

Dear Janet:

Thank you for contacting me about President Trump's proposed budget. I appreciate hearing from you on this important issue.

As you may know, on May 23, 2017, President Trump released a draft of his Fiscal Year 2018 budget. President Trump's budget dramatically increases military spending by more than \$54 billion while cutting almost all other federal agencies, including 30% cuts to the State Department and EPA. It includes substantial cuts to many important programs, including federal-funded research at organizations like the National Science Foundation and the National Institutes of Health, as well as cuts to public education, environmental protection, and infrastructure.

In the EPA, President Trump has proposed eliminating more than 50 programs and 3,200 positions. Among the programs within the EPA that would be eliminated is the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative, an initiative launched in 2010 that has undertaken more than 3,000 projects to restore the Great Lakes. These projects include preventing invasive species from invading the Great Lakes and rebuilding wetlands where fish spawn. Even Wisconsin Governor Scott Walker opposed this cut, saying "I think it makes sense for us to continue to make prudent investments in protecting and improving the Great Lakes."

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In addition, the budget a nportant cultur infrastructure programs, including the Corporation for Tubil Broadcasting (CPB), the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA), and the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH), despite these programs making up only 0.02% of the federal budget. The CPB is a private corporation funded by Congress that provides funding for public radio and television. It supports more than 1,500 local radio and television stations. In addition, the NEA and NEH perform a similar task for arts and humanities programs. In 2016, the NEA provided more than 24,000 grants, primarily for local and community art projects, 25% of which were in rural areas. Although the NEA receives public money, it also helps spur private investment; every dollar directly invested by the NEA is matched by \$9 in state or private investment. Many crucial art projects, which help revitalize local communities, would not be able to continue without NEA support.

Furthermore, Trump's budget would eliminate several programs that provide crucial assistance to low-income and elderly Americans, such as Community Development Block Grants. The budget would also eliminate the AmeriCorps program, a program that matches more than 80,000 volunteers per year with community service initiatives around the county, many of whom

support after-school programs in schools. And in cutting funding for the National Institute of Health (NIH), the budget would eliminate critical funding for medical research, including cancer research. Finally, by cutting the State Department budget, several crucial diplomacy and foreign aid programs would be eliminated. Many national security experts say that these cuts would alienate important transatlantic allies and harm people in developing countries who rely on support from these foreign aid programs.

These cuts would have a devastating impact on rural Wisconsin. Instead of supporting programs that create jobs and grow our rural Wisconsin communities, Trump's budget guts the programs they depend on. There is nothing fiscally responsible about making drastic cuts to programs that Wisconsinites depend on to pay for outdated military equipment that even our Generals have said they don't need.

Instead, Congress should agree on a budget blueprint that puts our country on a sound fiscal path and reduces our deficit while simultaneously protecting important investments in our communities. That means making spending cuts but also asking powerful special interests — including big oil and wealthy Wall Street bankers — to contribute their fair share by eliminating tax loopholes. We can also eliminate weapons programs that the Pentagon doesn't even want and end unfair taxpayer subsidies made to large agribusiness.

We must also continue to lay a foundation for growth – making smart investments that keep our economy growing and support economic competitiveness, to ensure America remains the most innovative, creative country in the world. Investments in education and innovation will not only create the jobs of the future but will ensure that every American is prepared with the skills they need to succeed and every business can compete in a 21st century economy. These investments will guarantee that we out-innovate, out-educate, and out-build our global competitors.

In the 115th Congress, I will continue working to find common ground to promote fiscal responsibility without endangering our future through foolish cuts. Rest assured that I will keep your concerns in mind as any budget is considered in the House.

The review of Chapters 2.04, 2.05, 2.06, is part of the strategic plan process.

- **SECTION 1.** Deletes the April 1st date for reporting strategic initiatives to the county administrator. The county administrator will determine on an annual basis. Clarifies that the November budget meeting is held in place of the 3rd Tuesday meeting.
- **SECTION 2.** Updates the code to reflect there is no slate of candidates viewable by the board, that a unanimous ballot for officers can be made by voice vote, that the retention period for retaining officer ballots is 90 days and adds a county code reference
- **SECTION 3.** Updates code to allow for new and different voting devices without the need to change the code.
- SECTION 4. Gives the chair flexibility in recognizing the order in which supervisors will speak.
- **SECTION 5.** Clarifies language.
- **SECTION 6.** Entering all documents alphabetically by committee has not been followed since the committee on rules and legislation was abolished. The balance of the subsection is the responsibility of the county administrator.
- **SECTION 7.** Updated to reflect current practice.
- **SECTION 8.** Eliminates job title which is subject to change.
- **SECTION 9.** Updates the code to reflect that not all committees always meet monthly which means minutes cannot always be approved within 35 days.
- **SECTION 10.** Makes uniform that all committee appointments expire at termination or the 3rd Tuesday in even-numbered years.
- **SECTION 11.** The amendment provides for the automatic carry over of calendar items referred or introduced at the first meeting in April.
- **SECTION 12.** Changes the requirement to call the question from a simple majority vote to a 2/3 rds vote to be consistent with Robert's Rules of Order.
- **SECTION 13.** Requires all amendments except those coming up during debate or editorial changes to be typewritten, approved as to form by corporation counsel and provided to all members prior to introduction from the floor.
- **SECTION 14.** Allows individual supervisors to introduce legislation only after consideration by a committee or if immediate action is required. See also section 26 of this ordinance.

SECTION 15. Eliminates receiving 2 annual reports from the Airport and the City-County Health Department.

SECTION 16. Never used. The chair has the ability to issue a citation or commendation already under existing 2.04,320 F.

SECTION 17. Written reports of convention delegates have not been required for many years.

SECTION 18. Under Wis. Stat. § 59.18(2)(b) the county administrator appoints department heads subject to confirmation of the county board. The goal is to effectively recruit the most talented individuals in an expeditious manner. The process of involving county board members prior to confirmation is the prerogative of the county administrator. Committees make recommendation to the county board chair, but the chair's appointments are confirmed by the county board.

SECTION 19. Eliminates the requirement for a county board sunshine fund used for condolences and special recognition. When funds get low the board can solicit supervisors for donations.

SECTION 20. Deletes a duplicate provision regarding the payroll function for condolences and special recognition. See section 19.

SECTION 21. Reflects the integration of children's court services with human services and the fact that the law library is included within oversight of the clerk of courts.

SECTION 22. Updates the code to reflect current practice. The county code reference was previously repealed. Extension contracts have been reviewed by the corporation counsel and the finance director and approved by the county administrator for many years. The statute that is referenced only requires that funds have been allocated which is verified by the finance director and county administrator.

SECTION 23. This provision duplicates existing language in Chapter 4.04 of the county code.

SECTION 24. Reletters remaining subsections in 2.04.465.

SECTION 25. Clarifies that if the committee on finance and budget has taken action on claims it will be reported in writing to the county board. Elimination of the reporting of transfer of funds language conforms to current practice.

SECTION 26. Eliminates the EMS council which is not required by statute and only meets annually. The work of the EMS Council is currently being done through the Health Department's Public Health Emergency Preparedness meetings, the Northwest Wisconsin Healthcare coalition and the Regional Trauma Advisory Council. The local emergency planning committee, which meets quarterly is still in place.

SECTION 27. The elimination of this subsection requiring oversight of community agencies was requested the ADRC subcommittee on Older American Act programs. The function is not required by state or federal law.

SECTION 28. Reletters remaining paragraphs in Subsection C. of Section 2.05.611.

SECTION 29. Eliminates the UW-Extension advisory committee which is allowed but not required by Wis. Stat. § 59.56(3)(f)3e.

SECTION 30. Updates the code to be consistent with the Employee Policy Manual.

SECTION 31. Updates the code to reflect the process for budget preparation of the county administrator and the finance and budget committee.

SECTION 32. Updates the code to reflect the fact that Chapter 3.45 was deleted and with only one paragraph remaining no subsection designation is necessary.

The meeting on the Tuesday after the 2nd Monday of November in each year shall be the annual meeting <u>held in lieu of the 3rd Tuesday of the month meeting</u> at which time the board shall conduct a public hearing on and thereafter adopt the county budget and tax levy for the ensuing fiscal year, in addition to its regular business. Unless otherwise ordered, the board shall adjourn at 11:00 p.m. until 1:00 p.m. the next day until the business of the annual meeting is concluded.
- **SECTION 2.** That paragraphs 1. and 3. of Subsection C. and Subsection D. of Section 2.04.020 of the code be amended to read:
- 1. Nominations for the office to be filled shall be called for by the chair and may be made by any member of the board upon recognition by the chair. The person so nominated shall immediately state an objection if he or she wishes the nomination to be withdrawn from consideration. Nominations so made need not be seconded and shall be entered by the clerk on a slate viewable by the board. The chair shall request 3 times if additional nominations are to be made and hearing none may entertain a motion to close nominations. If there is only one nominee a voice vote to cast a unanimous ballot is in order. Nominations having been closed the board shall proceed with written ballots to vote for one of the nominees. If any nominee receives a majority of the votes cast, he or she shall be declared elected. If no nominee receives a majority of the votes cast on the lst ballot, successive ballots shall be taken with the nominee receiving the lowest number of votes on the 3rd ballot being eliminated, until one of the nominees shall receive a majority of the votes cast;
- 2. Written ballots provided herein shall be secret for the election of the officers of the county board, but shall be endorsed on the reverse thereof by the person casting the ballot in the case of all other elections;
- 3. All ballots cast shall they shall be open to public inspection for 90 days after which the clerk will destroy them. Following said period, the clerk may destroy said ballots.

The county board shall then proceed to consider amendments to the rules of order and to establish or amend the rules of the board dealing with the committees thereof, their duties and manner of reporting. Review of Chapters 2.15, 10.02 and 12.34 is part of the strategic plan process.

Section 1. The current sections regarding definitions, divisions, the reserve corps and liability have been eliminated. Definitions are no longer necessary due to the other changes being made. The sheriff has the authority to name the divisions within the department. The reserve corps is addressed in the sheriff departmental policy code. Liability is governed by statutory provisions and case law. The requirement for creation and maintenance of the office policy code and review by the corporation counsel, human services director and sheriff (2.15.010) as well as the provision regarding deputies serving as municipal police (2.15.020) have been preserved. In section 2.15.030 outdated references to other sections of the county code have been eliminated and language added allowing a mutual aid request to fall under acceptable circumstances for the use of county authority and equipment.

Section 2. Currently the location of stop intersections, yield intersections and parking prohibition areas on county roads under the jurisdiction of the highway department are individually listed in the county code. The current format is not required by Wisconsin Statutes or the Wisconsin Administrative Code. This Ordinance repeals and recreates Chapter 10.02 and delegates the authority to establish locations of, and to post and place stop signs, yield signs and parking prohibition signs as well as to maintain all related records to the highway commissioner.

Wis. Stat. § 349.07 (8) provides authority through ordinance for the installation of stop signs and traffic signals on highways which the governing body has exclusive jurisdiction over. Wis. Stat. § 349.13 (1e) allows local authorities to prohibit, limit, or otherwise restrict the stopping, standing, or parking of vehicles with respect to highways, state trunk highways, and connecting highways within the corporate limits of their jurisdiction. Wis. Admin. Code. § Trans 200.02 provides the authority to the Department of Transportation or its authorized representative and local authorities with respect to highways under their exclusive jurisdiction, to place and maintain traffic signs and signals.

Section 3. Section 12.34.001 A. has been updated to reflect to specify supervision of the highway commissioner by the county administrator.

Section 4. Relevant statutory provisions have been added.

Section 5. Updates the language to reflect the highway commissioner's authority to enter into contracts.

Background

The Aging & Disability Resource Center (ADRC) operates the elderly nutrition program for Eau Claire County. These programs are commonly known as Meals on Wheels and the Senior Dining programs. The ADRC serves roughly 78,000 meals per year of which 88% are for homebound seniors on the Meals on Wheels program and 12% are served at locations throughout the County. Without this program, many of Eau Claire County's seniors would not be able to live safely in their own homes.

Historically, the ADRC has used a caterer/contracted vendor for the provision of these prepared meals. Sacred Heart Hospital and Augusta Nursing and Rehabilitation are the vendors with contracts until December 31, 2017.

In partnership with the Purchasing Department the ADRC completed a request for proposal process for 2018 vendor(s). Upon completion of that process the result was one bid which would only provide services for the area currently served by Sacred Heart Hospital. Since the proposal process, that bidder rescinded their proposal leaving no interested vendors for the Eau Claire, Altoona and Fall Creek areas for 2018. Augusta Nursing and Rehabilitation submitted a quote of \$9 per meal in 2018 for the Augusta/Fairchild area which is a 30% cost increase over the current rate.

Recommended Solution

The ADRC is recommending to transition all food preparation in house through the operation of a central kitchen located in Fall Creek. Transitioning from a catering model to a central kitchen model will create long-term sustainability for this program, allowing us to control costs as well as quality. Geographically, Fall Creek is the center of Eau Claire County allowing for maximum efficiency and food safety for serving seniors living anywhere within the county. An in-house kitchen model is used in several other counties and tribes throughout Wisconsin and has proven to be one of the most cost effective, efficient, and flexible ways to operate the nutrition program. Those counties include: Florence, Forest, Sawyer, Washburn, Burnett, Barron, St. Croix, Taylor, Oconto, Marinette, Door, Waupaca, Adams, Marquette, Fond du Lac, Racine, Iowa and Lafayette. All 15 tribes in Wisconsin operate their own kitchens as well. Additionally, the ADRC will be able to obtain the majority of the raw food through a partnership with Feed My People at a very affordable rate.

Location of Kitchen Operation

The Fall Creek Nursing Home is currently vacant and has offered the ADRC a 3 year lease agreement to use the kitchen, all equipment, dining room, laundry facilities and offices in order to operationalize the model described above. The offer includes an 'all inclusive' fixed rent amount that includes the access and use of the space, all utilities, lawn care, snow removal and all equipment as well as building upkeep. This location and arrangement is ideal for the ADRC as a whole.

SUMMARY

The applicant proposes to rezone 27.89 acres +/- of land from A-P District to A-3 District to divide the existing home and surrounding acreage from the remainder of the property (approximately 132 acres), which will remain zoned A-P (Agricultural Preservation District), and which the applicant will retain. According to the applicant, the existing home and surrounding acreage will be sold to buyer will intends to farm on the western portion of the property.

BACKGROUND

SITE CHARACTERISTICS:

- Majority of property is currently undeveloped and with portions previously used for agriculture
- Property has one single-family residence
- Property is rolling and slopes generally south to north, with residence situated on a high point on the southern portion of the property

A-P Agricultural Preservation District. The A-P Agricultural Preservation District is established to:

- A. Preserve and protect those areas best suited for agricultural, forestry or open-space uses by minimizing fragmentation of contiguous agricultural or forest lands for the benefit and use of current and future generations;
- B. Provide for a wide range of agricultural uses typically associated with the continued production of food and fiber while recognizing that such uses may involve noise, dust, odor, or operation of heavy equipment for long periods of time;

- C. Strengthen and diversify a predominately agricultural and forestry-based economy by providing for a range of economic opportunities for property owners which are generally compatible with and supportive of agriculture or forestry operations as either permitted or conditional uses;
- D. Comply with standards contained in Wis. Stat. ch. 91 to permit eligible landowners to receive tax credits under Wis. Stat. § 71.09, in conjunction with their agricultural operations;
- E. Preserve rural character and promote the efficient use of public infrastructure and utilities by minimizing the adverse effects of urban sprawl along with its associated expense;
- F. Promote environmental quality through the use of conservation practices designed to minimize erosion of productive soils and deter the delivery of sediment and nutrients to the waters of our state;
- G. Minimize land use conflicts which occur when agricultural and non-agricultural uses are intermixed or not adequately separated; and
- H. Provide for carefully regulated extraction of nonmetallic mineral resources through Eau Claire County's permitting processes to ensure compatibility with adjacent land uses, minimize impacts to natural resources, and to restore lands to productive agricultural use consistent with locally approved reclamation plans.

REQUESTED ZONING DISTRICT:

The petition is to rezone the 27.89-acre property described above from the A-P Agricultural Preservation District to the A-3 Agricultural District.

A-3 Agricultural District. The A-3 District is established to "1. Protect the agricultural base of the county; 2. Preserve the county's natural resources and open space; 3. Provide an area for limited residential and hobby farm development in a rural atmosphere; and 4. Minimize urban sprawl and its associated public costs." Minimum lot size in the A-3 District is twenty (20) acres.

COMPREHENSIVE PLANS:

The Eau Claire County Future Land Use Map includes the property in the Rural Lands (RL) planning area and the Town of Pleasant Valley Future Land Use Map includes the property in the Rural Preservation (RP) planning area.

Following is a description of the intent of the applicable County and Town comprehensive plan future land use categories and applicable policies. Policies are quoted *in italics* and staff comments, as applicable, are provided thereafter:

Eau Claire County:

Rural Lands Intent and Description: The primary intent of these areas is to preserve productive
agricultural lands, protect existing farm & forestry operations from encroachment by incompatible
uses, promote further investments in farming, maintain farmer eligibility for incentive programs,
and preserve wildlife habitat and open spaces. In other words, to preserve the rural character of
these areas.

Applicable Policies:

- 1. Farming and other agriculture uses, agricultural-related businesses, cottage industries, forestry, mineral extraction, open space, and utilities shall be established as the primary land uses within these areas. Other uses may be permitted if found to be compatible with these uses and existing uses adjacent to the property. There is an existing home on the property to be divided. This use and other uses permitted in the A-3 District are typically compatible with adjacent agricultural uses.
- 2. The preferred housing density is one (1) unit per 20 or more acres; however, local comprehensive plans may be more or less restrictive than this guideline and generally range from one (1) unit per five (5) acres to one (1) unit per 35 acres.
- 3. For those Towns under County Zoning, the following Eau Claire County Zoning Districts will be considered for approval within RP areas: A-1 Exclusive Agricultural District, A-2 Agricultural-Residential District, A-3 Agricultural District, A-R Floating Agricultural-Residential District, F-2 Forestry District, F-1 Forestry District, and the proposed AC-R District noted below. The following additional policies shall apply to rezoning petitions:
 - a. Rezoning land to the A-R Floating Agricultural-Residential District or the proposed AC-R Agricultural Compatible Residential District is preferred over additional non-farm A-2 or A-3 parcels, unless rezoning land to either of these districts will not interfere with, will not disrupt, or will not be incompatible with farming or agricultural use, and will not take land suitable for cultivation or other agricultural use out of production. The applicant states that they have found a buyer who is a retired farmer who is interested in engaging in agricultural activities, which is consistent with the purpose and intent of the Rural Lands designation and the A-3 District.

Town of Pleasant Valley:

- Rural Preservation Comprehensive Plan Intent and Description: The primary intent of these areas is to, "preserve productive agricultural lands in the long-term, protect existing farm & forestry operations from encroachment by incompatible uses, promote further investments in farming, maintain farmer eligibility for incentive programs, and to preserve wildlife habitat and open spaces. In other words, to preserve the rural character of these areas. However, the term rural preservation is not intended to imply that changes in land use will not occur in these areas."
- Applicable Policies: The following policies are applicable to this rezoning petition. Staff comments, where provided, follow the policy in italics.
 - 1. Farming and agricultural uses shall be established as the primary land uses within these areas. Non-farm development shall only be allowed if it will not interfere with, will not disrupt, or will not be incompatible with farming or agricultural use, and will not take significant tracts of land suitable for cultivation or other agricultural use out of production. The proposed land division will have
 - 3. Proposals for any new non-farm residential development shall be consistent with the following policies:
 - a. The maximum gross density for non-farm residential lots shall be one unit per five (5) acres held in single ownership, except as otherwise provided below for conservation subdivisions. The minimum lot size for non-farm residential lots shall be one (1) acre. The balance of the land not included in the residential lots shall be placed in a permanent conservation easement for agriculture, forestry, and open space use.
 - b. Any new non-farm residential lot shall have a "Right to Farm" disclosure attached to it acknowledging that the potential non-farm owner has been informed that his lot has been

- established in an area where farming is the preferred land use, and stating that the owner understands that he must abide by the State of Wisconsin "Right to Farm" statute (WI Stat. 823.08). This language shall be recorded on the deed to the property, transferable to subsequent owners.
- c. Non-farm residential development shall only occur on land that is marginal for agricultural productivity. At least 80% of any proposed new lot shall not contain Class I, II, or III soils. In addition, it is the preference of the Town of Pleasant Valley that new non-farm residential lots that are approved in accord with these policies be located adjacent to or near existing non-farm development.
- 4. The following Eau Claire County zoning districts will be considered for approval within RP areas: A-1 Exclusive Agricultural District, A-2 Agricultural-Residential District, A-3 Agricultural District, A-R Floating Agricultural-Residential District, F-2 Forestry District, F-1 Forestry District, and the proposed AC-R District noted above. The following additional policies shall apply to zoning petitions:
 - b. Rezoning land to the A-2 Agriculture-Residential District or the A-3 Agriculture District is discouraged for new non-farm residential development, unless findings can be made that rezoning land to either of these districts will not interfere with, will not disrupt, or will not be incompatible with farming or agricultural use, and will not take land suitable for cultivation or other agricultural use out of production.
 - c. Rezoning land to the A-R Floating Agricultural-Residential District or the proposed AC-R Agricultural Compatible Residential District is preferred over additional non-farm residential A-2 or A-3 parcels.

FARMLAND PRESERVATION PLAN:

The property is included in the Farmland Preservation Plan Map, which allows the property owner to claim Farmland Preservation tax credits. The proposed A-3 District is not a certified farmland preservation district and would remove the property from the map.

Comprehensive Plan Summary

The proposed A-3 zoning is generally consistent with the intent and description and the applicable policies of the Eau Claire County and also appears to be generally consistent with the Town of Pleasant Valley Comprehensive Plan. Further, the Town of Pleasant Valley recommends approval of the proposed rezoning.

ANALYSIS

When rezoning land, a finding should be made that the purpose of the proposed zoning district and the uses that are allowed in that district are appropriate for the location; and that the rezoning will uphold the purpose of the zoning ordinance. A finding should also to be made that the rezone is consistent with the County's Comprehensive Plan.

A-P Rezoning Standards

In addition, there are four standards for approving a rezoning of land from the A-P Agricultural Preservation zoning district to any other district. The following provides an analysis of this rezoning petition based on those standards:

Standard 1 - The land is better suited for a use not allowed in the A-P Agricultural Preservation zoning district based on a review of soil types, historical productivity, location, and adjacent land uses.

• Soil Types – There are a total of eight (8) different soil types on the property. Five of the eight soil types found on the property to be rezoned are considered prime agricultural soils. However, the majority of these areas of prime agricultural soils are developed with improvements, used as a pond, or limited by topography.

- **Historical Productivity** It appears that a portion of the southwest quadrant of the property was cultivated for agriculture in the past. There is no evidence of past agricultural activities on the majority of the property.
- Site Location The site is located on County Highway I, just west of Traaseth Road
- Adjacent Land Uses Uses in the area are a mixture of woodlands, cropland, and single-family residences. Zoning in the area is predominantly A-P, with scattered A-R and A-3 zoning in the area. The nearest A-R zoning is approximately one-quarter mile southeast of the property and the nearest A-3 zoning is approximately three-quarters of a mile northwest of the property. Agriculture is limited by topography and soil capability.

Standard 2 - The rezoning is consistent with any applicable comprehensive plans. The proposed rezoning substantially conforms to the future land use intent, purpose, and policies for the Eau Claire County and Town of Pleasant Valley Comprehensive Plans.

Standard 3 - The rezoning is substantially consistent with the certified Eau Claire County Farmland Preservation Plan.

Although the majority of the property contains Class 3 soils, which are considered productive agricultural soils, the majority of these areas are developed with improvements, including outbuildings and a pond, or are limited by topography. The rezoning is substantially consistent with the Farmland Preservation Plan as it will not take productive farmland out of production and will have no foreseeable impact on productive farmland surrounding the property.

Standard 4 - The rezoning will not substantially impair or limit current or future agricultural use of surrounding parcels of land that are zoned for or legally restricted to agricultural use.

The proposed rezoning will not substantially impair or limit current or future agricultural use.

<u>Town Board Action</u>: The Pleasant Valley Town Board considered this rezoning petition on Monday, June 12, 2017 and recommended approval (3-0 vote) of the rezoning.

The rezoning petition has been evaluated for consistency with the purpose of A-3 District and the uses allowed in the district. The request is consistent with the purpose of the zoning code based on the following findings:

 The proposed rezoning is consistent with the intent and purpose of the Future Land Use plans for the County and the Town of Pleasant Valley

- Existing uses in the area include agricultural fields, woodlands, and scattered single-family residences
- Zoning in the area is predominantly A-P, with scattered A-R and A-3 zoning in the area. The
 nearest A-R zoning is approximately one-quarter mile southeast of the property and the nearest
 A-3 zoning is approximately three-quarters of a mile northwest of the property. Agriculture is
 limited by topography and soil capability.

CONCLUSION

The rezone petition has been evaluated for consistency with the following:

- Eau Claire County and Town of Pleasant Valley Comprehensive Plan future land use designations
- Eau Claire County and Town of Pleasant Valley Comprehensive Plan goals, objectives and policies
- Eau Claire County Farmland Preservation Plan
- Eau Claire County Zoning Ordinance, including purpose of the zoning code and allowable uses in A-3 District

In addition, the following factors have also been considered:

• Input of surrounding property owners. No correspondence in support or opposed to the proposed rezoning has been received, to date.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Planning and Development Committee file a recommendation of approval to the County Board for the rezoning petition to rezone the approximately 27.89-acre property from the A-P District to the A-3 District as depicted on the attached map and described in the attached legal description.

FINDINGS

The following findings support a recommendation of approval for the proposed rezoning:

- 1. The request is consistent with the goals, objectives, and policies of the Town of Pleasant Valley and Eau Claire County Comprehensive Plans, as required by Section 19.01.020.B of the Eau Claire County Code; and Wisconsin Statutes §66.1001(1)(am) and §66.1001(3)(j), including the intent, description, and policies of the Rural Lands Future Land Use classification in Section 3.3 of the Eau Claire County Comprehensive Plan and Map 9 (Future Land Use) of the Eau Claire County Comprehensive Plan
- 2. Existing uses in the area include a mixture of cropland, woodlands, and farm and non-farm housing
- 3. The property is included in the County Farmland Preservation Plan, but no agricultural operations have taken place on the property in some time
- 4. Although portions of the property contain Capability Class 3 Soils, which are considered prime agricultural soils, much of the property is developed with improvements including outbuildings a pond and other areas are limited by topography. The proposed rezoning will not remove productive farmland from cultivation.







OVERGARD REZONING SLOPE MAP







TO FILE NO 17-18/037

This resolution was originally shared through the Wisconsin County Forest Association membership at the request of Bayfield County. Bayfield County is seeking other counties to pass this resolution seeking an increase Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILT) from \$.30 to \$2.00 an acre for all towns with county forest land.

The \$.30 PILT was established in 1989 and has not changed since. Many counties, including Eau Claire already supplement the current amount with road repair or other aids to towns to help towns keep their roads up. In Eau Claire County, this is supplemented by giving the towns 15% of all timber sale revenues, instead of the 10% that is required.

By approving the \$2.00 per acre PILT, it would bring the payment in line with Federal Forest Payment in Lieu of Taxes.

Fiscal Impact: This resolution would have zero impact on the county budget, as these payments to the towns are paid directly from the State.

The impact to the towns in Eau Claire County that have county forest land would be an additional \$1.70 per acre of county forest land. This total impact to the towns of Eau Claire County with county forest land in them would be \$89,772.

- SUPPORTING AN INCREASE IN PAYMENT IN LIEU OF TAXES (PILT) FOR COUNTY FOREST LANDS-

WHEREAS, collectively, counties manage nearly 2.4 million acres of land in Wisconsin, making County forests the largest public ownership in the state; and

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin currently provides \$.30 per acre to towns with county forest property enrolled in the County forest Land (CFL) program; and

WHEREAS, this \$.30 per acre goes to pay for town roads, elections and emergency services; and

WHEREAS, the rate of \$.30 per acre was set in 1989 and has not changed over the past 28 years; and

WHEREAS, costs to provide road, election and emergency services have increased dramatically since 1989; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Forest Payment in Lieu of Taxes is \$2 per acre; and

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin pays on average at least \$10 per acre for lands not on the tax roll but owned by the State.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors supports an increase in the fee paid to towns from \$.30 to \$2 per acre for County Forest Land enrolled in the CFL program.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors directs the county clerk to forward this resolution to the governor, assembly members and senators representing Eau Claire County and the Wisconsin Counties Association.
