assure maximum public benefits; to protect the public rights, interests, and investments in such lands; and to compensate the counties for the public uses, benefits, and privileges these lands provide; all in a manner which will provide a reasonable revenue to the towns in which such lands lie; and

WHEREAS, the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors, on February 6, 2007, adopted Resolution 06-07/102 approving the Eau Claire County Forest Comprehensive Land Use Plan for a period of 15 years; and

WHEREAS, the county board has the authority to acquire properties for the purpose of establishing county forest land pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 28.10 and as outlined in Chapter 400 of the Eau Claire County Forest Comprehensive Land Use Plan; and

WHEREAS, acquisition of said properties would perpetually provide forest products to our local economy, revenue to the county, outdoor recreation opportunities to the public and improve property administration of the county forest; and

Development (HUD) in developing the process to consolidate and defederalize the municipal revolving loan funds into the RBF, Inc. as outlined in the Investment Strategy and Memorandum of Understanding with DOC; and

WHEREAS, starting in 2011, administration of the CDBG program at the state level was transferred from DOC to the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation (WEDC), and then to the Wisconsin Department of Administration (DOA) in July, 2013; and

WHEREAS, on April 1, 2015 DOA notified the RBF that HUD has determined that the proper defederalization process was not followed and that all existing cash and future consolidated loan fund repayments thereby must be considered federal and must adhere to all accompanying federal rules and requirements; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County does not agree with the DOA and HUD ruling because the process for defederalization was originally provided and directed by DOC and HUD; and

WHEREAS, having to administer the Consolidated Revolving Loan Fund with the federal restrictions will minimize the fund's usefulness to businesses in that the federal requirements are restrictive and burdensome.

WHEREAS, Paragraph 23 of Motion #520 changes the standards for regulation of existing structures in the shoreland area contrary to adopted standards in Wis. Admin. Code NR § 115 and to the detriment of environmental quality and the orderly economic development of Eau Claire County; and

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin and Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources has adopted Wis. Admin. Code NR § 115 and updated it periodically after public input and review; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County has 18 lakes, 161 miles of trout streams along with 40 miles of shoreline along the Eau Claire and Chippewa Rivers, that are pressured with both new development and redevelopment of existing structures; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County has been enforcing the minimum standards of Wis. Admin. Code NR § 115 since its inception in the late 1960s, and has accumulated considerable experience while working with the various incarnations of Wis. Admin. Code NR § 115 over many years, and furthermore has noted during these many years that the current laws have protected the water quality in Eau Claire County and, at the same time, have protected property values, the county's wildlife and fisheries habitat, and the natural scenic beauty of Eau Claire County's shorelands and, at the same time, provided flexibility to property owners in development of their property; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County Board members conclude that the water quality of those water bodies within our county would suffer if development is not regulated to the benefit of both the property owner and the water body whose shorelines are proposed for development as it currently is in Wis. Admin. Code NR § 115; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County has had good protection of landowner rights, property values, and the environment, including water quality, when following the current minimum standards; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County feels strongly that counties should be able to enforce more than the minimum standards to protect their unique resources; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County feels that the minimum standards should not be changed without due consideration by the entire legislature, the Natural Resources Board, and the public; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County strongly objects to Paragraph 23 of Motion #520 amending the 2015-2017 State of Wisconsin Budget (SB 21 and AB 21) because it weakens regulation of non-conforming structures and does not provide adequate protection of our valuable water resources; and

WHEREAS, the amendment, as written, will prevent the local governmental units charged by the State of Wisconsin with overseeing development within its shorelands from protecting the rights of the property owner, the citizens of the area, and the environment in a fair and equitable manner; and

WHEREAS, Paragraph #23 of Motion # 520, as written, will result in unchecked development along our shorelines which will cause irreparable harm to the water quality of our county, result in a drop in property values which in turn will damage the economy of our county, and promote harm to the environment by contributing to the degradation of our surface waters and ultimately the ground water of our county and the state.

WHEREAS, public policy changes of this magnitude should be removed from the budget and introduced as legislation so hearings and debate can be held before enactment.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors that it hereby requests that the State of Wisconsin repeal Paragraph 23 of Motion #520 to the 2015-2017 budget bill (SB 21 and AB 21) and retain the current provisions of Wis. Admin. Code NR § 115, Wisconsin Administrative Code, and thereby protect the citizens and environment of our county and great state.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors directs the county clerk to forward this resolution to the governor, assembly members and senators representing Eau Claire County and the Wisconsin Counties Association.

WHEREAS, local government in Wisconsin is responsible for about 90% of the road miles in the state; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin's diverse economy is dependent upon county and town roads as well as city and village streets and transit systems across the state; and

WHEREAS, according to a report commissioned by the Local Government Institute (LGI), the condition of Wisconsin's highways is now in the bottom third of the country; and

WHEREAS, state funding for local roads in Wisconsin has failed to keep up with costs over the past several decades which has adversely affected local transportation finances. According to the LGI study, municipal transportation spending has declined from \$275 per capita in 2000 to \$227 in 2012. In only two states did local transportation spending increase less than in Wisconsin during 2000-2011; and

WHEREAS, levy limits do not allow local government to make up for the deterioration of state funding; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin's over-reliance on bonding eats away at the state's segregated funding sources - the state gas tax and vehicle registration fees - which increasingly go to pay debt service rather than fund local transportation needs; and

WHEREAS, safety is a primary concern and responsibility of local governments across Wisconsin. Unfortunately, according to TRIP, a national nonprofit transportation research group, Wisconsin had 347 non-interstate, rural road fatalities in 2013; and

WHEREAS, the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors recognizes that our state highway and interstate system is the backbone of our surface transportation system and plays a vital role in the economy of Wisconsin. Both local and state roads need to be properly maintained in order for our economy to grow; and

WHEREAS, from a competitive standpoint, Wisconsin motorists pay significantly less than any of our neighbors when you combine the annual cost of the state gas tax and vehicle registration fees; and

WHEREAS, the Transportation Finance and Policy Commission, appointed by the governor and legislature clearly found that if Wisconsin does not adjust its user fees, the condition of both our state and local roads will deteriorate significantly over the next decade.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors that the governor and legislature are urged to agree upon a sustainable solution--one that includes a responsible level of bonding and adjusts user fees to adequately fund Wisconsin's transportation system. -PLEDGING \$3,500,000 TO HELP FUND THE CONSTRUCTION OF "THE CONFLUENCE" COMMUNITY ARTS CENTER PROJECT LOCATED IN DOWNTOWN EAU CLAIRE-

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County has a successful history of collaboration with public, private and not-for-profit organizations within the county that have been beneficial to the community and the respective organizations; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire Confluence Inc., has been established as a not-for-profit, non-stock corporation to receive funds and cause the construction of the Confluence Arts Center; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire Confluence Inc., has proposed "The Confluence" project to be located in downtown Eau Claire and consisting of a shared arts center, a mixed-use building for housing and commercial/retail space, structure parking, public park and open space with public amenities and completion of a river walk/pedestrian trail on the east bank of the Chippewa River and the south bank of the Eau Claire River; and

WHEREAS, "The Confluence" project provides a unique opportunity for the community to work collaboratively to meet current and future needs of community, the university and the county; and

WHEREAS, the construction of the proposed project will require a strong partnership among the private sector, local government, nonprofit organizations and the university and would combine the experience, capability, skills, talent and financial resources of the public and private sectors to accomplish a project that could not be completed by any one of the organizations on their own; and

WHEREAS, the construction and operation of the "Confluence Project" will strengthen the local and regional economy resulting in increased county sales tax revenue, create jobs, raise the property tax base and attract and retain talent in the community that will benefit all Eau Claire County citizens; and

WHEREAS, the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors is authorized to provide funding for a community arts center pursuant to Wis. Stat. §59.56(1); and

WHEREAS, the referendum as required by Resolution Enrolled No. R157-092 to obtain the approval of Eau Claire County electors for such investment, passed on April 1, 2014; and

WHEREAS the State of Wisconsin has authorized in the 2015-17 biennial budget a non-state agency grant in the amount of \$15,000,000.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors hereby agrees to authorize \$3,500,000 toward the construction of "*The Confluence*" community arts center subject to the following contingencies:

- Evidence of funding of at least \$15,000,000 from philanthropy and other private and public sources required as a local match by the State of Wisconsin to qualify for the non-state agency grant.
- Evidence of sufficient funding guarantees and reserves to ensure long-term operational sustainability.
- Successful negotiation and approval of funding, development and operational agreements by and between
 the various public, private, nonprofit and university parties that will have a financial interest in the
 construction and operation of the facility.
- Establishment of a sustainable operating revenue stream and an appropriate governance structure to be implemented and approved by all parties directly involved in the financing and operation of the Confluence Arts Center and multi-use segments of the project.
- Approval by the City of Eau Claire of all required rezoning, site plans, parking plans and permits required for the construction of the project.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors authorizes issuance of general obligation promissory notes in the amount of \$3,500,000, which must be repaid within 10 years to provide funding for a donation for the *Community* Arts Center portion of "*The Confluence*" project, subject to the aforementioned contingencies.

-RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF \$9,500,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION PROMISSORY NOTES, SERIES 2015A-

WHEREAS, the County Board of Supervisors hereby finds and determines that it is necessary, desirable and in the best interest of Eau Claire County, Wisconsin (the "County") to raise funds for public purposes, including paying the cost of capital projects in the County including bridge construction and maintenance, information systems software, hardware and broadband, general building repair and maintenance projects, and vehicle replacements (the "Project");

WHEREAS, the County Board of Supervisors hereby finds and determines that the Project is within the County's power to undertake and therefore serves a "public purpose" as that term is defined in Section 67.04(1)(b), Wisconsin Statutes;

WHEREAS, none of the proceeds of the General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 2015A shall be used to fund the operating expenses of the general fund of the County or to fund the operating expenses of any special revenue fund of the County that is supported by the property taxes;

WHEREAS, counties are authorized by the provisions of Section 67.12(12), Wisconsin Statutes, to borrow money and issue general obligation promissory notes for such public purposes;

WHEREAS, the County has directed Ehlers & Associates, Inc. ("Ehlers") to take the steps necessary to sell the general obligation promissory notes (the "Notes") to pay the cost of the Project;

WHEREAS, Ehlers, in consultation with the officials of the County, prepared a Notice of Sale (a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by this reference) setting forth the details of and the bid requirements for the Notes and indicating that the Notes would be offered for public sale on September 15, 2015;

WHEREAS, the County Clerk (in consultation with Ehlers) caused a form of notice of the sale to be published and/or announced and caused the Notice of Sale to be distributed to potential bidders offering the Notes for public sale on September 15, 2015;

I. WHEREAS, the County has duly received bids for the Notes as described on the Bid Tabulation attached hereto as Exhibit B and incorporated herein by this reference (the "Bid Tabulation"); and

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the bid proposal (the "Proposal") submitted by the financial institution listed first on the Bid Tabulation fully complies with the bid requirements set forth in the Notice of Sale and is deemed to be the most advantageous to the County. Ehlers has recommended that the County accept the Proposal. A copy of said Proposal submitted by such institution (the "Purchaser") is attached hereto as Exhibit C and incorporated herein by this reference.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Board of Supervisors of the County that:

Section 1A. Ratification of the Notice of Sale and Offering Materials. The County Board of Supervisors of the County hereby ratifies and approves the details of the Notes set forth in Exhibit A attached hereto as and for the details of the Notes. The Notice of Sale and any other offering materials prepared and circulated by Ehlers are hereby ratified and approved in all respects. All actions taken by officers of the County and Ehlers in connection with the preparation and distribution of the Notice of Sale, and any other offering materials are hereby ratified and approved in all respects.

Section 1B. Authorization and Award of the Notes. For the purpose of paying the cost of the Project, there shall be borrowed pursuant to Section 67.12(12), Wisconsin Statutes, the principal sum of NINE MILLION FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$9,500,000) from the Purchaser in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Proposal. The Proposal of the Purchaser offering to purchase the Notes for the sum set forth on the Proposal, plus accrued interest to the date of delivery, resulting in a true interest cost as set forth on the Proposal is hereby accepted. The Chairperson and County Clerk or other appropriate officers of the County are authorized and directed to execute an acceptance of the Proposal on behalf of the County. The good faith deposit of the Purchaser shall be retained by the County Treasurer until the closing of the note issue, and any good faith deposits submitted by unsuccessful bidders shall be promptly returned. The Notes shall bear interest at the rates set forth on the Proposal.

Section 2. Terms of the Notes. The Notes shall be designated "General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 2015A"; shall be issued in the aggregate principal amount of \$9,500,000; shall be dated October 7, 2015; shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof; shall be numbered R-1 and upward; and shall bear interest at the rates per annum and mature on September 1 of each year, in the years and principal amounts as set forth on the Pricing Summary attached hereto as Exhibit D-1 and incorporated herein by this reference. Interest shall be payable semi-annually on March 1 and September 1 of each year commencing on September 1, 2016. Interest shall be computed upon the basis of a 360-day year of twelve 30-day months and will be rounded pursuant to the rules of the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board. The schedule of principal and interest payments due on the Notes is set forth on the Debt Service Schedule attached hereto as Exhibit D-2 and incorporated herein by this reference (the "Schedule").

Section 3. Redemption Provisions. The Notes maturing on September 1, 2023 and thereafter shall be subject to redemption prior to maturity, at the option of the County, on September 1, 2022 or on any date thereafter. Said Notes shall be redeemable as a whole or in part, and if in part, from maturities selected by the County and within each maturity, by lot, at the principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest to the date of redemption.

<u>Section 4. Form of the Notes</u>. The Notes shall be issued in registered form and shall be executed and delivered in substantially the form attached hereto as <u>Exhibit E</u> and incorporated herein by this reference.

Section 5. Tax Provisions.

(A) Direct Annual Irrepealable Tax Levy. For the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the Notes as the same becomes due, the full faith, credit and resources of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged, and there is hereby levied upon all of the taxable property of the County a direct annual irrepealable tax in the years 2015 through 2024 for the payments due in the years 2016 through 2025 in the amounts set forth on the Schedule.

(B) Tax Collection. So long as any part of the principal of or interest on the Notes remains unpaid, the County shall be and continue without power to repeal such levy or obstruct the collection of said tax until all such payments have been made or provided for. After the issuance of the Notes, said tax shall be, from year to year, carried onto the tax roll of the County and collected in addition to all other taxes and in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes of the County for said years are collected, except that the amount of tax carried onto the tax roll may be reduced in any year by the amount of any surplus money in the Debt Service Fund Account created below.

(C) Additional Funds. If at any time there shall be on hand insufficient funds from the aforesaid tax levy to meet principal and/or interest payments on said Notes when due, the requisite amounts shall be paid from other funds of the County then available, which sums shall be replaced upon the collection of the taxes herein levied.

Section 6. Segregated Debt Service Fund Account.

(A) Creation and Deposits. There be and there hereby is established in the treasury of the County, if one has not already been created, a debt service fund, separate and distinct from every other fund, which shall be maintained in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Debt service or sinking funds established for obligations previously issued by the County may be considered as separate and distinct accounts within the debt service fund.

Within the debt service fund, there hereby is established a separate and distinct account designated as the "Debt Service Fund Account for \$9,500,000 General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 2015A, dated October 7, 2015" (the "Debt Service Fund Account") and such account shall be maintained until the indebtedness evidenced by the Notes is fully paid or otherwise extinguished. The County Treasurer shall deposit in the Debt Service Fund Account (i) all accrued interest received by the County at the time of delivery of and payment for the Notes; (ii) any premium which may be received by the County above the par value of the Notes and accrued interest thereon; (iii) all money raised by the taxes herein levied and any amounts appropriated for the specific purpose of meeting principal of and interest on the Notes when due; (iv) such other sums as may be necessary at any time to pay principal of and interest on the Notes when due; (v) surplus monies in the Borrowed Money Fund as specified below; and (vi) such further deposits as may be required by Section 67.11, Wisconsin Statutes.

(B) Use and Investment. No money shall be withdrawn from the Debt Service Fund Account and appropriated for any purpose other than the payment of principal of and interest on the Notes until all such principal and interest has been paid in full and the Notes canceled; provided (i) the funds to provide for each payment of principal of and interest on the Notes prior to the scheduled receipt of taxes from the next succeeding tax collection may be invested in direct obligations of the United States of America maturing in time to make such payments when they are due or in other investments permitted by law; and (ii) any funds over and above the amount of such principal and interest payments on the Notes may be used to reduce the next succeeding tax levy, or may, at the option of the County, be invested by purchasing the Notes as permitted by and subject to Section 67.11(2)(a), Wisconsin Statutes, or in permitted municipal investments under the pertinent provisions of the Wisconsin Statutes ("Permitted Investments"), which investments shall continue to be a part of the Debt Service Fund Account. Any

investment of the Debt Service Fund Account shall at all times conform with the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code") and any applicable Treasury Regulations (the "Regulations").

(C) Remaining Monies. When all of the Notes have been paid in full and canceled, and all Permitted Investments disposed of, any money remaining in the Debt Service Fund Account shall be transferred and deposited in the general fund of the County, unless the County Board of Supervisors directs otherwise.

Section 7. Proceeds of the Notes; Segregated Borrowed Money Fund. The proceeds of the Notes (the "Note Proceeds") (other than any premium and accrued interest which must be paid at the time of the delivery of the Notes into the Debt Service Fund Account created above) shall be deposited into a special fund separate and distinct from all other funds of the County and disbursed solely for the purposes for which borrowed or for the payment of the principal of and the interest on the Notes. In no event shall monies in the Borrowed Money Fund be used to fund operating expenses of the general fund of the County or of any special revenue fund of the County that is supported by property taxes. Monies in the Borrowed Money Fund may be temporarily invested in Permitted Investments. Any monies, including any income from Permitted Investments, remaining in the Borrowed Money Fund after the purposes for which the Notes have been issued have been accomplished, and, at any time, any monies as are not needed and which obviously thereafter cannot be needed for such purposes shall be deposited in the Debt Service Fund Account.

Section 8. No Arbitrage. All investments made pursuant to this Resolution shall be Permitted Investments, but no such investment shall be made in such a manner as would cause the Notes to be "arbitrage bonds" within the meaning of Section 148 of the Code or the Regulations and an officer of the County, charged with the responsibility for issuing the Notes, shall certify as to facts, estimates, circumstances and reasonable expectations in existence on the date of delivery of the Notes to the Purchaser which will permit the conclusion that the Notes are not "arbitrage bonds," within the meaning of the Code or Regulations.

Section 9. Compliance with Federal Tax Laws. (a) The County represents and covenants that the projects financed by the Notes and the ownership, management and use of the projects will not cause the Notes to be "private activity bonds" within the meaning of Section 141 of the Code. The County further covenants that it shall comply with the provisions of the Code to the extent necessary to maintain the tax-exempt status of the interest on the Notes including, if applicable, the rebate requirements of Section 148(f) of the Code. The County further covenants that it will not take any action, omit to take any action or permit the taking or omission of any action within its control (including, without limitation, making or permitting any use of the proceeds of the Notes) if taking, permitting or omitting to take such action would cause any of the Notes to be an arbitrage bond or a private activity bond within the meaning of the Code or would otherwise cause interest on the Notes to be included in the gross income of the recipients thereof for federal income tax purposes. The County Clerk or other officer of the County charged with the responsibility of issuing the Notes shall provide an appropriate certificate of the County certifying that the County can and covenanting that it will comply with the provisions of the Code and Regulations.

(b) The County also covenants to use its best efforts to meet the requirements and restrictions of any different or additional federal legislation which may be made applicable to the Notes provided that in meeting such requirements the County will do so only to the extent consistent with the proceedings authorizing the Notes and the laws of the State of Wisconsin and to the extent that there is a reasonable period of time in which to comply.

<u>Section 10. Designation as Qualified Tax-Exempt Obligations</u>. The Notes are hereby designated as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" for purposes of Section 265 of the Code, relating to the ability of financial institutions to deduct from income for federal income tax purposes, interest expense that is allocable to carrying and acquiring tax-exempt obligations.

Section 11. Execution of the Notes; Closing; Professional Services. The Notes shall be issued in printed form, executed on behalf of the County by the manual or facsimile signatures of the Chairperson and County Clerk, authenticated, if required, by the Fiscal Agent (defined below), sealed with its official or corporate seal, if any, or a facsimile thereof, and delivered to the Purchaser upon payment to the County of the purchase price thereof, plus accrued interest to the date of delivery (the "Closing"). The facsimile signature of either of the officers executing the Notes may be imprinted on the Notes in lieu of the manual signature of the officer but, unless the County has contracted with a fiscal agent to authenticate the Notes, at least one of the signatures appearing on each Note shall be a manual signature. In the event that either of the officers whose signatures appear on the Notes shall cease to be such officers before the Closing, such signatures shall, nevertheless, be valid and sufficient for all purposes to the

same extent as if they had remained in office until the Closing. The aforesaid officers are hereby authorized and directed to do all acts and execute and deliver the Notes and all such documents, certificates and acknowledgements as may be necessary and convenient to effectuate the Closing. The County hereby authorizes the officers and agents of the County to enter into, on its behalf, agreements and contracts in conjunction with the Notes, including but not limited to agreements and contracts for legal, trust, fiscal agency, disclosure and continuing disclosure, and rebate calculation services. Any such contract heretofore entered into in conjunction with the issuance of the Notes is hereby ratified and approved in all respects.

<u>Section 12. Payment of the Notes; Fiscal Agent</u>. The principal of and interest on the Notes shall be paid by the County Clerk or County Treasurer (the "Fiscal Agent").

Section 13. Persons Treated as Owners; Transfer of Notes. The County shall cause books for the registration and for the transfer of the Notes to be kept by the Fiscal Agent. The person in whose name any Note shall be registered shall be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes and payment of either principal or interest on any Note shall be made only to the registered owner thereof. All such payments shall be valid and effectual to satisfy and discharge the liability upon such Note to the extent of the sum or sums so paid.

Any Note may be transferred by the registered owner thereof by surrender of the Note at the office of the Fiscal Agent, duly endorsed for the transfer or accompanied by an assignment duly executed by the registered owner or his attorney duly authorized in writing. Upon such transfer, the Chairperson and County Clerk shall execute and deliver in the name of the transferee or transferees a new Note or Notes of a like aggregate principal amount, series and maturity and the Fiscal Agent shall record the name of each transferee in the registration book. No registration shall be made to bearer. The Fiscal Agent shall cancel any Note surrendered for transfer.

The County shall cooperate in any such transfer, and the Chairperson and County Clerk are authorized to execute any new Note or Notes necessary to effect any such transfer.

- Section 14. Record Date. The fifteenth day of each calendar month next preceding each interest payment date shall be the record date for the Notes (the "Record Date"). Payment of interest on the Notes on any interest payment date shall be made to the registered owners of the Notes as they appear on the registration book of the County at the close of business on the Record Date.
- Section 15. Utilization of The Depository Trust Company Book-Entry-Only System. In order to make the Notes eligible for the services provided by The Depository Trust Company, New York, New York ("DTC"), the County agrees to the applicable provisions set forth in the Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations previously executed on behalf of the County and on file in the County Clerk's office.
- II. <u>Section 16. Payment of Issuance Expenses</u>. The County authorizes the Purchaser to forward the amount of the proceeds of the Notes allocable to the payment of issuance expenses to KleinBank, Chaska, Minnesota at Closing for further distribution as directed by Ehlers.
- III. Section 17. Official Statement. The County Board of Supervisors hereby approves the Preliminary Official Statement with respect to the Notes and deems the Preliminary Official Statement as "final" as of its date for purposes of SEC Rule 15c2-12 promulgated by the Securities and Exchange Commission pursuant to the Securities and Exchange Act of 1934 (the "Rule"). All actions taken by officers of the County in connection with the preparation of such Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda to it are hereby ratified and approved. In connection with the Closing, the appropriate County official shall certify the Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda. The County Clerk shall cause copies of the Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda to be distributed to the Purchaser.
- IV. Section 18. Undertaking to Provide Continuing Disclosure. The County hereby covenants and agrees, for the benefit of the owners of the Notes, to enter into a written undertaking (the "Undertaking") if required by the Rule to provide continuing disclosure of certain financial information and operating data and timely notices of the occurrence of certain events in accordance with the Rule. The Undertaking shall be enforceable by the owners of the Notes or by the Purchaser on behalf of such owners (provided that the rights of the owners and the Purchaser to enforce the Undertaking shall be limited to a right to obtain specific performance of the obligations thereunder and any failure by the County to comply with the provisions of the Undertaking shall not be an event of default with respect to the Notes).

- V. To the extent required under the Rule, the Chairperson and County Clerk, or other officer of the County charged with the responsibility for issuing the Notes, shall provide a Continuing Disclosure Certificate for inclusion in the transcript of proceedings, setting forth the details and terms of the County's Undertaking.
- <u>Section 19. Record Book</u>. The County Clerk shall provide and keep the transcript of proceedings as a separate record book (the "Record Book") and shall record a full and correct statement of every step or proceeding had or taken in the course of authorizing and issuing the Notes in the Record Book.
- Section 20. Bond Insurance. If the Purchaser determines to obtain municipal bond insurance with respect to the Notes, the officers of the County are authorized to take all actions necessary to obtain such municipal bond insurance. The Chairperson and County Clerk are authorized to agree to such additional provisions as the bond insurer may reasonably request and which are acceptable to the Chairperson and County Clerk including provisions regarding restrictions on investment of Note proceeds, the payment procedure under the municipal bond insurance policy, the rights of the bond insurer in the event of default and payment of the Notes by the bond insurer and notices to be given to the bond insurer. In addition, any reference required by the bond insurer to the municipal bond insurance policy shall be made in the form of Note provided herein.
- Section 21. Conflicting Resolutions; Severability; Effective Date. All prior resolutions, rules or other actions of the County Board of Supervisors or any parts thereof in conflict with the provisions hereof shall be, and the same are, hereby rescinded insofar as the same may so conflict. In the event that any one or more provisions hereof shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any other provisions hereof. The foregoing shall take effect immediately upon adoption and approval in the manner provided by law.

WHEREAS, changes in said supervisory district boundaries are allowed by law, provided that the total number of supervisory districts is left unchanged.

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County has a successful history of collaboration with public, private and not-forprofit organizations within the county that have been beneficial to the community and the respective organizations; WHEREAS, the Blugold Real Estate Foundation, Inc., which is a supporting organization of the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire Foundation, has received a gift of nearly 25 acres of land previously owned by Urban Transit located at 1001 Menomonie Street and the County Materials Corporation located at 1111 Menomonie Street in Eau Claire; and

WHEREAS, the Blugold Real Estate Foundation is working cooperatively with the University, the Eau Claire YMCA and Mayo Clinic Health Systems to develop a shared event, recreation, YMCA and wellness complex at that site which will be known as the John H. and Carolyn O. Sonnentag Event and Recreation Complex; and

WHEREAS, the shared facilities at the Sonnentag Complex will provide the community with opportunities for recreation, athletics, entertainment and wellness at a location on the Chippewa River that is currently a large commercial and industrial site; and

WHEREAS, the Sonnentag Complex project provides a unique opportunity for the community to work collaboratively to meet current and future needs of the community, the university and the county; and

WHEREAS, the construction of the proposed project will require a strong partnership in the private sector, local government, nonprofit organizations and the university and would combine the experience, capability, skills, talent and financial resources of various sectors to accomplish a project that could not be completed by any one of the organizations on their own; and

WHEREAS, the construction and operation of the John H. and Carolyn O. Sonnentag Event and Recreation Complex will strengthen the local and regional economy resulting in increased county sales tax revenue, create jobs, raise the property tax base and attract and retain talent in the community that will benefit all Eau Claire County citizens; and

WHEREAS, the current site is considered an idle industrial site that can be redeveloped and become a generator of economic development and an improved quality of life for the city and county; and

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation has an Idle Industrial Site Redevelopment Grant Program of up to \$500,000 per grant; and

WHEREAS, grant applicants must be cities, villages, towns, redevelopment authorities, community development authorities or other government entities; and

WHEREAS Eau Claire County is a government entity eligible to apply for the WEDC grant funding on behalf of the project.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors hereby agrees to authorize staff to work with the Blugold Real Estate Foundation, Inc. to apply for a WEDC Idle Industrial Site Redevelopment Grant for the purposes of demolition, abatement, environment remediation, and/or site-specific improvements to advance the site to shovel-ready status with the following contingencies:

- That the county assumes no liability or responsibility for the work being done at the site and only serves as a fiscal agent to receive and submit expense vouchers for reimbursement.
- That Blugold Real Estate Foundation Inc. assumes full responsibility for fulfilling the requirements of the grant, operationally and financially.
- That Blugold Real Estate Foundation Inc. is responsible for securing and paying for expenses associated with writing and submitting the grant.
- That Eau Claire County's participation as a fiscal agent in submitting the grant on behalf of the project is
 not construed as the county's approval to provide financial or human resources or to be a grant applicant
 for future funding for this project without separate and prior approval from the county.

-RESOLUTION TO REPEAL STATUTORY PROVISIONS ENACTED IN THE STATE OF WISCONSIN 2015-2017 BUDGET CONCERNING SHORELAND ZONING STANDARDS (SECTIONS 1922am-1922L OF 2015 WISCONSIN ACT 55)-

WHEREAS, when acting on the 2015-2017 State Biennial Budget, enacted as 2015 Wisconsin Act 55, the Wisconsin Legislature adopted into law sections 1922am-1922L, resulting in significant changes of the standards for regulation of existing nonconforming structures in shoreland areas, contrary to the adopted standards of Wisconsin Administrative Code NR 115; and

WHEREAS, sections 1922am-1922L of the 2015-2017 State Biennial Budget, enacted as 2015 Wisconsin Act 55, will prevent the local governmental units charged by the State of Wisconsin with overseeing development within its shorelands from protecting the rights of the property owner, the citizens of the area, and the environment in a fair and equitable manner; and

WHEREAS, sections 1922am-1922L of the 2015-2017 State Biennial Budget, enacted as 2015 Wisconsin Act 55 will result in unchecked development along our shorelines which will cause irreparable harm to the water quality of our county, result in a drop in property values which in turn will damage the economy of our county, and promote harm to the environment by contributing to the degradation of our surface waters and ultimately the ground water of our county and the state.

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin and Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources have adopted Wisconsin Administrative Code NR 115 and updated it periodically after public input and review; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County has been enforcing the minimum standards of Wisconsin Administrative Code NR 115 since its inception in the late 1960s and has accumulated considerable experience while working with the various incarnations of Wisconsin Administrative Code NR 115 over many years and, furthermore, has noted during these many years that the current laws have protected the water quality in Eau Claire County and, at the same time, have protected property values, the county's wildlife and fisheries habitat and the natural scenic beauty of Eau Claire County's shorelands, and, at the same time, provided flexibility to property owners in development of their property; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County has 18 lakes, 161 miles of trout streams along with 40 miles of shoreline along the Eau Claire and Chippewa Rivers that are pressured with both new development and redevelopment of existing structures; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County Board members conclude that the water quality of those water bodies within our county would suffer if development is not regulated to the benefit of both the property owner and the water body whose shorelines are proposed for development as it currently is in Wisconsin Administrative Code NR 115; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County feels strongly that counties should be able to enforce more than the minimum standards to protect their unique resources; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County feels that the minimum standards should not be changed without due consideration by the entire legislature, the Natural Resources Board, and the public; and

WHEREAS, state organizations including the Wisconsin Counties Association, Wisconsin County Code Administrators, Wisconsin Land and Water Conservation Association and Wisconsin County Planning and Zoning Directors have gone on record supporting the repeal of the statutory provisions created in the 2015-2017 Budget Bill, that concern the regulation of shorelands, specifically found in Sections 1992am through 1922L of 2015 Wisconsin Act 55 and request that any amendments be addressed through the normal legislative process to allow for important input from the general public regarding managing development activity around our state waterways.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors that it hereby requests that the State of Wisconsin repeal Sections 1922am-1922L of the 2015-2017 State Biennial Budget, enacted as 2015 Wisconsin Act 55, and retain the current provisions of Wisconsin Administrative Code NR 115, and requests that any amendments to the shoreland zoning provisions of the Wisconsin Statutes be made through the normal legislative process to allow for open public discussion and input.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors directs the county clerk to forward this resolution to members of the State's Joint Finance Committee, to the Governor of the State of Wisconsin, state senators and representatives serving Eau Claire County and the Wisconsin Counties Association.

WHEREAS, both SB239 and SB291 restrict the ability of citizens to protect and access shared water resources, including public drinking water resources as well as the lakes, streams, rivers and wetlands of Eau Claire County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors is opposed to passage and implementation of SB239 and SB291.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors directs the county clerk to forward this resolution as well as Resolution 14-15/123 to the governor, assembly members and senators representing Eau Claire County, the Secretary of the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and the Wisconsin Counties Association.

- OPPOSING LRB-2148/1 CHANGING THE WAY PROPERTY IS FORFEITED AFTER BEING SEIZED IN RELATION TO A CRIME-

WHEREAS, the current forfeiture law applies to all property directly or indirectly derived from the commission of a crime; and

WHEREAS, current law allows an agency to keep certain property for its own use, to transfer the property to another agency or to sell property; and

WHEREAS, under current law the agency that seized the property may retain a set percentage of the proceeds of selling the property to cover administrative and other costs with the remainder going to the state school fund; and

WHEREAS, under current law a law enforcement agency may enter in agreements with federal authorities to turn over property seized under federal law and then share proceeds of the sale of the property seized; and

WHEREAS, this bill would allow property to be forfeited only if a person is convicted of a crime related to the action for forfeiture and only if the court finds that the property seized is proportional to the crime committed; and

WHEREAS, this bill would require law enforcement agencies to return seized illegal money and property until after conviction and then the agencies would then attempt to locate the assets which had been seized.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors opposes LRB-2148/1 changing the way property is forfeited after being seized in relation to a crime.

- 6. Local government practices that encourage county employees to conserve energy, preserve the environment, and decrease greenhouse gas emissions from county facilities, services, and vehicle fleets.
- 7. Encourage residents and businesses to adopt sustainable practices; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County has been invited by the Wisconsin Counties Association to join in this voluntary program and believes participation will further enhance the County's current commitment to sustainability; and

-REQUESTING THE LEGISLATURE DISCONTINUE THE PRACTICE OF PUTTING FORTH AND FAST-TRACKING PIECEMEAL BILLS REGARDING PLANNING, ZONING AND LAND USE-

WHEREAS, on November 3, 2015 Eau Claire County adopted Resolution R159-047 to repeal statutory provisions enacted in the State of Wisconsin 2015-2017 budget concerning shoreland zoning standards (Sections 1922am – 1922L of 2015 Wisconsin Act 55); and

WHEREAS, 2015 Wisconsin Act 55 (the biennial budget bill), including the revisions to Wis. Stat. § 59.692 was enacted on July 12, 2015, published July 13, 2015 and in full force and effect from and after July 14, 2015, significantly and immediately changed that state's shoreland zoning policy, purpose and regulations. These changes were enacted without meaningful notice, public input opportunity, review by and input from local units of government or analysis by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources; and

WHEREAS, predictably the manner in which this legislation came about has resulted in a general state of confusion as to interpretation and implementation of the 2015 Wisconsin Act 55 shoreland zoning revisions. Opinions and interpretations have been put forth by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR), the Wisconsin Counties Association (WCA), the Wisconsin Legislative Council, and others regarding the meaning and impact of the 2015 Wisconsin Act 55 shoreland zoning revisions. These opinions and interpretations are not entirely consistent regarding the interplay of the 2015 Wisconsin Act 55 shoreland zoning revisions with existing law, including Wis. Admin Code § NR 115 and Wis. Stats. §§ 59.69, 59.692 and 281. Consequently there is a lack of clear guidance regarding what the 2015 Wisconsin Act 55 shoreland zoning revisions require and allow, and a resulting uncertainty as to implementation, administration and enforcement of shoreland zoning at the county level; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin counties have been authorized by state statutes since 1968 to enact and administer general zoning regulations in towns choosing to be subject to those regulations. The enabling legislation is currently codified in Wis. Stat. § 59.69; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin counties have been required by state statutes since 1968 to enact and administer shoreland zoning regulations. The enabling legislation is codified in Wis. Stat. § 59.692 with rules and standards promulgated by the DNR and set for in Wis. Admin Code § NR 115; and

WHEREAS, state statutes dictate the process by which counties may revise shoreland or zoning regulations, said process typically involves numerous steps and notifications and opportunities for town board and public input. This process generally takes anywhere from 4-8 weeks to complete; and

WHEREAS, subsequent to enactment of the 2015 Wisconsin Act 55 shoreland zoning revisions, a number of bills were proposed, including AB563, AB582, AB583 and AB600, that impact planning, zoning and land-use at the local level. These bills were introduced one week, and several were sent to public hearing the next, offering little or no opportunity for public input, or analysis by state or local regulators of the meaning of the bills or how the proposed law would interact with existing laws.

WHEREAS, the development community and property owners typically seek information from county code administrators regarding pertinent zoning regulations months before submitting final applications, relying on the code administrators to provide accurate information as to the zoning regulations surrounding a project. The changes brought about the 2015 Wisconsin Act 55 shoreland zoning revisions, and the piecemeal bills subsequently introduced and fast-tracked, have created a climate of uncertainty and frustration for the development community, property owners, and county code administrators, all of which contributes to a loss of efficiency and productivity.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors respectfully requests that the legislature discontinue the practice of putting forth and fast-tracking piecemeal bills regarding planning, zoning and land use.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors urges the state legislature to instead adopt a systematic review by a group of primary stakeholders of state laws (existing or proposed) that impact planning, zoning, and land use, with a concurrent process involving notice and public input opportunities. This will result in the thoughtful and deliberate consideration that is certainly due planning, zoning, and land use laws.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors that Eau Claire County would welcome the opportunity to participate in comprehensive, collaborative discussions, public listening sessions, and hearings regarding state shoreland and comprehensive zoning regulations to discuss manners in which each could be improved.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors directs the county clerk to forward this resolution to the governor, assembly members and senators representing Eau Claire County, the Secretary of the DNR and the Wisconsin Counties Association.

The Future Land Use Map contained within the Eau Claire County Comprehensive Plan used a "Rural Lands" designation for much of the rural area of Eau Claire County, with little consideration of farmland preservation program. Areas included within this "Rural Lands" designation may include: small and large lot residential development; areas covered by a non-certified zoning district; large marsh or wetland areas; and other areas that are unrelated to agricultural uses. As a result, many of these areas are largely excluded from mapped preservation areas on the Farmland Preservation Map (Map 12) to comply with Ch. 91, Wis. Stats. Therefore, the Farmland Preservation Map (Map 12) contained within this comprehensive plan and incorporated by reference within the Eau Claire County Farmland Preservation Plan 2015 located in Appendix G shall supersede the Future Land Use Map (Map 9) as it relates to the implementation and administration of the Farmland Preservation Program in Eau Claire County, Petitions to amend the Future Land Use Map that are consistent with the Farmland Preservation Map may be considered in accord with the procedures to amend the Eau Claire County Comprehensive Plan. The 1983 Eau Claire County Farmland Preservation Plan has expired as of December 31, 2014. Adoption of the "Eau Claire County Farmland Preservation Plan 2015" as Appendix G of the Eau Claire County Comprehensive Plan will allow eligible farmers and landowners to continue to qualify for farmland preservation tax credits and other farmland preservation programs, thereby supporting an agricultural industry that encompasses more than 1,200 farms and 250,000 acres under production or reserved for future production while generating roughly \$1.1 billion in total business sales each year for the Eau Claire County economy. Floodplain elevations shall be determined by studies and maps prepared by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security or the Federal Insurance Administration. - 54. "Farm" means a tract of land producing \$6,000 or more of agricultural products which are sold or would normally be sold during a year. "Farm" means all contiguous land under common ownership that is primarily devoted to agricultural use.
- 157. "Restaurant" means a business establishment consisting of a kitchen and dining room, whose primary purpose is to prepare and serve food to be consumed on the premises. "Winery" means a facility for the production of wine, as defined in Chapter 125 of the Wisconsin Statutes, that are sold wholesale and/or off premises directly to retailers as authorized by statute. "Winery" means a facility for the production of fermented malt beverages that may be bottled, packaged, possessed, stored, sold, sampled, shipped, transported, delivered and/or consumed on premise in accordance with the provisions of Wis. Stat. § 125.53.
- **SECTION 2.** That paragraphs 6. through 20. be renumbered to 7. through 21., 21. through 54. be renumbered to 23. through 56., 55. through 119. be renumbered to 59. through 123., and 120. through 198. be renumbered to 126. through 232.

- A. Preserve and protect those areas best suited for agricultural, forestry or open-space uses by minimizing fragmentation of contiguous agricultural or forest lands for the benefit and use of current and future generations;
- B. Provide for a wide range of agricultural uses typically associated with the continued production of food and fiber while recognizing that such uses may involve noise, dust, odor, or operation of heavy equipment for long periods of time;
- C. Strengthen and diversify a predominately agricultural and forestry-based economy by providing for a range of economic opportunities for property owners which are generally compatible with and supportive of agriculture or forestry operations as either permitted or conditional uses;
- D. Comply with standards contained in Wis. Stat. ch. 91 to permit eligible landowners to receive tax credits under Wis. Stat. § 71.09, in conjunction with their agricultural operations;
- E. Preserve rural character and promote the efficient use of public infrastructure and utilities by minimizing the adverse effects of urban sprawl along with its associated expense;
- F. Promote environmental quality through the use of conservation practices designed to minimize erosion of productive soils and deter the delivery of sediment and nutrients to the waters of our state;
- G. Minimize land use conflicts which occur when agricultural and non-agricultural uses are intermixed or not adequately separated; and
- H. Provide for carefully regulated extraction of nonmetallic mineral resources through Eau Claire County's permitting processes to ensure compatibility with adjacent land uses, minimize impacts to natural resources, and to restore lands to productive agricultural use consistent with locally approved reclamation plans.
- 18.32.010 Permitted principal uses. The following principal uses are permitted in the A-P district:
- A. Agricultural use for the purpose of earning an income or livelihood such as: crop or forage production; keeping livestock; beekeeping; nursery or Christmas tree production; sod production; floriculture; silviculture; horticulture; orchards; paddocks; stabling and equestrian operations; aquaculture; viticulture; and enrolling land in a federal agricultural commodity payment program or federal or state agricultural land conservation payment program;
- B. Farm residences and single family housing which existed prior to January 1, 2014;
- C. Livestock Facility:
 - 1. Not closer than 1,000 feet from a residential district;
 - 2. The facility has an approved nutrient management plan;
 - 3. Fencing or screening; and
 - 4. No structure shall be placed within 100 feet of any lot line, except when adjacent to A-P; the structure may then be placed 50 feet from a lot line.
- D. Undeveloped open space land uses which may include environmentally sensitive areas; and
- E. Agriculture-related businesses which are consistent with or secondary to the primary agricultural use of the property or that are an integral support service of agriculture, such as: agricultural service and repair including welders and machinists; veterinarian services primarily serving agricultural operations; livestock groomers or breeding services; direct sales of agricultural-related products such as feed, seed, fertilizer, herbicides and pesticides; agri-tourism; community-supported agricultural operations; direct marketing operations; u-pick operations; livestock and commodity trucking services; and manure handling services.
- 18.32.015 Permitted principal structures. The following principal structures are permitted in the A-P district:
- A. Farm residences and non-farm single family dwellings which existed prior to January 1, 2014; and
- B. A building, structure, or improvement that is an integral part of, or incidental to, an agricultural or agriculture-related use such as: barns, sheds, shops, parlors, silos, grain bins, greenhouses, and stables.

- F. The sale of crafts or related products which are incidental to the agricultural use of the property;
- G. The rental of principal or secondary residences in existence on a farm as of January 1, 2014 and no longer utilized in the operation of a farm; and
- H. Non-commercial alternative energy facilities such as solar, wind energy, biofuels and methane digesters.

18.32.025 Permitted accessory structures. The following accessory structures are permitted in the A-P district:

- A. Private garages, greenhouses and other similar accessory structures;
- B. Private recreational structures, as allowed in Chapter 18.30;
- C. Single family or two family dwellings that are either farm residences or non-farm single family dwellings which existed prior to January 1, 2014;
- D. Produce stands;
- E. Seasonal structures which meet the criteria under 18.17.035 C.; and
- F. One (1) on premise sign shall be allowed stating the name of the business, the owner/operator and the product being sold or service offered. The sign shall not exceed 24 sq. feet in area, shall be non-illuminated, and shall not be placed within a vision triangle.
- 18.32.030 Conditional uses. The following uses are conditional uses in the A-P district, and subject to the provisions of Chapter 18.21:
- A. Temporary housing for seasonal farm help;
- B. Sawmill operations;
- C. Game farms and the commercial raising of fur-bearing animals for the purpose of earning an income or livelihood or which comply with Wis. Stat. § 91.01(1), provided the following criteria are met:
 - 1. Not closer than 1,000 feet from a residential district;
 - 2. Animal waste handling plan;
 - 3. Fencing or screening; and
 - 4. No structure shall be placed within 100 feet of any lot line.
- D. Governmental, institutional, religious or nonprofit community uses;
- E. Transportation, communications, pipeline, electric transmission, utility, or drainage uses not covered by Chapter 18.30;
- F. Agriculture-related businesses that may entail some level of processing or that are retail-oriented in nature, such as: nano-wineries or nano-breweries in which a significant portion of the agricultural inputs are produced on-site, slaughtering or meat processing for commercial purposes, agricultural equipment dealership, agriculturally-related supplies other than those listed in 18.32.010 D., sale of equestrian tack or related supplies, facilities for off-site storing or processing of agricultural products such as granaries or creameries, processing of agricultural wastes, and incidental use of agricultural structures or facilities for special events in accordance with 18.30.270;
- G. Cottage industries in accordance with 18.23.030, bed and breakfast operations in accordance with 18.30.150, or tourist rooming houses or retreats in accordance with 18.30.290 that are accessory to an agricultural use or conducted by the owner or operator of a farm in accordance with Wis. Stat. § 91.01(1);
- H. Housing for more than two units when the person or family to be housed earns more than 50% of his or her gross income on the farm operation;
- I. Temporary asphalt and concrete batching or ready mix operations or concrete crushing provided they meet the following criteria:
 - 1. The operation is used solely for a specific Wisconsin Department of Transportation project;

- 2. A restoration plan for the site is provided which describes or illustrates measures taken to restore the site to its original land use. The restoration plan will describe methods for establishing vegetative cover on all exposed soil;
- 3. The temporary concrete or asphalt batch plants shall be removed from the premises within 60 days of completion of project;
- 4. A storm water and erosion control plan in compliance with Chapters 17.05 and 17.06 shall be submitted to and approved by the land conservation division; and
- 5. The maximum area devoted for facility operations shall not be larger than 5 acres, including, but not limited to, the stockpiling of materials, equipment and vehicle storage, associated buildings, access roads, batch plants, storm water facilities and crushers.
- J. Nonmetallic mineral extraction in accordance with Wis. Stat. § 91.46(6) provided it complies with the following criteria:
 - 1. The operation complies with Wis. Stat. ch. 295, subch. I and rules promulgated under that subchapter, with applicable provisions of the local ordinance under Wis. Stat. § 295.13 or 295.14, and with any applicable requirements of the Department of Transportation concerning the restoration of nonmetallic mining sites;
 - 2. The operation and its location in this zoning district are consistent with the purposes of the A-P Agricultural Preservation zoning district;
 - 3. The operation and its location in the farmland preservation zoning district are reasonable and appropriate, considering alternative locations outside the farmland preservation zoning district, or are specifically approved under state or federal law;
 - 4. The operation is reasonably designed to minimize the conversion of land around the extraction site from agricultural use or open space use;
 - The operation does not significantly impair or limit the current or future agricultural use
 of surrounding parcels of land that are zoned for or legally restricted to agricultural use;
 and
 - 6. The farmland preservation zoning ordinance requires the owner to restore the land to agricultural use, consistent with any required locally approve reclamation plan, when extraction is completed.

18.32.035 Structures allowed under conditional use permits. In the A-P district, the following structures may be allowed under conditional use permits, issued pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 18.21:

- A. Temporary structures for the purpose of housing for seasonal farm help;
- B. Sawmills;
- C. Governmental structures, for police, fire and highway purposes; landfill site improvements; schools; parks and playgrounds;
- D. Structures used for religious purposes;
- E. Utility structures;
- F. Single family or two family dwellings that are either farm residences or non-farm single family dwellings which existed prior to January 1, 2014;
- G. Structures associated with temporary asphalt, concrete batch, ready mix operations, or concrete crushing operations;
- H. A building, structure, or improvement that is an integral part of, or incidental to, an agricultural-related business such as: barns, machinery sheds, shops, silos, grain bins, greenhouses, and residential structures; and
- I. Structures associated with nonmetallic mining operations permitted in conjunction with Chapters 18.28 and 18.34.

<u>18.32.040</u> Standards for approval of conditional uses. When reviewing conditional use permit requests for the A-P district, the committee shall consider the following factors:

- A. The use and its location in the farmland preservation zoning district are consistent with the purposes of the A-P Agricultural Preservation zoning district;
- B. The use and its location in the A-P Agricultural Preservation zoning district are reasonable and appropriate, considering alternative locations, or are specifically approved under state or federal law;
- C. The use is reasonably designed to minimize conversion of land, at and around the site of the use, from agricultural use or open space use;
- D. The use does not substantially impair or limit current or future agricultural use of surrounding parcels of land that are zoned for or legally restricted to agricultural use;
- E. Construction damage to land remaining in agricultural use is minimized and repaired, to the greatest extent feasible;

- F. The availability of local units of government to provide services without unreasonable burden; and
- G. The effect of the proposed use on water and air pollution, soil erosion, sedimentation and other possible environmental damage.

18.32.050 Lot, height and yard requirements. The following lot, height and yard requirements are established for the A-P district:

- A. Lot Size.
 - 1. The minimum lot size is 35 acres:
 - 2. The lot size for a farm residence or structure, which existed prior to the adoption of the ordinance codified in this subtitle, or which is situated upon a parcel or lot separated and distinct from a principal parcel acquired through farm consolidation or acquisition, shall be a minimum of one acre with a maximum lot size of 5 acres; and
 - 3. The minimum lot width shall be 150 feet.

 - 1. The maximum height of a residential structure shall be 35 feet;
 - 2. The maximum height of accessory structures shall be 25 feet; and
 - 3. Agricultural structures are exempt from the height requirements under 18.30.020 E.
- C. Setbacks.
 - 1. The minimum highway setback shall be regulated under Chapter 18.22;
 - 2. The minimum side-yard setback for residential structures and private garages shall be 20 feet, and for all other structures shall be 50 feet;
 - 3. The minimum rear-yard setbacks for all structures shall be 50 feet; and
 - 4. No accessory structures shall be located within the required front yard.
- D. Lot, Height and Yard Requirements for Conditional Uses. Lot, height and yard requirements shall be established at the time of conditional use permit approval, but in no case shall the minimum lot size be less than one acre.
- <u>18.32.055</u> Standards for rezoning. Rezoning from the A-P district shall be based on findings which consider the following factors:
- A. The land is better suited for a use not allowed in the A-P Agricultural Preservation zoning district based on a review of soil types, historical productivity, location, and adjacent land uses;
- B. The rezoning is consistent with any applicable comprehensive plans;
- C. The rezoning is substantially consistent with the certified Eau Claire County Farmland Preservation Plan; and
- D. The rezoning will not substantially impair or limit current or future agricultural use of surrounding parcels of land that are zoned for or legally restricted to agricultural use.

18.32.060 Notification of rezoning. Eau Claire County shall by March 1 of each year provide a report to the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection indicating the number of acres that were rezoned out of a farmland preservation zoning district during the previous calendar year and a map that clearly shows the location of those acres.

- 4.25.110 Distribution of foreclosure proceeds.
- 4.25.120 Ordinance electing to proceed under Wis. Stat. § 75.521, in relation to enforcement of collection of tax liens.
- 4.25.001 Purpose. The County finds that renovations or additions to premises located in the County made to improve energy efficiency, improve water efficiency, and/or use renewable resource applications, increase property values, stimulate local economic activity, provide local and global environmental benefits, and promote the general welfare of County residents. The purpose of this Chapter is to facilitate loans arranged by property owners or lessees to make such improvements by treating loan principal and interest, fees, and other charges as special charges eligible for inclusion on the tax roll for these properties.

4.25.010 Definitions.

- A. "Annual installment" means the portion of the PACE loan that is due and payable for a particular year under the supplemental agreement.
- B. "Borrower" means the property owner or lessee of the subject property that borrows the proceeds of a PACE loan.
- C. "Default loan balance" means the outstanding balance, whether or not due, of a PACE loan at the time that the County receives foreclosure proceeds.
- D. "Foreclosure proceeds" means the proceeds received by the County from the disposition of a subject property through an in rem property tax foreclosure.
- E. "Loan amount" means the principal, interest, administrative fees (including the Program Administrator's fees) and other loan charges to be paid by the borrower under the PACE loan.
 - F. "PACE" means the acronym for property assessed clean energy.
 - G. "PACE default provisions" means:
- 1. The delinquent annual installment(s) due when the County initiates the in rem property tax foreclosure on the subject property;
- 2. Any additional annual installment(s) that become due between the time that the COUNTY initiates in rem property tax foreclosure on the subject property and the date the County receives the foreclosure proceeds;
- 3. Any default interest charges applied to unpaid annual installments referenced in subs. (1) and (2) above, as provided in the supplemental agreement; and
 - 4. Any default loan balance.
- H. "PACE lender" means any person that makes a PACE loan, and which may include an affiliate of the borrower.
- I. "PACE loan" means a loan made by a PACE lender to a borrower under this Chapter for energy efficiency improvements, water efficiency improvements, or renewable resource applications made to or installed on a subject property.
- J. "Person" means any individual, association, firm, corporation, partnership, limited liability company, trust, joint venture or other legal entity, or a political subdivision as defined in Wis. Stat. § 66.0627.
- K. "Program Administrator" means the person retained by the Wisconsin PACE Commission as provided in 4.25.040 B.
- L. "Subject property" means any premises located in the County on which energy efficiency improvements, water efficiency improvements, or renewable resource applications are being or have been made and financed through an outstanding PACE loan.
- M. "Supplemental agreement" means a written agreement among a borrower, a PACE lender and the County, as provided for in 4.25.060.

- N. "Wisconsin PACE Commission" means the Wisconsin PACE Commission to be formed under Wis. Stat. § 66.0301, as amended, by the County and one or more other political subdivisions as defined in Wis. Stat. § 66.0627, pursuant to a Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement Relating to the Wisconsin PACE Commission dated [], as amended.
- 4.25.020 Statutory authority. This Chapter is enacted pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 66.0627, as amended, which authorizes a county to make a loan or enter into an agreement regarding loan repayments to a 3rd party for owner-arranged or lessee-arranged financing, to an owner or a lessee of a premises located in the County for making or installing an energy efficiency improvement, a water efficiency improvement or a renewable resource application to a premises.
- 4.25.030 Annual loan repayments as special charges. Any PACE loan made and secured pursuant to this Section shall be considered a special charge on the subject property. Any installment or portion of a PACE loan made and secured pursuant to the Section that becomes delinquent according to the terms of the PACE loan shall be a lien against the subject property and placed on the tax roll, as permitted pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 66.0627 as amended.

4.25.040 Wisconsin Pace Commission.

- A. Any of the powers and duties of the County under this Chapter, except for those under 4.25.070 B. and 4.25.080, may (but are not required to) be delegated to the Wisconsin PACE Commission.
- B. The Wisconsin PACE Commission is further authorized to retain a Program Administrator to act as its agent and administer the PACE program, subject to adherence with PACE program requirements consistent with this Chapter and in Wis. Stat. § 66.0627, as amended.

4.25.050 Loan approval.

- A. A prospective borrower applying for a PACE loan shall comply with the loan application process set forth in the program manual approved by the County.
 - B. The County shall approve the financing arrangements between a borrower and PACE lender. 4.25.060 Supplemental agreement.
- A. The County, the borrower and the PACE lender shall execute the supplemental agreement which, without limitation:
- 1. Shall inform the participants that the PACE loan amount shall be imposed as and considered a special charge, and each year's annual installment may be included on the property tax roll of the subject property as a special charge and an annual installment that is delinquent shall be a lien against the subject property pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 66.0627, as amended;
 - 2. Shall recite the amount and the term of the PACE loan;
- 3. Shall provide for the amount, or a method for determining the amount, of the annual installment due each year;
 - 4. Shall provide whether default interest may be applied to unpaid annual installments;
- 5. Shall require the PACE lender and the borrower to comply with all federal, state and local lending and disclosure requirements;
 - 6. Shall provide for any fees payable to the County and/or Program Administrator;
 - 7. Shall recite that the supplemental agreement is a covenant that runs with the land;
- 8. May provide for prepayments of annual installments by the borrower with a resulting reduction in the special charge for the prepayment, subject to any prepayment premium charged by the PACE lender, if any; and
 - 9. May allow for amendment by the parties.
- B. Prior to executing the supplemental agreement, the owner of the subject property, if different from the borrower, and any existing mortgage holder(s) on the subject property must have executed a separate writing acknowledging the borrower's use of PACE financing for the subject property and the special charge that will be imposed under this Chapter and its consequences, including the remedies for collecting the special charge.
- C. Each PACE loan shall be amortized over the term of the PACE loan as provided in the supplemental agreement.
- D. The annual payments of a PACE loan may be payable in installments as authorized by Wis. Stat. § 66.0627, as amended.
- 4.25.070 Annual installments added to tax rolls. Upon the request of the Program Administrator the County shall place each year's annual installment on the tax roll for the subject property as permitted pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 66.0627, as amended.
- 4.25.080 Remittance of special charges. The County shall promptly remit to the Wisconsin PACE Commission any payment(s) it receives in respect of any special charge imposed under this Chapter, including penalties and charges thereon, it may receive from any taxing district or the County treasurer pursuant to Wis. Stat. Ch. 74, as amended.

4.25.090 Property tax foreclosure procedures.

- A. The County elects to utilize the provisions of Wis. Stat. § 75.521, as amended, for the purpose of enforcing tax liens if a subject property owner fails to pay any special charges imposed on the subject property under this Chapter as required.
- B. The County shall begin an in rem property tax foreclosure proceeding on the subject property at the earliest time allowed under Wisconsin Statutes, unless the County determines that subject property is a "brownfield" (as defined is Wis. Stat. § 75.106, as amended) or that in rem property tax foreclosure is not in the best interests of the County due to the condition of the property or for other reasons.
- C. If the County has determined that it will not commence an in rem property tax foreclosure proceeding, then the PACE lender may request that the County, pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 75.106, as amended, assign the County's right to take judgment against the subject property, provided that the PACE lender and the County fully comply with all provisions of Wis. Stat. § 75.106, as amended, concerning the subject property and the PACE lender agrees to pay the amounts required by Wis. Stat. § 75.36(3)(a)1 and 1m, as amended.
- 4.25.100 Sale of foreclosed property. If the County prevails in an in rem property tax foreclosure action against a subject property, the County shall diligently proceed to sell the subject property pursuant to the procedures set forth in Wis. Stat. § 75.69, as amended.
- 4.25.110 Distribution of foreclosure proceeds. The County treasurer shall follow the procedures set forth in Wis. Stat. §75.36, as amended, to distribute the proceeds from the sale of a subject property.
- 4.25.120 Ordinance electing to proceed under Wis. Stat. § 75.521, in relation to enforcement of collection of tax liens. From and after January 1, 2017 the County elects to adopt the provisions of Wis. Stat. § 75.521, as amended, for the purpose of enforcing tax liens in such County in the cases where the procedure provided by such Chapter is applicable. ENACTED: April 6, 2016

- SUPPORTING A CHANGE IN STATE LAW TO MAKE COUNTY CIVILIAN CORRECTIONAL OFFICERS PROTECTIVE STATUS UNDER THE WISCONSIN RETIREMENT SYSTEM -

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County created the civilian correctional officer classification in 1990 and began the transition from a jail staffed by deputy sheriffs to civilian correctional officers at that time; and

WHEREAS, civilian correctional officers do not meet the principal duties test that 51% or more of their duties consist of active law enforcement duties as set forth in Wis. Stat. § 40.02(48)(a) as interpreted by Wisconsin Appellate Court Decisions; and

WHEREAS, correctional officers are classified as general employees under the Wisconsin Retirement System and deputy sheriffs are classified as protective service.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors support a change in state law to make county civilian correctional officers protective status under the Wisconsin Retirement System.
