RESOLUTION TO ESTABLISH GOALS OF 100% RENEWABLE ENERGY AND CARBON NEUTRALITY BY THE YEAR 2050 FOR EAU CLAIRE COUNTY AND TO AMEND THE BUDGET TO MOVE \$10,000 FROM CONTINGENCY FOR INITIAL PLANNING

WHEREAS, the Paris Climate Agreement seeks to stabilize the global climate system by "holding the increase in the global average temperature to well below 2 °C above pre-industrial levels and pursuing efforts to limit the temperature increase to 1.5 °C above pre-industrial levels"; and,

WHEREAS, climate scientists have determined this upper temperature limit to be the best feasible scenario in managing climate change impacts (such as extreme weather events and sea level rise) that threaten public safety, infrastructure, private property and economic prosperity; and,

WHEREAS, Wisconsin pays an estimated \$14 billion dollars to states with fossil fuel resources and is last in per capita workforce in the clean energy economy compared to other Midwestern states. Pursuing these goals will reduce out-of-state monetary flows, recycle dollars back into the local economy, spur local economic development and create jobs; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Eau Claire passed a 100% Renewable Energy and Carbon Neutrality Resolution in March 2018 to achieve these goals; and,

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County approved Resolution 09-10/102 in October 2009 to support the State of Wisconsin's goals for energy independence and to be eligible to gain access to its accelerated technical and financial assistance; and,

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County approved Resolution 15-16/073 to join the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources in partnership with the League of Wisconsin Municipalities and multiple organizations and

communities in participating in the GREEN TIER LEGACY COMMUNITY PROGRAM; and,

WHEREAS, by signing the GREEN TIER LEGACY COMMUNITY PROGRAM, the County is committed to meeting the goals of the Legacy program with regards to developing a sustainability Implementation and Monitoring Plan; and,

WHEREAS, the County envisions a climate and energy planning process that will reflect community values and stakeholder participation to develop low-carbon means to reach these goals. Stakeholders include all county residents, low-income and minority populations, large and small businesses, local utilities, the educational community, institutions, the building and construction sector, transportation providers, waste companies, Towns and municipalities within the County, and many others; and,

WHEREAS, the County recognizes the process to achieve these ambitious goals represents a journey that needs to be realistic and sensitive to unintended impacts. Careful and ongoing planning is necessary to understand what is practical in the short term while ratcheting up efforts in the mid and long-term target ranges, where technological advancements occur and costs decline; and,

WHEREAS, the Eau Claire Chamber of Commerce's position is "Economic growth and environmental progress go hand in hand. Responsible stewardship of our resources can both grow our economy and preserve the planet;" and,

WHEREAS, a 2017 community sustainable development survey revealed public support in the County of Eau Claire for pursing aggressive municipal and community goals, and further, demonstrated a willingness to pay slightly more in making the transition; and (Ref. Clean Wisconsin Survey by Fairbank, Maslin, Maullin, Metz and Associates, Dec 2017)

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of Eau Claire County, that it adopts the following sustainability goals:

- 1) Achieve Eau Claire County government and community carbon neutrality by 2050 with incremental drawdown targets of 5% by 2020, 25% by 2030, 30% by 2040 and 40% by 2050.
 - 2) Obtain 100% renewable energy by 2050 for the Eau Claire County government,
 - 3) Assist the County Community in achieving the 100% renewable energy goal by 2050; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County will undertake planning and action initiatives to establish baseline data and to prepare a plan to achieve the sustainability goals and to engage in a periodic evaluation of progress; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED to collaborate with the City of Eau Claire's Sustainability Advisory Committee, other governmental bodies within the County, PACE Wisconsin, UWEC, CVTC, school districts, other civic entities, and encourage community participation; and,

There were concerns expressed by Housing Authority staff about the physical nature of the space and the ability to maintain confidentiality with the clients of the Housing Authority. The Committee on Administration during its regularly scheduled meeting held on July 9, 2019, approved moving the Offices of the Housing Authority to vacant office space located on the second floor of the Agriculture and Resource Center located in the City of Altoona; and,

WHEREAS, it would be beneficial to the Eau Claire County Housing Authority to not have to pay rent at their new location in the Agricultural and Resource Center because they would be able to divert the funds they would use to pay rent to the services that they provide to the low-income residents of Eau Claire County.

IN SUPPORT OF WISCONSIN DRAFT LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU (LRB) BILL 1522/P1 THAT SEEKS TO RESTORE VOTING RIGHTS TO PEOPLE ON PROBATION AND PAROLE AND DECREASE FELONY DISENFRANCHISEMENT IN THE STATE OF WISCONSIN

WHEREAS, felony disenfranchisement is defined as the loss of a person's voting rights due to a felony conviction; and

WHEREAS, in the state of Wisconsin a person is not eligible to vote if they have been convicted of a felony and currently serving any portion of their sentence including extended supervision, probation and/or parole; and

WHEREAS, rates of disenfranchisement vary drastically by state due to broad variations in voting prohibitions; and

WHEREAS, as reported by The Sentencing Project, 30 states deny voting rights to felony probationers, 34 states disenfranchise parolees, and 12 states deny voting rights to some or all individuals who have successfully fulfilled their prison, parole or probation sentence; and

WHEREAS, Maine and Vermont are the only two states that do not disenfranchise felons; and

WHEREAS, as of December 2016, the Bureau of Justice Statistics reported there were an estimated 4.5 million adults in the U.S. under community supervision, probation or parole and, of that amount, 64,900 were residents of the state of Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, the Ex-Incarcerated People Organizing (EXPO) group reports in 2016 that the average length of stay for parole in Wisconsin was estimated to be 38 months or a little over three years; that makes Wisconsin third nationally for probation and parole sentences as reported by the EXPO group; and

WHEREAS, the EXPO group further reports that the average duration for parole across all states is estimated to be 22 months; and

WHEREAS, a report by the Advancement Project titled *Democracy Disappeared: How Florida Silences* the Black Vote through Felony Disenfranchisement published October 2018, suggests that the consequences of felony disenfranchisement disproportionately impact poor communities and communities of color, which are likely to have high concentrations of returning citizens who are disenfranchised; and

WHEREAS, the report further indicates that losing the right to vote is linked to socio-economic conditions; felony disenfranchisement converges with low income, poverty, limited education and employment opportunities to disempower entire communities; and

WHEREAS, the inability for disenfranchised people convicted of a felony to participate in the political process limits their power to overcome inequality and systemic injustice and isolates them from society; and

WHEREAS, the Advancement Project reports that when large numbers of citizens are not allowed to vote, entire constituencies may go unrepresented in the democratic institutions that govern them; and

WHEREAS, under Wisconsin Legislative Reference Bureau (LRB) draft legislation 1522/P1, a person would lose his or her right to vote based on a disqualifying offense only while he or she is incarcerated for that offense, and a person that is released to extended supervision or parole may resume voting; and

WHEREAS, additionally, LRB 1522/P1 would allow a person convicted of a disqualifying offense and on probation retain his or her right to vote unless he or she is confined as a condition of probation; and

WHEREAS, EXPO, Wisconsin Affiliate of the Gamaliel Foundation (WISDOM), the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU), Project Return, Wisconsin Voices, League of Women Voters and Just Leadership USA plans to launch the "Unlock the Vote" Campaign seeking to reengage 64,900 disenfranchised voters; and

WHEREAS, felony disenfranchisement is a major social issue across the United States that adversely affects more than 4 million people, including 64,900 people in the state of Wisconsin, as it is a constitutional right that every citizen should be allowed the right to vote;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors supports Wisconsin Legislative Reference Bureau (LRB) draft legislation 1522/P1 that seeks to restore voting rights to disenfranchised felons and efforts to reduce felony disenfranchisement and reform practices that disproportionately impact communities of color in Wisconsin and the United States; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors supports a comprehensive review and revision of Wisconsin's sentencing guidelines, parole processes, and revocation processes to ensure that best practices are being followed; and

WHEREAS, airport users have been consulted in formulation of the improvements included in this resolution, and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held prior to the adoption of this petition in accordance with Wis. Stat. §114.33(2) (1973) as amended, and a transcript of the hearing is transmitted with this petition, and

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the sponsor that a petition for federal and (or) state aid in the following form is hereby approved:

The petitioner, desiring to sponsor an airport development project with federal and state aid or state aid only, in accordance with the applicable state and federal laws, respectfully represents and states:

- That the airport, which it is desired to develop, should generally conform to the requirements for a primary commercial service type airport as defined by the Federal Aviation Administration.
- The character, extent, and kind of improvements desired under the project are as follows: Expand/Rehabilitate the Airport Snow Removal Equipment Storage Building, Extend Runway 14/32, and any necessary related work.
- That the airport project, which your petitioner desires to sponsor, is necessary for the following reasons: to meet the existing and future needs of the airport.

WHEREAS, it is recognized that the improvements petitioned for as listed will be funded individually or collectively as funds are available, with specific project costs to be approved as work is authorized, the proportionate cost of the airport development projects described above which are to be paid by the sponsor to the Secretary of the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (hereinafter referred to as the Secretary) to be held in trust for the purposes of the project; any unneeded and unspent balance after the project is completed is to be returned to the sponsor by the Secretary; the sponsor will make available any additional monies that may be found necessary, upon request of the Secretary, to complete the project as described above; the Secretary shall have the right to suspend or discontinue the project at any time additional monies are found to be necessary by the Secretary, and the sponsor does not provide the same; in the event the sponsor unilaterally terminates the project, all reasonable federal and state expenditures related to the project shall be paid by the sponsor; and

WHEREAS, the sponsor is required by Wis. Stat. §114.32(5) (1971) to designate the Secretary as its agent to accept, receive, receipt for and disburse any funds granted by the United States under the Federal Airport and Airway Improvement Act, and is authorized by law to designate the Secretary as its agent for other purposes.

"DESIGNATION OF SECRETARY OF TRANSPORTATION AS SPONSOR'S AGENT"

FURTHER, the sponsor requests that the Secretary provide, per Wis. Stat. §114.33(8)(a) (1971), that the sponsor may acquire the required land or interests in land that the Secretary shall find necessary to complete the aforesaid project.

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AWARDING THE SALE OF \$9.855,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION PROMISSORY NOTES. SERIES 2019A

WHEREAS, on September 17, 2019 by a 3/4 vote, the County Board of Supervisors of Eau Claire County, Wisconsin (the "County") adopted an initial resolution authorizing the issuance of general obligation promissory notes (the "Notes") in an amount not to exceed \$10,000,000 for the purpose of paying the cost of highway improvements and other 2019 capital projects (the "Project") (the above-referenced initial resolution is referred to herein as the "Initial Resolution");

WHEREAS, the County is authorized by the provisions of Section 67.12(12), Wisconsin Statutes, to borrow money and issue general obligation promissory notes for such public purposes;

WHEREAS, none of the proceeds of the Notes shall be used to fund the operating expenses of the general fund of the County or to fund the operating expenses of any special revenue fund of the County that is supported by the property taxes;

WHEREAS, the County has directed Ehlers & Associates, Inc. ("Ehlers") to take the steps necessary to sell the Notes to pay the cost of the Project;

WHEREAS, Ehlers, in consultation with the officials of the County, prepared a Notice of Sale (a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by this reference) setting forth the details of and the bid requirements for the Notes and indicating that the Notes would be offered for public sale on October 15, 2019;

WHEREAS, the County Clerk (in consultation with Ehlers) caused a form of notice of the sale to be published and/or announced and caused the Notice of Sale to be distributed to potential bidders offering the Notes for public sale on October 15, 2019;

WHEREAS, the County has duly received bids for the Notes as described on the Bid Tabulation attached hereto as Exhibit B and incorporated herein by this reference (the "Bid Tabulation"); and

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the bid proposal (the "Proposal") submitted by the financial institution listed first on the Bid Tabulation fully complies with the bid requirements set forth in the Notice of Sale and is deemed to be the most advantageous to the County. Ehlers has recommended that the County accept the Proposal. A copy of said Proposal submitted by such institution (the "Purchaser") is attached hereto as Exhibit C and incorporated herein by this reference.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Board of Supervisors of the County that:

Section 1. Ratification of the Notice of Sale and Offering Materials. The County Board of Supervisors hereby ratifies and approves the details of the Notes set forth in Exhibit A attached hereto as and for the details of the Notes. The Notice of Sale and any other offering materials prepared and circulated by Ehlers are hereby ratified and approved in all respects. All actions taken by officers of the County and Ehlers in connection with the preparation and distribution of the Notice of Sale, and any other offering materials are hereby ratified and approved in all respects.

Section A. Authorization and Award of the Notes. For the purpose of paying the cost of the Project, there shall be borrowed pursuant to Section 67.12(12), Wisconsin Statutes, the principal sum of NINE MILLION EIGHT HUNDRED FIFTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$9,855,000) from the Purchaser in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Proposal. The Proposal of the Purchaser offering to purchase the Notes for the sum set forth on the Proposal, plus accrued interest to the date of delivery, resulting in a true interest cost as set forth on the Proposal, is hereby accepted. The Chairperson and County Clerk or other appropriate officers of the County are authorized and directed to execute an acceptance of the Proposal on behalf of the County. The good faith deposit of the Purchaser shall be applied in accordance with the Notice of Sale, and any good faith deposits submitted by unsuccessful bidders shall be promptly returned. The Notes shall bear interest at the rates set forth on the Proposal.

Section 2. Terms of the Notes. The Notes shall be designated "General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 2019A"; shall be issued in the aggregate principal amount of \$9,855,000; shall be dated October 30, 2019; shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof; shall be numbered R-1 and upward; and shall bear interest at the rates per annum and mature on September 1 of each year, in the years and principal amounts as set forth on the Pricing Summary attached hereto as Exhibit D-1 and incorporated herein by this reference. Interest shall be payable semi-annually on March 1 and September 1 of each year commencing on September 1, 2020. Interest shall be computed upon the basis of a 360-day year of twelve 30-day months and will be rounded pursuant to the rules of the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board. The schedule of principal and interest payments due on the Notes is set forth on the Debt Service Schedule attached hereto as Exhibit D-2 and incorporated herein by this reference (the "Schedule").

Section 3. Redemption Provisions. The Notes maturing on September 1, 2026 and thereafter are subject to redemption prior to maturity, at the option of the County, on September 1, 2025 or on any date thereafter. Said Notes are redeemable as a whole or in part, and if in part, from maturities selected by the County, and within each maturity by lot, at the principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest to the date of redemption.

<u>Section 4. Form of the Notes</u>. The Notes shall be issued in registered form and shall be executed and delivered in substantially the form attached hereto as <u>Exhibit E</u> and incorporated herein by this reference.

Section 5. Tax Provisions.

(A) Direct Annual Irrepealable Tax Levy. For the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the Notes as the same becomes due, the full faith, credit and resources of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged, and there is hereby levied upon all of the taxable property of the County a direct annual irrepealable tax in the years 2019 through 2028 for the payments due in the years 2020 through 2029 in the amounts set forth on the Schedule.

(B) Tax Collection. So long as any part of the principal of or interest on the Notes remains unpaid, the County shall be and continue without power to repeal such levy or obstruct the collection of said tax until all such payments have been made or provided for. After the issuance of the Notes, said tax shall be, from year to year, carried onto the tax roll of the County and collected in addition to all other taxes and in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes of the County for said years are collected, except that the amount of tax carried onto the tax roll may be reduced in any year by the amount of any surplus money in the Debt Service Fund Account created below.

(C) Additional Funds. If at any time there shall be on hand insufficient funds from the aforesaid tax levy to meet principal and/or interest payments on said Notes when due, the requisite amounts shall be paid from other funds of the County then available, which sums shall be replaced upon the collection of the taxes herein levied.

Section 6. Segregated Debt Service Fund Account.

(A) Creation and Deposits. There be and there hereby is established in the treasury of the County, if one has not already been created, a debt service fund, separate and distinct from every other fund, which shall be maintained in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Debt service or sinking funds established for obligations previously issued by the County may be considered as separate and distinct accounts within the debt service fund.

Within the debt service fund, there hereby is established a separate and distinct account designated as the "Debt Service Fund Account for General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 2019A, dated October 30, 2019" (the "Debt Service Fund Account") and such account shall be maintained until the indebtedness evidenced by the Notes is fully paid or otherwise extinguished. There shall be deposited into the Debt Service Fund Account (i) all accrued interest received by the County at the time of delivery of and payment for the Notes; (ii) any premium which may be received by the County above the par value of the Notes and accrued interest thereon; (iii) all money raised by the taxes herein levied and any amounts appropriated for the specific purpose of meeting principal of and interest on the Notes when due; (iv) such other sums as may be necessary at any time to pay principal of and interest on the Notes when due; (v) surplus monies in the Borrowed Money Fund as specified below; and (vi) such further deposits as

may be required by Section 67.11, Wisconsin Statutes.

(B) Use and Investment. No money shall be withdrawn from the Debt Service Fund Account and appropriated for any purpose other than the payment of principal of and interest on the Notes until all such principal and interest has been paid in full and the Notes canceled; provided (i) the funds to provide for each payment of principal of and interest on the Notes prior to the scheduled receipt of taxes from the next succeeding tax collection may be invested in direct obligations of the United States of America maturing in time to make such payments when they are due or in other investments permitted by law; and (ii) any funds over and above the amount of such principal and interest payments on the Notes may be used to reduce the next succeeding tax levy, or may, at the option of the County, be invested by purchasing the Notes as permitted by and subject to Section 67.11(2)(a), Wisconsin Statutes, or in permitted municipal investments under the pertinent provisions of the Wisconsin Statutes ("Permitted Investments"), which investments shall continue to be a part of the Debt Service Fund Account. Any investment of the Debt Service Fund Account shall at all times conform with the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code") and any applicable Treasury Regulations (the "Regulations").

(C) Remaining Monies. When all of the Notes have been paid in full and canceled, and all Permitted Investments disposed of, any money remaining in the Debt Service Fund Account shall be transferred and deposited in the general fund of the County, unless the County Board of Supervisors directs otherwise.

Section 7. Proceeds of the Notes; Segregated Borrowed Money Fund. The proceeds of the Notes (the "Note Proceeds") (other than any premium and accrued interest which must be paid at the time of the delivery of the Notes into the Debt Service Fund Account created above) shall be deposited into a special fund (the "Borrowed Money Fund") separate and distinct from all other funds of the County and disbursed solely for the purpose or purposes for which borrowed. In no event shall monies in the Borrowed Money Fund be used to fund operating expenses of the general fund of the County or of any special revenue fund of the County that is supported by property taxes. Monies in the Borrowed Money Fund may be temporarily invested in Permitted Investments. Any monies, including any income from Permitted Investments, remaining in the Borrowed Money Fund after the purpose or purposes for which the Notes have been issued have been accomplished, and, at any time, any monies as are not needed and which obviously thereafter cannot be needed for such purpose(s) shall be deposited in the Debt Service Fund Account.

Section 8. No Arbitrage. All investments made pursuant to this Resolution shall be Permitted Investments, but no such investment shall be made in such a manner as would cause the Notes to be "arbitrage bonds" within the meaning of Section 148 of the Code or the Regulations and an officer of the County, charged with the responsibility for issuing the Notes, shall certify as to facts, estimates, circumstances and reasonable expectations in existence on the date of delivery of the Notes to the Purchaser which will permit the conclusion that the Notes are not "arbitrage bonds," within the meaning of the Code or Regulations.

Section 9. Compliance with Federal Tax Laws. (a) The County represents and covenants that the projects financed by the Notes and the ownership, management and use of the projects will not cause the Notes to be "private activity bonds" within the meaning of Section 141 of the Code. The County further covenants that it shall comply with the provisions of the Code to the extent necessary to maintain the tax-exempt status of the interest on the Notes including, if applicable, the rebate requirements of Section 148(f) of the Code. The County further covenants that it will not take any action, omit to take any action or permit the taking or omission of any action within its control (including, without limitation, making or permitting any use of the proceeds of the Notes) if taking, permitting or omitting to take such action would cause any of the Notes to be an arbitrage bond or a private activity bond within the meaning of the Code or would otherwise cause interest on the Notes to be included in the gross income of the recipients thereof for federal income tax purposes. The County Clerk or other officer of the County charged with the responsibility of issuing the Notes shall provide an appropriate certificate of the County certifying that the County can and covenanting that it will comply with the provisions of the Code and Regulations.

(b) The County also covenants to use its best efforts to meet the requirements and restrictions of any different or additional federal legislation which may be made applicable to the Notes provided that in meeting such requirements the County will do so only to the extent consistent with the proceedings authorizing the Notes and the laws of the State of Wisconsin and to the extent that there is a reasonable period of time in which to comply.

Section 10. Designation as Qualified Tax-Exempt Obligations. The Notes are hereby designated as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" for purposes of Section 265 of the Code, relating to the ability of financial institutions to deduct from income for federal income tax purposes, interest expense that is allocable to carrying and acquiring tax-exempt obligations.

Section 11. Execution of the Notes; Closing; Professional Services. The Notes shall be issued in printed form, executed on behalf of the County by the manual or facsimile signatures of the Chairperson and County Clerk, authenticated, if required, by the Fiscal Agent (defined below), sealed with its official or corporate seal, if any, or a facsimile thereof, and delivered to the Purchaser upon payment to the County of the purchase price thereof, plus accrued interest to the date of delivery (the "Closing"). The facsimile signature of either of the officers executing the Notes may be imprinted on the Notes in lieu of the manual signature of the officer but, unless the County has contracted with a fiscal agent to authenticate the Notes, at least one of the signatures appearing on each Note shall be a manual signature. In the event that either of the officers whose signatures appear on the Notes shall cease to be such officers before the Closing, such signatures shall, nevertheless, be valid and sufficient for all purposes to the same extent as if they had remained in office until the Closing. The aforesaid officers are hereby authorized and directed to do all acts and execute and deliver the Notes and all such documents, certificates and acknowledgements as may be necessary and convenient to effectuate the Closing. The County hereby authorizes the officers and agents of the County to enter into, on its behalf, agreements and contracts in conjunction with the Notes, including but not limited to agreements and contracts for legal, trust, fiscal agency, disclosure and continuing disclosure, and rebate calculation services. Any such contract heretofore entered into in conjunction with the issuance of the Notes is hereby ratified and approved in all respects.

<u>Section 12. Payment of the Notes; Fiscal Agent.</u> The principal of and interest on the Notes shall be paid by the County Clerk or County Treasurer (the "Fiscal Agent").

Section 13. Persons Treated as Owners; Transfer of Notes. The County shall cause books for the registration and for the transfer of the Notes to be kept by the Fiscal Agent. The person in whose name any Note shall be registered shall be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes and payment of either principal or interest on any Note shall be made only to the registered owner thereof. All such payments shall be valid and effectual to satisfy and discharge the liability upon such Note to the extent of the sum or sums so paid.

Any Note may be transferred by the registered owner thereof by surrender of the Note at the office of the Fiscal Agent, duly endorsed for the transfer or accompanied by an assignment duly executed by the registered owner or his attorney duly authorized in writing. Upon such transfer, the Chairperson and County Clerk shall execute and deliver in the name of the transferee or transferees a new Note or Notes of a like aggregate principal amount, series and maturity and the Fiscal Agent shall record the name of each transferee in the registration book. No registration shall be made to bearer. The Fiscal Agent shall cancel any Note surrendered for transfer.

The County shall cooperate in any such transfer, and the Chairperson and County Clerk are authorized to execute any new Note or Notes necessary to effect any such transfer.

Section 14. Record Date. The 15th day of the calendar month next preceding each interest payment date shall be the record date for the Notes (the "Record Date"). Payment of interest on the Notes on any interest payment date shall be made to the registered owners of the Notes as they appear on the registration book of the County at the close of business on the Record Date.

Section 15. Utilization of The Depository Trust Company Book-Entry-Only System. In order to make the Notes eligible for the services provided by The Depository Trust Company, New York, New York ("DTC"), the County agrees to the applicable provisions set forth in the Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations, which the County Clerk or other authorized representative of the County is authorized and directed to execute and deliver to DTC on behalf of the County to the extent an effective Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations is not presently on file in the County Clerk's office.

<u>Section 16. Payment of Issuance Expenses</u>. The County authorizes the Purchaser to forward the amount of the proceeds of the Notes allocable to the payment of issuance expenses to Old National Bank at Closing for further distribution as directed by Ehlers.

Section 17. Official Statement. The County Board of Supervisors hereby approves the Preliminary Official Statement with respect to the Notes and deems the Preliminary Official Statement as "final" as of its date for purposes of SEC Rule 15c2-12 promulgated by the Securities and Exchange Commission pursuant to the Securities and Exchange Act of 1934 (the "Rule"). All actions taken by officers of the County in connection with the preparation of such Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda to it or final Official Statement are hereby ratified and approved. In connection with the Closing, the appropriate County official shall certify the Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda or final Official Statement. The County Clerk shall cause copies of the Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda or final Official Statement to be distributed to the Purchaser.

Section 18. Undertaking to Provide Continuing Disclosure. The County hereby covenants and agrees, for the benefit of the owners of the Notes, to enter into a written undertaking (the "Undertaking") if required by the Rule to provide continuing disclosure of certain financial information and operating data and timely notices of the occurrence of certain events in accordance with the Rule. The Undertaking shall be enforceable by the owners of the Notes or by the Purchaser on behalf of such owners (provided that the rights of the owners and the Purchaser to enforce the Undertaking shall be limited to a right to obtain specific performance of the obligations thereunder and any failure by the County to comply with the provisions of the Undertaking shall not be an event of default with respect to the Notes).

To the extent required under the Rule, the Chairperson and County Clerk, or other officer of the County charged with the responsibility for issuing the Notes, shall provide a Continuing Disclosure Certificate for inclusion in the transcript of proceedings, setting forth the details and terms of the County's Undertaking.

<u>Section 19. Record Book.</u> The County Clerk shall provide and keep the transcript of proceedings as a separate record book (the "Record Book") and shall record a full and correct statement of every step or proceeding had or taken in the course of authorizing and issuing the Notes in the Record Book.

Section 20. Bond Insurance. If the Purchaser determines to obtain municipal bond insurance with respect to the Notes, the officers of the County are authorized to take all actions necessary to obtain such municipal bond insurance. The Chairperson and County Clerk are authorized to agree to such additional provisions as the bond insurer may reasonably request and which are acceptable to the Chairperson and County Clerk including provisions regarding restrictions on investment of Note proceeds, the payment procedure under the municipal bond insurance policy, the rights of the bond insurer in the event of default and payment of the Notes by the bond insurer and notices to be given to the bond insurer. In addition, any reference required by the bond insurer to the municipal bond insurance policy shall be made in the form of Note provided herein.

Section 21. Conflicting Resolutions; Severability; Effective Date. All prior resolutions, rules or other actions of the County Board of Supervisors or any parts thereof in conflict with the provisions hereof shall be, and the same are, hereby rescinded insofar as the same may so conflict. In the event that any one or more provisions hereof shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any other provisions hereof. The foregoing shall take effect immediately upon adoption and approval in the manner provided by law.

REQUESTING THE WISCONSIN LEGISLATURE REVISE CHAPTER 814 TO MAKE FILING FEES CONSISTENT BETWEEN THE CLERK OF COURT AND REGISTER IN PROBATE

WHEREAS, Wisconsin Statutes Chapter 814 relates to court costs, fees and surcharges. Wisconsin Statutes section 814.66 applies to the fees charged by the Register in Probate. The Probate Court and Juvenile Court are responsible for case types that are not listed in Section 814.66 or other statutes, with the result being that there are cases filed with Register in Probate for which there is no filing fee; and,

WHEREAS, under the statutes there are fees and costs that are collected by the Register in Probate that are different from the fees collected by the Clerk of Court for the same type of service. This often causes confusion to the public; and,

WHEREAS, the office of the Register in Probate and the Clerk of Court serve similar functions for the court, both offices are staffed with county employees, both offices utilize CCAP-provided computers and printers as well as county-provided copiers. There is no discernable difference in these two offices when it comes to copying and providing certificates; and,

WHEREAS, it would benefit the public and the county for the State Legislature to revise the statutes so that fees charged for similar services in the Clerk of Court and the Register in Probate are consistent in both offices; and,

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Register in Probate Association has commenced efforts to encourage the State Legislature to amend and revise the statutes to create consistency with the fees charged by the Clerk of Court and the Register in Probate.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED; the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors supports the efforts of the Wisconsin Register in Probate Association in their efforts to encourage the Wisconsin Legislature Statutes to amend the related statutes to further consistency between the fee structures for these offices.

Said easement is permanent and is binding upon the successors and assigns of the county, and can be terminated only by SBA providing notice to the county or its failure to use the tower for a period of ten (10) years or longer; and,

WHEREAS, attached to and incorporated into this resolution is the proposed easement and legal description of the easement.

IN SUPPORT OF 2019-2020 SENATE BILL 576, CREATION OF THE CHIPPEWA VALLEY REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY

WHEREAS, 2019-2020 Senate Bill 576 is currently pending before the Wisconsin Legislature. This bill proposes the creation of a Regional Transit Authority known as the Chippewa Valley Regional Transit Authority (CVRTA) for the purpose of establishing, maintaining and operating a comprehensive local transportation system, primarily for the transportation of persons, and includes the use of railroads, motor vehicles, motor buses and any combination thereof; and,

WHEREAS, the CVRTA would be public body corporate and a separate governmental entity. If SB 576 is adopted by the state and becomes law, the CVRTA would be created if the governing body of Eau Claire County adopts a resolution authorizing the county to become a member of the CVRTA and the resolution is then ratified by the electors at a referendum held in Eau Claire County; and,

WHEREAS, if the CVRTA is created, any municipality located in whole or in part within Eau Claire County shall be a member of the authority; and,

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 576 allows Chippewa County to join the CVRTA, after the creation of the authority, if the governing body of Chippewa County adopts resolution to join the authority and the resolution is then ratified by the electors at a referendum held in Chippewa County; and

WHEREAS, the governing body of the CVRTA would be a board of directors appointed according to the statutes and would be a combination of directors appointed by the county board, municipalities and an appointment by the governor.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED; the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors supports the adoption of Senate Bill 576 by the Wisconsin Legislature and Governor Evers for the purpose of creating the Chippewa Valley Regional Transportation Authority; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, a copy of the resolution shall be forwarded by the county clerk to members of the Wisconsin Legislature, Governor Tony Evers, and Chippewa County.

WHEREAS, the proposed windfarm is a "large electrical generating facility" and as a result and according to Wisconsin Statutes and the administrative regulations, permits for the windfarm will be determined by the Public Service Commission (PSC) and not by the town(s) or county and without local review or control; and,

WHEREAS, a windfarm will have a potential impact on the landowners who agree to have a wind turbine placed on their property and for their neighbors. The siting of a windfarm can and has been shown to create changes in property values and create issues for residents living near the wind turbines such as noise, shadow flicker and electrical interference; and,

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County supports the ability of local residents and municipalities being able to participate and provide input concerning the permitting, siting and development of potential windfarms, that exceed 100 megawatts in size.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED; Eau Claire County supports the efforts and ability of the local residents and municipalities to participate and provide input into the siting, permitting and development of windfarms that are classified as a large electrical generating facility, and urges the state to make the necessary changes in the laws and regulations to allow the maximum amount of input by local residents and municipalities who are impacted by siting and development of large windfarms; and,

SUPPORTING THE COMMITMENT TO VETERANS SUPPORT AND OUTREACH (CVSO) ACT.

WHEREAS, the number of veteran suicides has continued to rise nationwide. Approximately 14 of the 20 veterans who die by suicide are not under Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) care. This is a public health crisis that requires a national approach where the veterans are located; and,

WHEREAS, County Veterans Service Officers (CVSOs) are often the first point of contact in the community for veteran's services and they provide assistance on a wide range of benefits, including service-connected benefits, enrollment in VA health care, VA home loans, education benefits and available job placement assistance; and,

WHEREAS, veterans are not always aware of available benefits, and CVSOs are often the first to inform veterans of their eligibility. CVSOs are county employees who are nationally accredited by the VA to prepare, present and prosecute VA claims. Currently there is no federal funding available for CVSOs; and,

WHEREAS, there is currently pending in Congress legislation known as the "Commitment to Veteran Support and Outreach Act" (CVSO Act) that authorizes the Secretary of Veterans Affairs to enter into contracts with States or to award grants to States to promote health and wellness, prevent suicide, and improve outreach to veterans. The CVSO Act will authorize \$50 Million annually for five years to expand and support CVSOs or similar local entities who currently assist veterans in obtaining over \$50 Billion in benefits annually.

THERFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors does hereby support pending legislation in the United States Congress known as the "Commitment to Veteran Support and Outreach Act (CVSO Act) that authorizes the Secretary of Veterans Affairs to enter into contracts with States or to award grants to States to promote health and wellness, prevent suicide, and improve outreach to veterans; and

WHEREAS, Smith-Lever capacity funding has not increased for the past several years, severely limiting the ability of the Extension system to meet counties' most pressing problems.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors requests and supports at least a 20% increase in federal Smith-Lever and 1890 Extension capacity funding in the USDA's National Institute for Food and Agriculture in the FY21 budget.

WHEREAS, most refugees living in the State of Wisconsin do not have the language skills, or the cultural background knowledge required to deal with issues of deportation; and,

WHEREAS, many refugee groups have long established roots in the State of Wisconsin; and,

WHEREAS, refugees living in the State of Wisconsin make important economic contributions by both performing hard physical labor and by paying taxes; and,

WHEREAS, refugees living in the State of Wisconsin enrich our society by contributing to the rich multicultural heritage of our state; and, WHEREAS, refugees living in the State of Wisconsin have friends, families, lives and livelihoods worthy of a protected status.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, The Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors is requesting the Wisconsin Legislature to take action to protect refugees living and working in the State of Wisconsin; and,

AFFIRMING THE COUNTY BOARD'S COMMITMENT TO BUILD AND COMPLETE THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE 6^{TH} COURTROOM BY MAY 31, 2022.

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County is one of several counties that has been in consideration by the Wisconsin Legislature and Supreme Court for the creation of an additional branch of the circuit court. The Eau Claire County Board County Board has already budgeted the necessary funds and designated space, the old county board room on the second floor of the courthouse, to be converted into a Branch 6 courtroom; and,

WHEREAS, the construction of the 6th courtroom was previously placed on hold by the County Board pending the decision of the legislature to fund additional judges, and the Supreme Court naming Eau Claire County as one of the counties to receive and additional judge; and,

WHEREAS, on March 9, 2020, and consistent with 2019 Act 184, the Supreme Court of Wisconsin through the Director of State Courts, announced the names of 12 counties that are in line to receive an additional circuit court branch, spread out over 3 years. It was announced that Four counties will receive a new judge in the year 2021, four counties will be named after November 2020 for the year 2022, and four counties will be named after November 2021 for the year 2023: and,

WHEREAS, Eau Claire was one of the four counties that were named as being considered for a new circuit court branch effective August 1, 2022. In doing so the Director of State Courts stated: "The four counties named have demonstrated judicial need, county board resolutions of support and a commitment to have facilities ready before the statutory deadline of May 31, 2022. Counties unable to meet these requirements in a timely manner will be removed from consideration;" and,

WHEREAS, in order for Eau Claire County to remain in the second group of four counties to receive an additional circuit court branch in 2022 it will need to show a commitment to and the completion of the courtroom and the facilities for a 6th courtroom prior to May 31, 2022.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, The Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors approves the expenditure of the necessary funds, including those that were previously segregated and placed on hold for the planning and construction of a new courtroom and the facilities needed for a Circuit Court Branch 6, to be located on the second floor of the Courthouse in the space previously designated as the county board room; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors authorizes moving forward with the development of architectural plans and the construction of the 6th courtroom and facilities with all factors in the timing of the construction being considered such that the courtroom and facilities will be fully completed and ready prior to the May 31, 2022 deadline imposed by the Director of State Courts so as to allow the County to remain on the list for consideration for an additional judge in the year 2022; and,

RATIFYING THE DECLARATION OF EMERGENCY IN RESPONSE TO THE COVID-19 CORONAVIRUS

WHEREAS, in December 2019, a novel strain of coronavirus known as COVID-19 was detected, and COVID-19 has continued to spread throughout the world, including to the United States and the State of Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, the federal government, state governments, and local governments are working together to contain the further spread of the disease and treat existing cases; and

WHEREAS, on January 31, 2020, the United States Department of Health and Human Services declared a Public Health Emergency, on March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 a pandemic, and on March 12, 2020 the Governor of the State of Wisconsin declared a Health Emergency in the State; and

WHEREAS, on March 17, 2020 Eau Claire County Board Chair, Nick Smiar declared a state of emergency for Eau Claire County with regards to the need to plan for and respond to the potential of an imminent health crisis related to Covid-19 virus; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County has been working to protect the health and well-being of its residents from the spread of COVID-19, and to prepare for the impacts the disease is likely to have on the County; and

WHEREAS, the Eau Claire County Board has determined that it is necessary to make all possible resources and means available to the County in order to protect the health, safety, and welfare of its residents from the threat posed by the continued spread of COVID-19.

WHEREAS, under Wisconsin Statute §252.03, the Eau Claire City-County Health Department is the lead agency for controlling and responding to communicable disease threats and has opened Incident Command to plan for and respond to meet the needs of our residents.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 323.11, and Chapter 2.36 of the Eau Claire County Code of General Ordinances, the Eau Claire County Board ratifies the declaration of emergency issued by Nick Smiar, County Board Chairman that finds and declares that a state of emergency exists within the County by reason of an imminent threat of disaster impairing medical care, health, and other critical systems of the County due to the spread of COVID-19; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that during the period of emergency prescribed by this Resolution, the Board may order, by ordinance or resolution, whatever is necessary and expedient for the health, safety, protection, and welfare of persons and property within the County; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Board Chairman, Nick Smiar and County Administrator Kathryn Schauf are hereby authorized and directed by the Eau Claire County Board to coordinate and administer the County's emergency management response and to carry out the orders of the Board related thereto; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Head of Emergency Management of the County is authorized and directed to carry out his duties under the County's Emergency Management Plan under the supervision and direction of the County Administrator and perform such other duties as may be directed by further resolution of the Board; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that during the period of emergency the County Board Chair will have the power to cancel meetings if needed and to determine the availability of and to authorize County Board Supervisors to attend meetings of the Board remotely in a manner that is consistent with applicable laws and that are reasonably accessible to members of the public: and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, based upon the information available to the Board and the ongoing threat posed by the spread of COVID-19, the period of emergency shall continue for sixty (60) days from the effective date of this Resolution unless sooner terminated or extended by further resolution of the Board.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all actions heretofore taken by the Board and other appropriate public officers and agents of the County with respect to the matters contemplated under this Resolution are hereby ratified, confirmed and approved.

DESIGNATING EMPLOYEES OF EAU CLAIRE COUNTY AS "ESSENTIAL" AND "EMERGENCY RESPONDERS" IN RESPONSE TO THE FEDERAL FAMILIES FIRST CORONAVIRUS RESPONSE ACT AND GOVERNOR EVERS' SAFER AT HOME ORDER

WHEREAS, the governments of the United States, the State of Wisconsin and Eau Claire County have all declared that a state of emergency exists with regards to the worldwide novel coronavirus COVID-19 pandemic; and.

WHEREAS, In response to the pandemic, the United States Congress and the President have adopted the Families First Coronavirus Response Act ("FFCRA"), that among other things creates up to 80 hours of sick time for full time employees, and creates expanded benefits under the Family Medical Leave Act (EFMLA) for employees affected by COVID-19. The FFCRA became effective April 1, 2020 and expires on December 31, 2020; and,

WHEREAS, the FFCRA creates an exemption for the benefits for "emergency responders." The FFCRA provides a list of emergency responders within the act but also defines "emergency responder" as "any individual that the highest official of a state or territory determines is an emergency responder for that state's . . . response to COVID-19. The category of employees who could be included in the category of emergency responder are those who: (1) interact with and aid individuals with physical or mental health issues, including those who are suffering from COVID-19; (2) ensure the welfare and safety of our communities and of our Nation; (3) have specialized training relevant to emergency response; and (4) provide essential services relevant to the American people's health and wellbeing; and,

WHEREAS, Governor Tony Evers issued Emergency Order #12, also known as the "Safer at Home Order". The Safer at Home Order provides a list of functions that are Essential Functions and are exempt from the order to stay at home. In the Safer at Home Order Governor Evers defined all governmental functions as essential that are "needed to ensure the continuing operation of the governmental body and provide and support the health, safety and welfare of the public. Each governmental body shall determine its Essential Governmental Function, if

any, and identify employees and contractors necessary to the performance of those functions;" and,

WHEREAS, other than those employment categories already defined in the FFCRA and the Safer at Home Order, it is up to the local governmental body to determine what positions are essential to provide and support the health safety and welfare of the public under the Safer at Home Order and as "emergency responders" for purposes of the FFCRA.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED; The Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors hereby determines that all employees of Eau Claire County are determined to be an "Essential" Employees for the governmental functions of Eau Claire County as designated by the Safer at Home Order and as an "Emergency Responder" for that portion of the FFCRA related to expanded FMLA benefits.

WHEREAS, currently under the state constitution, the legislature is directed to redistrict legislative districts according to the number of residents at its next session following the decennial federal census by the majority party; and at the same intervals, the legislature also reapportions congressional districts pursuant to federal law; and

WHEREAS, legislative and congressional redistricting plans enacted pursuant to this procedure are used to elect members of the legislature and members of Congress starting in the fall of the second year following the year of the census; and

WHEREAS, historically legislative and congressional plans in Wisconsin have been subject to partisan influence that puts the goals of politicians ahead of the electoral prerogative of the people; and

WHEREAS, the 2011 redistricting process to draw the maps, and subsequent litigation contesting those maps, cost the taxpayers of the State of Wisconsin nearly \$1.9 million; and

WHEREAS, a panel of federal district court judges has ruled that the redistricting that was done in Wisconsin in 2011 was unconstitutional; and

 $WHEREAS, redistricting\ to\ achieve\ partisan\ gains\ is\ improper,\ whether\ it\ is\ done\ by\ Republicans\ or\ Democrats.$

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors insists upon the creation of a nonpartisan procedure for the preparation of legislative and congressional redistricting plans.

BEITFURTHER RESOLVED that a nonpartisan procedure process promotes accountability, transparency and prohibits the consideration of voting patterns, party information and incumbent's residence information or demographic information in drawing the district maps, except as necessary to ensure minority participation as required by the U.S. Constitution.

Any expansion or enlargement must be in conformity and have approval of the Federal Aviation Administration and Wisconsin Department of Transportation, Bureau of Aeronautics.

AGRICULTURAL PERFORMANCE STANDARDS AND MANURE STORAGE

17.04.001 Authority and name. This ordinance is adopted under authority granted by Wis. Stat. §§ 59.70, 59.02, 59.03, 92.15, and 92.16, and Wisconsin Administrative Code ("Wis. Admin. Code") Wis. Admin. Code ch. ATCP 50.56 and NR 151.05. This ordinance shall be known as, referred to, and may be cited as the "Eau Claire County Agricultural Performance Standards and Manure Storage Ordinance" and is hereinafter referred to as the "ordinance".

<u>17.04.005</u> Findings and declaration of policy. The Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors finds that the following conditions may threaten the county's natural and water resources, cause harm to the health, safety and welfare of people within the county, and adversely impact the property tax base of the county:

- A. New and substantially altered manure storage facilities that fail to meet performance and technical standards for proper design, construction and operation.
- B. Existing manure storage facilities that are not properly functioning and pose unreasonable risks related to structural failure and leakage.
- C. Existing manure storage facilities that overtop or are operated in a manner that creates an unreasonable risk of discharge to waters of state.
- D. Existing manure storage facilities where no manure has been added or removed for a period of 24 months and are not slated for future use.
- E. Management and storage of manure including land application that fails to meet performance and technical standards for proper handling and land application of manure.

17.04.010 Purpose. The purpose of this ordinance is to regulate the location, design, construction, installation, alteration, operation, maintenance, closure, and use of manure storage facilities; ensure the proper application of waste and manure from all storage facilities covered by this Ordinance, and prescribe performance standards and prohibitions related to manure and other agricultural management and use of manure storage facilities in order to prevent water pollution and thereby protect the health of Eau Claire County residents and visitors; prevent the spread of disease; and promote the prosperity and general welfare of the citizens of Eau Claire County. It is also intended to provide for the administration and enforcement of the ordinance and to provide penalties for its violation.

<u>17.04.020 Interpretation</u>. In their interpretation and application, the provisions of this ordinance shall be held to be minimum requirements and shall not be deemed a limitation or repeal of any other power granted by the Wisconsin Statutes.

<u>17.04.030 Severability clause</u>. If any section, provision, or portion of this ordinance is ruled invalid by a court, the remainder of the ordinance shall not for that reason be rendered ineffective.

17.04.040 Applicability. This ordinance applies to all land located within the unincorporated areas of Eau Claire County, unless an intergovernmental agreement is established with the governmental entity of an incorporated municipality within Eau Claire County. Best management practices, conservation practices and manure storage facilities shall comply with all federal, state, and local laws, rules and regulations.

SUBCHAPTER II. ACTIVITIES SUBJECT TO REGULATION

<u>17.04.050</u> Permit requirements.

<u>17.04.060</u> Performance standards and prohibitions.

17.04.050 Permit requirements. Any person who constructs, substantially alters, changes use of or closes a manure storage facility and related transfer systems, or who employs another person to do the same, shall be subject to the provisions of this Ordinance. A person is in compliance with this ordinance if he or she follows the procedures of this ordinance, receives a permit from the land conservation division before beginning activities subject to permit requirements under this ordinance, and complies with the requirements of the permit.

17.04.060 Performance standards and prohibitions. Any person who stores manure, owns or operates cropland or livestock facilities in Eau Claire County is subject to the performance standards and prohibitions in Subchapter III, regardless of whether they received a permit under this Ordinance. This Ordinance incorporates by reference the definitions in Wis. Admin. Code ch. ATCP 50 and ch. NR 151, to the extent that they are not explicitly referenced herein.

SUBCHAPTER III. AGRICULTURAL PERFORMANCE STANDARDS AND PROHIBITIONS

17.04.080	Performance standards and prohibitions.
17.04.090	Standards.
17.04.100	Cost shared required

17.04.080 Performance standards and prohibitions.

- A. Sheet, Rill, And Wind Erosion. All land where crops and feed are grown, including pastures, shall be managed to achieve a soil erosion rate equal or less than the "tolerable" (T) rate established for that soil by the USDA-NRCS.
 - B. Tillage Setback.
- 1. No crop producer may conduct a tillage operation that negatively impacts stream bank integrity or deposits soil directly in surface waters.
- 2. No tillage operations may be conducted within 5 feet of the top of the channel of surface waters. Tillage setbacks greater than 5 feet but no more than 20 feet may be required to meet this standard.
- 3. Crop producers shall maintain the area within the tillage setback required under sub. (b) in adequate sod or self-sustaining vegetative cover that provides a minimum of 70% coverage.
 - 4. This section does not apply to grass waterways installed as conservation practices.
- C. Phosphorus Index. All cropland, pastures, and winter grazing areas must meet the Wisconsin Phosphorus Index (PI) established in Wis. Admin. Code § NR 151.04 including where the PI applies, the methods for calculating the PI, and acceptable PI runoff levels. A nutrient management plan meeting the standard in Wis. Admin. Code § ATCP 50.04 (3) may be used to demonstrate compliance with Wis. Admin. Code § NR 151.04.
- D. Nutrient Management. All crop and livestock producers that apply manure or other nutrients directly, or through contract, to agricultural fields shall comply with this section.
- 1. This performance standard does not apply to industrial waste and byproducts regulated under Wis. Admin. Code ch. NR 214, municipal sludge regulated under Wis. Admin. Code ch. NR 204, or septage regulated under Wis. Admin. Code ch. NR 113.
- 2. Nutrient management plans are required on pastures unless exempt as established in Wis. Admin. Code §ATCP 50.04(3)(b).

- 3. Manure, commercial fertilizer, and other nutrients shall be applied in conformance with a nutrient management plan as established in Wis. Admin. Code § ATCP 50.04(3).
- a. The nutrient management plan shall be designed to limit or reduce the discharge of nutrients to waters of the state for the purpose of complying with state water quality standards and groundwater standards.
- b. Nutrient management plans for croplands in watersheds that contain impaired surface waters or in watersheds that contain outstanding or exceptional resource waters shall meet the following criteria:
- i. unless otherwise provided in this subsection, the plan shall be designed to manage soil nutrient concentrations so as to maintain or reduce delivery of nutrients contributing to the impairment of impaired surface waters and to outstanding or exceptional resources waters.
- ii. The plan may allow for an increase in soil nutrient concentrations at a site if necessary to meet crop demands
- iii. For lands in watersheds containing exceptional or outstanding resource waters, the plan may allow an increase in soil nutrient concentrations if the plan documents that any potential nutrient delivery to the exceptional or outstanding resource waters will not alter the background water quality of the exceptional or outstanding resource waters. For lands in watersheds containing impaired waters, the plan may allow an increase in soil nutrient concentrations if a low risk of delivery of nutrients from the land to the impaired water can be demonstrated.
- 4. In this ordinance, impaired surface waters are waters identified as impaired pursuant to 33 U.S.C. § 1313(d)(1)(A) and 40 C.F.R. § 130.7. Outstanding and Exceptional Resource Waters are defined in Wis. Admin. Code Ch. NR 102.
- 5. An updated nutrient management plan and checklist shall be submitted to the land conservation division annually to ensure the plan meets requirements of this section.
- E. Clean Water Diversion. All livestock producers within a water quality management area shall comply with this section. Runoff shall be diverted away from contacting feedlot, manure storage areas and barnyard areas within water quality management areas except that a diversion to protect a private well under Wis. Admin. Code § NR 151.015 (18) (a) is required only when the feedlot, manure storage area, or barnyard area is located upslope from the private well.
- F. Manure Management Prohibitions. All livestock producers shall comply with this section as follows:
 - 1. A livestock operation shall have no overflow of manure storage structures.
- 2. A livestock operation shall have no unconfined manure piles within a water quality management area.
- 3. A livestock operation shall have no direct runoff from a feedlot or stored manure to waters of the state. Stored manure not contained within a manure storage facility shall meet the standards for stacking or piling manure.
- 4. A livestock operation may not allow unlimited access by livestock to waters of the state in a location where high concentrations of animals prevent the maintenance of adequate sod or self-sustaining vegetative cover. This prohibition does not apply to properly designed, installed and maintained livestock or farm equipment crossings.
 - G. Process Wastewater Handling. All livestock producers shall comply with this section.
 - 1. There may be no significant discharge of process wastewater to waters of the state.
- 2. The land conservation division shall consider all of the following factors when determining whether a discharge of process wastewater is a significant discharge to waters of the state:
 - a. Volume and frequency of the discharge.
 - b. Location of the source relative to receiving waters.
 - c. Means of process wastewater conveyance to waters of the state.
- d. Slope, vegetation, rainfall, and other factors affecting the likelihood of process wastewater discharge to waters of the state.
- e. Available evidence of discharge to a surface water of the state or to a direct conduit to groundwater.
- f. Whether the process wastewater is discharged to a site that is defined as a site that is susceptible to groundwater contamination.
- g. Other factors relevant to the impact of the discharge on water quality standards of the receiving water or to groundwater standards.

- H. Manure Storage Facilities. All livestock producers building new manure storage facilities, substantially altering manure storage facilities, or choosing to abandon their manure storage facilities shall comply with this section.
 - 1. New construction and alterations.
- a. New or substantially altered manure storage facilities shall be designed, constructed, and maintained to minimize the risk of structural failure of the facility and to minimize leakage of the facility in order to comply with groundwater standards. The levels of materials in the storage facility may not exceed the margin of safety level. Storage facilities that are constructed or significantly altered on or after January 1, 2011, shall be designed and operated to contain the additional volume of runoff and direct precipitation entering the facility as a result of a 25-year, 24-hour storm.
- b. A new manure storage facility means a facility constructed after October 1, 2002.
- c. A substantially altered manure storage facility is a manure storage facility that is substantially altered after October 1, 2002.
 - 2. Closure.
- a. Closure of a manure storage facility shall occur when an operation where the facility is located ceases operations or manure has not been added or removed from that facility for a period of 24 months. Manure facilities shall be closed in a manner that will prevent future contamination of groundwater and surface waters.
- b. The owner or operator may retain the facility for a longer period of time by demonstrating to the land conservation division that all of the following conditions are met:
- i. The facility is designed, constructed and maintained in accordance with 17.04.080 (H)(1)a of this ordinance.
 - i. Retention of the facility is warranted based on anticipated future use.
- 3. Existing Facilities. Manure storage facilities in existence as of October 1, 2002, that pose an imminent threat to public health or fish and aquatic life, or are causing a violation of groundwater standards, shall be upgraded, replaced, or abandoned in accordance with this section. Levels of materials in manure storage facilities may not exceed the margin of safety level.
- I. Human Household Wastewater Prohibited. Human household wastewater shall not be discharged into manure storage facilities.

17.04.090 Standards.

- A Standards for Evaluating Sheet, Rill, and Wind Erosion. The standards for evaluating sheet, rill, and wind erosion shall be the Revised Universal Soil Loss Equation II (RUSLE2) equation or the Wind Erosion Prediction System (WEPS) models published by NRCS. Copies of RUSLE2 and the WEPS models are on file with the land conservation division.
- B. Standards for Design and Construction of Manure Storage Facilities. The standards for design and construction of manure storage facilities shall be the current standards in the NRCS Technical Guide, including but not limited to 313 Waste Storage Facility; 367 Roofs and Covers; 520 Pond Sealing or Lining, Compacted Soil Treatment; 521 Pond Sealing or Lining, Geomembrane or Geosynthetic Clay Liner; 522 Pond Sealing or Lining, Concrete; 558 Roof Runoff Structure; 634 Waste Transfer; and 629 Waste Treatment and any amendments to these standards.
- C. Standards for Nutrient Management. The standards for management of manure and nutrients applied to cropland and pastures shall be the current standards in the NRCS Technical Guide, including 590 Nutrient Management and any amendments.
- D. Standards for Closure of Manure Storage Facility. The standards for closure of an unused manure storage facility shall be the current standards in the NRCS Technical Guide, including 360 Waste Facility Closure and any amendments.
- E. Standards for Stacking or Piling Manure. The standards for stacking or piling manure shall be the current standards in the NRCS Technical Guide, including 318 Short Term Storage of Animal Waste and By-Products and 313 Waste Storage Facility, and any amendments.
- F. Standards for Determination of Significant Discharge and Direct Runoff. The standards for determination of direct runoff shall be the "BARNY runoff prediction model" which is the NRCS "Evaluation System to Rate Feedlot Pollution Potential," ARM-NC-17 (April 1982 version with modifications as of August 2005, or an equivalent predictive model for manure runoff as approved by the land conservation division. An Excel computer spreadsheet version of the BARNY model is available at https://datcp.wi.gov/Documents/BARNYSpreadsheet.xls.

- G. Standards for the Determination of Adequate Sod or Self-Sustaining Vegetative Cover. Standards for determination of adequate sod or self-sustaining vegetative cover shall be the standards outlined in the NRCS Technical Guide 528 Prescribed Grazing, and any amendments, or vegetative measurement by grid sample shall show at least 70 percent living plant material cover.
- H. Subsequent Modification of Standards. The standards of the NRCS Technical Guide are adopted and by reference made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth herein. Any future amendment, revision or modification of the standards incorporated herein are made a part of this chapter upon adoption by the Eau Claire County Land Conservation Commission. Copies of the current standards are available at the land conservation division.

17.04.100 Cost share required. An owner or operator of an agricultural facility or practice that is in existence before October 1, 2002, may not be required to comply with the performance standards, prohibitions, conservation practices or technical standards under this subchapter unless cost- sharing is available from any source, to the owner or operator. A determination that cost-sharing is available to meet the performance standards, prohibitions, conservation practices or technical standards under this subchapter will be determined in accordance with Wis. Admin. Code § NR 151.09(4)(d) or § NR 151.095(5)(d) when funding is provided under Wis. Stat. § 281.65, and will be determined in accordance with Wis. Admin. Code ch. ATCP 50 when funds are from any other source. Cost sharing under this subchapter is only required for the minimum practice necessary to meet the performance standards and prohibitions.

SUBCHAPTER IV. MANURE STORAGE FACILITY PERMIT, USE AND SPECIFICATIONS

17.04.110 Application for issuance of permits.

17.04.120 Certificate of use.

17.04.110 Application for Issuance of Permits.

- A. Permit Required. No person may do any of the following without first obtaining a permit in accordance with this Subchapter:
- 1. Construct a new manure storage facility or substantially alter an existing manure storage facility, including the construction or substantial alteration of waste transfer systems connected to a manure storage facility.
- 2. Upgrade, repair or replace a manure storage facility that has been identified as posing an imminent threat to public health, fish and aquatic life, or groundwater under 17.04.080(H)(3).
- 3. Close an existing manure storage facility, including conversion of its use, regardless of whether the facility must be closed in accordance with 17.04.080(H)(3).
- B. No Permit Required. Manure storage facilities in place as of the date of passage of this ordinance shall be determined to be existing storage facilities subject to the rules in place at the time of construction and shall not be required to obtain a permit unless they are being substantially altered or closed after the date of passage. Owners of existing storage facilities may, at their discretion, apply for a Certificate of Use.
- C. Exception to Permit Requirement. Emergency repairs such as repairing a broken pipe or equipment, leaking dikes, or the removal of stoppages may be performed without a permit. A report shall be made to the land conservation division within 2 work days of the emergency for a determination by the land conservation division on whether a permit will be required for any additional alteration or repair to the facility.
- D. Onsite Investigation Required. Each application for a permit under this section shall require an onsite inspection prior to permit issuance and include a summary report on site conditions. The site inspection shall be conducted by the land conservation division staff.
- E. Fees. The nonrefundable fees for a permit under this ordinance shall be based upon the footprint of the liner(s) and as listed in 4.35.165. A double permit fee shall be charged by the land conservation division if activity requiring approval under 17.04.110(A) commences prior to obtaining a permit. Such double fee shall not release the responsible party from full compliance with this chapter nor from prosecution for violation of this chapter.

- F. Manure Storage Facility Plan Requirements. Each application for a manure storage permit under this section shall include the completion of the county permit application and a detailed manure storage facility construction plan. The applicant can employ the services of a private design consultant or a registered professional engineer to prepare the plan. Technical assistance for plan development may be made available to applicants upon request through the land conservation division, as available staff time will allow.
- G. Manure Storage Construction Plan Requirements. A complete permit application for a new or modified storage facility shall meet or exceed the minimum established limits and specific criteria within NRCS Technical Standard 313 Waste Storage Facility, and additional Technical Standards, including, but not limited to; 367 Roofs and Covers; 520 Pond Sealing or Lining, Compacted Soil Treatment; 521 Pond Sealing or Lining, Geomembrane or Geosynthetic Clay Liner; 522 Pond Sealing or Lining, Concrete; 558 Roof Runoff Structure; 634 Waste Transfer; and 629 Waste Treatment where they apply. The plan shall include all the following:
- 1. The number, type, and size of animals for which storage is provided and the duration for which storage is to be provided.
- 2. The type and amount of bedding to be used in the operation and all aspects of handling and recovery of this bedding material.
- 3. The type and quantity of flush water, milk house waste, or other additives which will be added to the manure storage facility.
- 4. A general location map drawing of the site which shall include the location of structures in relation to buildings, homes, property lines, roads, wells, karst features, public or private drainage ditches and creeks, flowages, rivers, streams, lakes, floodplains, or wetlands within one thousand (1,000) feet of the proposed facility or system. The map will include the scale of the drawing, a north arrow, and the date the general location map was prepared.
- 5. The soil test pit locations, elevations, and soil descriptions to a depth as required for the planned structure according to the NRCS Technical Standard 313 Waste Storage Facility. Soil test pits must be verified by land conservation division staff at the time of investigation.
- 6. The elevation of groundwater, bedrock or seasonally saturated conditions if encountered in the soil profile and the date of any such determinations.
- 7. Engineering design drawings of the manure storage facility or waste transfer system which shall include:
- a. Specific design components that shall comply with NRCS Technical Standard 313 Waste Storage Facility, and additional applicable NRCS Technical Standards such as 634 Waste Transfer.
 - b. A recoverable benchmark(s) including elevation(s) expressed in feet and tenths.
- c. The scale of the drawings and the north arrow. The engineering design drawing shall be drawn to a scale no smaller than one (1) inch equals one hundred (100) feet.
 - d. The date the engineering design drawings were prepared.
- 8. The structural details, including but not limited to dimensions, cross-sections, concrete thickness, concrete joint design and placement, design loads, design computations, reinforcement schedules, thickness and placement of groundwater protection liners, and all material specifications.
- 9. Provisions for adequate drainage and control of runoff to prevent pollution of surface water and groundwater.
- 10. An erosion control and/or storm water management plan as defined in Chapter 17.05 and 17.06.
 - 11. Estimated start of construction and construction schedule.
- 12. A safety plan that identifies hazards to animals and people in the production area, and design features to minimize those hazards.
 - 13. An operation and maintenance plan for installed practices.
- 14. An emergency response plan identifying the names and phone numbers of individuals or others to be notified in the event of any leaks, spills or other system failures that could discharge manure.
- 15. A certification by a professional engineer registered in the State of Wisconsin, or an engineering practitioner certified by the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) or the NRCS that the plans meet technical and ordinance standards.
- 16. A nutrient management plan that complies with Wis. Admin. Code § ATCP 50.04. The nutrient management plan must be prepared by a nutrient management planner qualified under Wis. Admin. Code § ATCP 50.04 (3)(c) and submitted prior to issuance of the permit. If the nutrient management plan indicates manure will be applied to land not owned by the applicant, the nutrient management plan must include a copy of a lease, manure spreading agreement, or written proof of land availability. The nutrient management plan must be based on current soil analyses that comply with Wis. Admin. Code § ATCP 50.04. If current soil analyses are not available

due to frozen soils or other conditions beyond the control of the applicant, the land conservation division may accept, at its discretion, an incomplete nutrient management plan at permit submission. A complete nutrient management plan that complies with Wis. Admin. Code § ATCP 50.04 (3) (d) must be submitted and a Certificate of Use must be issued prior to use of the manure storage facility.

- 17. Any other additional information required by the land conservation division to protect water quality and determine compliance with this section.
- H. Safety Devices. Safety devices as outlined within NRCS Technical Standard 313 Waste Storage Facility or related standards will be installed prior to issuance of the Certificate of Use.
- I. Manure Storage Facility Closure Application Requirements. A complete permit application for waste storage facility closure shall meet all standards as outlined in NRCS Technical Standard 360 Waste Facility Closure and shall specify:
- 1. Provisions to remove and properly dispose of all accumulated wastes in the manure storage facility.
- 2. Provisions to remove any concrete or synthetic liner, or properly use pieces of the concrete or synthetic liner as clean fill at the site.
- 3. Provisions to remove and properly dispose of any soil saturated with waste from the manure storage facility.
- 4. Provisions to remove any soils to the depth of significant manure saturation. When contaminated soils are found, they must be removed to the extent necessary with a minimum depth of 6 inches.
- 5. Provision to remove or permanently plug the waste transfer system serving the manure storage facility.
- 6. Covering all disturbed area with topsoil, seeding the areas with a grass mixture, and mulching the seeded area. This section does not apply if an alternative use of the site is authorized under a closure plan approved by the county as part of the permit.
- 7. Any other additional information required by the land conservation division to protect water quality and determine compliance with this section.
- J. Review of Application. The land conservation division shall receive and review all permit applications. The land conservation division shall determine if the proposed facility meets required standards set forth in 17.04. Within 30 business days after receiving the completed application and fee, the land conservation division shall inform the applicant in writing whether the permit application is approved or disapproved. If additional information is required, the land conservation division shall so notify the permit applicant. The land conservation division has 14 business days from the receipt of the additional information in which to approve or disapprove the application. No construction may commence without the final approval form being executed by the land conservation division.
- K. Permit Conditions. All permits issued under this ordinance shall be issued subject to the following conditions and requirements:
- 1. Manure storage facility design, construction, closure, management and utilization activities shall be carried out in accordance with the manure facility plan and applicable standards specified in 17.04.
- 2. The permittee shall give 5 working days' notice to the land conservation division before starting any construction or closure activity authorized by the permit.
- 3. Written approval from the land conservation division must be obtained prior to any modifications to the permitted plans.
- 4. Activities authorized by permit must be completed within 2 years from the date of issuance, after which the permit shall be void. Permits may be extended upon written request of the applicant, subject to the corresponding fee, with approval from the land conservation division.
- 5. Following completion of construction and prior to issuance of a Certificate of Use, an agricultural or civil engineer registered in the State of Wisconsin or a DATCP, NRCS, or land conservation division engineering practitioner and the permittee, and, if applicable, the contractor shall certify in writing that all facilities and systems were installed as planned, including as-built drawings and authorized changes or modifications made during construction.
- 6. The permittee, engineer and contractor shall participate in a pre-construction conference with land conservation division staff before initiating construction of a new facility to outline the requirements and responsibilities of all the involved parties.
- 7. The land conservation division shall provide onsite inspection prior to issuance of the Certificate of Use. To receive a Certificate of Use, a manure storage facility must be fully constructed as designed, including the marking of the maximum operating level and implementation of all safety devices.

8. No permitted manure storage facilities may receive manure until the land conservation division provides its final approval. No manure may be emptied from a permitted manure storage facility until the land conservation division approves the nutrient management plan submitted by the applicant.

17.04.120 Certificate of use.

- A. Certificate requirement. No person may operate or use a manure storage facility or any portion of a manure storage facility that was constructed after the effective date of this ordinance unless the person has a valid Certificate of Use for the storage facility or portion of the manure storage facility that is being operated or used.
- B. Issuance. The land conservation division will issue a Certificate of Use upon receipt of the written certification required by 17.04.110(K)(5). The Certificate of Use will not be subject to fees.
- C. Operating requirements. The operator of a manure storage facility is in compliance with the Certificate of Use if the person does all the following:
- 1. Updates and follows an annual nutrient management plan that complies with requirements in this ordinance and includes all manure land applied from the manure storage facility covered by the certification of use.
- 2. Provides a nutrient management plan, including the Nutrient Management Checklist, annually to the land conservation division by April 15th to document compliance with ordinance requirements. The land conservation division may take appropriate action authorized by this chapter if the submitted nutrient management plan does not reasonably substantiate a checklist answer.
- 3. Properly operates the storage facility in accordance with performance standards in 17.04.080 (H) and consistent with the recommended operating methods as defined by the Technical Guide, NRCS-Agricultural Waste Management Field Handbook and NRCS-Engineering Field Handbook.
- 4. Properly maintains the storage facility free from visible and serious damage, erosion, or deformities that would impair the facility's safety or function as determined by the Technical Guide, NRCS-Agricultural Waste Management Field Handbook, and the NRCS-Engineering Field Handbook.
 - 5. Properly maintains the safety devices for a manure storage facility.
- 6. Provides the land conservation division proof of compliance with the requirements in 17.04 upon request and submits to periodic inspections of the storage facility with 2 business days advance notice from the land conservation division.
- 7. Develops and implements a plan for closure of the manure storage facility when the operator ceases use of the facility or closure is required based on conditions specified in this ordinance.
- D. Certificate Revocation. The land conservation division may revoke a certificate of use if there is a misrepresentation of any material fact in the permit application, a misrepresentation of any material fact in the manure storage facility plan, a misrepresentation of any material fact in the nutrient management plan, a failure to comply with the nutrient management plan requirement, a failure to provide the land conservation division with a copy of the nutrient management plan upon request, or for multiple or repeat violations of this ordinance. The land conservation division will immediately provide written notice of the revocation, the reason for the revocation, and corrective actions required.
- E. Permit Revocation. The land conservation division may revoke the permit issued under this ordinance if the holder of the permit has misrepresented any material fact in the permit application or manure facility plan, or if the holder of the permit violates any of the conditions of the permit.

17.04.130 Administration.

- A. Delegation of Authority. Eau Claire County hereby designates the Eau Claire County Land Conservation Division to administer and enforce this ordinance.
- B. Administrative Duties. In the administration of this ordinance, the land conservation division shall:

- 1. Keep an accurate record of all permit applications, animal waste facility plans, permits issued, inspections made, and other official actions.
 - 2. Review permit applications and issue permits in accordance with 17.04.110.
- 3. Inspect animal waste facility construction to insure the facility is being constructed according to plan standards and specifications.
 - 4. Investigate complaints relating to compliance with the ordinance.
 - 5. Perform other duties as specified in this ordinance.
- C. Inspection Authority. The land conservation division is authorized to enter upon any lands affected by this ordinance to inspect the land prior to or after permit issuance to determine compliance with this ordinance. If permission cannot be received from the applicant or permittee, the permit may be denied or entry by the land conservation division shall be according to Wis. Stat. § 66.0119.
- D. Enforcement Authority. The land conservation division is authorized to post an order stopping work upon land which has had a permit revoked or on land currently undergoing activity in violation of this ordinance. Notice is given by both posting upon the land where the violation occurs one or more copies of a poster stating the violation, and by mailing a copy of the order by certified mail to the person whose activity is in violation of this ordinance. The order shall specify that the activity must cease immediately and be brought into compliance within 5 working days. Any permit revocation or order stopping work shall remain in effect unless retracted by the board of land use appeals, the land conservation division, or by a court of general jurisdiction; or until the activity is brought into compliance with the ordinance. The land conservation division is authorized to refer any violation of this ordinance or of an order stopping work issued pursuant to this ordinance to the corporation counsel for commencement of further legal proceedings.

17.04.140 Violations.

- A. Penalties. Any person who violates, neglects, or refuses to comply with or resists the enforcement of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a forfeiture of up to \$200.00 plus costs of prosecution for each violation. An unlawful violation includes failure to comply with any standard of this ordinance or with any condition or qualification attached to the permit. Each day that a violation exists shall be a separate offense.
- B. Enforcement of injunction. As a substitute for or as an addition to forfeiture actions, Eau Claire County may seek enforcement of any part of this ordinance by court actions seeking injunctions or restraining orders.

17.04.150 Appeals.

- A. Authority. Under authority of Wis. Stat. Ch. 68, the Eau Claire County Board of Land Use Appeals, created under Wis. Stat. § 59.694, and under 18.31.020 and acting as an appeal authority under Wis. Stat. § 59.694, is authorized to hear and decide appeals where it is alleged that there is error in any order, requirement, decision or determination by the land conservation division in administering this ordinance.
- B. Procedure. The rules, procedures, duties and powers of the board of land use appeals and Wis. Stat. Ch. 68, shall apply to this ordinance.
- C. Who May Appeal. Appeals may be taken by any person having a substantial interest which is adversely affected by the order, requirement, decision or determination made by the land conservation division.

SUBCHAPTER VI. DEFINITIONS

17.04.160	Purpose.
17.04.170	Word usage.
17.04.180	Definitions.

<u>17.04.160 Purpose</u>. To define words, terms, and phrases contained in this chapter that are essential to the understanding, administration, and enforcement of this chapter.

17.04.170 Word usage. For the purposes of this chapter, certain words and terms are used as follows:

- Words used in the present tense include the future.
- Words in the singular include the plural.
- Words in the plural include the singular.

• The word "shall" is mandatory and not permissive.

17.04.180 Definitions. For the purposes of this chapter, certain words and terms are defined as follows:

- A. "Adequate sod, or self-sustaining vegetative cover" means maintenance of sufficient vegetation types and densities that provide 70% coverage such that the physical integrity of the streambank or lakeshore is preserved. Self-sustaining vegetative cover includes grasses, forbs, sedges and duff layers of fallen leaves, and woody debris.
 - B. "Applicant" means any person who applies for a permit under this ordinance.
- C. "BARNY" means the BARNY runoff prediction model which is the NRCS "Evaluation System to Rate Feedlot Pollution Potential," ARM-NC-17 (April 1982 version with modifications as of August 2005. An Excel computer spreadsheet version of the BARNY model is available at https://datcp.wi.gov/Documents/BARNYSpreadsheet.xls.
- D. "Best management practices (BMPs)" mean structural or nonstructural measures, practices, techniques, or devices employed to avoid or minimize soil, sediment, or pollutants carried in runoff to waters of the state.
- E. "Direct conduit to groundwater" means wells, sinkholes, swallets, fractured bedrock at the surface, mine shafts, non-metallic mines, tile inlets discharging to groundwater, quarries, cenotes, or depressional groundwater recharge areas over shallow fractured bedrock.
 - F. "Direct runoff" means any of the following:
- 1. Runoff of stored manure, including manure leachate, that discharges a significant amount of pollutants to surface waters of the state or to a direct conduit to ground water.
- 2. Runoff from a feedlot that can be predicted to discharge a significant amount of pollutants to surface waters of the state or a direct conduit to groundwater.
 - 3. Discharge of a significant amount of leachate from stored manure to waters of the state.
- 4. Construction of a manure storage facility in permeable soils or over fractured bedrock without a liner designed in accordance with Wis. Admin. Code § NR 154.04(3).
- G. "Footprint of the liner" means the area measured in square feet located beneath the liner of the manure storage facility, including the waste transfer system.
- H. "Feedlot" means a barnyard, exercise area, or other outdoor area where livestock are concentrated for feeding or other purposes and self-sustaining vegetative cover is not maintained. "Feedlot" does not include a winter grazing area or a bare soil area such as a cattle lane or a supplemental feeding area located within a pasture, provided that the bare soil area is not a significant source of pollution to waters of the state as determined by the BARNY runoff prediction model or an equivalent predictive model for manure runoff utilized by the land conservation division.
- I. "Land application" means the physical transfer of manure from any animal confinement area or manure storage facility to fields for purposes of fertilization or disposal.
- J. "Land Conservation Commission" means the Commission which is designated by the county board pursuant to Wis. Stat. \S 92.06.
- K. "Land Conservation Division" means the Eau Claire County Land Conservation Division of the Planning and Development Department.
 - L. "Landowner" means any of the following:
 - 1. A person who owns a parcel of land.
 - 2. A person who rents, controls, or uses a parcel of land for agricultural purposes.
 - M. "Livestock" means all domestic animals, including deer, elk, or any fenced-in animals.
- N. "Livestock operation" means a feedlot or other facility or a pasture where animals are fed, confined, maintained, or stabled.
 - O. "Livestock producer" means an owner or operator of a livestock operation.
- P. "Manure" means livestock excreta. "Manure" includes the following when intermingled with excreta in normal farming operations: debris including bedding, water, soil, hair, and feathers; processing derivatives including separated sand, separated manure solids, precipitated manure sludges, supernatants, digested liquids, composted biosolids, and process water; and runoff collected from barnyards, animal lots, and feed storage areas.
- Q. "Manure storage" means physically transferring manure from the livestock production area, feedlot, or place of origin to another location, manure storage facility, or unconfined manure pile. Manure storage does not include transferring manure for land application.
- R. "Manure storage facility" means an impoundment made by constructing an embankment or excavating a pit or dugout or by fabricating a structure to contain manure and other animal or agricultural waste.

- S. "Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS)" means an agency of the United States
 Department of Agriculture (USDA) which, for purposes of this chapter, provides the Land Conservation
 Commission and the land conservation division with technical assistance and information on the design criteria, size, shape, engineering strength, and other necessary technical data for the proper and safe installation of a manure storage facility.
- T. "Navigable waters" means any body of water that is navigable under the laws of the state as defined in Wis. Stat. § 30.01(4m).
- U. "Nutrient management plan" means a plan that balances the nutrient needs of a crop with the nutrients available from legume crops, manure, fertilizer, or other sources. The requirements for a nutrient management plan are as established in Wis. Admin. Code § ATCP 50.04(3).
- V. "Nutrients" means plant nutrients derived from commercial fertilizers, manure, organic wastes, soil reserves, legumes, or other sources.
- W. "Ordinary high-water mark" means the point on the bank or shore up to which the presence and action of surface water is so continuous as to leave a distinctive mark such as by erosion, destruction or prevention of terrestrial vegetation, or other easily recognized characteristic. Where the bank or shore at any particular place is of such character that it is difficult or impossible to ascertain where the point of ordinary high-water mark is, recourse may be had to the opposite bank of a stream or to other places on the shore of a lake or flowage to determine whether a given stage of water is above or below the ordinary high-water mark.
- X. "Pasture" means land on which livestock graze or otherwise seek feed in a manner that maintains the vegetative cover over the grazing area. Pasture may include limited areas of bare soil such as cattle lanes and supplemental feeding areas provided the bare soil areas are not significant sources of pollution to waters of the state.
- Y. "Permit" means the signed, written statement issued by the land conservation division under this ordinance authorizing the applicant to construct, install, substantially alter, close, or reuse a manure storage facility, and to use or dispose of waste from the facility.
 - Z. "Permitted manure storage facility" means a facility that was permitted under this ordinance.
 - AA. "Permittee" means any person to whom a permit is issued under this ordinance.
- BB. "Person" means any individual, owner, operator, corporation, limited liability company, partnership, association, municipality, interstate agency, state agency, or federal agency pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 283.01(11).
- CC. "Phosphorus index" or "PI" means the State's agricultural land management planning tool for assessing the potential of a cropped or grazed field to contribute phosphorus to surface waters.
- DD. "Pollutant" means any dredged, spoil, solid waste, incinerator residue, sewage, garbage, refuse, oil, sewage sludge, munitions, chemical wastes, biological materials, radioactive substance, heat, wrecked or discarded equipment, rock, sand, cellar dirt and industrial, municipal, and agricultural waste discharged into water as defined in Wis. Stat. § 283.01(13).
- EE. "Pollution" includes contaminating or rendering unclean or impure the waters of the state, or making the same injurious to public health, harmful for commercial or recreational use, or deleterious to fish, bird, animal or plant life.
- FF. "Process wastewater" means wastewater from the production area directly or indirectly used in the operation of animal feeding operation that results from any or all of the following:
 - 1. Spillage or overflow from animal or poultry watering systems.
- 2. Washing, cleaning, or flushing pens, barns, manure pits, or other animal feeding operation facilities.
 - 3. Direct contact swimming, washing, or spray cooling of animals or dust control.
- 4. Water that comes into contact with any raw materials or animal byproducts including manure, feed, milk, eggs, or bedding.
- GG. "Recoverable benchmark" means a readily identifiable, relatively permanent benchmark that is intended to maintain its elevation without change over a long period of time and will not be influenced by disturbing activities.
- HH. "Runoff" means storm water or precipitation including rain, snow, ice melt or similar water that moves on the land surface via sheet or channelized flow.
- II. "Safety devices" means constructed measures designed to protect humans and livestock from hazards associated with a manure storage facility.
- JJ. "Site that is susceptible to groundwater contamination" under Wis. Stat. § 281.16 (1) (g) means any one of the following:
 - 1. An area within 250 feet of a private well.

- 2. An area within 1000 feet of a municipal well.
- 3. An area within 300 feet upslope or 100 feet downslope of a direct conduit to

groundwater.

- 4. A channel that flows to a direct conduit to groundwater.
- 5. An area where the soil depth to groundwater or bedrock is less than 2 feet.
- 6. An area where the soil does not exhibit one of the following soil characteristics:
 - a. At least a 2-foot soil layer with 40% fines or greater above groundwater and

bedrock.

b. At least a 3-foot soil layer with 20% fines or greater above groundwater and

bedrock.

c. At least a 5-foot soil layer with 10% fines, or greater above groundwater and

bedrock.

- KK. "Stored manure" means manure that is kept in a manure storage facility or an unconfined manure pile.
- LL. "Substantially alter or significantly alter" means a change initiated by a landowner or operator that results in a relocation of a structure or facility or changes to the size, depth or configuration of a structure or facility including any of the following:
 - 1. Replacement of a liner of any type in a manure storage facility.
 - 2. An increase in the volumetric capacity or area of a manure storage facility.
- 3. A change in a manure storage facility related to a change in livestock management from one species of livestock to another such as cattle to poultry.
- 4. The addition of a new pipe penetration or waste transfer system that requires an alteration to the manure storage facility.
- MM. "Surface waters" means all natural and artificial named and unnamed lakes and all naturally flowing streams within the boundaries of the state, but not including cooling lakes, farm ponds and facilities constructed for the treatment of wastewaters.
- NN. "Tolerable soil loss" or "T" means the maximum average annual rate of soil erosion, in tons per year, allowable for particular soils and site conditions that will maintain soil productivity.
- OO. "Technical guide" means the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) Technical Guide as adopted by the Land Conservation Commission, including subsequent amendments or additions.
- PP. "Top of the channel" means an edge or point on the landscape landward from the ordinary highwater mark of a surface water of the state, where the slope of the land begins to be less than 12% continually for at least 50 feet. If the slope of the land is 12% or less continually for the initial 50 feet landward from the ordinary high-water mark, the top of the channel is the ordinary high-water mark.
- QQ. "Unconfined manure pile" means a quantity of manure that is at least 175 cubic feet in volume and which covers the ground surface to a depth of at least 2 inches and is not confined within a manure storage facility, livestock housing facility or barnyard runoff control facility or covered or contained in a manner that prevents storm water access and direct runoff to surface water or leaching of pollutants to groundwater.
- RR. "Waste transfer system" means components such as pumps, pipes, conduits, valves, and other mechanisms installed to convey manure, leachate and contaminated runoff, and milking center wastes from livestock structures to a storage structure, loading area, or treatment area. Waste transfer system may include permanently installed conveyance systems necessary to transfer material from the source to a storage facility, treatment facility or system, loading area, or cropland, and does not include vehicles, temporary surface pipes or hoses.
- SS. "Water pollution" means any act or condition contaminating or rendering unclean or impure the ground or surface waters of the state, or making the same injurious to public health, harmful for commercial or recreational use, or deleterious to fish, bird, animal, or plant life.
- TT. "Water Quality Management Area (WQMA)" means land that includes any of the following: an area within 1,000 feet of the ordinary high-water mark of a navigable lake, pond, or flowage; an area within 300 feet of the high-water mark of a navigable river or stream; an area that is susceptible to groundwater contamination, or has the potential to be a direct conduit for contamination to reach groundwater.
- UU. "Waters of the state" mean those portions of Lake Michigan and Lake Superior within the boundaries of Wisconsin, all lakes, bays, rivers, streams, springs, ponds, wells, impounding reservoirs, marshes, water courses, drainage systems and other surface water or groundwater, natural or artificial, public or private within

the state or under its jurisdiction, except those waters which are entirely confined and retained completely upon the property of a person.

VV. "Winter grazing area" means a cropland or pasture where livestock feed on dormant vegetation or crop residue, with or without supplementary feed, during the period of October 1 to April 30.

SECTION 3. This ordinance is effective upon adoption.

TO CREATE CHAPTER 12.74: BROADBAND NETWORK PROJECT APPLICATIONS

The County Board of Supervisors of the County of Eau Claire does ordain as follows:

Chapter 12.74. Broadband Network Project Applications

SECTION 1. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- Purpose and policy. The purpose of this chapter is to encourage the development of broadband 1.1 access in Eau Claire County (County) by reducing administrative obstacles to broadband service providers and coordinating the review of applications to ensure such applications are timely processed. This chapter shall at all times be construed consistent with the forestated purpose.
- 1.2 Definitions. In this chapter:
 - (1) "Applicant" means a person applying for a permit for a broadband network project.
- (2) "Broadband network project" means the construction or deployment of wireline or wireless communication facilities to provide broadband communication services in the County.
- (3) "Permit" means any local permit, license, certificate, approval, registration, or similar form of approval required by policy, administrative rule, regulation, ordinance, or resolution with respect to a broadband network project.
- (4) "Written" or "in writing" means information that is inscribed on a tangible medium or that is stored in an electronic or other intangible medium and is retrievable in perceivable form.
- Point of contact. The County shall appoint a single point of contact for all matters related to a broadband network project. The County shall provide on its public website the contact information, including the e-mail address, for the point of contact authorized to receive a broadband network project application.
- SECTION 2. ELECTRONIC SUBMISSION OF APPLICATIONS. An applicant may sign and file all forms,

applications, and documentation related to a broadband network project electronically. Due to the large size of maps, the applicant shall also submit one hard copy of the application.

SECTION 3. REVIEW OF APPLICATIONS. Notwithstanding any other provision in the County's ordinances, resolutions, regulations, policies, or practices to the contrary, the following process shall apply exclusively upon receiving a broadband network project application. Unless noted in this Ordinance, all existing regulatory review and approval processes set forth in County Ordinances are not amended, repealed or otherwise modified. The County shall continue to adhere to all other regulatory requirements set forth in the County Ordinances, the Wisconsin Statutes, the Wisconsin Administrative Codes, or other applicable statutes, codes or laws.

- 3.1 Completeness review. Upon receiving a broadband network project application, the County shall:
- (1) Determine whether an application is complete and notify the applicant of the determination by the County in writing within 10 calendar days of receiving an application. If the County does not notify the applicant in writing of its completeness determination within 10 calendar days of receiving the application, the application shall be considered complete.
- (2) If the County determines that an application is not complete, the written notification to the applicant shall specify in detail the required information that is not complete. The applicant may resubmit an application as often as necessary until the application is complete.
- 3.2 Approval or denial of complete applications.
- (1) Within 60 calendar days of receiving an application that is complete, or considered complete under sub. (1), the County shall approve or deny the application and provide the applicant written notification of the approval or denial. If the County does not notify the applicant of its approval or denial within 60 calendar days of receiving a complete application, the application shall be considered approved and any required permit shall be considered issued.
- (2) If the County denies an application, the written notification of the denial under sub. (1) shall include evidence that the denial is not arbitrary and capricious.

SECTION 4. FEES. Any fee imposed by the County to review an application, issue a permit, or perform any other activity related to a broadband network project shall be reasonable. An application fee that exceeds \$100.00 is unreasonable.

SECTION 5. INITIAL APPLICABILITY. The treatment of this ordinance first applies to applications received by the County on or after the effective date of this ordinance.

SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance takes effect on the day after publication.



I'm writing to provide an update about redistricting reform in Governor Tony Evers' 2019-21 Biennial State Budget. Your advocacy for non-partisan redistricting reform is appreciated, and I hope this letter helps you better understand the status of this issue.

I voted "no" on the budget because it did not reflect the priorities I have heard from constituents, activists and leaders throughout western Wisconsin. For the past eight years, Wisconsin's needs have been neglected. I supported Governor Evers' budget because he made the tough choices for offering a plan forward. The Governor asked the people what to include in his budget at numerous listening sessions throughout the state before crafting the "People's Budget." Immediately after the Governor introduced his budget, Republicans rejected his plan outright.

Assembly Bill 56 worked its way through the Joint Finance Committee (JFC) and passed both the Assembly and the Senate despite bipartisan opposition. After 78 vetoes, Governor Tony Evers compromised with Republicans to sign the budget bill into law as Wisconsin Act 9. The final version of the budget does not expand Medicaid, fix our school funding formula, solve the transportation funding crisis, reform our criminal justice system, protect our environment, or create a plan for nonpartisan redistricting reform. However, Governor Evers used his veto pen to shield Wisconsinites from many of the worst provisions passed by Republicans. However, there is still much more that must be done to ensure fair maps for Wisconsin's future.

Governor Evers understands the consequences of politicians picking their voters and drawing their own legislative districts. Without competitive elections, elected officials become increasingly partisan and fail to truly represent the multitude of views in our state. The Governor prioritized redistricting reform in his budget; his plan established a non-partisan redistricting commission and defined rules for the redistricting process that would not violate the Voting Rights Act or create politically-motivated or demographically diluted boundaries. Despite seventy-two percent of Wisconsinites supporting non-partisan redistricting reform, Republican JFC members removed this budget provision entirely.

Redistricting reform is an issue very important to me ever since I served in the State Assembly during the 2007 and 2009 legislative sessions. As the former Chair of the Assembly Committee on Elections and Campaign Reform, I held a public hearing for Assembly Joint Resolution 29. This would have established fair criteria for the drawing of legislative districts and promoted competitive elections, but this bill ultimately did not pass through the Legislature.

Redistricting reform is a principal reason why I returned to the Legislature to represent the 31st Senate District. In June, I became a co-sponsor to Senate Bill 288, which would establish a non-partisan redistricting advisory commission and identify rules for the Legislative Reference Bureau when drawing district boundaries. As a member of the Senate Committee on Elections, Ethics and Rural Issues, I will continue to encourage the Chair, Senator Kathy Bernier, to schedule a public hearing and a vote on this important bill.

Along with this letter, you will find my recent weekly column about gerrymandering and the dangers it presents to our democracy. Please share this with friends and family members all over the state. We won't get fair maps unless legislators across the state hear from you.

Thank you for contacting me regarding Governor Evers' 2019-21 State Budget and your advocacy for redistricting reform. I encourage you to sign up for my weekly column list on my website at www.sensmithwi.com to stay up-to-date on what's happening in Madison and western Wisconsin. It is a privilege to represent you in the State Senate, and I hope that you will not hesitate to contact me again in the future.





-AUTHORIZING A CONTINGENCY FUND TRANSFER FOR DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES PROGRAM REVIEW-

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County Department of Human Services has exceeded its budget consistently over the last three years, and that the department overages have exceeded a cumulative of \$5 Million during that time, and the department's continuous overages have created repercussions and consequences for the entire county; and,

WHEREAS, the Department of Human Service implements programs mandated by state and federal law, but state and federal reimbursements are not commensurate with the expenditures required to fulfill the mandates; and,

WHEREAS, the Department of Human Services, in discharging its responsibilities, has come under increased pressure to provide out-of-home placement for children and adults, which contributes to a significant amount of the budget overage; and,

WHEREAS, the Department of Human Services projects that it will exceed its annual budget again in the fiscal year 2019 by approximately \$2 Million; and,

WHEREAS, In an effort to better understand the nature of the mandate and the expenditure required to fulfill the mandate, and to better understand the funding shortfall in the Department of Human Services, it would be beneficial to hire a consultant to review the operations, expenses, sources of income, and fiscal practices of the department as they relate to their program requirements; and,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors does hereby authorize the expenditure of up to \$30,000 from the contingency fund to be paid for consulting services for the program review/audit of the Eau Claire County Department of Human Services with said consultant chosen by the purchasing policies of the Eau Claire County; and,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that an ad hoc committee will consist of the chairs of the Human Services Board, the committee on Finance and Budget, and the committee on Human Resources; along with the County Treasurer or her designee, the Sheriff or his designee; and the Finance Director and one citizen member chosen by the County Board Chair. The committee will define the parameters for the consultant and review and monitor the progress of the consultant, with said ad hoc committee reporting to the full County Board.

"Department" means the county highway sheriff's department. A.

SECTION 2. That paragraphs 1, and 3, of Subsection A. of Section 10.20.010 of the code be amended to read:

- The sheriff's deputy or the officer in charge who discovers any vehicle which has been abandoned shall cause it to be removed from the road or right-of-way by authorizing the vehicle to be towed by a private towing company to the county vehicle pound as provided in A.2. The officer shall notify the sheriff of the abandonment and location of the impounded vehicle the name of the private towing company who towed the vehicle.
- The expense of all vehicle towing and impoundment authorized by this chapter shall be the sole responsibility of the vehicle owner. If the officer is able to contact the vehicle owner the officer shall give the owner the opportunity to select a towing company of their own choice, with the vehicle to be towed within a reasonable amount of time as determined by the officer. If the owner does not express a preference for a towing company, or if the towing company chosen is not able to remove the vehicle in a reasonable amount of time the Communication Center will make the choice of towing company from a rotating list of available towing companies, in this chapter shall be charged as provided in 4.09.040.

SECTION 3. That Subsection B. of Section 10.20.010 of the code be amended to read:

If a vehicle is left unattended on county property without the permission of the officer in charge and it jeopardizes public safety by creating an unsafe condition, significantly hindering the efficient movement of traffic or interfering with parking of vehicles in county lots, the officer in charge of the property on which it stands or the sheriff may authorize the immediate removal, and towing and impoundment of the vehicle. at the vehicle pound,
 - SECTION 4. That Section 10.20.015 of the code be repealed.

B. The owner or lienholder of record of any vehicle impounded or stored at the vehicle pound on county owned or leased property pursuant to this chapter shall be assessed \$30.00 for each day the vehicle remains in storage, plus towing costs in addition to any civil forfeiture.

SECTION 6. That Subsection B. of Section 10.20.035 of the code be amended to read:

B. Notice of the sale shall be publicly posted by the department at the office of the sheriff; at the courthouse and the department office, and shall be published at least once in the official newspaper in the same form as the certified mail notice sent to the owner under Wis. Stat. § 342.40 (3) (c). The department shall conduct the sale and transfer in accord with Wis. Stat. § 342.40 (3) (c) and (3). If all bids are rejected or none are received, the department may readvertise the sale or sell the vehicle at a private sale or annual county auction. Vehicle sales shall be grouped where practical.



REQUIRING ANY DEPARTMENT OF OVER 50 EMPLOYEES, TRENDING SIGNIFICANTLY AND REPEATEDLY OVER BUDGET, TO SEEK APPROVAL PRIOR TO FILLING VACANT STAFF POSITIONS AND TO PROVIDE FISCAL REPORTS TO THE COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS UPON REQUEST

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors acknowledges that their number one responsibility is fiduciary oversight of the county; and

WHEREAS, the county has been placed in a precarious fiscal condition due to repeated and significant overages incurred; and

WHEREAS, the overages put the county in fiscal jeopardy by depleting cash reserves and fund balance; and

WHEREAS, depletion of cash reserves could have the effect of requiring short-term borrowing to meet payroll or lost revenue from investments; and

WHEREAS, depletion of the fund balance could have the effect of lowering the county's bond rating or decreasing funds available to meet other departments' critical needs; and

WHEREAS, delay in filling positions, including positions that are fully funded by outside sources, is an approach to recover from immediate overspending.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors requires, effective immediately, any department of over 50 employees that is trending significantly and repeatedly over budget is required to place all positions on hold, pending review and approval to fill the position by the County Administrator, the department oversight committee, the Human Resources Committee, and the Committee on Finance and Budget. If filling the position is denied by any of the above, the oversight committee may bring the request to fill the position to the County Board for consideration.

BE IF FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors requires monthly written and oral fiscal reports to the full board by the chair of the department's oversight committee and by the department head. This fiscal report shall provide year-to-date statements of expenses and revenue, approved budget and actual, the variance, total excess (deficiency) of revenue and expenditures, and vacant positions filled during that month.

DEFEATED: February 19, 2020

 DIRECTING THE COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR TO TAKE SIGNIFICANT ACTION STEPS WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES TO ENSURE BUDGET COMPLIANCE IN THE YEAR 2020

WHEREAS, the County Administrator, the County Finance Director, governing committees and the Finance and Budget Committee all have the responsibility to provide fiscal oversight, support adherence to the adopted budget, and report to the County Board; and,

WHEREAS, among other things, the County Administrator administers the county budget and works with departments to remain in compliance with the adopted budget within the budget parameters. It is understood many departments have budget areas of risk. The administrator and department heads are expected to take all possible corrective action when departments are exceeding their budget; and,

WHEREAS, the County Board of Supervisors is committed to seeing that the County Administrator has the necessary support and authority to achieve budget compliance in the Department of Human Services; and,

WHEREAS, the Department of Human Services has exceeded its annual budgets resulting in deficits as follows: \$225,089 in the year 2016; \$1,934,293 in the year 2017; \$2,492,413 in the year 2018; and the preliminary report for the year 2019 shows a deficit of \$2,180,909; and,

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County has repeatedly expressed concern to the state for the lack of adequate state reimbursement. Eau Claire County should continue to lobby the state to do right by counties, but not count on it happening any time soon.

WHEREAS, the repeated deficits of the Department of Human Services have contributed to placing Eau Claire County in a precarious financial condition that has resulted in depleted cash reserves, and a depletion of the county fund balance; and,

WHEREAS, the depleted cash reserves could result in the county needing to engage in short term borrowing to meet payroll. This may result in lost revenue associated with the cost of borrowing, and the potential loss of revenue from investments; and,

WHEREAS, the continued depletion of the fund balance will at some point have an impact on the county's bond rating, causing a substantial increase in expense for the county when it comes to borrowing for the county's capital projects and to meet the county's critical needs; and,

WHEREAS, currently there is an unacceptable time lag in the Department of Human Services fiscal reports which does not allow for prompt management adjustments and adequate fiscal oversight. As such, it may be beneficial to determine if the fiscal division of the Department of Human Services combined with the County Finance Department would be more cost-effective and improve fiscal reporting.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the County Administrator is directed to take significant action steps within the Department of Human Services to make sure there is compliance with the 2020 adopted budget; and,
