete address and if the identification produced is a driver" license number specify the state that issued the license.

JEWELRY TRANSACTION:

Check the appropriate block describing the jewelry item. If more than one kind of jewelry is involved, additional forms may be required. If the item involves a precious stone describe the kind and size of stone as well as the number of stones in the appropriate area. The "description" area should be used for recording any additional identifying information. If a watch is being sold or pawned, specify the brand and describe the watch in the jewelry description area.

OTHER ARTICLE TRANSACTION:

Check the box that best describes the article. Indicate the serial number, brand name and; if appropriate, the size, color and model of the article. The detailed description area should specify any unique characteristics of the item.

FIREARM TRANSACTION:

Check the box that best describes the weapon type and the action. If the type and action do not fit any of the categories provided, check "other" and describe the character of the weapon. Complete the remainder of the boxes to fully describe the weapon. The "other identification" box should be used to indicate any other characteristics of the weapon, e.g. brown walnut oversized grips, gold or silver inlaid sorollwork, etc.

DECLARATION OF OWNERSHIP:

The individual is required to complete this information and sign the form in the appropriate area. If the item is a weapon, the background certification information is mandatory. A right index fingerprint impression must be obtained. This can be accomplished by having the individual place his/her right index finger on a pre-inked pad and lightly rolling the finger from right to left on the pad. After the finger is inked repeat the rolling process in the appropriate block on the form.

MANDATORY HOLDING PERIODS:

Wisconsin Statute 134.71(8)(d) specifies the length of time items must be "held" by the dealer. Any secondhand article or jewelry purchased or received by a pawnbroker must be kept for not less than thirty (30) days; any article purchased or received by a secondhand article dealer shall be kept for not less than ten (10) days; and any secondhand jewelry purchased or received by a secondhand jewelry dealer shall be kept for not less than ten (10) days; and any secondhand jewelry purchased or received by a secondhand jewelry dealer shall be kept for not less than ten (10) days; and any secondhand jewelry purchased or received by a secondhand jewelry dealer shall be kept for not less than ten (10) days; and any secondhand jewelry purchased or received by a secondhand jewelry dealer shall be kept for not less than ten (15) days. During this holding period, the pawnbroker, secondhand article dealer or secondhand jewelry dealer shall permit any law enforcement officer to inspect the secondhand article or jewelry.

FACT SHEET

Eau Claire County received substantial flood damage as a result of the flooding that occurred on September 21-22, 2016. Eau Claire County declared a State of Emergency on September 23, 2016 for the flooding event. Areas in Eau Claire County that experienced flooding included the Eau Claire River, Lake Eau Claire, Nine Mile Creek, Lake Altoona and other waterways in the northern part of the County.

On September 23, 24, and 26, 2016, planning and development staff conducted inspections of the flooded properties to document the extent of the damage to residential structures. County surveying staff surveyed high water marks from the flood waters on Lake Eau Claire and found that the flood waters exceeded the 100-year storm event.

Eau Claire County is making application for a Section 404 Hazard Mitigation Grant for the purpose of acquisition and demolition (buy out) of two properties that were flooded. This is voluntary participation by the property owners. In 2016, there were two separate Presidential Declarations for flooding in the State of Wisconsin. Communities across the state are eligible to apply for hazard mitigation assistance from FEMA when there is a Presidential Declaration.

Based on the grant's budget cost analysis the costs associated with acquisition of the two properties are \$259,000. If grant is awarded, FEMA would cover 75% of the costs (\$194,235), Wisconsin Emergency Management (WEM) would cover 12.5% (\$32,387.50) and the County would cover the local match of 12.5% (\$32,387.50).

The county's local match of 12.5% can include in kind dollars for staff for administering the grant, demolition and restoration of the sites by the highway and parks and forest departments, and possibly the Land Conservation Land Stewardship Fund.

The approval of this resolution is a requirement of the 404 Hazard Mitigation grant application confirming the county's commitment to providing the required 12.5% local match.

There fiscal impacts are \$32,387.50.
