Critical Community Issues: Drug Abuse which results in increase in Alternate Care & Hospitalization placements

Diane Cable, DHS Director, shared statistical information re: Out of Home Care, increased cost for youth in residential centers

Diane has communicated to Oversight Committees in 2018 the urgent need for Child Welfare System change to address above issues.

<u>Presentation on SystemChange</u> -Eau Claire County DHS (Diane and Tom representatives) is one of five counties across the country who have been part of the Alia Unsystem Innovation Cohort. This evening we have the pleasure of welcoming Dr. Amelia Franck Meyer who is the CEO of Alia, a national non-profit organization focused on transforming how the child welfare system is done in this country. As the former CEO of Anu Family Services, Amelia has moved the organization through a cultural and practice transformation resulting in nationally recognized child permanence and placement stability outcomes for children in out-of-home care.

DHS has been actively involved in UnSystem Change work at the Department, creating a vision **FAMILY CONNECTIONS ARE ALWAYS PREESERVED AND STRENGTHENED**Our participation is no cost to the county.

Dr. Meyer shared a power point presentation on UnSystem Change. She answered questions from members and tried to project, by using past experience from other counties, the cost of the transition from the old child welfare system to the new child welfare system. Evolution of a System diagram explained.

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### Better, more affordable care, covering more Wisconsinites

### **Supporting Eau Claire County**

Medicaid expansion is the lever that Wisconsin pulls to infuse new federal dollars into the rest of our health care system, with the aim of improving the health and well-being of every citizen. Medicaid is a critical part of our health care system. In Wisconsin, 1.1 million residents rely on Medicaid for high-quality health care. The budget expands Medicaid to cover childless adults, parents, and caretakers with incomes up to 138% of the federal poverty level, which is about \$17,000 per year for a single person. This expansion will enable an estimated 82,000 additional individuals to access affordable health care.

Medicaid expansion will also allow the state to draw down new federal funds and save Wisconsin taxpayers \$324.5 million. The budget proposes to reinvest these savings into new initiatives to improve health care access and quality for all Eau Claire County residents, not just those enrolled in Medicaid. The expansion plus the new initiatives will enable us to draw down a total of \$1.6 billion in new federal funding. When we combine these new initiatives with all other investments for Department of Health Services programs—from both the state and federal government—the budget provides a total of \$2.6 billion in new funding. Of this, \$2.4 billion will be invested in Wisconsin communities, including \$46 million in Eau Claire County.

### TO FILE NO. 19-20/008

Abandoned vehicles are no longer impounded at the highway shop in Altoona. In most cases abandoned vehicles are stored at the towing company at the expense of the owner. Some vehicles are stored on county owned or leased property. Vehicles which are evidence are stored at secure locations.

This ordinance updates the county code to be consistent with the current practice and to accommodate changes made in the future regarding the impoundment of vehicles. This ordinance deletes specific references to requiring the impoundment of vehicles at the highway department yard in Altoona, while preserving but not requiring vehicles to be stored on county owned or leased property. The discretion as to where the vehicles are towed is the responsibility of the sheriff's department. For those vehicles the county retains the right to collect impoundment and storage charges.

The County Board of Supervisors of the County of Eau Claire does ordain as follows:

**SECTION 1**. That Subsection A. of Section 10.20.005 of the code be amended to read:

A. "Department" means the county highway sheriff's department.

**SECTION 2**. That paragraphs 1. and 3. of Subsection A. of Section 10,20.010 of the code be amended to read:

1. The sheriff's deputy or the officer in charge who discovers any vehicle which has been abandoned shall cause it to be removed to the county vehicle pound as provided in A.2. The officer shall notify the sheriff of the abandonment and location of the impounded vehicle.

3. The expense of all vehicle towing and impoundment authorized in this chapter on county owned or leased property shall be charged as provided in 4.09.040.

**SECTION 3.** That Subsection B. of Section 10.20.010 of the code be amended to read:

B. If a vehicle is left unattended on county property without the permission of the officer in charge and it jeopardizes public safety by creating an unsafe condition, significantly hindering the efficient movement of traffic or interfering with parking of vehicles in county lots, the officer in charge of the property on which it stands or the sheriff may authorize the immediate removal, towing and impoundment of the vehicle at the vehicle pound.

**SECTION 4.** That Section 10.20.015 of the code be repealed.

**SECTION 5.** That Subsection B. of Section 10.20.030 of the code be amended to read:

B. The owner or lienholder of record of any vehicle impounded or stored at the vehicle pound on county owned or leased property pursuant to this chapter shall be assessed \$30.00 for each day the vehicle remains in storage, plus towing costs in addition to any civil forfeiture.

### TO FILE NO. 19-20/020

This resolution creates a special committee to review and develop strategies to expand broadband services in Eau Claire County. Many areas in Eau Claire County are underserved or not served at all with broadband.

The term broadband commonly refers to high-speed Internet access that is always on and faster than the traditional dial-up access. Broadband includes several high-speed transmission technologies such as:

- Digital Subscriber Line (DSL)
- Cable Modem
- Fiber
- Wireless
- Satellite
- Broadband over Powerlines (BPL)

The broadband technology you choose will depend on a number of factors. These may include whether you are located in an urban or rural area, how broadband Internet access is packaged with other services (such as voice telephone and home entertainment), price, and availability.<sup>(1)</sup>

The Special Committee shall include the following in their review/plan:

- Analysis of Cellular/Broadband coverage within Eau Claire County, including a phased plan to improve coverage Countywide Results from public participation/survey efforts;
- Provider information, their location(s) and details on current service and technologies;
- Industry findings and funding sources;
- Potential project partners;
- Legal and regulatory issues;
- Business and financial modeling in support of network build to include Fiber to the Home (FTTH), Fixed Wireless Broadband, or a Hybrid System;
- Provide ESRI ArcGIS shapefiles or geodatabase created or utilized for the project;
- Final list of recommendations and suggested implementation measures to be employed by Eau Claire County and its municipalities, together with a summary of data collected and relied upon for recommendation.

**Fiscal Impact:** It is estimated that there will be minimal committee expenditures for per diem and mileage that will be handled through existing committee and commission accounts. General expenditures for conducting necessary studies will be derived from existing budget accounts.
