<u>Review/Approval of September 17, 2018 meeting minutes</u> – Paul Maulucci made a motion to approve the meeting minutes of September 17, 2018. Second by Martha Nieman. The motion carried and the meeting minutes were approved.

<u>Presentation on Comprehensive Community Services/Coordinated Services Team</u> – Kerry Swoboda, Children's Mental Health Manager; Bill Stein, SW Manager and Jess Buckli were present at the meeting to introduce family members who benefit from the CCS/Coordinated Services Team services. Two families spoke very highly of how the program services have helped their lives immensely. Discussion after the families left the meeting surrounded planning for Open House for the new Mental Health Clinic. Also public relations for the Department.

Resolution Requesting Increased Funding & Oversight Reforms for WI Child Protective Services System – Diane explained the Resolution and referred to the presentation a few months ago by Terri Bohl, Family Services Administrator. The original Resolution can be found on the WCA website. Sandra McKinney made a motion to accept the resolution as presented. Second by Martha Nieman. The Resolution passed unanimously and will be forwarded to Administration for placement on an upcoming County Board meeting. Colleen encouraged other County Board members to share to other County Board members what passing this resolution means for Child Welfare across the state.


Outpatient Clinic

We have hired two staff for our outpatient clinic, which also means we are able to submit our application. Luke Fedie is our new Clinic Manager, and started this past Monday. Luke comes to us with lots of experience working with kids and families in the Chippewa Valley as a therapist. Most recently he worked for several years in the Counseling Center at the University of Wisconsin Eau Claire, including a stint as Interim Director. In addition to Luke, we hired Jennifer Coyne as a therapist. Jennifer has a dual certification to work as an AODA therapist, or mental health. She comes to us from Arbor Place, but has worked at several other facilities in our community. Both are excellent additions to DHS, and will be instrumental to getting our clinic up and running. We will be adding to this staff very soon.

Treatment Courts


The treatment courts have seen an upswing in referrals over the past several months, especially in the Alternatives to Incarcerating Mothers (AIM) and Drug Courts. There is still capacity in the Mental Health and Veterans Courts though. We continue to partner with CJCC in trying to create efficiencies in how we interact with our triage team, and other community partners. There has been a change in how our screening process happens, with a contracted position from LSS doing most of those. LSS has also hired a part-time female Recovery Coach, who has been helpful in lending support to some of the female participants.

Adult Protective Services



During the month of October the Adult Protective Services team reviewed 26 Eau Claire County Annual Protective Placement Reviews and 7 Chippewa County Annual Protective Placement reviews. The Team traveled as far as Central Center in Madison to complete the reviews. Please note that out of the 26 investigations started in October 27 were completed and 4 investigations from September and 2 in October have not been closed.

Crisis Services



During the Month of October there were 24 individuals who were detained and 13 went to probable cause.





Comprehensive Community Services (CCS) Program



The CCS Program continues to grow and evolve. With the arrival of November, the CCS Program is fully staffed. There are currently 18 service facilitators, 4 mental health professionals, and 4.5 substance use professionals providing direct services to CCS Program participants. Demand for CCS Program services remains strong, with approximately 7 to 10 new referrals received each week. The CCS Program is expected to grow and expand as we move into 2019.

Children's Behavioral Health Unit: CCS, CLTS/CCOP, CST

Personnel

There are currently 11 Social Workers on the team: Children's Long Term Support/Children Community Options Program (4), Coordinated Services Team (2), and Comprehensive Community Services (5).

Clients Served

CLTS

Children's Long-Term Support (CLTS) and Children's Community Options Program (CCOP) are currently serving 165 families; 157 waiver, 8 CCOP cases. As of October 2018, there are 45 children found eligible for services and on the formal waitlist. Currently, nine (9) children are in the screening process to receive an eligibility determination to be placed on the waitlist. The Department is expected to eliminate the waitlist during 2018.

Coordinated Service Team Program

As of October 2018, the Coordinated Services Team Program is serving 23 teams with 41 youth. CST received 25 referrals since January 2018. CST staff have facilitated nine (9) Family Group Decision Making (FGDM) meetings this year.

Program

The Children's Behavioral Health Unit will be distributing the first joint newsletter, Children's Wellness Connection. The newsletter will be distributed quarterly and include information pertaining to children and family mental health and wellness.

Programming

The Family Services Division, along with the Foster Care Recruitment, Retention and Support Team, are planning a holiday event for foster families to be held on December 4th at the courthouse. The Foster Care Recruitment, Retention and Support Team has received a tremendous support from the community for raffle prizes and gift baskets for foster children and families. Food, games and face painting will also be available at the event. All agency staff have been invited to attend the event.



CPS Initial Assessment


In October we received 137 reports alleging child maltreatment; 56 were screened in for CPS Initial Assessment and 81 were screened out.



Ongoing Child Protective Services

Ongoing CPS is currently serving 132 families and 257 children. 178 of the 257 children served are in out of home care which equates to 69% of the children served. 94 of the 132 families served have at


least one child in out of home care. This means 71% of the families served have a child in out of home care. AODA struggles continue to be the main case planning component in Ongoing CPS cases.



^{*}The significant increase in numbers from March to April involves the transfer of two Social Workers from the Youth Services team to the Ongoing Child Protective Services Team.

Youth Services

The Youth Services Team is currently serving 87 families with 97 youth. Of the 97 youth open, 24 are in out of home placement which is equivalent to 24% of the children served by Youth Services. Complex trauma and significant mental health needs and developmental disabilities continue to be the primarily reason for out of home placements.



^{*}The significant decrease in youth in out of home care from March to April is explained by the transfer of two Social Workers from the Youth Services team to the Ongoing CPS team.

Alternate Care (Kinship and Foster Care)

Alternate Care has continued to experience a high number of children in out of home placements. The primary focus in this unit is to recruit and license foster parents to meet the needs of children in the community and to provide additional support to foster parents to increase retention. As of 11/14/2018, there were 207 children in out of home placement.

Birth to Three Program

The Birth to Three Program has received 361 referrals so far in 2018.

FISCAL SERVICES UNIT Vickie Gardner

The Fiscal Unit is currently working on the following:

- Fiscal staff is beginning to gear up for year-end processing with provider notification, billing cleanup, reporting, etc.
- All 2018 contracts have been sent to providers. Provider meetings have been scheduled and are occurring over the next two months. We are working on creating 2019 contracts as rates arrive. We will begin sending those out to providers in mid to late December.
- The updated Petty cash policy and procedure has been approved by managers. It will become effective 1/1/19. Work is continuing to test the new monthly travel expense form to allow for miscellaneous purchases and to create an electronic submission and approval process.
- Beginning preliminary work with IS department on creating a Sharepoint site for CCS on hold as IS continues to learn more about Sharepoint.
- Cross training is continuing for some state reporting within the unit.

- The new Crisis billing process issues have been resolved and we are now billing within our new process.
- We are continuing work with Joxel staff on the Avatar Optimization project. Preliminary work includes:
 - o Defining Programs in Avatar
 - o Reviewing and updating CPT codes
 - o Reviewing Guarantors
 - Setting up the new Provider fee Definitions
 - o Electronic Billing Process with LSS for CCS services
 - o Month-end Closing
 - o Billing Process
 - o MSO Authorization
 - o Reviewing process flow for client statements
- The auditing and approval of monthly employee travel expense reports is going well. With the implementation of an electronic process, we will be providing training to all staff in early January.
- We are working on several CLTS projects. They are:
 - o Notifying providers and implementing new mandated rates
 - o Moving several providers to our third party payer
 - O Updating our website to include new instructions on how to bill with our third party provider.
 - o Potentially moving several respite providers to our contracted payer.

ORGANIZATIONAL SERVICES UNIT Sue Schleppenbach

We are excited to have hired the Administrative Specialist I who will be the support person for the Outpatient Clinic. This is an energizing opportunity to assist in building procedures for the clinic and helping it succeed. The unit continues to be a part of the Joxel Optimization Project. We are also being trained in the records room to take over our records by the end of the year.

ECONOMIC SUPPORT UNIT (ESU)

The Economic Support Services Unit (ESU) provides a variety of financial supports and services to families and individuals. The programs include Child Care, Health Care (HC), and Food Share (FS). The Energy Assistance Program (WHEAP) is contracted out to Western Dairyland. Eau Claire County is the Lead Agency of the Great Rivers Income Maintenance Consortium (GRC). Counties included in the Great Rivers Consortium include Burnett, Barron, Chippewa, Douglas, Dunn, Eau Claire, Polk, Pierce, St. Croix, and Washburn. Currently GRC has eight vacancies, three of which are in Eau Claire County.
