This year was a time of transition and growth for Workforce Resource. We achieved many noted accomplishments due to the collaboration and workforce partnerships within our communities. To highlight a few:

- Exceeded all nine Workforce Innovation & Opportunity Act (WIOA) performance measures
 resulting in attaining first place in the state among the 11 Workforce Development Areas.
- Ranked first in the state for Wisconsin Works (W-2) performance which resulted in receiving a \$32,480 bonus for 2014.
- FoodShare Employment & Training (FSET) program exceeded all measures for program year
 2015-2016 which resulted in acquiring the highest performance incentive available.

WIOA PROGRAM

The adage is well-known to those who work for Workforce Resource: "It's never too late to become what you might have been." Some employees hang the saying in an office painting or poster. Some just hold the idea close to help those who enter the Job Centers seeking assistance. Regardless, the organization's case managers and staff members witness the truth of the statement on a continuous basis. Such is the case of Angela.

Angela, a mother of five children, enrolled in the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Adult Program in March of 2014 with the original hope of becoming a certified nursing assistant. The broader intention was to pursue and complete the Respiratory Therapy program at Chippewa Valley Technical College (CVTC).

The Respiratory Therapy program is particularly demanding, not only in academics and content but in time and travel. Angela spent many hours traveling, staying overnight at various trainings around Minnesota and Wisconsin to gain the experience needed to be a successful Respiratory Therapist. Through the WIOA Adult Program, Workforce Resource assisted Angela with tuition, books, mileage, travel costs, scrubs, shoes, supplies and exam fees.

Angela graduated in May of 2016 with a 3.46 GPA and was offered a full-time, first-shift respiratory therapy position with the UW-Hospital in Madison before she even completed her final semester. She has since moved to the Madison area with her family. Angela is now making \$25.80 an hour with full benefits and absolutely loves her new career.


- Workforce Resource exceeded all WIOA Performance Measures for Program Year (PY) 2015. Out of 11 Workforce
 Development Areas in the state of Wisconsin, West Central Wisconsin (Region #8) ranks #1 in the state for WIOA

- In PY 2015, WIOA served 1,265 individuals in the nine county Workforce Development Area. Of those, 432 were
 Adults, 441 were Dislocated Workers and 392 were Youth.

WIOA PROGRAM & HEALTHCARE ACADEMY

Testimonials are often the best form of advertising. Take, for example, the story of Brandi. She was referred to Workforce Resource by her stepmother, Cami, who had worked with the agency in the past, participating in the Bridges to Healthcare and Workforce Investment Act (WIA) Adult programs. Cami knew the staff members in the Chippewa County Job Center and understood how the offered services could benefit her stepdaughter.

Brandi was living with her stepmother and father after leaving Missouri where she worked in food service to provide for her small family. A single mom with two young daughters to provide for, Brandi knew she had to find a way to increase her earning potential. Brandi signed up for a nursing assistant class, paid for with some of the last of her savings. She was reluctant to ask anyone for help, but was very interested in participating in the Healthcare Academy through Bridges to Healthcare because of her interest in pursuing a career in nursing. Brandi also needed some assistance with travel and child care expenses while attending the academy, so she enrolled in the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Youth program as an Out-of-School Youth and began the healthcare academy the following week.

WIOA helped with reimbursing her mileage to attend the academy and covered the cost of daycare for her children during class time. She also received help in paying for the academy's CPR training and the



required textbook for the course. Having thoroughly enjoyed the academy, she stated, "I would do it a hundred times if I could," after the two-week session ended.

In June, Brandi began her nursing assistant training at Wissota Health and Regional Vent Center in Chippewa Falls. While she attended training, Workforce Resource assisted her in purchasing her required uniforms. She studied hard to successfully complete the class and pass the Wisconsin Nurse Aide Competency Test. Her hard work paid off not only in completing the class and becoming certified, but also in gaining full-time employment with

Wissota Health in July, 2015. Brandi has plans to save her money to purchase a house for herself and her daughters and continue her education to become a registered nurse.

W-2 & WIOA PROGRAMS CO-ENROLLMENT

Octavia, a single mother of three children, came to Workforce Resource Inc. (WRI) in March of 2016. She had lost her job at an assisted living facility two months prior to entering the Job Center. Despite her experience in the field, she was having a difficult time finding new employment in the local adult family homes and was struggling to make ends meet.

She decided to apply for the Wisconsin Works (W2) program for both financial and employment assistance. Octavia met with a case manager for the program to discuss the opportunities available to her, and they developed a plan together. Octavia knew that she liked working with people and wanted to continue providing care to others. She felt that becoming a certified nursing assistant could help her be more marketable to employers and boost her wages.

In order to help her reach her goal, Octavia was co-enrolled in the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Adult Program. Due to the high demand for CNAs in the Eau Claire area, Workforce Resource had recently formed a partnership with Grace Lutheran to give the individuals enrolled in its programs a unique opportunity for obtaining this training. Support dollars from the program were able to fund Octavia's CNA training classes, clothing, and her exam fees to become certified upon completion. On top of WRI covering the cost of her training, she also earned a wage while she was participating in the training. Octavia completed the training in April and passed her exam to become state certified in July.

After she finished her training, Octavia began looking for employment that would put her new knowledge and skills to good use as well as work with the needs of her family. She was offered a job with Grace Lutheran contingent on her passing her exam. Octavia originally accepted this offer but then had to turn it down due to lack of childcare for the hours she would need to work. She began working at the Wisconsin Veterans' Home, but again found that this location was just not the right fit for her.

Finally, she found the position she had been seeking. She was offered employment with Serving Hands as a Service Coordinator where she received a starting wage of \$15 per hour. In this position, she is responsible for facilitating and overseeing the staff for five area group homes. In the future, Octavia hopes to attend Chippewa Valley Technical College and become a registered nurse.

FSET PROGRAM

A 76-year-old go-getter, Beatrice entered the Washburn County FSET Office in March of 2016 and enrolled in the FoodShare Employment and Training (FSET) program. Her primary goal was to find and secure a labor -intensive job that satisfied her want and need to work.

Beatrice worked diligently with both her case manager and her Work Readiness Specialist (WRS) looking for work. With their assistance, she developed a professional and effective resume that highlighted her experience. She also received guidance on how to complete employment applications and how to look for jobs online.

Shortly after her search began, Beatrice was hired by McCain Foods. Her daily commute was 80 miles round-trip. Two weeks after starting work, Beatrice encountered a minor setback. She realized she could not physically perform her job duties so she had to resign from her position with McCain Foods.

Beatrice did not let that stop her. She once again started job-searching and eventually applied to Sanmina in Turtle Lake. She was selected for an interview, and Sanmina hired her on the spot during the interview. Again, travel did not deter Beatrice. She now drives 120 miles round-trip. She works 28 hours per week and makes a good wage. Beatrice enjoys her work and is thankful for the help she received through the FSET Program.

FSET & WIOA PROGRAMS CO-ENROLLMENT

For Julie, a classic life moment occurred when trying to move forward, she examined her past and decided to go in a completely different direction. This led to a new and exciting career path.

Julie entered the Clark County Job Center in January to learn about the FoodShare Employment and Training (FSET) program. She had worked a number of jobs in the manufacturing industry in the past but was not excited to return to a career in manufacturing.

Working with the Clark County FSET staff, Julie completed a career interest and aptitude assessment and realized that pursuing a path in the field of medical coding was a good fit. She developed an employment plan that included continuing to work part-time as an office assistant at Chippewa Valley Technical College to build on her work experience and strengthen her academic skills.

Julie was also placed at two different worksites to help her gain even more experience. She was eventually co-enrolled in the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Adult Program to assist her with tuition as she started attending medical coding classes offered by Mid State Technical College. Julie is currently attending part-time and has gained the confidence and support necessary to pursue full-time studies in a few weeks. She is happy with her plan and excited for the future.

BLUEPRINT FOR PROSPERITY GRANT

Through innovative workforce development ideas and supporting grant funding, Workforce Resource has witnessed the power of collaboration in assisting both job seekers and employers fill their needs. One such example of this is the Dual Enrollment Academy that was created and implemented in the St. Croix Valley as a result of funding awarded from the State of Wisconsin's Blueprint for Prosperity grant.

Wisconsin's Office of Skills and Development awarded Blueprint for Prosperity funds to Wisconsin Indianhead Technical College (WITC) to execute a welding program that was formed in partnership with local school districts, area employers and Workforce Resource.

During the course of the program, 14 students from area schools – St. Croix Central, New Richmond, Somerset, Amery, Hudson and Osceola – spent a few hours each morning at New Richmond High School working towards earning credit in the one-year welding technical program at WITC. Students who completed the academy earned stacked credentials in Shielded Metal Arc Welding, along with Gas Metal Arc Welding. They also received their OSHA 10 certification and earned anywhere between 10-34 credits toward the welding program.

Workforce Resource employees worked closely with the students and the instructors to make sure the academy was successful. Case managers assisted students in developing their resumes. Mock interviews were hosted by both WITC and New Richmond High School and students also completed mock weld tests in order to prepare for their final exams. OEM Fabricators, Northern Metal Fab, Schaffer Manufacturing and GEA all participated in helping the students prepare for the world of work. It was a great collaboration that resulted in 14 students growing their knowledge and interest in the manufacturing sector and gaining entry level skills for a potential career in welding.



PARTNERSHIPS

The partnership between Workforce Resource Inc. and the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (DVR) continues to grow. That growth was apparent this past summer when the organizations partnered to put on the Summer Youth Career Exploratory Academy in multiple West Central Wisconsin counties.

For two weeks, 29 consumers between the ages of 16 and 21 participated in hands-on activities hosted in the counties of Clark, Dunn, Eau Claire and Chippewa. The participants explored in-demand careers in preparation for entering the workforce. Additional topics covered allowed participants to: assess their strengths and barriers; learn about and gain team-building skills; discover their transferrable skills; develop resumes; learn about and practice interviewing; and discover how to disclose disabilities. The academy also included guest speakers, as well as tours of businesses and technical colleges.

Upon completing the academy, consumers spent the next six weeks applying their skills and knowledge at local worksites. The participants worked 20 hours per week at a worksite that was of interest to them based on their career goal. During this time, the youth were able to gain a paycheck while also accumulating valuable work experience and references to help build their resumes.

Between the four counties, more than 38 businesses participated. During the experience, Workforce Resource was able to provide consumers with job coaches to assist them in learning new skills and to ensure their success. Weekly communication reports were provided to DVR case managers and staff. These reports evaluated the youth in terms of attendance, punctuality, work initiative, interaction with co-workers and supervisors, and attire and grooming. This documentation provided valuable information to the case managers. Plans are underway for a similar academy in 2017.

Local Emergency Planning Committee

Annual Liaison Report

April 2017

The Eau Claire County Local Emergency Planning Committee, or LEPC, is a group of professionals that work closely with the Office of Emergency Management to ensure the County meets its requirements under the Emergency Planning and Community Right to Know Act. This committee is made up of individuals from Law Enforcement, Fire, Hazardous Materials, community organizations, and other government officials.

Highlights from the past year include:

- Reviewing and approving eleven off-site emergency plans for facilities that handle large
 amounts of extremely hazardous substances. These plans are done for organizations that may
 have small manned or unmanned substations for redundant communications that hold large
 quantities of batteries to some of the largest employers in Eau Claire County like Cascade Tissue
 Group.
- The LEPC was able to hold a meeting and tour the WRR Environmental Services plant which has had some memorable and dangerous fires in the past decade due to the variety and amount of chemicals on hand. The Committee met with Safety Officials from WRR and was able to identify the location of various chemicals and see what precautions are in place to lessen the impact of future incidents at the plant.

As we move forward in future years, the LEPC remains a crucial committee in assisting the Office of Emergency Management with identifying which facilities need to have off-site emergency plans written and tours set up so that our first responders have updated information in an emergency. This committee also has insight into the development of hazardous materials exercises which are highly beneficial for the community and required for the County to receive grant funding.

FACT SHEET

TO FILE NO. 17-18/002

This ordinance updates the county code to reflect the separation of the housing authority from the county in resolution 16-17/079 adopted on March 21.

- SECTION 1: Deletes a reference to the program coordinating committee established by the housing authority. An ordinance is not necessary. The housing authority board can adopt a similar provision as a policy.
- SECTION 2: Deletes a reference regarding oversight by the committee on planning and development.
- SECTION 3: Deletes the section of the code describing the housing authority as a division of the department of planning and development.

Please note that the references in 2.05.030, creating the housing authority; 3.20.080, authorizing per diem compensation to housing authority board members and Chapter 9.70, the County Fair Housing Ordinance will be maintained in the county code.

FACT SHEET

TO FILE NO 17-18/11

Wisconsin counties hold significant acreage of lands enrolled under Wisconsin's County Forest Law (State Statutes §28.10 & §28.11). Citizens of Wisconsin value these County Forests because they provide reliable raw materials for the forest products industry as well as public access and recreation programs on more than 2.4 million acres of forested lands. These county forests are a large part of what makes northern Wisconsin unique and collectively make up the largest public forested land holdings in the state.

County Forest lands are managed by individual counties for the benefit of all citizens of Wisconsin. County Forests produced 743,787 cord equivalents of wood products, valued at \$39,383,277 during 2016, helping to fuel the \$24 billion forest products industry in Wisconsin. In addition, the endless recreational opportunities provided by our programs are an important part of the state's vital tourism industry.

Wisconsin's Forestry Mill Tax was established in 1937 for the purpose of acquiring, preserving and developing the forests of the state. This account has supported forest management operations, including partial support for county forest programs, since its inception. Governor Walker's 2017-19 Executive Budget proposal contains provisions to eliminate this funding source.

We are concerned about the loss of a dedicated funding source for Wisconsin's productive forestry programs and respectfully request that the Legislature provide long term adequate support, not only to the County Forest program, but all forestry programs in Wisconsin. Sustainable forestry and public land management are critically important to our state's economic health.

Fiscal Impact: DNR assistance to Eau Claire County Forestry programs is approximately \$62,000 annually. This number goes up when the forestry program participates in other special grants such as the Sustainable Forestry Grant and the Knowles Nelson Stewardship Program, which are applied for on an as needed basis. The DNR also provides time standards staffing on the county forest in the amount of 1,055 hours, equal to a value of approximately \$37,000.

- SUPPORT FOR REINSTATING THE FORESTATION STATE TAX-

WHEREAS, the Forestation State Tax (mill tax) was enacted in the 1930's for the purpose of acquiring, preserving and developing the forests of the state and has served as a segregated funding source for the Department of Natural Resources Division of Forestry and for grants and assistance to county forests and other programs that support, enhance and protect forest management, forest health and the timber industry; and

WHEREAS, the Mill Tax has served to support the state's \$24 billion forest products industry and helped support the state's \$20 billion tourism industry; and

WHEREAS, the 2017-2019 Wisconsin State Budget proposal includes a provision to eliminate the Mill Tax and replace this forestry funding source with state General Purpose Revenues; and

WHEREAS, it will likely be difficult to fully fund necessary forestry programs in the future when competing against transportation, education, health care, and other programs for limited General Purpose Revenue funds.

WHEREAS, a stable source of funding is necessary for maintaining our public lands in Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, an adequate fire program is critical for protecting Wisconsin's forests; and

WHEREAS, the forestry account funds a significant portion of Wisconsin's Knowles-Nelson Stewardship Program debt; and

WHEREAS, the forestry account funds a significant portion of Wisconsin's Payment In Lieu of Tax on state owned lands purchased under the Knowles-Nelson Stewardship Program; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin County Forests have relied on forestry funding to meet the state's statutory obligation to "compensate counties for the public uses, benefits and privileges these lands provide; all in a manner which will provide a reasonable revenue to the towns in which such lands lie."

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors supports reinstating the Forestation State Tax but at a level more appropriate to funding Wisconsin's core forestry services as identified in Wis. Stat. § 70.58 (1).

WHEREAS, in Wisconsin, it is estimated that 115,000 individuals age 65 and older are living with some form of clinically diagnosable dementia, and by 2040 that population is expected to grow to 240,000; and

WHEREAS, in Eau Claire County, it is estimated that over 2,000 individuals are living with some form of clinically diagnosable dementia, and the care and treatment of persons with dementia is now being described as a public health emergency; and

WHEREAS, 90% of people with dementia live in their home and 22% live alone; a diagnosis of dementia doesn't mean a person has to lose their dignity or their ability to remain in their home and part of the community; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County has made a significant commitment to persons with dementia through the critical work of the Aging and Disability Research Center's (ADRC's) Dementia Care Specialist (DCS), and through the work of the Dementia Coalition, which includes the Purple Angel Program (Business Training Program), and Memory Cafés; and

WHEREAS, the DCS and Dementia Coalition strive to improve the quality of life for all those affected, including people living with memory loss and their caregivers, while helping them to remain in the community where they want to live and cost-savings to taxpayers can be realized and

WHEREAS, each day that an individual remains in the community, and outside of expensive publicly funded institutional care facilities, saves the taxpayers an estimated \$161 per day or \$58,925 annually, making the DCS program a wise and sound investment of public dollars.

WHEREAS, the ADRC of Eau Claire County has experienced a steady growth in contacts by customers, caregivers and professionals (there were 17,271 contacts in 2016); and

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin Department of Health Services' proposed budget does not include funding for the DCS positions in 2017-2019, thereby removing this valuable expertise and coalition support from the community.

- 3. Five spaces minimum for customers of operators offering services under Chapters 12.02 and 12.03.
- 4. Ten spaces minimum for customers of operators offering services under Chapters 12.04 and 12.09.

5. Paved parking spaces shall be installed on the ground space to be leased as part of the airport facilities for the service to be offered. Said paved spaces shall be constructed and paid for by the lessee.

Separate self-fueling option dispensing pumps and motors are required for each grade of fuel.
- D. Each F.B.O. subject to this chapter shall maintain at least 2 fuel storage tanks of the capacity set forth in B. at the airport fuel farm site and maintain an adequate supply of fuel on hand at all times of at least 2 grades of fuel, inclusive of jet fuel, as closely related to the popular demand of the general aviation uses as possible and maintain petroleum tank environmental insurance listing the airport as additional insured with a minimum coverage of \$1,000,000. as provided in 12.01.040 B.8.
- E. Corporations and individuals subject to this chapter for private fueling shall maintain at least one fuel storage tank of the capacity set forth in B. within the airport fuel farm site and maintain petroleum tank environmental insurance listing the airport as an additional insured with a minimum coverage of \$1,000,000 as provided in 12.01.040 B.8.

SECTION 14. That Section 12.06.020 of the code be created to read:

12.06.020 Fuel flowage fee.

A. There shall be imposed upon the sale of aviation fuel at the airport a fuel flowage fee of \$.080 per gallon for jet fuel and \$.070 per gallon for 100LL fuel. B. Operation of vehicles on runways, taxiways, ramps and other airport property. No privately owned vehicle shall enter, be driven upon or operate upon any airport runway or taxiway. No privately owned vehicle shall enter, be driven upon or operate upon any airport

ramp, tie-down area, or any area not designated as a vehicle movement area. The provisions of this section shall not apply to emergency equipment or service, maintenance and construction equipment when engaged in performing official duties.

C. Pedestrian traffic on airport. No pedestrian shall be allowed beyond the terminal area, the apron or aircraft tie-down area unless for the purpose of egress from or ingress to an aircraft, or unless authorized by the airport director. Pedestrian traffic is prohibited on the runway and upon outlying areas of the airport except for those employees of the county, state and federal government or contractors engaged in airport construction or maintenance work.

SECTION 27. That Section 12.25.090 of the code be amended to read:

12.25.090 Policing and enforcement. It shall be the duty of the <u>airport</u> director, <u>and airport personnel</u> and the security police to enforce the regulations contained within this chapter and to issue citations for violations hereof. Prosecution of violations shall be the responsibility of the corporation counsel.
