...The scope of external services should cover 80% of the expenditures for the past three years and audit the vetting and evaluation of vendors for service delivery outcomes and compliance with County contract terms.

...The audit should also review both Statewide and Nationwide, best practices for evaluating the cost-benefit (e.g. effectiveness) for the delivery of social services.

While this may seem somewhat subjective, every government entity in the Country provides some level of these services. Multiple government entities and higher educational institutions have dedicated staff to address this important issue. The audit will identify any gaps in Eau Claire County current methods to achieve such status and a recommendation regarding possible implementation steps.

Should the cost of each of the above two expenditures not be feasible within the limits cited above, the Committee on Finance and Budget may modify the expenditures not to exceed \$100,000 in total."

Such evaluation will compare Eau Claire County practices to similar counties in Wisconsin and recommend "best practices" implemented by those counties considered to be "best in class", which Eau Claire may implement.

-Provide detailed program evaluation for the services provided by DHS. This will include:

...Analysis of current program outcome effectiveness. This will evaluate both internally delivered services and externally contracted services.

...The scope of external services should cover 80% of the expenditures for the past three years and audit the vetting and evaluation of vendors for service delivery outcomes and compliance with County contract terms.

...The audit should also review both Statewide and Nationwide, best practices for evaluating the cost-benefit (e.g. effectiveness) for the delivery of social services.

While this may seem somewhat subjective, every government entity in the Country provides some level of these services. Multiple government entities and higher educational institutions have dedicated staff to address this important issue. The audit will identify any gaps in Eau Claire County current methods to achieve such status and a recommendation regarding possible implementation steps.

Should the cost of each of the above two expenditures not be feasible within the limits cited above, the Committee on Finance and Budget may modify the expenditures not to exceed \$100,000 in total."

WHEREAS, a Task Force will provide a mechanism to identify issues and create solutions to the financial needs of the county during this current crisis and into the future; and,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED; the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors ratifies the bridge plan created by the County Administrator; County Board Chair in consultation with department heads; and,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a task force consisting of the County Administrator, the County Finance Director, The Director of Human Resources, The Corporation Counsel, the Chair of the County Board, The Chair of the Finance and Budget Committee, and the Chair of the Human Resources Committee is hereby created to identify issues and create solutions created by the reduction in revenue as a result of the COVID-19 crisis. SUPPORTING A PROPOSED EAU CLAIRE – BLACK RIVER FALLS-TOMAH AMTRAK SHUTTLE CONNECTION

WHEREAS, Passenger rail service, as part of an integrated multimodal transportation system, is increasingly being recognized as a critical choice for small, medium and large communities to provide reasonably priced, safe, accessible transportation to compliment other modes of transportation and for communities to be economically competitive and to be attractive to skilled talent; and,

WHEREAS, the West Central Wisconsin business community sees the value of passenger rail service as critical to efficient travel for employees, and allows for productive use of time during travel, and increases the attractiveness of West Central Wisconsin as a business location and tourism destination; and,

WHEREAS, since 1999 the West Central Wisconsin Rail Coalition has worked to obtain passenger rail service for area communities including Hudson/River Falls, Baldwin, Menomonie and Eau Claire/Chippewa Falls and is currently developing a public-private partnership to establish an initial corridor between St. Paul and Eau Claire with future extension eastward to Milwaukee and Chicago; and,

WHEREAS, both the Wisconsin and Minnesota state rail plans include the West Central Wisconsin corridor in long-range plans for passenger rail service; and,

WHEREAS, Tomah currently has passenger rail service with the Amtrak Empire Builder train once daily in each direction on a route linking Tomah to the Wisconsin communities of La Crosse, Wisconsin Dells, Portage, Columbus and Milwaukee, as well as Chicago, Winona, Red Wing and Minneapolis-St. Paul in neighboring states. The Amtrak Empire Builder provides direct rail service from Tomah to 45 cities and towns all the way to the Pacific Northwest, and connections to more than 400 domestic and Canadian destinations; and,

WHEREAS, residents and visitors of West Central Wisconsin drive to Tomah to access the Empire Builder and the Amtrak national network because there is no direct dedicated shuttle connection from West Central Wisconsin and no intercity public bus service from Black River Falls to Tomah; and,

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, like 17 other U.S. states, has an operating contract with Amtrak to supplement service along the existing Chicago to Milwaukee route with 14 additional train departures, six days per week, 12 on Sunday, because travel utility and demand is best served with multiple frequencies (departures and arrivals) each day providing competitive travel service that prompts motorists to opt not to drive and expanding the existing transportation network between Milwaukee and Chicago; and,

WHEREAS, the departments of transportation for the states of Wisconsin and Minnesota are working with Amtrak on the Twin Cities Milwaukee Chicago (TCMC) project to consider adding a second daily route between St, Paul, Milwaukee and Chicago to serve the additional demand for passenger rail transportation in the corridor. With the implementation of this service there exists the opportunity to expand its usefulness by connecting communities via dedicated shuttle service; and,

WHEREAS, the inclusion of a direct shuttle service between the Chippewa Valley (including downtown Eau Claire), Black River Falls and the Tomah Amtrak Station in the TCMC project would significantly enhance the utility of these rail improvements for West Central Wisconsin, and would open up travel opportunities for residents and visitors and provide improved mobility for students and seniors to connect with Milwaukee/Chicago through Tomah, and who don't want to drive the 80 miles to access the service; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Eau Claire is constructing a new Transit Center in downtown Eau Claire. Connecting the shuttle service to the new Transit Center would be beneficial to travelers as it provides access to the national intercity rail network; and,

WHEREAS, the United States Federal government has appropriated approximately \$1.4 billion for railspecific, competitive grants, that are available to states to implement passenger rail improvement projects; and,

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County and the communities in West Central Wisconsin are looking towards the benefits made possible by a better connected, more functional transportation network that includes more frequent passenger train departures, such as are being experienced by communities in 28 different Amtrak-state partnered passenger rail corridors that exist across the U.S.; and,

WHEREAS, implementation of a shuttle service to Tomah would be a step towards and be complementary to the future implementation of direct passenger rail service to West Central Wisconsin.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED; that Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors requests the State of Wisconsin work with the West Central Wisconsin Rail Coalition, Amtrak, the Canadian Pacific Railroad, Minnesota Department of Transportation and other communities along the route to implement one additional passenger train service each day between Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul, via Tomah, and to include dedicated shuttle service between Tomah, Black River Falls and Eau Claire to meet the arrivals and departures of both the new train and the Empire Builder.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the County Clerk is directed to send a copy of this resolution to the state legislators and the county clerks who represent the West Central Wisconsin including Eau Claire, Chippewa, Dunn, St. Croix, Trempealeau, Jackson, and Monroe counties.

ENCOURAGING THE EAU CLAIRE COUNTY DEER ADVISORY COMMITTEE TO ESTABLISH HARVEST QUOTAS AND POPULATION LEVELS THAT PROMOTE FOREST HEALTH AND DIVERSITY, SUSTAIN FOREST REGENERATION, AND SLOW THE SPREAD OF CHRONIC WASTING DISEASE (CWD) ON THE PUBLIC LANDS WITHIN THE CENTRAL FOREST DEER MANAGEMENT UNIT OF EAU CLAIRE COUNTY

WHEREAS, the Central Forest Deer Management Unit in Eau Claire County is made up of over 50% public land, with approximately 47,500 acres owned by Eau Claire County and managed as a forest ecosystem. This area represents approximately 93% of the public lands in the Central Forest Management Unit within Eau Claire County; and

WHEREAS, healthy forests depend on forest diversity and deer are selectively reducing this diversity; and

WHEREAS, high deer populations are currently preventing the forest from regenerating, negatively impacting future yields and forest benefits; and

WHEREAS, the County receives approximately \$1,000,000 annually in direct income from the sale of timber; and

WHEREAS, an annual harvest goal of 125 antlerless deer is not adequately controlling the deer population; and

WHEREAS, restricted deer harvests do not provide adequate samples to test for Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD); and

WHEREAS, high deer populations promote increased deer to deer contact possibly increasing the spread of CWD.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors support the County Deer Advisory Committee establishment of harvest goals that promote forest health, encourage forest regeneration, provide adequate samples size to test for CWD, and populations that prevent the spread of CWD within the public lands of the Central Forest Deer Management Unit.

MODIFICATION TO RESOLUTION 20-21/017 AUTHORIZING THE BRIDGE PLAN RELATED TO THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC; TO CREATE A TASK FORCE TO ADDRESS ISSUES RELATED TO THE COVID-19 CRISIS

WHEREAS, On March 24, 2020 Governor Tony Evers through the State Department of Health Services issued the "Safer at Home Order," also known as Executive Order #12 in response to the worldwide Coronavirus (COVID-19). The Safer at Home Order requires all non-essential businesses to close and restricts travel in the state of Wisconsin; and,

WHEREAS, as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic thousands of workers in the state of Wisconsin are now unemployed, businesses are closed, and many services provided by governmental agencies such as Eau Claire County have been greatly reduced or restricted; and,

WHEREAS, the negative impact on the county's revenue stream will require the county to review its operating costs including but not limited to a reduction in staff levels and services so that it can bridge the projected loss of revenue; and,

WHEREAS, the bridge plan is an initial financial fiscal strategy to provide time for a task force to be created to work through the changes needed to cover the impending loss of revenue; and,

WHEREAS, a task force will provide a mechanism to identify issues and create solutions to the financial needs of the county during this current crisis and into the future with a commitment to building equity, diversity, and inclusion in all our financial and operational solutions, policies and paths forward.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors ratifies the bridge plan created by the County Administrator and County Board Chair in consultation with department heads.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a task force consisting of the County Administrator, the County Finance Director, The Director of Human Resources, The Corporation Counsel, the Chair of the County Board, The Chair of the Finance and Budget Committee, and the Chair of the Human Resources Committee is hereby created to identify issues and create solutions created by the reduction in revenue as a result of the COVID-19 crisis. The task force shall not exist past December 31, 2021, unless otherwise extended by a resolution of the Board. The task force shall provide an update to the Eau Claire County Board on no less than a monthly basis, concerning the issues identified, the actions taken to resolve those issues, and any proposals that will need to be acted on by the County Board of Supervisors.

RESOLUTION AWARDING THE SALE OF \$17,060,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION PROMISSORY NOTE, SERIES 2020A

WHEREAS, on April 21, 2020, the County Board of Supervisors of Eau Claire County, Wisconsin (the "County") adopted an initial resolution authorizing the issuance of general obligation promissory notes in an amount not to exceed \$18,945,000 for public purposes, including

- (a) paying the cost of highway improvements and other 2020 capital projects (collectively, the "Project"), and
- (b) refunding the County's Taxable General Obligation Building Bonds, Series 2010B (Build America Bonds Direct Payment), dated November 9, 2010 (the "Refunded Obligations") (hereinafter the refinancing of the Refunded Obligations shall be referred to as the "Refunding");

WHEREAS, the County Board of Supervisors deems it to be necessary, desirable and in the best interest of the County to undertake the Refunding for the purpose of achieving debt service savings;

WHEREAS, the County is authorized by the provisions of Section 67.12(12), Wisconsin Statutes, to borrow money and issue general obligation promissory notes (the "Notes") for such public purposes and to refinance its outstanding obligations;

WHEREAS, none of the proceeds of the Notes shall be used to fund the operating expenses of the general fund of the County or to fund the operating expenses of any special revenue fund of the County that is supported by the property taxes;

WHEREAS, the County has directed Ehlers & Associates, Inc. ("Ehlers") to take the steps necessary to sell the Notes to pay the cost of the Project and the Refunding;

WHEREAS, Ehlers, in consultation with the officials of the County, prepared a Notice of Sale (a copy of which is attached hereto as <u>Exhibit A</u> and incorporated herein by this reference) setting forth the details of and the bid requirements for the Notes and indicating that the Notes would be offered for public sale on June 16, 2020;

WHEREAS, the County Clerk (in consultation with Ehlers) caused a form of notice of the sale to be published and/or announced and caused the Notice of Sale to be distributed to potential bidders offering the Notes for public sale on June 16, 2020;

WHEREAS, the County has duly received bids for the Notes as described on the Bid Tabulation attached hereto as <u>Exhibit B</u> and incorporated herein by this reference (the "Bid Tabulation"); and

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the bid proposal (the "Proposal") submitted by the financial institution listed first on the Bid Tabulation fully complies with the bid requirements set forth in the Notice of Sale and is deemed to be the most advantageous to the County. Ehlers has recommended that the County accept the Proposal. A copy of said Proposal submitted by such institution (the "Purchaser") is attached hereto as <u>Exhibit C</u> and incorporated herein by this reference

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Board of Supervisors of the County that:

<u>Section 1. Ratification of the Notice of Sale and Offering Materials</u>. The County Board of Supervisors hereby ratifies and approves the details of the Notes set forth in <u>Exhibit A</u> attached hereto as and for the details of the Notes. The Notice of Sale and any other offering materials prepared and circulated by Ehlers are hereby ratified and approved in all respects. All actions taken by officers of the County and Ehlers in connection with the preparation and distribution of the Notice of Sale, and any other offering materials are hereby ratified and approved in all respects.

Section 1A. Authorization and Award of the Notes. For the purpose of paying the cost of the Project and the Refunding, there shall be borrowed pursuant to Section 67.12(12), Wisconsin Statutes, the principal sum of SEVENTEEN MILLION SIXTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$17,060,000) from the Purchaser in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Proposal. The Proposal of the Purchaser offering to purchase the Notes for the sum set forth on the Proposal, plus accrued interest to the date of delivery, resulting in a true interest cost as set forth on the Proposal, is hereby accepted. The Chairperson and County Clerk or other appropriate officers of the County are authorized and directed to execute an acceptance of the Proposal on behalf of the County. The good faith deposit of the Purchaser shall be applied in accordance with the Notice of Sale, and any good faith deposits submitted by unsuccessful bidders shall be promptly returned. The Notes shall bear interest at the rates set forth on the Proposal.

Section 2. Terms of the Notes. The Notes shall be designated "General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 2020A"; shall be issued in the aggregate principal amount of \$17,060,000; shall be dated July 1, 2020; shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof; shall be numbered R-1 and upward; and shall bear interest at the rates per annum and mature on the dates and in the principal amounts set forth on the Pricing Summary attached hereto as Exhibit D-1 and incorporated herein by this reference. Interest shall be computed upon the basis of a 360-day year of twelve 30-day months and will be rounded pursuant to the rules of the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board. The schedule of principal and interest payments due on the Notes is set forth on the Debt Service Schedule attached hereto as Exhibit D-2 and incorporated herein by this reference (the "Schedule").

Section 3. Redemption Provisions. The Notes maturing on September 1, 2027 and thereafter are subject to redemption prior to maturity, at the option of the County, on September 1, 2026 or on any date thereafter. Said Notes are redeemable as a whole or in part, and if in part, from maturities selected by the County, and within each maturity by lot, at the principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest to the date of redemption.

<u>Section 4. Form of the Notes</u>. The Notes shall be issued in registered form and shall be executed and delivered in substantially the form attached hereto as <u>Exhibit E</u> and incorporated herein by this reference.

Section 5. Tax Provisions.

(A) Direct Annual Irrepealable Tax Levy. For the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the Notes as the same becomes due, the full faith, credit and resources of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged, and there is hereby levied upon all of the taxable property of the County a direct annual irrepealable tax in the years 2020 through 2029 for the payments due in the years 2021 through 2030 in the amounts in the amounts set forth on the Schedule.

(B) Tax Collection. So long as any part of the principal of or interest on the Notes remains unpaid, the County shall be and continue without power to repeal such levy or obstruct the collection of said tax until all such payments have been made or provided for. After the issuance of the Notes, said tax shall be, from year to year, carried onto the tax roll of the County and collected in addition to all other taxes and in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes of the County for said years are collected, except that the amount of tax carried onto the tax roll may be reduced in any year by the amount of any surplus money in the Debt Service Fund Account created below.

(C) Additional Funds. If at any time there shall be on hand insufficient funds from the aforesaid tax levy to meet principal and/or interest payments on said Notes when due, the requisite amounts shall be paid from other funds of the County then available, which sums shall be replaced upon the collection of the taxes herein levied.

Section 6. Segregated Debt Service Fund Account.

(A) Creation and Deposits. There be and there hereby is established in the treasury of the County, if one has not already been created, a debt service fund, separate and distinct from every other fund, which shall be maintained in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Debt service or sinking funds established for obligations previously issued by the County may be considered as separate and distinct accounts within the debt service fund.

Within the debt service fund, there hereby is established a separate and distinct account designated as the "Debt Service Fund Account for General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 2020A, dated July 1, 2020" (the "Debt Service Fund Account") and such account shall be maintained until the indebtedness evidenced by the Notes is fully paid or otherwise extinguished. There shall be deposited into the Debt Service Fund Account (i) all accrued interest received by the County at the time of delivery of and payment for the Notes; (ii) any premium not used for the Refunding which may be received by the County above the par value of the Notes and accrued interest thereon; (iii) all money raised by the taxes herein levied and any amounts appropriated for the specific purpose of meeting principal of and interest on the Notes when due; (iv) such other sums as may be necessary at any time to pay principal of and interest on the Notes when due; (v) surplus monies in the Borrowed Money Fund as specified below; and (vi) such further deposits as may be required by Section 67.11, Wisconsin Statutes.

(B) Use and Investment. No money shall be withdrawn from the Debt Service Fund Account and appropriated for any purpose other than the payment of principal of and interest on the Notes until all such principal and interest has been paid in full and the Notes canceled; provided (i) the funds to provide for each payment of principal of and interest on the Notes prior to the scheduled receipt of taxes from the next succeeding tax collection may be invested in direct obligations of the United States of America maturing in time to make such payments when they are due or in other investments permitted by law; and (ii) any funds over and above the amount of such principal and interest payments on the Notes may be used to reduce the next succeeding tax levy, or may, at the option of the County, be invested by purchasing the Notes as permitted by and subject to Section 67.11(2)(a), Wisconsin Statutes, or in permitted municipal investments under the pertinent provisions of the Wisconsin Statutes ("Permitted Investments"), which investments shall continue to be a part of the Debt Service Fund Account. Any investment of the Debt Service Fund Account shall at all times conform with the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code") and any applicable Treasury Regulations (the "Regulations").

(C) Remaining Monies. When all of the Notes have been paid in full and canceled, and all Permitted Investments disposed of, any money remaining in the Debt Service Fund Account shall be transferred and deposited in the general fund of the County, unless the County Board of Supervisors directs otherwise.

Section 7. Proceeds of the Notes; Segregated Borrowed Money Fund. The proceeds of the Notes (the "Note Proceeds") (other than any premium not used for the Refunding and accrued interest which must be paid at the time of the delivery of the Notes into the Debt Service Fund Account created above) shall be deposited into a special fund (the "Borrowed Money Fund") separate and distinct from all other funds of the County and disbursed solely for the purpose or purposes for which borrowed. In no event shall monies in the Borrowed Money Fund be used to fund operating expenses of the general fund of the County or of any special revenue fund of the County that is supported by property taxes. Monies in the Borrowed Money Fund may be temporarily invested in Permitted Investments. Any monies, including any income from Permitted Investments, remaining in the Borrowed Money Fund after the purpose or purposes for which the Notes have been issued have been accomplished, and, at any time, any monies as are not needed and which obviously thereafter cannot be needed for such purpose(s) shall be deposited in the Debt Service Fund Account.

Section 8. No Arbitrage. All investments made pursuant to this Resolution shall be Permitted Investments, but no such investment shall be made in such a manner as would cause the Notes to be "arbitrage bonds" within the meaning of Section 148 of the Code or the Regulations and an officer of the County, charged with the responsibility for issuing the Notes, shall certify as to facts, estimates, circumstances and reasonable expectations in existence on the date of delivery of the Notes to the Purchaser which will permit the conclusion that the Notes are not "arbitrage bonds," within the meaning of the Code or Regulations.

Section 9. Compliance with Federal Tax Laws. (a) The County represents and covenants that the projects financed by the Notes and by the Refunded Obligations and the ownership, management and use of the projects will not cause the Notes and the Refunded Obligations to be "private activity bonds" within the meaning of Section 141 of the Code. The County further covenants that it shall comply with the provisions of the Code to the extent necessary to maintain the tax-exempt status of the interest on the Notes including, if applicable, the rebate requirements of Section 148(f) of the Code. The County further covenants that it will not take any action, omit to take any action or permit the taking or omission of any action within its control (including, without limitation, making or permitting any use of the proceeds of the Notes) if taking, permitting or omitting to take such action would cause any of the Notes to be an arbitrage bond or a private activity bond within the meaning of the Code or would otherwise cause interest on the Notes to be included in the gross income of the recipients thereof for federal income tax purposes. The County Clerk or other officer of the County charged with the responsibility of issuing the Notes shall provide an appropriate certificate of the County certifying that the County can and covenanting that it will comply with the provisions of the Code and Regulations.

(b)The County also covenants to use its best efforts to meet the requirements and restrictions of any different or additional federal legislation which may be made applicable to the Notes provided that in meeting such requirements the County will do so only to the extent consistent with the proceedings authorizing the Notes and the laws of the State of Wisconsin and to the extent that there is a reasonable period of time in which to comply.

Section 10. Execution of the Notes; Closing; Professional Services. The Notes shall be issued in printed form, executed on behalf of the County by the manual or facsimile signatures of the Chairperson and County Clerk, authenticated, if required, by the Fiscal Agent (defined below), sealed with its official or corporate seal, if any, or a facsimile thereof, and delivered to the Purchaser upon payment to the County of the purchase price thereof, plus accrued interest to the date of delivery (the "Closing"). The facsimile signature of either of the officers executing the Notes may be imprinted on the Notes in lieu of the manual signature of the officer but, unless the County has contracted with a fiscal agent to authenticate the Notes, at least one of the signatures appearing on each Note shall be a manual signature. In the event that either of the officers whose signatures appear on the Notes shall cease to be such officers before the Closing, such signatures shall, nevertheless, be valid and sufficient for all purposes to the same extent as if they had remained in office until the Closing. The aforesaid officers are hereby authorized and directed to do all acts and execute and deliver the Notes and all such documents, certificates and acknowledgements as may be necessary and convenient to effectuate the Closing. The County hereby authorizes the officers and agents of the County to enter into, on its behalf, agreements and contracts in conjunction with the Notes, including but not limited to agreements and contracts for legal, trust, fiscal agency, disclosure and continuing disclosure, and rebate calculation services. Any such contract heretofore entered into in conjunction with the issuance of the Notes is hereby ratified and approved in all respects.

Section 11. Payment of the Notes; Fiscal Agent. The principal of and interest on the Notes shall be paid by Bond Trust Services Corporation, Roseville Minnesota, which is hereby appointed as the County's registrar and fiscal agent pursuant to the provisions of Section 67.10(2), Wisconsin Statutes (the "Fiscal Agent"). The County hereby authorizes the Chairperson and County Clerk or other appropriate officers of the County to enter a Fiscal Agency Agreement between the County and the Fiscal Agent. Such contract may provide, among other things, for the performance by the Fiscal Agent of the functions listed in Wis. Stats. Sec. 67.10(2)(a) to (j), where applicable, with respect to the Notes.

Section 12. Persons Treated as Owners; Transfer of Notes. The County shall cause books for the registration and for the transfer of the Notes to be kept by the Fiscal Agent. The person in whose name any Note shall be registered shall be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes and payment of either principal or interest on any Note shall be made only to the registered owner thereof. All such payments shall be valid and effectual to satisfy and discharge the liability upon such Note to the extent of the sum or sums so paid.

Any Note may be transferred by the registered owner thereof by surrender of the Note at the office of the Fiscal Agent, duly endorsed for the transfer or accompanied by an assignment duly executed by the registered owner or his attorney duly authorized in writing. Upon such transfer, the Chairperson and County Clerk shall execute and deliver in the name of the transferee or transferees a new Note or Notes of a like aggregate principal amount, series and maturity and the Fiscal Agent shall record the name of each transferee in the registration book. No registration shall be made to bearer. The Fiscal Agent shall cancel any Note surrendered for transfer.

The County shall cooperate in any such transfer, and the Chairperson and County Clerk are authorized to execute any new Note or Notes necessary to effect any such transfer.

Section 13. Record Date. The 15th day of the calendar month next preceding each interest payment date shall be the record date for the Notes (the "Record Date"). Payment of interest on the Notes on any interest payment date shall be made to the registered owners of the Notes as they appear on the registration book of the County at the close of business on the Record Date.

Section 14. Utilization of The Depository Trust Company Book-Entry-Only System. In order to make the Notes eligible for the services provided by The Depository Trust Company, New York, New York ("DTC"), the County agrees to the applicable provisions set forth in the Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations, which the County Clerk or other authorized representative of the County is authorized and directed to execute and deliver to DTC on behalf of the County to the extent an effective Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations is not presently on file in the County Clerk's office.

<u>Section 15. Payment of Issuance Expenses</u>. The County authorizes the Purchaser to forward the amount of the proceeds of the Notes allocable to the payment of issuance expenses to Old National Bank at Closing for further distribution as directed by Ehlers.

Section 16. Official Statement. The County Board of Supervisors hereby approves the Preliminary Official Statement with respect to the Notes and deems the Preliminary Official Statement as "final" as of its date for purposes of SEC Rule 15c2-12 promulgated by the Securities and Exchange Commission pursuant to the Securities and Exchange Act of 1934 (the "Rule"). All actions taken by officers of the County in connection with the preparation of such Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda to it or final Official Statement are hereby ratified and approved. In connection with the Closing, the appropriate County official shall certify the Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda or final Official Statement. The County Clerk shall cause copies of the Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda or final Official Statement to be distributed to the Purchaser.

Section 17. Undertaking to Provide Continuing Disclosure. The County hereby covenants and agrees, for the benefit of the owners of the Notes, to enter into a written undertaking (the "Undertaking") if required by the Rule to provide continuing disclosure of certain financial information and operating data and timely notices of the occurrence of certain events in accordance with the Rule. The Undertaking shall be enforceable by the owners of the Notes or by the Purchaser on behalf of such owners (provided that the rights of the owners and the Purchaser to enforce the Undertaking shall be limited to a right to obtain specific performance of the obligations thereunder and any failure by the County to comply with the provisions of the Undertaking shall not be an event of default with respect to the Notes).

To the extent required under the Rule, the Chairperson and County Clerk, or other officer of the County charged with the responsibility for issuing the Notes, shall provide a Continuing Disclosure Certificate for inclusion in the transcript of proceedings, setting forth the details and terms of the County's Undertaking.

Section 18. Redemption of the Refunded Obligations. The Refunded Obligations due on September 1, 2021 are hereby called for prior payment and redemption on September 1, 2020 at a price of par plus accrued interest to the date of redemption.

The County hereby directs the County Clerk to work with Ehlers to cause timely notice of redemption, in substantially the form attached hereto as <u>Exhibit F</u> and incorporated herein by this reference (the "Notice"), to be provided at the times, to the parties and in the manner set forth on the Notice. Any and all actions heretofore taken by the officers and agents of the County to effectuate the redemption of the Refunded Obligations are hereby ratified and approved.

<u>Section 19. Record Book</u>. The County Clerk shall provide and keep the transcript of proceedings as a separate record book (the "Record Book") and shall record a full and correct statement of every step or proceeding had or taken in the course of authorizing and issuing the Notes in the Record Book.

Section 20. Bond Insurance. If the Purchaser determines to obtain municipal bond insurance with respect to the Notes, the officers of the County are authorized to take all actions necessary to obtain such municipal bond insurance. The Chairperson and County Clerk are authorized to agree to such additional provisions as the bond insurer may reasonably request and which are acceptable to the Chairperson and County Clerk including provisions regarding restrictions on investment of Note proceeds, the payment procedure under the municipal bond insurance policy, the rights of the bond insurer in the event of default and payment of the Notes by the bond insurer and notices to be given to the bond insurer. In addition, any reference required by the bond insurer to the municipal bond insurance policy shall be made in the form of Note provided herein.

Section 21. Conflicting Resolutions; Severability; Effective Date. All prior resolutions, rules or other actions of the County Board of Supervisors or any parts thereof in conflict with the provisions hereof shall be, and the same are, hereby rescinded insofar as the same may so conflict. In the event that any one or more provisions hereof shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any other provisions hereof. The foregoing shall take effect immediately upon adoption and approval in the manner provided by law. ADOPTED: June 16, 2020

AUTHORIZING A 2020 BUDGET TRANSFER OF CAPITAL PROJECTS FUNDS

WHEREAS, Based on tracking of the actual expenditure of capital funds, and the tracking of funds received for capital projects yet to be completed in 2020, the Finance Department has determined that there are excess capital funds available from budgeted projects that have been completed; and,

WHEREAS, The funds for these two projects will come from the following completed capital projects where there are excess funds in the following amounts: computer lab expansion - \$19,196, fleet replacement - \$1,493, food chopper - \$992, IS infrastructure projects - \$102,598.

The Town of Pleasant Valley would be responsible by a Hold Harmless Agreement signed with the County for all inspections, clean-up, and costs.

WHEREAS, further savings will come from suspending the July 2020 step increase in wages as set forth in Policy 519, Section 213 of the Employee policy Manual, voluntary furloughs, not filling vacant positions, and additional operational adjustments; and,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED; that the Eau Claire County Board authorizes closing county facilities and functions except for law enforcement, the Airport and 24-hour operations on the following days: July 24, 2020; August 21, 2020; September 18, 2020, October 16, 2020; November 13, 2020 and December 18, 2020. All County employees will be furloughed without pay on those days; with the following exceptions: Law enforcement Officers, Correctional Officers, employees of the Northwest Regional Juvenile Detention Center, Airport workers, Meals on Wheels workers, workers who are called into work to provide crisis or emergency services, the minimal amount of staff necessary from the Clerk of Courts, Register in Probate, and facilities department necessary to support court operations on the planned furlough days. Highway workers are subject to the language stated below; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the annual step increase scheduled to take place during the first pay period of July, of every year and found in Section 519, subsection 2.3 of the Employee Policy Manual, is suspended retroactively to July 1, 2020, only for the year 2020; and

REQUESTING ASSISTANCE FROM THE STATE OF WISCONSIN IN LIGHT OF THE VERSO PAPER MILL CLOSURES

WHEREAS, On June 9, Verso announced idling of their Duluth, MN and Wisconsin Rapids, WI pulp and paper mills by the end of July 2020 for an indefinite period; and

WHEREAS, the idling of these mills will directly impact 1,000 workers and indirectly affect thousands more across the entire state of Wisconsin that support the mills through related forestry work such as logging and transportation; and

WHEREAS, the prolonged closure of these mills will negatively affect national, state, county and private landowners financially and has the potential to affect the ability to continue proper growth and harvesting techniques on those lands to maintain a healthy forest structure; and

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Rapids, WI mill utilizes over 25% of all pulpwood produced in the state of Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, the forest products industry is responsible for over 600 jobs in Eau Claire County; and

WHEREAS, 38 % of total pulpwood on active sales in Eau Claire County is hardwood pulp, of which over 15% would be consumed at the Wisconsin Rapids mill; and

WHEREAS, timber revenue from the Eau Claire County Forest reduces the County levy by 5-8% and the loss of this income will financially affect the citizens of Eau Claire County and the public services available to them; and

WHEREAS, a similar impact will be felt by nearly every County operating a County Forest for timber production. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, The Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors is requesting that the Governor and Legislature work to provide direct assistance, in any way possible, to allow continuation of mill operations and/or financial assistance be considered to support the direct loss of jobs, as well as assistance for other industries impacted by the closure.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the State of Wisconsin work with Counties to identify new markets for forest products and provide flexibility and assistance to replace lost revenues.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Eau Claire County Clerk is directed to forward this resolution to Wisconsin Counties Association (WCA), Wisconsin County Forests Association (WCFA) and all local, regional, state, and federal representatives.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors request the Wisconsin State Senate to convene into an extraordinary session to address the 13 "Water Bills" passed in the Assembly earlier this year.

RACISM IS A PUBLIC HEALTH CRISIS

WHEREAS, race is a social construction with no biologic basis; and

WHEREAS, racism is a social system with multiple dimensions: individual racism is internalized or interpersonal; and systemic racism is institutional or structural, and is a system of structuring opportunity and assigning value based on the social interpretation of how one looks, that unfairly disadvantages some individuals and communities, unfairly advantages other individuals and communities, and saps the strength of the whole society through the waste of human resources; and

WHEREAS, racism causes persistent racial discrimination in housing, education, employment, and criminal justice; and an emerging body of research demonstrates that racism is a social determinant of health; and

WHEREAS, more than 100 studies have linked racism to worse health outcomes; and

WHEREAS, in Wisconsin, the highest excess death rates exist for African American and Native Americans, at every stage in the life course, and our infant mortality rate for infants of non-Hispanic Black Women is the highest in the nation; and

WHEREAS, the American Public Health Association (APHA) launched a National Campaign Against Racism; and

WHEREAS, Healthiest Wisconsin 2020 states that, "Wisconsin must address persistent disparities in health outcomes, and the social, economic, educational and environmental inequities that contribute to them"; and

WHEREAS, public health's responsibilities to address racism include reshaping our discourse and agenda so that we all actively engage in racial justice work; and

WHEREAS, while there is no epidemiologic definition of "crisis", the health impact of racism clearly rises to the definition proposed by Galea: "The problem must affect large numbers of people, it must threaten health over the long-term, and it must require the adoption of large- scale solutions".

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors: Asserts that racism is a public health crisis affecting our entire society

1. Conducts an assessment of internal policy and procedures to ensure racial equity is a core element of Eau Claire County, led by people who are most impacted, the Board in collaboration with Eau Claire County Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion Committee, and other relevant parties and community partners, communicates results of assessment, and determines appropriate intervals for ongoing reassessments

2. Works to create an equity and justice-oriented organization, with the Board and Committees, and persons who are most impacted, in identifying specific activities to increase diversity and to incorporate anti-racist policies and principles across Eau Claire County.

3. Incorporates into the organizational workplan and Eau Claire County's strategic plan, educational efforts to address and dismantle racism, expand members' understanding of racism, and how racism affects individual and population health and provide tools to assist members to dismantle their own racism, and tools to assist members to engage actively and authentically with persons from underrepresented groups and persons most impacted by racism. Eau Claire County is committed to having people who are most underrepresented and most impacted lead this work.

4. Advocates for relevant policies that improve health in persons from racial minority demographics, and supports local, state, and federal initiatives that advance social justice, while also encouraging individual member advocacy to dismantle systemic racism

5. Works to build alliances and partnerships with other organizations that are confronting racism and encourages other local, state and national entities to recognize racism as a public health crisis

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors directs the County Clerk to send a copy of this resolution to Governor Tony Evers, all Wisconsin State Legislators, and the Wisconsin Counties Association.

The Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors now directs the County Clerk to sign Eau Claire County on to the Wisconsin Public Health Association's declaration that Racism is a Public Health Crisis.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Library Planning Committee shall review the current library services agreement, the current Library Services Plan and explore changes to the agreement/plan, including the possible creation of a public library system under Wis. Stats §§ 43.19 or 43.21, and submit its report and recommendations to the Committee on Administration, library boards and chief elected officers in the County no later than December 31, 2020; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the County Board Chairman is authorized to appoint members of the Library Planning Committee.

WHEREAS, entering into a cooperative agreement with Beaver Creek Reserve will assist Eau Claire County achieve the goals of natural resources conservation,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors authorizes the land conservation manager to act on behalf of Eau Claire County to:

- Complete correspondence with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources of the county's intent to participate in a multi-county network providing Aquatic Invasive Species and Lake services; and
- Complete grant applications as required by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources; and
- Sign a cooperative agreement with Beaver Creek Reserve that will identify Beaver Creek Reserve as a "Designated Agent" for the Aquatic Invasives Species programs; and

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND ESTABLISHING PARAMETERS FOR THE SALE OF NOT TO EXCEED \$14,000,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION REFUNDING BONDS, SERIES 2021A

WHEREAS, the County Board of Supervisors hereby finds and determines that it is necessary, desirable and in the best interest of Eau Claire County, Wisconsin (the "County") to raise funds to pay the cost of refinancing certain outstanding obligations of the County, specifically, the General Obligation Building Bonds, Series 2011B, dated December 22, 2011 maturing on and after September 1, 2022 (the "Refunded Obligations") (hereinafter the refinancing of the Refunded Obligations shall be referred to as the "Refunding");

WHEREAS, the County Board of Supervisors deems it to be necessary, desirable and in the best interest of the County to refund the Refunded Obligations for the purpose of achieving debt service savings;

WHEREAS, the County is authorized by the provisions of Section 67.04, Wisconsin Statutes, to borrow money and issue general obligation refunding bonds to refinance its outstanding obligations;

WHEREAS, it is the finding of the County Board of Supervisors that it is necessary, desirable and in the best interest of the County to authorize the issuance of and to sell the general obligation refunding bonds (the "Bonds") to Morgan Stanley Municipal Funding, Inc. (or other party named in the Proposal (defined below) (the "Purchaser");

WHEREAS, the Purchaser intends to submit a Forward Delivery Bond Purchase Agreement in substantially the form attached hereto as <u>Exhibit A</u> to the County (the "Proposal") offering to purchase the Bonds in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in the Proposal;

WHEREAS, the County has determined that it is desirable and in its best interest to lock in interest rates on the Bonds that are available in the current market and then issue the Bonds when they can be issued as tax-exempt bonds in June, 2021; and

WHEREAS, in order to facilitate the sale of the Bonds to the Purchaser in a timely manner, the County Board of Supervisors hereby finds and determines that it is necessary, desirable and in the best interest of the County to delegate to (a) the Finance Director and (b) either the County Administrator or the County Clerk of the County (collectively,

the "Authorized Officers") the authority to accept the Proposal on behalf of the County so long as the Proposal meets the terms and conditions set forth in this Resolution by executing a certificate in substantially the form attached hereto as <u>Exhibit B</u> and incorporated herein by reference (the "Approving Certificate").

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Board of Supervisors of the County that:

Section 20. Authorization and Sale of the Bonds; Parameters. For the purpose of paying costs of the Refunding, there shall be borrowed pursuant to Section 67.04, Wisconsin Statutes, the principal sum of not to exceed FOURTEEN MILLION DOLLARS (\$14,000,000) from the Purchaser upon the terms and subject to the conditions set forth in this Resolution. Subject to satisfaction of the conditions set forth in Section 17 of this Resolution, the Chairperson and County Clerk are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to make, execute, issue and sell to the Purchaser for, on behalf of and in the name of the County, Bonds aggregating the principal amount of not to exceed FOURTEEN MILLION DOLLARS (\$14,000,000). The purchase price to be paid to the County for the Bonds shall not be less than 99% of the principal amount of the Bonds.

<u>Section 21. Terms of the Bonds</u>. The Bonds shall be designated "General Obligation Refunding Bonds, Series 2021A"; shall be issued in the aggregate principal amount of up to \$14,000,000; shall be dated their date of issuance which is currently contemplated to be June 15, 2021 in the Proposal; shall be in the denomination of \$100,000 and any integral multiple of \$5,000 in excess thereof; shall be numbered R-1 and upward; and mature on the dates and in the principal amounts set forth below, provided that the principal amount of each maturity amount may be increased or decreased by up to \$500,000 per maturity and that the aggregate principal amount of the Bonds shall not exceed \$14,000,000. The schedule below assumes the Bonds are issued in the aggregate principal amount of \$11,835,000.

Interest shall be payable semi-annually on March 1 and September 1 of each year commencing on March 1, 2022. Interest shall be computed upon the basis of a 360-day year of twelve 30-day months and will be rounded pursuant to the rules of the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board.

The present value debt service savings achieved by the Refunding shall be at least \$1,500,000 (the "Savings").

Section 22. Redemption Provisions. The Bonds are not subject to redemption prior to maturity.

<u>Section 4. Authorization of the Proposal</u>. The provisions and terms included in the Proposal attached hereto are hereby approved. Subject to satisfaction of the conditions in Section 17, the Authorized Officers are hereby authorized to execute the Proposal with such insertions or deletions as the County's Corporation Counsel deems are consistent with this Resolution. The Authorized Officers are hereby authorized to execute and deliver any documents or take any other actions required under the Proposal to effectuate the Closing and Settlement Date, as those terms are defined in the Proposal. The County hereby states that all representations in Section 2 of the Proposal are true and correct. Section 5. Form of the Bonds. The Bonds shall be issued in registered form and shall be executed and delivered in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit C and incorporated herein by this reference.

Section 6. Tax Provisions.

(A) Direct Annual Irrepealable Tax Levy. For the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the Bonds as the same becomes due, the full faith, credit and resources of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged, and there is hereby levied upon all of the taxable property of the County a direct annual irrepealable tax in the years 2021 through 2030 for the payments due in the years 2022 through 2031 in the amounts as are sufficient to meet the principal and interest payments when due which amounts shall be set forth as a schedule to be attached to the Approving Certificate.

(B) Tax Collection. So long as any part of the principal of or interest on the Bonds remains unpaid, the County shall be and continue without power to repeal such levy or obstruct the collection of said tax until all such payments have been made or provided for. After the issuance of the Bonds, said tax shall be, from year to year, carried onto the tax roll of the County and collected in addition to all other taxes and in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes of the County for said years are collected, except that the amount of tax carried onto the tax roll may be reduced in any year by the amount of any surplus money in the Debt Service Fund Account created below.

(C) Additional Funds. If at any time there shall be on hand insufficient funds from the aforesaid tax levy to meet principal and/or interest payments on said Bonds when due, the requisite amounts shall be paid from other funds of the County then available, which sums shall be replaced upon the collection of the taxes herein levied.

Section 7. Segregated Debt Service Fund Account.

(A) Creation and Deposits. There be and there hereby is established in the treasury of the County, if one has not already been created, a debt service fund, separate and distinct from every other fund, which shall be maintained in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Debt service or sinking funds established for obligations previously issued by the County may be considered as separate and distinct accounts within the debt service fund.

Within the debt service fund, there hereby is established a separate and distinct account designated as the "Debt Service Fund Account for General Obligation Refunding Bonds - 2021" (the "Debt Service Fund Account") and such account shall be maintained until the indebtedness evidenced by the Bonds is fully paid or otherwise extinguished. There shall be deposited into the Debt Service Fund Account (i) all accrued interest received by the County at the time of delivery of and payment for the Bonds; (ii) any premium not used for the Refunding which may be received by the County above the par value of the Bonds and accrued interest thereon; (iii) all money raised by the taxes herein levied and any amounts appropriated for the specific purpose of meeting principal of and interest on the Bonds when due; (iv) such other sums as may be necessary at any time to pay principal of and interest on the Bonds when due; (v) surplus monies in the Borrowed Money Fund as specified below; and (vi) such further deposits as may be required by Section 67.11, Wisconsin Statutes.

(B) Use and Investment. No money shall be withdrawn from the Debt Service Fund Account and appropriated for any purpose other than the payment of principal of and interest on the Bonds until all such principal and interest has been paid in full and the Bonds canceled; provided (i) the funds to provide for each payment of principal of and interest on the Bonds prior to the scheduled receipt of taxes from the next succeeding tax collection may be invested in direct obligations of the United States of America maturing in time to make such payments when they are due or in other investments permitted by law; and (ii) any funds over and above the amount of such principal and interest payments on the Bonds may be used to reduce the next succeeding tax levy, or may, at the option of the County, be invested by purchasing the Bonds as permitted by and subject to Section 67.11(2)(a), Wisconsin Statutes, or in permitted municipal investments under the pertinent provisions of the Wisconsin Statutes ("Permitted Investments"), which investments shall continue to be a part of the Debt Service Fund Account. Any investment of the Debt Service Fund Account shall at all times conform with the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code") and any applicable Treasury Regulations (the "Regulations").

(C) Remaining Monies. When all of the Bonds have been paid in full and canceled, and all Permitted Investments disposed of, any money remaining in the Debt Service Fund Account shall be transferred and deposited in the general fund of the County, unless the County Board of Supervisors directs otherwise.

Section 8. Proceeds of the Bonds; Segregated Borrowed Money Fund. The proceeds of the Bonds (the "Bond Proceeds") (other than any premium not used for the Refunding and accrued interest which must be paid at the time of the delivery of the Bonds into the Debt Service Fund Account created above) shall be deposited into a special fund (the "Borrowed Money Fund") separate and distinct from all other funds of the County and disbursed solely for the purpose or purposes for which borrowed. In no event shall monies in the Borrowed Money Fund be used to fund operating expenses of the general fund of the County or of any special revenue fund of the County that is supported by property taxes. Monies in the Borrowed Money Fund may be temporarily invested in Permitted Investments. Any monies, including any income from Permitted Investments, remaining in the Borrowed Money Fund after the purpose or purposes for which the Bonds have been issued have been accomplished, and, at any time, any monies as are not needed and which obviously thereafter cannot be needed for such purpose(s) shall be deposited in the Debt Service Fund Account.

<u>Section 9. No Arbitrage</u>. All investments made pursuant to this Resolution shall be Permitted Investments, but no such investment shall be made in such a manner as would cause the Bonds to be "arbitrage bonds" within the meaning of Section 148 of the Code or the Regulations and an officer of the County, charged with the responsibility for issuing the Bonds, shall certify as to facts, estimates, circumstances and reasonable expectations in existence on the date of delivery of the Bonds to the Purchaser which will permit the conclusion that the Bonds are not "arbitrage bonds," within the meaning of the Code or Regulations.

<u>Section 10. Compliance with Federal Tax Laws</u>. (a) The County represents and covenants that the projects financed by the Bonds and by the Refunded Obligations and the ownership, management and use of the projects will not cause the Bonds and the Refunded Obligations to be "private activity bonds" within the meaning of Section 141 of the Code. The County further covenants that it shall comply with the provisions of the Code to the extent necessary to maintain the tax-exempt status of the interest on the Bonds including, if applicable, the rebate requirements of Section 148(f) of the Code. The County further covenants that it will not take any action, omit to take any action or permit the taking or omission of any action within its control (including, without limitation, making or permitting any use of the proceeds of the Bonds) if taking, permitting or omitting to take such action would cause any of the Bonds to be an arbitrage bond or a private activity bond within the meaning of the Code or would otherwise cause interest on the Bonds to be included in the gross income of the recipients thereof for federal income tax purposes. The County Clerk or other officer of the County charged with the responsibility of issuing the Bonds shall provide an appropriate certificate of the County certifying that the County can and covenanting that it will comply with the provisions of the Code and Regulations.

(b)The County also covenants to use its best efforts to meet the requirements and restrictions of any different or additional federal legislation which may be made applicable to the Bonds provided that in meeting such requirements the County will do so only to the extent consistent with the proceedings authorizing the Bonds and the laws of the State of Wisconsin and to the extent that there is a reasonable period of time in which to comply.

Section 11. Execution of the Bonds; Closing; Professional Services. The Bonds shall be issued in printed form, executed on behalf of the County by the manual or facsimile signatures of the Chairperson and County Clerk, authenticated, if required, by the Fiscal Agent (defined below), sealed with its official or corporate seal, if any, or a facsimile thereof, and delivered to the Purchaser upon payment to the County of the purchase price thereof, plus accrued interest to the date of delivery (the "Closing"). The facsimile signature of either of the officers executing the Bonds may be imprinted on the Bonds in lieu of the manual signature of the officer but, unless the County has contracted with a fiscal agent to authenticate the Bonds, at least one of the signatures appearing on each Bond shall be a manual signature. In the event that either of the officers whose signatures appear on the Bonds shall cease to be such officers before the Closing, such signatures shall, nevertheless, be valid and sufficient for all purposes to the same extent as if they had remained in office until the Closing. The aforesaid officers are hereby authorized and directed to do all acts and execute and deliver the Bonds and all such documents, certificates and acknowledgements as may be necessary and convenient to effectuate the Closing. The County hereby authorizes the officers and agents of the County to enter into, on its behalf, agreements and contracts in conjunction with the Bonds, including but not limited to agreements and contracts for legal, trust, fiscal agency, disclosure and continuing disclosure, and rebate calculation services. Any such contract heretofore entered into in conjunction with the issuance of the Bonds is hereby ratified and approved in all respects.

<u>Section 12. Payment of the Bonds; Fiscal Agent</u>. The principal of and interest on the Bonds shall be paid by the County Clerk or the County Treasurer (the "Fiscal Agent").

Section 13. Persons Treated as Owners; Transfer of Bonds. The County shall cause books for the registration and for the transfer of the Bonds to be kept by the Fiscal Agent. The person in whose name any Bond shall be registered shall be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes and payment of either principal or interest on any Bond shall be made only to the registered owner thereof. All such payments shall be valid and effectual to satisfy and discharge the liability upon such Bond to the extent of the sum or sums so paid.

Any Bond may be transferred by the registered owner thereof by surrender of the Bond at the office of the Fiscal Agent, duly endorsed for the transfer or accompanied by an assignment duly executed by the registered owner or his attorney duly authorized in writing. Upon such transfer, the Chairperson and County Clerk shall execute and deliver in the name of the transferee or transferees a new Bond or Bonds of a like aggregate principal amount, series and maturity and the Fiscal Agent shall record the name of each transferee in the registration book. No registration shall be made to bearer. The Fiscal Agent shall cancel any Bond surrendered for transfer.

The County shall cooperate in any such transfer, and the Chairperson and County Clerk are authorized to execute any new Bond or Bonds necessary to effect any such transfer.

<u>Section 14. Record Date</u>. The 15th day of the calendar month next preceding each interest payment date shall be the record date for the Bonds (the "Record Date"). Payment of interest on the Bonds on any interest payment date shall be made to the registered owners of the Bonds as they appear on the registration book of the County at the close of business on the Record Date.

Section 15. Utilization of The Depository Trust Company Book-Entry-Only System. In order to make the Bonds eligible for the services provided by The Depository Trust Company, New York, New York ("DTC"), the County agrees to the applicable provisions set forth in the Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations, which the County Clerk or other authorized representative of the County is authorized and directed to execute and deliver to DTC on behalf of the County to the extent an effective Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations is not presently on file in the County Clerk's office.

<u>Section 16. Payment of Issuance Expenses</u>. The County authorizes the Purchaser to forward the amount of the proceeds of the Bonds allocable to the payment of issuance expenses to Old National Bank at Closing for further distribution as directed by Ehlers & Associates, Inc.

<u>Section 17. Conditions on Issuance and Sale of the Bonds</u>. The issuance of the Bonds and the sale of the Bonds to the Purchaser are subject to satisfaction of the following conditions:

(a)approval by the Authorized Officers of the principal amount, definitive maturities, interest rates and purchase price for the Bonds, which approval shall be evidenced by execution by the Authorized Officers of the Approving Certificate; and

(b) realization by the County of the Savings described in Section 2 hereof.

The Bonds shall not be issued, sold or delivered until these conditions are satisfied. Upon satisfaction of these conditions, the Authorized Officers are authorized to execute the Proposal.

<u>Section 18. Redemption of the Refunded Obligations</u>. Subject to the issuance of the Bonds, the Refunded Obligations are hereby called for prior payment and redemption on September 1, 2021 at a price of par plus accrued interest to the date of redemption.

After the Bonds have been issued, the County hereby directs the County Finance Director to work with Ehlers to cause timely notice of redemption, in substantially the form attached hereto as <u>Exhibit D</u> and incorporated herein by this reference (the "Notice"), to be provided at the times, to the parties and in the manner set forth on the Notice. Any and all actions heretofore taken by the officers and agents of the County to effectuate the redemption of the Refunded Obligations are hereby ratified and approved.

<u>Section 19. Record Book</u>. The County Clerk shall provide and keep the transcript of proceedings as a separate record book (the "Record Book") and shall record a full and correct statement of every step or proceeding had or taken in the course of authorizing and issuing the Bonds in the Record Book.

<u>Section 20. Conflicting Resolutions; Severability; Effective Date</u>. All prior resolutions, rules or other actions of the County Board of Supervisors or any parts thereof in conflict with the provisions hereof shall be, and the same are, hereby rescinded insofar as the same may so conflict. In the event that any one or more provisions hereof shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any other provisions hereof. AUTHORIZING THE FILLING OF THE "OPERATIONS ADMINISTRATOR" POSITION IN THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES

WHEREAS, the Department of Human Services has been under scrutiny for years due to budget pressures; and,

WHEREAS, lack of adequate funding combined with a reporting error of approximately \$1,200,000 in the 2019 end of year reconciliation has increased concern and resulted in perception of disarray; and,

WHEREAS, a recently completed audit by Clifton, Larson and Allen, indicates a recording error deemed immaterial; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Human Services experienced a theft by a prior employee and recognized some gaps in internal control processes which have been addressed, in conjunction with County Finance; and,

WHEREAS, the 2020 budget adopted the addition of an Operations Administrator, whose primary function is to guide and interconnect between programmatic areas and the finances of the department: and,

WHEREAS, the Department of Human Services, County Administration, and County Finance assess the need for increased administration, management and supervision within the Department of Human Services; and,

WHEREAS, currently there is a resolution circulating that calls for the expenditure of up to \$100,000 for a forensic audit of the finances of the Department of Human Services; and,

WHEREAS, a forensic audit is typically an examination of a company's financial records to derive evidence which could be used in a court of law or legal proceeding when there exists evidence of fraud; and,

WHEREAS, the request for the forensic audit has failed to state any action on the part of the Department of Human Services that would justify the expenditure of \$100,000 of the county's funds for a forensic audit; and,

WHEREAS, the Human Services Board is the governing committee of the Department of Human Services and believes that it is prudent to move forward with action that offers a pathway that ensures the structure supports the best practices and operations in place; and ,

WHEREAS, The Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors previously approved the creation of the FTE position of "Operations Administrator" for the Department of Human Services and has funded this position in the 2020 budget. Among other things, this position was created to continue development of needed systems and processes within the department, but, this position is currently being held open as the result of the County Board approved "Bridge Plan" that was created in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

WHEREAS, by authorizing the position of Operations Administrator to be removed from the list of positions that are being held open by the Bridge Plan the County Board would be taking action to provide resources necessary to continue to enhance the financial systems that support the departmental operations without the expenditure of additional funds.

NOW THEREFORE BE RESOLVED, The Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors authorizes removing the position of Operations Administrator from the list of positions that are currently being held open in response to the Bridge Plan that was created by Resolution No. 20-21.017, and authorizes the Department of Human Services to begin the process of recruitment to fill this position as soon as possible.

REQUESTING THAT THE GOVERNOR AND THE WISCONSIN STATE LEGISLATURE ALLOCATE \$15 MILLION ANNUALLY FOR GRANTS TO PUBLIC SAFETY ANSWERING POINTS (PSAP'S) THROUGH THE POLICE AND FIRE PROTECTION FUND FOR THE UPGRADE AND MAINTENANCE OF EQUIPMENT TO SUPPORT THE TRANSITION TO A DIGITAL NEXT GENERATION 911 (NG911); REQUESTING THE GOVERNOR AND WISCONSIN STATE LEGISLATURE TO SUPPORT THE DEPARTMENT OF MILITARY AFFAIRS BUDGET REQUEST TO CONTINUE THE BUILD OF THE ESINET FOR AN ANNUAL APPROPRIATION FOR THE ONGOING MAINTENANCE OF THE SYSTEM

WHEREAS, modernizing Wisconsin's 911 system has been a priority for local governments, Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs), law enforcement, and the telecommunications industry since the early 2000s; and

WHEREAS, the 2017-19 and the 2019-21 state biennial budgets provided funding for creation of a statewide emergency services IP network (ESInet), which is the first step in the transition to a digital Next Generation 911 (NG911) system; and

WHEREAS, a NG911 system utilizes advancements in technology to improve communication with 911 operators and provides greater efficiency in assisting individuals in crisis; and

WHEREAS, local 911 centers (PSAPs) require NG911 capable equipment to connect to the digital system; and

WHEREAS, currently many PSAPs require an upgrade of their equipment to NG911 or will require maintenance and security upgrades to their current NG911 capable equipment; and

WHEREAS, the average cost for the necessary equipment upgrades will likely exceed \$250,000 per county in addition to ongoing maintenance costs based on the number of call stations in the PSAP; and

WHEREAS, while the state has provided grant funding for counties in the past to upgrade local PSAPs, state funding has not existed in over a decade; and

WHEREAS, the state currently has a fund—the Police and Fire Protection Fund—which its original intent was to fund county PSAP upgrades; and

WHEREAS, revenue from the Police and Fire Protection Fund has been diverted to the state general fund and had never been utilized for its intended purpose.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Eau Claire County board of supervisors hereby request the Governor and Wisconsin State Legislature to allocate \$15 million annually for grants to PSAPS through the Police and Fire Protection Fund for the upgrade of their equipment and the ongoing maintenance and upgrades required; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of supervisors request that the Governor and Wisconsin State Legislature support the Department of Military Affairs budget request to continue the build of the ESInet for an annual appropriation for the ongoing maintenance of the system.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the Eau Claire County Clerk is directed to send a copy of this resolution to the Governor, Wisconsin State Legislature, members of the Assembly who represent Eau Claire County, and the Wisconsin County's Association.

GRANTING A UTILITY EASEMENT TO NORTHERN STATES POWER COMPANY AT THE CHIPPEWA VALLEY REGIONAL AIRPORT

WHEREAS, Northern State Power Company (NSP), a division of Xcel Energy, currently has underground utility lines located at the Chippewa Valley Regional Airport (CVRA) adjacent and parallel to Airport Road; and

WHEREAS, NSP has requested that Eau Claire County grant it a perpetual underground electrical distribution easement of approximately 10 feet in width to extend a new underground line from an existing junction box located on CVRA property adjacent to Airport road, and then heading from that junction box in a westerly direction towards Airport Road, where it will then go under Airport Road and serve a new residence on the west side of Airport Road. The easement is more fully described in the attached Exhibit A; and

WHEREAS, NSP has offered compensation in the amount of Five Hundred and No/100 Dollars (\$500.00) for the easement, which is approximately 871 square feet or approximately .02 acres.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors grants to NSP a ten-foot wide perpetual electrical underground distribution easement across a parcel of land located at the Chippewa Valley Regional Airport, more fully described in the attached Exhibit A, for the purchase price of Five Hundred and No/100 Dollars (\$500.00); and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County Clerk is authorized to sign the easement on behalf of Eau Claire County.

SUPPORT PENDING LEGISLATION TO AMEND HEARING TIME FRAMES FOR JUVENILES TAKEN INTO CUSTODY UNDER WISCONSIN STATUTES CHAPTER 938 TO COINCIDE WITH HEARING TIMELINES FOR CHILDREN TAKEN INTO CUSTODY UNDER WISCONSIN STATUTES CHAPTER 48

WHEREAS, in Children in Need of Protection or Services (CHIPS) proceedings pursuant to Wisconsin Statutes Chapter 48, when a child is taken into custody and not immediately released to a parent, guardian or legal custodian, the judge or circuit court commissioner in the county where the child is being held must hold a detention hearing within 48 hours of the time in which the decision to hold the child was made (excluding Saturdays, Sundays, and legal holidays); and

WHEREAS, in similar actions involving Juvenile Justice proceedings pursuant to Wisconsin Statutes Chapter 938, when a juvenile is taken into custody and held by a county, the circuit court must hold a detention hearing within 24 hours after the end of the day on which the decision to hold the juvenile was made (excluding Saturdays, Sundays, and legal holidays); and

WHEREAS, as a result of the discrepancy in the timelines between the Chapter 48 and Chapter 938 proceedings, in Chapter 938 cases county circuit court judges, commissioners, juvenile intake workers, and other courthouse staff need to be prepared to conduct hearings in circumstances in which the county courthouse may otherwise be closed, such as the Friday after Thanksgiving, extreme weather days, etc. Failing to meet the statutory deadlines places the county at risk of losing jurisdiction over the pending matter. Additionally, concerns may arise regarding transportation of juveniles and children on non-workdays in order to accommodate hearings.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors that it hereby supports legislation that would align the statutes that compute the detention hearing timelines for children in need of protection or services proceedings under Chapter 48 and juvenile delinquency proceedings under Chapter 938 by specifying that a day in which the Clerk of Circuit Courts Office is closed does not count toward the computation of the detention hearing timeline under Chapter 938. This will ensure county governments are in a heater protection to acut limited resources and protect the orfice of their employees and the public.

REQUESTING THAT THE STATE OF WISCONSIN PROVIDE INCREASED FUNDING FOR THE COUNTY CHILD SUPPORT PROGRAM

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County administers the child support program on behalf of the State of Wisconsin, providing services to Eau Claire County residents including but not limited to the establishment of paternity, the establishment and enforcement of child support and health insurance orders, and the review and modification of those orders; and

WHEREAS, well-being, economic security, and chances of success in life are all enhanced by parents who provide emotional and financial support; and

WHEREAS, the services provided by the Eau Claire County Child Support Agency help to establish parental rights, reduce childhood poverty rates, and promote the involvement of both parents in the lives of their children; and

WHEREAS, the services of the Eau Claire County Child Support Agency are needed now more than ever during the economic downturn caused by the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, funding from the state has failed to keep up with county agency costs that have steadily increased due to growing caseloads, inflation, and increased federal regulations; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin's Child Support Enforcement Program has fallen from being ranked number 2 in the nation for collecting child support to number 5 in the nation; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin's decreased performance has led to the state missing out on an estimated \$70,000 in potential federal incentive payments between the calendar year 2019 and 2020; and

WHEREAS, in 2019, a change at the federal level resulted in the loss of \$4.2 million to the state child support program due to the elimination of the federal birth cost recovery matching funds; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin's strong performance in child support is at risk without additional state funding. Further drops in performance would result in additional reductions to the federal funding allocated to the state of Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, a decrease in federal funding will result in less funding for the Eau Claire County Child Support Agency, which could lead to reductions in the services provided to the citizens of Eau Claire County, and the further reduction of child support collections; and

WHEREAS, investments by the state in child support are amplified by a federal match. Every dollar of state GPR invested in the child support program generates roughly two dollars in matching federal funds; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin's child support program is very cost-effective, collecting an average of \$6.20 in child support for every dollar invested into the program.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors requests that state funding for the county child support agencies be increased by a minimum of \$4.0 million GPR in each fiscal year of the 2021-2023 Wisconsin state budget, which in turn will generate approximately an additional \$7.7 million in additional federal funding for each year. This investment will allow Wisconsin counties to continue to provide economic support for the children of Wisconsin effectively.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the county clerk forward a copy of this resolution to the governor of the State of Wisconsin, members of the Wisconsin Legislature representing Eau Claire County, and the Secretary for the Wisconsin Department of Administration.

SUPPORTING THE CREATION OF THE CHIPPEWA-ST. CROIX RAIL COMMISSION WITH COUNTIES AND MUNICIPALITIES

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County has participated in efforts to expand passenger rail services into western Wisconsin and the Chippewa Valley along the I-94 corridor from St. Paul, Minnesota; and

WHEREAS, every day there are thousands of individuals who travel between the Twin Cities and the St. Croix Valley and the Chippewa Valley for purposes of commuting to work; conducting business; pursuing higher education; engaging in tourism, shopping, and recreation activities; and connecting to travel hubs for national and international travel; and

WHEREAS, both the Wisconsin State Rail Plan and the Minnesota State Rail Plan, federally mandated official transportation plans created by the respective states, include the Twin Cities-Eau Claire line as a planned future passenger rail route; and

WHEREAS, over the past several years, the West Central Wisconsin Rail Coalition has worked to develop partners to create a public-private partnership to bring passenger rail service to the West Central Wisconsin area, including the Chippewa Valley and the St. Croix Valley. This coalition was initially formed out of the Momentum West economic development organization and has seen interest or involvement from the counties and municipalities in the I-94 corridor, including the counties of Eau Claire, Chippewa, Dunn, St. Croix and Pierce, and the Village of Baldwin, and the cities of Hudson, New Richmond, River Falls, Menomonie, Eau Claire, Chippewa Falls, and Altoona; and

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Gateway Corridor Coalition, a similar predecessor initiative, was involved in the bi-state Gateway Corridor Study Alternative Analysis that showed promise for future public transportation in the Twin Cities-Eau Claire corridor; and

WHEREAS, the West Central Rail Wisconsin Coalition and its Passenger Rail Organizing Council has been working with Union Pacific Railroad, owner of the tracks, to implement passenger service, and Union Pacific Railroad has indicated that it will enter into a memorandum of understanding regarding service implementation upon satisfactory completion of an engineering study of the existing Union Pacific Railroad rail line to determine the need for capacity and capital improvements; and

WHEREAS, the continued planning and development of the rail corridor is critical to the transportation needs of the St. Croix Valley and the Chippewa Valley. It is necessary to have a multijurisdictional body independent of any one county or municipality to govern the implementation, creation, and continuation of passenger rail service through the multiple counties and municipalities that the proposed rail corridor will pass through to oversee the relationship between the private and public sector, coordinate guidelines for site selection and development of stations, apply for federal grant programs, coordinate with jurisdictions in the state of Minnesota, and coordinate with the Wisconsin Department of Transportation and the Federal government; and

WHEREAS, the multijurisdictional body or commission would need to be independent, but supported by the individual counties and municipalities to promote decisions that are independent and made for the best interest of the passenger rail corridor; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the commission would be to advance the public interest by pursuing the implementation of passenger rail service and other public transportation improvements to serve the St. Croix Valley and the Chippewa Valley; and

WHEREAS, activities that the commission could participate in may include:

- Identify the public benefits of passenger rail and other public transportation improvements to connect the Chippewa/St. Croix region to the Twin Cities, as well as Madison, Milwaukee, and Chicago.
- Identify, support, and facilitate initiatives to implement passenger rail service, including public-private partnerships, sponsors, operators, federal and state funding opportunities, relationships among governments and stakeholders, feasibility studies, and the like.
- Pursue opportunities for transit orientated development, value capture financing, and other communityrelated benefits at station locations to ensure the fullest possible economic benefits from service implementation.
- Foster cooperation among Wisconsin and Minnesota governments, agencies, and other entities. Determine the long-term role of the commission, or other organization that might be created to coordinate public involvement in the service, including any legislative or other action that might be needed. Participate in determining the appropriate project roles for this commission, state DOTs, counties and municipalities, private partners and real estate developers, and advocacy or educational organizations like the West Central Rail Coalition.
- Determine and coordinate zoning, environmental, safety, and other regulatory-related requirements.
- Participate in current and future planning processes, including the Wisconsin and Minnesota State Rail Plans, Federal Railroad Administration Midwest Corridor Study, and the local MPO; and

WHEREAS, creation of a commission will require the individual counties and municipalities to adopt a resolution committing to being a part of and agreeing to assist in the development and creation of the commission and its bylaws, and committing to appointing the appropriate individuals to serve on the commission; and

WHEREAS, initially, it would be beneficial if the counties and municipalities adopting a resolution similar to this one, agreeing to participate in the creation of the Chippewa-St. Croix Rail Commission, each appoint one representative to a committee to create rules and by-laws for the commission and to recommend enabling resolutions and/or agreements for all participating counties and municipalities. The West Central Wisconsin Rail Coalition shall have at least 2 members appointed to the committee for the creation of the Chippewa-St. Croix Rail commission; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Wisconsin Statutes Section 66.0301 "municipalities," including counties, may enter into agreements for the purpose of intergovernmental cooperation, including the development of joint transportation commissions.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors supports the creation of the Chippewa-St. Croix Rail Commission, and agrees to commit the necessary resources and individuals for the development of an intergovernmental agreement and by-laws for the creation of a transportation commission that will oversee the implementation, creation, and continuation of passenger rail service in the Chippewa Valley and St,. Croix Valley of Western Wisconsin.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Eau Claire County commits to development of a transportation rail commission upon the ratification of a resolution of commitment, the same or similar to this resolution, by at least 10 of the 13 of the following governmental bodies: Eau Claire County, Chippewa County, Dunn County, Pierce County and St. Croix

County, and the Village of Baldwin, and the cities of Eau Claire, Chippewa Falls, Altoona, Menomonie, New Richmond, River Falls, and Hudson.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the county clerk send a copy of this resolution to the clerks of the afore-mentioned counties and municipalities.

AUTHORIZING THE COUNTY TO PROCEED WITH A PROJECT TO PROVIDE BROADBAND SERVICES TO A RURAL AREA NEAR THE CITY OF AUGUSTA, AND TO APPLY FOR A GRANT FROM THE WISCONSIN ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION TO HELP PAY FOR THE PROJECT

WHEREAS, the Eau Claire County Board created a Broadband Committee in 2019 to investigate and find ways to improve broadband and high-speed internet service to the rural areas of Eau Claire County; and

WHEREAS, the Broadband Committee, in cooperation with the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation (WEDC), has identified a pilot project operated by SpaceX to provide high-speed satellite internet service in a rural area of Eau Claire County near the City of Augusta; and

WHEREAS, the pilot project offered by SpaceX, known as "Starlink Beta Enterprise," initially would be for 50 users or households for 12 months. The pilot project would require payment of approximately \$85,000.00, \$25,000.00 of which would be to purchase the equipment to be used by the 50 users/households, and the remaining \$60,000.00 for the satellite internet service provided by SpaceX; and

WHEREAS, the agreement with SpaceX calls for a payment of approximately \$60,000.00 for service to the 50 users in the pilot project, which is equivalent to approximately \$100.00 per month per user; and

WHEREAS, it is likely that if the pilot project is successful that at the end of the 12 months, SpaceX would continue to provide service directly to the user/households and other interested customers in this area and possibly expand their service to other rural areas in Eau Claire County and Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, if Eau Claire County enters into the agreement with SpaceX, it would be ultimately responsible for the payment of the entire cost of the program to SpaceX. However, WEDC has a grant program that would pay approximately \$25,000.00 for a broadband project such as this to be used to purchase the equipment for those households selected to receive the service. Eau Claire County, through its Broadband Committee, would need to apply for and be awarded the grant; and

WHEREAS, the WEDC has indicated that it would require community involvement in the funding of the service portion of the agreement as part of any grant. It would like to see contributions to the cost of the monthly service provided by SpaceX from individuals and entities located in Eau Claire County to develop community interest in the expansion of broadband service to rural areas; and

WHEREAS, it is believed that individuals, businesses who have employees located within the affected areas, and other entities public and private may be interested in contributing to this pilot project to allow individuals to work remotely and to promote the development of broadband/highspeed internet service in rural areas of Eau Claire County; and

WHEREAS, it would be the intent and the responsibility of the Broadband Committee, consistent with the requirement of WEDC to have community involvement in the pilot project, to seek contributions from public and private entities and individuals to pay for all or part of the cost of service under the SpaceX agreement; and

WHEREAS, if the Broadband Committee cannot raise all the funds necessary through contributions, then Eau Claire County would be responsible for the difference, up to the full amount of approximately \$60,000.00, for service under the contract.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Eau Claire County is committed to the development of broadband service to the underserved rural areas of Eau Claire County, and sees this pilot project as a method of providing high-speed internet service to areas in the county which do not have access to high-speed internet service. The County Board authorizes Eau Claire County, through the Broadband Committee, to move forward with the above-mentioned pilot project with SpaceX, contingent upon the application for and the award of a grant to Eau Claire County from the WEDC for approximately \$25,000.00 for the purchase of the equipment needed by the users under the SpaceX agreement; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, consistent with the requirements of the WEDC grant, the Broadband Committee is directed to seek contributions from the community to help fund the service portion of the pilot project. Eau Claire County seeks to limit its contribution to % of the approximate total of \$60,000.00. As part of this requirement, the Broadband Committee should work with the Corporation Counsel to develop an agreement to be used with those entities and individuals that choose to contribute to the pilot project.

TO CONTINUE EMERGENCY PAID SICK LEAVE (EPSL) AFTER EXPIRATION OF THE FAMILIES FIRST CORONAVIRUS RESPONSE ACT (FFCRA)

WHEREAS, in April 2020, the federal government passed the Families First Coronavirus Response Act ("FFCRA"), frequently called the "Cares" Act, that among other things, provided for up to two weeks of Emergency Paid Sick Leave (EPSL) for employees who as result of the coronavirus pandemic were required to isolate or quarantine due to contracting or being exposed to the COVID-19 coronavirus; and

WHEREAS, EPSL was to be permitted after the employee had been ordered to isolate or quarantine by a health care provider or public health official; and

WHEREAS, the FFCRA expired on December 31, 2020, and the benefits of the EPSL under the federal act are no longer available to county employees; and

WHEREAS, the county may extend the benefits of the EPSL to employees to continue to provide the benefit of emergency paid sick leave to those employees who may need to take time emergency time off if affected by the COVID-19 coronavirus; and

WHEREAS, with the start of vaccination of the population for the COVID-19 coronavirus, the need for EPSL should diminish over time, and with the implementation of remote working, the ability to work from home while in isolation or quarantine has allowed many employees to avoid taking EPSL when they were required to isolate or quarantine; and

WHEREAS, the Human Resources Committee considered this issue at its meeting on January 7, 2021, and recommended that a resolution be drafted for the continuation of EPSL benefits for consideration by the Board of Supervisors.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors authorizes a temporary benefit to employees that mirrors the Emergency Paid Sick Leave (EPSL) portion of the FFCRA and authorizes up to 80 hours of paid sick leave for employees who are required to quarantine or isolate as the result of an order or direction from a healthcare provider or public health official as the result of becoming infected with or being in close contact with someone who is infected with the COVID-19 coronavirus; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this benefit shall expire on June 30, 2021, unless further extended by the Board of Supervisors by the adoption of a resolution extending the EPSL benefit and shall be limited to employees who have not already received this benefit or exhausted the full 80 hours of EPSL under the FFCRA; if the employee has already used a portion of his or her 80 hours under the FFCRA then he or she shall be entitled to the remaining portion of sick leave up to the full 80 hours; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that if employees can work remotely, based on their health and their ability to be connected to county systems, then they are encouraged, but not required, to work remotely to allow them to remain on the payroll during the time that they may need to isolate or quarantine because of the COVID-19 coronavirus.

RESOLUTION SUPPORTING INCREASED FUNDING FOR AGING AND DISABILITY RESOURCE CENTERS

WHEREAS, Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRC) are the first place to go to get accurate unbiased information on all aspects of life related to aging or living with a disability; and

WHEREAS, ADRC services include providing information and assistance, options and benefits counseling, coordinating short-term services, conducting functional screens, and enrollment processing and counseling; and

WHEREAS, in Wisconsin, there are currently 34 single-county ADRCs, 12 multi-county/tribal ADRCs, and seven tribal Aging and Disability Resource Specialists that work with an ADRC; and

WHEREAS, ADRCs serve the fastest growing demographic of our state's population; and

WHEREAS, the funding method for ADRCs has not been revised in more than a decade, and funding for ADRCs has not increased since 2006; and

WHEREAS, it has become evident that ADRC funding needs revision for a number of reasons, including:

- The current inequitable distribution of funding among ADRCs.
- The need to increase funding so that all ADRCs may effectively meet their mission, as outlined in the Scope of Services contract addendum; and

WHEREAS, the Office for Resource Center Development (ORCD) within the Department of Health Services (DHS) established a stakeholder advisory group in 2017 to discuss ADRC funding; and

WHEREAS, the stakeholder advisory group identified a number of issues with the current funding formula, such as:

- Dollars are distributed based on the date of ADRC establishment older ADRCs (Generation One) receive more funding than ADRCs established at a later date (Generation Two and Three ADRCs);
- The current funding formula does not address or take into account elements associated with health and social inequity that require a greater need for ADRC services racial and ethnic minority status, income level, number of residents age 75 or older, rate of disability;
- The current formula does not adjust with need Wisconsin's aging and disability populations continue to grow and are expected to grow significantly over the next 20 years;
- The current formula does not account for needed cost of living adjustments; and

WHEREAS, a significant state GPR investment is needed to implement the recommendations of the stakeholder advisory group; and

WHEREAS, such a significant state investment would provide consistency in ADRC funding statewide, cover the services required and recommended in the Scope of Services contract addendum, and equalize services among ADRCs; and

WHEREAS, the work of the stakeholder advisory group complements the work of the Governor's Task Force on Caregiving.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors does hereby support the following increases in the 2021-23 state biennial budget to ensure access to critical services provided by ADRCs to Wisconsin's aging and disability populations:

- Provide an additional \$27,410,000 GPR in funding to our state's ADRCs. It is important to note that the proposed change in the ADRC allocation methodology cannot occur unless the full \$27.4 million is allocated.
- Provide additional funding to expand/equalize ADRC services across the state:
- Expand Dementia Care Specialist Funding Statewide: \$3,320,000
- Fully Fund Elder Benefit Specialists Statewide: \$2,300,000
- Expand Caregiver Support and Programs: \$3,600,000
- Expand Health Promotion Services: \$6,000,000
- Expand Care Transition Services: \$6,000,000
- Fund Aging and Disability Resources in Tribes: \$1,180,000
- Fully Fund Aging and Disability Resource Support Systems: \$2,650,000; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be sent to Governor Tony Evers, DOA Secretary Joel Brennan, The DHS Secretary-designee, the Wisconsin Counties Association, and all area legislators.

WHEREAS, the State and its political subdivisions may self-insure worker's compensation without a special order from the Department of Workforce Development (Department) if they agree to report faithfully all compensable injuries and agree to comply with the Act and rules of the Department (including passing a resolution to self-insurance every 3-years); and

WHEREAS, the Committee on Administration on February 9, 2021 approved the continuation of the self-insured worker's compensation program, in compliance with Wisconsin Administrative Code DWD 80.630(3); and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors does ordain as follows:

(1)Provide for continuation of a self-insured worker's compensation program that is currently in effect.

(2)Authorize the Risk Manager to forward certified copies of this resolution to the Worker's Compensation Division, Wisconsin Department of Workforce Development.

INITIAL RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE BORROWING OF NOT TO EXCEED \$24,350,000; AND PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION HIGHWAY FACILITY BONDS THEREFORE

WHEREAS, the County Board of Supervisors of Eau Claire County, Wisconsin (the "County") hereby finds and determines that it is necessary, desirable and in the best interest of the County to raise funds for the public purpose of paying the cost of constructing and equipping a highway facility (the "Project");

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Board of Supervisors of the County that: <u>Section 1. Authorization of the Bonds</u>. For the purpose of paying costs of the Project, there shall be borrowed, through the issuance of general obligation highway facility bonds pursuant to Section 67.04 of the Wisconsin Statutes, a principal sum not to exceed TWENTY-FOUR MILLION THREE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$24,350,000) (the "Bonds").

<u>Section 2. Sale of the Bonds</u>. The County Board of Supervisors hereby authorizes and directs that the Bonds be offered for public sale. At a subsequent meeting, the County Board of Supervisors shall consider such bids for the Bonds as may have been received and take action thereon.

<u>Section 3. Notice of Sale</u>. The County Clerk, in consultation with Ehlers & Associates, Inc. ("Ehlers"), is hereby authorized and directed to cause the sale of the Bonds to be publicized at such times and in such manner as the County Clerk may determine and to cause copies of a complete, official Notice of Sale and other pertinent data to be forwarded to interested bidders as the County Clerk may determine.

<u>Section 4. Official Statement</u>. The Finance Director (in consultation with Ehlers) shall cause an Official Statement to be prepared and distributed. The appropriate County officials shall determine when the Official Statement is final for purposes of Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12 and shall certify said Official Statement, such certification to constitute full authorization of such Official Statement under this resolution.

RESOLUTION AWARDING THE SALE OF \$24,350,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION HIGHWAY FACILITY BONDS, SERIES 2021B

WHEREAS, on February 17, 2021, the County Board of Supervisors of Eau Claire County, Wisconsin (the "County") adopted an initial resolution authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$24,350,000 for the public purpose of paying the cost of constructing and equipping a highway facility (the "Project") (the above-referenced initial resolution is referred to herein as the "Initial Resolution");

WHEREAS, the County Board of Supervisors hereby finds and determines that the Project is within the County's power to undertake and therefore serves a "public purpose" as that term is defined in Section 67.04(1)(b), Wisconsin Statutes;

WHEREAS, the County is authorized by the provisions of Section 67.04, Wisconsin Statutes, to borrow money and issue general obligation bonds for such public purposes;

WHEREAS, none of the proceeds of the Bonds shall be used to fund the operating expenses of the general fund of the County or to fund the operating expenses of any special revenue fund of the County that is supported by the property taxes;

WHEREAS, the County has directed Ehlers & Associates, Inc. ("Ehlers") to take the steps necessary to sell general obligation bonds (the "Bonds") to pay the cost of the Project;

WHEREAS, Ehlers, in consultation with the officials of the County, prepared a Notice of Sale (a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by this reference) setting forth the details of and the bid requirements for the Bonds and indicating that the Bonds would be offered for public sale on March 16, 2021;

WHEREAS, the County Clerk (in consultation with Ehlers) caused a form of notice of the sale to be published and/or announced and caused the Notice of Sale to be distributed to potential bidders offering the Bonds for public sale on March 16, 2021;

WHEREAS, the County has duly received bids for the Bonds as described on the Bid Tabulation attached hereto as Exhibit B and incorporated herein by this reference (the "Bid Tabulation");

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the bid proposal (the "Proposal") submitted by the financial institution listed first on the Bid Tabulation fully complies with the bid requirements set forth in the Notice of Sale and is deemed to be the most advantageous to the County. Ehlers has recommended that the County accept the Proposal. A copy of said Proposal submitted by such institution (the "Purchaser") is attached hereto as Exhibit C and incorporated herein by this reference; and

WHEREAS, the County Board of Supervisors now deems it necessary, desirable and in the best interest of the County that the Bonds be issued in the aggregate principal amount of \$24,350,000.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Board of Supervisors of the County that:

Section 1. Ratification of the Notice of Sale and Offering Materials. The County Board of Supervisors hereby ratifies and approves the details of the Bonds set forth in Exhibit A attached hereto as and for the details of the Bonds. The Notice of Sale and any other offering materials prepared and circulated by Ehlers are hereby ratified and approved in all respects. All actions taken by officers of the County and Ehlers in connection with the preparation and distribution of the Notice of Sale, and any other offering materials are hereby ratified and approved in all respects.

Section 1A. Authorization and Award of the Bonds. For the purpose of paying the cost of the Project, there shall be borrowed pursuant to Section 67.04, Wisconsin Statutes, the principal sum of TWENTY-FOUR MILLION THREE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$24,350,000) from the Purchaser in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Proposal. The Proposal of the Purchaser offering to purchase the Bonds for the sum set forth on the Proposal, plus accrued interest to the date of delivery, resulting in a true interest cost as set forth on the Proposal, is hereby accepted. The Chairperson and County Clerk or other appropriate officers of the County are authorized and directed to execute an acceptance of the Proposal on behalf of the County. The good faith deposit of the Purchaser

shall be applied in accordance with the Notice of Sale, and any good faith deposits submitted by unsuccessful bidders shall be promptly returned. The Bonds shall bear interest at the rates set forth on the Proposal.

Section 2. Terms of the Bonds. The Bonds shall be designated "General Obligation Highway Facility Bonds, Series 2021B"; shall be issued in the aggregate principal amount of \$24,350,000; shall be dated April 6, 2021; shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof; shall be numbered R-1 and upward; and shall bear interest at the rates per annum and mature on the dates and in the principal amounts as set forth on the Pricing Summary attached hereto as Exhibit D-1 and incorporated herein by this reference. Interest shall be computed upon the basis of a 360-day year of twelve 30-day months and will be rounded pursuant to the rules of the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board. The schedule of principal and interest payments due on the Bonds is set forth on the Debt Service Schedule attached hereto as Exhibit D-2 and incorporated herein by this reference (the "Schedule").

Section 3. Redemption Provisions. The Bonds maturing on September 1, 2030 and thereafter are subject to redemption prior to maturity, at the option of the County, on September 1, 2029 or on any date thereafter. Said Bonds are redeemable as a whole or in part, and if in part, from maturities selected by the County, and within each maturity by lot, at the principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest to the date of redemption.

Section 4. Form of the Bonds. The Bonds shall be issued in registered form and shall be executed and delivered in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit E and incorporated herein by this reference. Section 5. Tax Provisions.

(A) Direct Annual Irrepealable Tax Levy. For the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the Bonds as the same becomes due, the full faith, credit and resources of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged, and there is hereby levied upon all of the taxable property of the County a direct annual irrepealable tax in the years 2021 through 2040 for the payments due in the years 2022 through 2041 in the amounts set forth on the Schedule.

(B) Tax Collection. So long as any part of the principal of or interest on the Bonds remains unpaid, the County shall be and continue without power to repeal such levy or obstruct the collection of said tax until all such payments have been made or provided for. After the issuance of the Bonds, said tax shall be, from year to year, carried onto the tax roll of the County and collected in addition to all other taxes and in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes of the County for said years are collected, except that the amount of tax carried onto the tax roll may be reduced in any year by the amount of any surplus money in the Debt Service Fund Account created below.

(C) Additional Funds. If at any time there shall be on hand insufficient funds from the aforesaid tax levy to meet principal and/or interest payments on said Bonds when due, the requisite amounts shall be paid from other funds of the County then available, which sums shall be replaced upon the collection of the taxes herein levied.

Section 6. Segregated Debt Service Fund Account.

(A) Creation and Deposits. There be and there hereby is established in the treasury of the County, if one has not already been created, a debt service fund, separate and distinct from every other fund, which shall be maintained in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Debt service or sinking funds established for obligations previously issued by the County may be considered as separate and distinct accounts within the debt service fund.

Within the debt service fund, there hereby is established a separate and distinct account designated as the "Debt Service Fund Account for General Obligation Highway Facility Bonds, Series 2021B, dated April 6, 2021" (the "Debt Service Fund Account") and such account shall be maintained until the indebtedness evidenced by the Bonds is fully paid or otherwise extinguished. There shall be deposited into the Debt Service Fund Account (i) all accrued interest received by the County at the time of delivery of and payment for the Bonds; (ii) any premium which may be received by the County above the par value of the Bonds and accrued interest thereon; (iii) all money raised by the taxes herein levied and any amounts appropriated for the specific purpose of meeting principal of and interest on the Bonds when due; (iv) such other sums as may be necessary at any time to pay principal of and interest on the Bonds when due; (v) surplus monies in the Borrowed Money Fund as specified below; and (vi) such further deposits as may be required by Section 67.11, Wisconsin Statutes.

(B) Use and Investment. No money shall be withdrawn from the Debt Service Fund Account and appropriated for any purpose other than the payment of principal of and interest on the Bonds until all such principal and interest has been paid in full and the Bonds canceled; provided (i) the funds to provide for each payment of principal of and interest on the Bonds prior to the scheduled receipt of taxes from the next succeeding tax collection may be invested in direct obligations of the United States of America maturing in time to make such payments when they are due or in other

investments permitted by law; and (ii) any funds over and above the amount of such principal and interest payments on the Bonds may be used to reduce the next succeeding tax levy, or may, at the option of the County, be invested by purchasing the Bonds as permitted by and subject to Section 67.11(2)(a), Wisconsin Statutes, or in permitted municipal investments under the pertinent provisions of the Wisconsin Statutes ("Permitted Investments"), which investments shall continue to be a part of the Debt Service Fund Account. Any investment of the Debt Service Fund Account shall at all times conform with the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code") and any applicable Treasury Regulations (the "Regulations").

(C) Remaining Monies. When all of the Bonds have been paid in full and canceled, and all Permitted Investments disposed of, any money remaining in the Debt Service Fund Account shall be transferred and deposited in the general fund of the County, unless the County Board of Supervisors directs otherwise.

Section 7. Proceeds of the Bonds; Segregated Borrowed Money Fund. The proceeds of the Bonds (the "Bond Proceeds") (other than any premium and accrued interest which must be paid at the time of the delivery of the Bonds into the Debt Service Fund Account created above) shall be deposited into a special fund (the "Borrowed Money Fund") separate and distinct from all other funds of the County and disbursed solely for the purpose or purposes for which borrowed. In no event shall monies in the Borrowed Money Fund be used to fund operating expenses of the general fund of the County or of any special revenue fund of the County that is supported by property taxes. Monies in the Borrowed Money Fund may be temporarily invested in Permitted Investments. Any monies, including any income from Permitted Investments, remaining in the Borrowed Money Fund after the purpose or purposes for which the Bonds have been issued have been accomplished, and, at any time, any monies as are not needed and which obviously thereafter cannot be needed for such purpose(s) shall be deposited in the Debt Service Fund Account.

Section 8. No Arbitrage. All investments made pursuant to this Resolution shall be Permitted Investments, but no such investment shall be made in such a manner as would cause the Bonds to be "arbitrage bonds" within the meaning of Section 148 of the Code or the Regulations and an officer of the County, charged with the responsibility for issuing the Bonds, shall certify as to facts, estimates, circumstances and reasonable expectations in existence on the date of delivery of the Bonds to the Purchaser which will permit the conclusion that the Bonds are not "arbitrage bonds," within the meaning of the Code or Regulations.

Section 9. Compliance with Federal Tax Laws. (a) The County represents and covenants that the projects financed by the Bonds and the ownership, management and use of the projects will not cause the Bonds to be "private activity bonds" within the meaning of Section 141 of the Code. The County further covenants that it shall comply with the provisions of the Code to the extent necessary to maintain the tax exempt status of the interest on the Bonds including, if applicable, the rebate requirements of Section 148(f) of the Code. The County further covenants that it will not take any action, omit to take any action or permit the taking or omission of any action within its control (including, without limitation, making or permitting any use of the proceeds of the Bonds) if taking, permitting or omitting to take such action would cause any of the Bonds to be an arbitrage bond or a private activity bond within the meaning of the Code or would otherwise cause interest on the Bonds to be included in the gross income of the recipients thereof for federal income tax purposes. The County Clerk or other officer of the County charged with the responsibility of issuing the Bonds shall provide an appropriate certificate of the County certifying that the County can and covenanting that it will comply with the provisions of the Code and Regulations.

(b)The County also covenants to use its best efforts to meet the requirements and restrictions of any different or additional federal legislation which may be made applicable to the Bonds provided that in meeting such requirements the County will do so only to the extent consistent with the proceedings authorizing the Bonds and the laws of the State of Wisconsin and to the extent that there is a reasonable period of time in which to comply.

Section 10. Execution of the Bonds; Closing; Professional Services. The Bonds shall be issued in printed form, executed on behalf of the County by the manual or facsimile signatures of the Chairperson and County Clerk, authenticated, if required, by the Fiscal Agent (defined below), sealed with its official or corporate seal, if any, or a facsimile thereof, and delivered to the Purchaser upon payment to the County of the purchase price thereof, plus accrued interest to the date of delivery (the "Closing"). The facsimile signature of either of the officers executing the Bonds may be imprinted on the Bonds in lieu of the manual signature of the officer but, unless the County has contracted with a fiscal agent to authenticate the Bonds, at least one of the signatures appearing on each Bond shall be a manual signature. In the event that either of the officers whose signatures appear on the Bonds shall cease to be such officers before the Closing, such signatures shall, nevertheless, be valid and sufficient for all purposes to the same extent as if they had remained in office until the Closing. The aforesaid officers are hereby authorized and directed to do all acts and execute and deliver the Bonds and all such documents, certificates and acknowledgements

as may be necessary and convenient to effectuate the Closing. The County hereby authorizes the officers and agents of the County to enter into, on its behalf, agreements and contracts in conjunction with the Bonds, including but not limited to agreements and contracts for legal, trust, fiscal agency, disclosure and continuing disclosure, and rebate calculation services. Any such contract heretofore entered into in conjunction with the issuance of the Bonds is hereby ratified and approved in all respects.

Section 11. Payment of the Bonds; Fiscal Agent. The principal of and interest on the Bonds shall be paid by the County Clerk or County Treasurer (the "Fiscal Agent").

Section 12. Persons Treated as Owners; Transfer of Bonds. The County shall cause books for the registration and for the transfer of the Bonds to be kept by the Fiscal Agent. The person in whose name any Bond shall be registered shall be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes and payment of either principal or interest on any Bond shall be made only to the registered owner thereof. All such payments shall be valid and effectual to satisfy and discharge the liability upon such Bond to the extent of the sum or sums so paid.

Any Bond may be transferred by the registered owner thereof by surrender of the Bond at the office of the Fiscal Agent, duly endorsed for the transfer or accompanied by an assignment duly executed by the registered owner or his attorney duly authorized in writing. Upon such transfer, the Chairperson and County Clerk shall execute and deliver in the name of the transferee or transferees a new Bond or Bonds of a like aggregate principal amount, series and maturity and the Fiscal Agent shall record the name of each transferee in the registration book. No registration shall be made to bearer. The Fiscal Agent shall cancel any Bond surrendered for transfer.

The County shall cooperate in any such transfer, and the Chairperson and County Clerk are authorized to execute any new Bond or Bonds necessary to effect any such transfer.

Section 13. Record Date. The 15th day of the calendar month next preceding each interest payment date shall be the record date for the Bonds (the "Record Date"). Payment of interest on the Bonds on any interest payment date shall be made to the registered owners of the Bonds as they appear on the registration book of the County at the close of business on the Record Date.

Section 14. Utilization of The Depository Trust Company Book-Entry-Only System. In order to make the Bonds eligible for the services provided by The Depository Trust Company, New York, New York ("DTC"), the County agrees to the applicable provisions set forth in the Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations, which the County Clerk or other authorized representative of the County is authorized and directed to execute and deliver to DTC on behalf of the County to the extent an effective Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations is not presently on file in the County Clerk's office.

Section 15. Payment of Issuance Expenses. The County authorizes the Purchaser to forward the amount of the proceeds of the Bonds allocable to the payment of issuance expenses to Old National Bank at Closing for further distribution as directed by Ehlers.

Section 16. Official Statement. The County Board of Supervisors hereby approves the Preliminary Official Statement with respect to the Bonds and deems the Preliminary Official Statement as "final" as of its date for purposes of SEC Rule 15c2-12 promulgated by the Securities and Exchange Commission pursuant to the Securities and Exchange Act of 1934 (the "Rule"). All actions taken by officers of the County in connection with the preparation of such Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda to it or final Official Statement are hereby ratified and approved. In connection with the Closing, the appropriate County official shall certify the Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda or final Official Statement. The County Clerk shall cause copies of the Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda or final Official Statement to be distributed to the Purchaser.

Section 17. Undertaking to Provide Continuing Disclosure. The County hereby covenants and agrees, for the benefit of the owners of the Bonds, to enter into a written undertaking (the "Undertaking") if required by the Rule to provide continuing disclosure of certain financial information and operating data and timely notices of the occurrence of certain events in accordance with the Rule. The Undertaking shall be enforceable by the owners of the Bonds or by the Purchaser on behalf of such owners (provided that the rights of the owners and the Purchaser to enforce the Undertaking shall be limited to a right to obtain specific performance of the obligations thereunder and any failure by the County to comply with the provisions of the Undertaking shall not be an event of default with respect to the Bonds).

To the extent required under the Rule, the Chairperson and County Clerk, or other officer of the County charged with the responsibility for issuing the Bonds, shall provide a Continuing Disclosure Certificate for inclusion in the transcript of proceedings, setting forth the details and terms of the County's Undertaking.

Section 18. Record Book. The County Clerk shall provide and keep the transcript of proceedings as a separate record book (the "Record Book") and shall record a full and correct statement of every step or proceeding had or taken in the course of authorizing and issuing the Bonds in the Record Book.

Section 19. Bond Insurance. If the Purchaser determines to obtain municipal bond insurance with respect to the Bonds, the officers of the County are authorized to take all actions necessary to obtain such municipal bond insurance. The Chairperson and County Clerk are authorized to agree to such additional provisions as the bond insurer may reasonably request and which are acceptable to the Chairperson and County Clerk including provisions regarding restrictions on investment of Bond proceeds, the payment procedure under the municipal bond insurance policy, the rights of the bond insurer in the event of default and payment of the Bonds by the bond insurer and notices to be given to the bond insurer. In addition, any reference required by the bond insurer to the municipal bond insurance policy shall be made in the form of Bond provided herein.

Section 20. Conflicting Resolutions; Severability; Effective Date. All prior resolutions, rules or other actions of the County Board of Supervisors or any parts thereof in conflict with the provisions hereof shall be, and the same are, hereby rescinded insofar as the same may so conflict. In the event that any one or more provisions hereof shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any other provisions hereof. The foregoing shall take effect immediately upon adoption and approval in the manner provided by law.

RESOLUTION AWARDING THE SALE OF \$7,405,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION PROMISSORY NOTES, SERIES 2021C

WHEREAS, on February 17, 2021, the County Board of Supervisors of Eau Claire County, Wisconsin (the "County") adopted an initial resolution authorizing the issuance of general obligation promissory notes in an amount not to exceed \$7,405,000 for public purposes, including paying the cost of highway improvements and other 2021 capital projects (collectively, the "Project") (the above-referenced initial resolution is referred to herein as the "Initial Resolution");

WHEREAS, the County is authorized by the provisions of Section 67.12(12), Wisconsin Statutes, to borrow money and issue general obligation promissory notes (the "Notes") for such public purposes;

WHEREAS, none of the proceeds of the Notes shall be used to fund the operating expenses of the general fund of the County or to fund the operating expenses of any special revenue fund of the County that is supported by the property taxes;

WHEREAS, the County has directed Ehlers & Associates, Inc. ("Ehlers") to take the steps necessary to sell the Notes to pay the cost of the Project;

WHEREAS, Ehlers, in consultation with the officials of the County, prepared a Notice of Sale (a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by this reference) setting forth the details of and the bid requirements for the Notes and indicating that the Notes would be offered for public sale on March 16, 2021;

WHEREAS, the County Clerk (in consultation with Ehlers) caused a form of notice of the sale to be published and/or announced and caused the Notice of Sale to be distributed to potential bidders offering the Notes for public sale on March 16, 2021;

WHEREAS, the County has duly received bids for the Notes as described on the Bid Tabulation attached hereto as Exhibit B and incorporated herein by this reference (the "Bid Tabulation"); and

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the bid proposal (the "Proposal") submitted by the financial institution listed first on the Bid Tabulation fully complies with the bid requirements set forth in the Notice of Sale and is deemed to be the most advantageous to the County. Ehlers has recommended that the County accept the Proposal. A copy of said Proposal submitted by such institution (the "Purchaser") is attached hereto as Exhibit C and incorporated herein by this reference.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Board of Supervisors of the County that:

Section 1. Ratification of the Notice of Sale and Offering Materials. The County Board of Supervisors hereby ratifies and approves the details of the Notes set forth in Exhibit A attached hereto as and for the details of the Notes. The Notice of Sale and any other offering materials prepared and circulated by Ehlers are hereby ratified and approved in all respects. All actions taken by officers of the County and Ehlers in connection with the preparation and distribution of the Notice of Sale, and any other offering materials are hereby ratified and approved in all respects.

Section 1A. Authorization and Award of the Notes. For the purpose of paying the cost of the Project, there shall be borrowed pursuant to Section 67.12(12), Wisconsin Statutes, the principal sum of SEVEN MILLION FOUR HUNDRED FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$7,405,000) from the Purchaser in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Proposal. The Proposal of the Purchaser offering to purchase the Notes for the sum set forth on the Proposal, plus accrued interest to the date of delivery, resulting in a true interest cost as set forth on the Proposal, is hereby accepted. The Chairperson and County Clerk or other appropriate officers of the County are authorized and directed to execute an acceptance of the Proposal on behalf of the County. The good faith deposit of the Purchaser shall be applied in accordance with the Notice of Sale, and any good faith deposits submitted by unsuccessful bidders shall be promptly returned. The Notes shall bear interest at the rates set forth on the Proposal.

Section 2. Terms of the Notes. The Notes shall be designated "General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 2021C"; shall be issued in the aggregate principal amount of \$7,405,000; shall be dated April 6, 2021; shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof; shall be numbered R-1 and upward; and shall bear interest at the rates per annum and mature on the dates and in the principal amounts as set forth on the Pricing Summary attached hereto as Exhibit D-1 and incorporated herein by this reference. Interest shall be computed upon the basis of a 360-day year of twelve 30-day months and will be rounded pursuant to the rules of the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board. The schedule of principal and interest payments due on the Notes is set forth on the Debt Service Schedule attached hereto as Exhibit D-2 and incorporated herein by this reference (the "Schedule").

Section 3. Redemption Provisions. The Notes maturing on September 1, 2028 and thereafter are subject to redemption prior to maturity, at the option of the County, on September 1, 2027 or on any date thereafter. Said Notes are redeemable as a whole or in part, and if in part, from maturities selected by the County, and within each maturity by lot, at the principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest to the date of redemption.

Section 4. Form of the Notes. The Notes shall be issued in registered form and shall be executed and delivered in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit E and incorporated herein by this reference. Section 5. Tax Provisions.

(A) Direct Annual Irrepealable Tax Levy. For the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the Notes as the same becomes due, the full faith, credit and resources of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged, and there is hereby levied upon all of the taxable property of the County a direct annual irrepealable tax in the years 2021 through 2030 for the payments due in the years 2022 through 2031 in the amounts set forth on the Schedule.

(B) Tax Collection. So long as any part of the principal of or interest on the Notes remains unpaid, the County shall be and continue without power to repeal such levy or obstruct the collection of said tax until all such payments have been made or provided for. After the issuance of the Notes, said tax shall be, from year to year, carried onto the tax roll of the County and collected in addition to all other taxes and in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes of the County for said years are collected, except that the amount of tax carried onto the tax roll may be reduced in any year by the amount of any surplus money in the Debt Service Fund Account created below.

(C) Additional Funds. If at any time there shall be on hand insufficient funds from the aforesaid tax levy to meet principal and/or interest payments on said Notes when due, the requisite amounts shall be paid from other funds of the County then available, which sums shall be replaced upon the collection of the taxes herein levied.

Section 6. Segregated Debt Service Fund Account.

(A) Creation and Deposits. There be and there hereby is established in the treasury of the County, if one has not already been created, a debt service fund, separate and distinct from every other fund, which shall be maintained in

accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Debt service or sinking funds established for obligations previously issued by the County may be considered as separate and distinct accounts within the debt service fund.

Within the debt service fund, there hereby is established a separate and distinct account designated as the "Debt Service Fund Account for General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 2021C, dated April 6, 2021" (the "Debt Service Fund Account") and such account shall be maintained until the indebtedness evidenced by the Notes is fully paid or otherwise extinguished. There shall be deposited into the Debt Service Fund Account (i) all accrued interest received by the County at the time of delivery of and payment for the Notes; (ii) any premium which may be received by the County above the par value of the Notes and accrued interest thereon; (iii) all money raised by the taxes herein levied and any amounts appropriated for the specific purpose of meeting principal of and interest on the Notes when due; (iv) such other sums as may be necessary at any time to pay principal of and interest on the Notes when due; (v) surplus monies in the Borrowed Money Fund as specified below; and (vi) such further deposits as may be required by Section 67.11, Wisconsin Statutes.

(B) Use and Investment. No money shall be withdrawn from the Debt Service Fund Account and appropriated for any purpose other than the payment of principal of and interest on the Notes until all such principal and interest has been paid in full and the Notes canceled; provided (i) the funds to provide for each payment of principal of and interest on the Notes prior to the scheduled receipt of taxes from the next succeeding tax collection may be invested in direct obligations of the United States of America maturing in time to make such payments when they are due or in other investments permitted by law; and (ii) any funds over and above the amount of such principal and interest payments on the Notes may be used to reduce the next succeeding tax levy, or may, at the option of the County, be invested by purchasing the Notes as permitted by and subject to Section 67.11(2)(a), Wisconsin Statutes, or in permitted municipal investments under the pertinent provisions of the Wisconsin Statutes ("Permitted Investments"), which investments shall continue to be a part of the Debt Service Fund Account. Any investment of the Debt Service Fund Account shall at all times conform with the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code") and any applicable Treasury Regulations (the "Regulations").

(C) Remaining Monies. When all of the Notes have been paid in full and canceled, and all Permitted Investments disposed of, any money remaining in the Debt Service Fund Account shall be transferred and deposited in the general fund of the County, unless the County Board of Supervisors directs otherwise.

Section 7. Proceeds of the Notes; Segregated Borrowed Money Fund. The proceeds of the Notes (the "Note Proceeds") (other than any premium and accrued interest which must be paid at the time of the delivery of the Notes into the Debt Service Fund Account created above) shall be deposited into a special fund (the "Borrowed Money Fund") separate and distinct from all other funds of the County and disbursed solely for the purpose or purposes for which borrowed. In no event shall monies in the Borrowed Money Fund be used to fund operating expenses of the general fund of the County or of any special revenue fund of the County that is supported by property taxes. Monies in the Borrowed Money Fund may be temporarily invested in Permitted Investments. Any monies, including any income from Permitted Investments, remaining in the Borrowed Money Fund after the purpose or purposes for which the Notes have been issued have been accomplished, and, at any time, any monies as are not needed and which obviously thereafter cannot be needed for such purpose(s) shall be deposited in the Debt Service Fund Account.

Section 8. No Arbitrage. All investments made pursuant to this Resolution shall be Permitted Investments, but no such investment shall be made in such a manner as would cause the Notes to be "arbitrage bonds" within the meaning of Section 148 of the Code or the Regulations and an officer of the County, charged with the responsibility for issuing the Notes, shall certify as to facts, estimates, circumstances and reasonable expectations in existence on the date of delivery of the Notes to the Purchaser which will permit the conclusion that the Notes are not "arbitrage bonds," within the meaning of the Code or Regulations.

Section 9. Compliance with Federal Tax Laws. (a) The County represents and covenants that the projects financed by the Notes and the ownership, management and use of the projects will not cause the Notes to be "private activity bonds" within the meaning of Section 141 of the Code. The County further covenants that it shall comply with the provisions of the Code to the extent necessary to maintain the tax exempt status of the interest on the Notes including, if applicable, the rebate requirements of Section 148(f) of the Code. The County further covenants that it will not take any action, omit to take any action or permit the taking or omission of any action within its control (including, without limitation, making or permitting any use of the proceeds of the Notes) if taking, permitting or omitting to take such action would cause any of the Notes to be an arbitrage bond or a private activity bond within the meaning of the Code or would otherwise cause interest on the Notes to be included in the gross income of the recipients thereof for federal income tax purposes. The County Clerk or other officer of the County charged with the responsibility of issuing the

Notes shall provide an appropriate certificate of the County certifying that the County can and covenanting that it will comply with the provisions of the Code and Regulations.

(b)The County also covenants to use its best efforts to meet the requirements and restrictions of any different or additional federal legislation which may be made applicable to the Notes provided that in meeting such requirements the County will do so only to the extent consistent with the proceedings authorizing the Notes and the laws of the State of Wisconsin and to the extent that there is a reasonable period of time in which to comply.

Section 10. Execution of the Notes; Closing; Professional Services. The Notes shall be issued in printed form, executed on behalf of the County by the manual or facsimile signatures of the Chairperson and County Clerk, authenticated, if required, by the Fiscal Agent (defined below), sealed with its official or corporate seal, if any, or a facsimile thereof, and delivered to the Purchaser upon payment to the County of the purchase price thereof, plus accrued interest to the date of delivery (the "Closing"). The facsimile signature of either of the officers executing the Notes may be imprinted on the Notes in lieu of the manual signature of the officer but, unless the County has contracted with a fiscal agent to authenticate the Notes, at least one of the signatures appearing on each Note shall be a manual signature. In the event that either of the officers whose signatures appear on the Notes shall cease to be such officers before the Closing, such signatures shall, nevertheless, be valid and sufficient for all purposes to the same extent as if they had remained in office until the Closing. The aforesaid officers are hereby authorized and directed to do all acts and execute and deliver the Notes and all such documents, certificates and acknowledgements as may be necessary and convenient to effectuate the Closing. The County hereby authorizes the officers and agents of the County to enter into, on its behalf, agreements and contracts in conjunction with the Notes, including but not limited to agreements and contracts for legal, trust, fiscal agency, disclosure and continuing disclosure, and rebate calculation services. Any such contract heretofore entered into in conjunction with the issuance of the Notes is hereby ratified and approved in all respects.

Section 11. Payment of the Notes; Fiscal Agent. The principal of and interest on the Notes shall be paid by the County Clerk or County Treasurer (the "Fiscal Agent").

Section 12. Persons Treated as Owners; Transfer of Notes. The County shall cause books for the registration and for the transfer of the Notes to be kept by the Fiscal Agent. The person in whose name any Note shall be registered shall be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes and payment of either principal or interest on any Note shall be made only to the registered owner thereof. All such payments shall be valid and effectual to satisfy and discharge the liability upon such Note to the extent of the sum or sums so paid.

Any Note may be transferred by the registered owner thereof by surrender of the Note at the office of the Fiscal Agent, duly endorsed for the transfer or accompanied by an assignment duly executed by the registered owner or his attorney duly authorized in writing. Upon such transfer, the Chairperson and County Clerk shall execute and deliver in the name of the transferee or transferees a new Note or Notes of a like aggregate principal amount, series and maturity and the Fiscal Agent shall record the name of each transferee in the registration book. No registration shall be made to bearer. The Fiscal Agent shall cancel any Note surrendered for transfer.

The County shall cooperate in any such transfer, and the Chairperson and County Clerk are authorized to execute any new Note or Notes necessary to effect any such transfer.

Section 13. Record Date. The 15th day of the calendar month next preceding each interest payment date shall be the record date for the Notes (the "Record Date"). Payment of interest on the Notes on any interest payment date shall be made to the registered owners of the Notes as they appear on the registration book of the County at the close of business on the Record Date.

Section 14. Utilization of The Depository Trust Company Book-Entry-Only System. In order to make the Notes eligible for the services provided by The Depository Trust Company, New York, New York ("DTC"), the County agrees to the applicable provisions set forth in the Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations, which the County Clerk or other authorized representative of the County is authorized and directed to execute and deliver to DTC on behalf of the County to the extent an effective Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations is not presently on file in the County Clerk's office.

Section 15. Payment of Issuance Expenses. The County authorizes the Purchaser to forward the amount of the proceeds of the Notes allocable to the payment of issuance expenses to Old National Bank at Closing for further distribution as directed by Ehlers.

Section 16. Official Statement. The County Board of Supervisors hereby approves the Preliminary Official Statement with respect to the Notes and deems the Preliminary Official Statement as "final" as of its date for purposes of SEC Rule 15c2-12 promulgated by the Securities and Exchange Commission pursuant to the Securities and Exchange Act of 1934 (the "Rule"). All actions taken by officers of the County in connection with the preparation of such Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda to it or final Official Statement are hereby ratified and approved. In connection with the Closing, the appropriate County official shall certify the Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda or final Official Statement. The County Clerk shall cause copies of the Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda or final Official Statement to be distributed to the Purchaser.

Section 17. Undertaking to Provide Continuing Disclosure. The County hereby covenants and agrees, for the benefit of the owners of the Notes, to enter into a written undertaking (the "Undertaking") if required by the Rule to provide continuing disclosure of certain financial information and operating data and timely notices of the occurrence of certain events in accordance with the Rule. The Undertaking shall be enforceable by the owners of the Notes or by the Purchaser on behalf of such owners (provided that the rights of the owners and the Purchaser to enforce the Undertaking shall be limited to a right to obtain specific performance of the obligations thereunder and any failure by the County to comply with the provisions of the Undertaking shall not be an event of default with respect to the Notes).

To the extent required under the Rule, the Chairperson and County Clerk, or other officer of the County charged with the responsibility for issuing the Notes, shall provide a Continuing Disclosure Certificate for inclusion in the transcript of proceedings, setting forth the details and terms of the County's Undertaking.

Section 18. Record Book. The County Clerk shall provide and keep the transcript of proceedings as a separate record book (the "Record Book") and shall record a full and correct statement of every step or proceeding had or taken in the course of authorizing and issuing the Notes in the Record Book.

Section 19. Bond Insurance. If the Purchaser determines to obtain municipal bond insurance with respect to the Notes, the officers of the County are authorized to take all actions necessary to obtain such municipal bond insurance. The Chairperson and County Clerk are authorized to agree to such additional provisions as the bond insurer may reasonably request and which are acceptable to the Chairperson and County Clerk including provisions regarding restrictions on investment of Note proceeds, the payment procedure under the municipal bond insurance policy, the rights of the bond insurer in the event of default and payment of the Notes by the bond insurer and notices to be given to the bond insurer. In addition, any reference required by the bond insurer to the municipal bond insurance policy shall be made in the form of Note provided herein.

REQUESTING THE STATE OF WISCONSIN STRENGTHEN ITS HATE CRIME STATUTE, WIS. STAT. § 939.645, TO PROVIDE ENHANCED SECURITY TO MEMBERS OF WISCONSIN'S MARGINALIZED COMMUNITIES

WHEREAS, the people of the State of Wisconsin are as diverse as anywhere in the United States, be they indigenous, Asian, Pacific Islander, Latin X, Black, LGBTQ, or any combination thereof, or other; and

WHEREAS, on a national, state, and local basis, the number of hate crimes committed against marginalized communities is increasing at exponential rates; and

WHEREAS, people from all walks of life deserve to be treated with dignity and respect; and

WHEREAS, people from all communities contribute to making Wisconsin a healthy and thriving environment for families and businesses; and

WHEREAS, hate crimes pose an immediate threat to the sanctity and security of every citizen and present a security risk to both the State of Wisconsin and the United States; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin's current hate crime statute is by and large used by prosecutors as a bargaining or negotiation tool; and

WHEREAS, Wis. Stat. § 939.645, the current "hate crimes" statute, needs an update to strengthen it and provide enhanced security to members of Wisconsin's marginalized communities.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors requests that the legislature and the governor of the state of Wisconsin enact legislation to modify Wis. Stat. § 939.645, as set forth below, by making the following changes:

939.645 (1) If a person does all <u>any</u> of the following, the penalties for the underlying crime are increased as provided in sub. (2):

939.645 (1) (b) Intentionally selects the person against whom the crime under par. (a) is committed or selects the property that is damaged or otherwise affected by the crime under par. (a) in whole or in part because of the actor's belief, values, or perception regarding the race, religion, color, disability, sexual orientation, national origin or ancestry, gender, gender identity, gender expression, age, or veteran's status of that person or the owner or occupant of that property, whether or not the actor's belief, values, or perception was correct.

939.645 (1) (c) The use of gay/transgender panic defenses is forbidden.

939.645 (4) This section does not apply to any crime if proof of race, religion, color, disability, sexual orientation, national origin or ancestry, gender, gender identity, gender expression, age, or veteran's status or proof of any person's perception or belief regarding another's race, religion, color, disability, sexual orientation, national origin or ancestry, gender expression, age, or veteran's status is required for a conviction for that crime.

<u>939.645 (5) This section mandates that hate crime data be collected, retained, and made publicly available based on demographic statistics by the Attorney General of the State of Wisconsin and the Wisconsin Department of Justice.</u>

<u>939.645 (6) this section requires law enforcement officers and officials to receive specialized hate crime training and continuing education on a biennial basis.</u>

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors directs the county clerk to forward a copy of this resolution to the Office of the Governor of the State of Wisconsin, the Office of the Attorney General for the State of Wisconsin, members of the Wisconsin Assembly and Senate, the county clerk for every county in the state of Wisconsin, as well as to the Wisconsin Counties Association.

GRANTING UTILITY EASEMENTS TO EAU CLAIRE ENERGY COOPERATIVE IN SECTION 5, T26N, R6W, IN THE TOWN OF BRIDGE CREEK AND IN THE TOWN OF LUDINGTON

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County owns county forest land known as Lake Eau Claire County Park; and

When any department indicates a significant projected budget overage (5% or more <u>of levy</u>), receive and evaluate that department's mitigation plan. Make recommendations regarding the mitigation plan to the department's oversight committee and the County Administrator, with notice to the County Board. Receive monthly reports of progress on the mitigation plan until the projected overage has been resolved.

3. Review and recommend county fiscal policies and fiscal strategies to the County Board.

4. Hold public listening sessions as part of the budget process.

5. Evaluate and consider the county's fund balance, consistent with county fiscal policy.

6. Examine and settle all claims, demands, or causes of action against the county referred thereto by the county clerk as provided in Chapter 4.90.

7. Exercise control over all non-tax deeded land acquired by the county through any of its departments, agencies, officials and employees. The committee shall refer all land acquisitions to appropriate governing committees whenever such lands abut or adjoin lands under the control of any such committee. No county official or employee may acquire, purchase or accept any land on behalf of the county without the prior written permission of the finance and budget committee except as otherwise provided by law. The county clerk, acting under the supervision of the committee, is hereby empowered to manage and sell all non-tax deed lands owned by Eau Claire County, subject to approval of the County Board consistent with provisions of Chapter 4.20.

The committee shall hold public_listening sessions. After such listening sessions, the committee on finance and budget shall submit to the board its recommendation for amendments to the administrator's budget. 4.02.050 User fee schedules.

A. All county user fees for the utilization, rental or leasing of county facilities, for the provision of county services and for the issuance of permits and licenses shall be established in the code of general ordinances and shall properly reflect the costs incurred by the county. The committee on finance and budget shall annually review these user fees and recommend to the county board at its 2nd meeting in October the enactment or amendment of user fee schedules for the ensuing fiscal year.

B. So as to enable the committee to comply with A., each department which lets or rents out county facilities subject to its control, provides the public with direct services or issues licenses or permits shall no later than September 1st annually submit to the county administrator a schedule of proposed user fee amendments or enactments. The county administrator shall review these and submit each department's proposal, along with his or her analysis, to the committee for its review and approval.

8. Any conversion of a building from one use to a different use.

C.The following construction activities shall not require a building permit:

1.All new detached accessory buildings, or additions to existing detached accessory buildings, however, the current Uniform Dwelling Code shall prevail.

2.Re-siding, reroofing, window and door replacement, and finishing of interior surfaces, installation of cabinetry, and non-structural repairs which are deemed minor by the building inspector.

3. Major equipment replacements (i.e., furnace, water heater, air conditioner, etc.).

4.Normal repairs of HVAC, plumbing and electrical equipment or systems such as replacing switches, receptacles, light fixtures and dimmers.

5. Agricultural structures.

2.75.001 Purpose. The purpose of this chapter shall be to establish a risk management program including the promotion of employee safety for the county. The risk management objectives include:

A. Protection of the county against financial consequences of accidental losses which are catastrophic in nature and preservation of county assets and public service capabilities.

B. Minimization of long term costs to the county due to activities related to the identification, prevention and control of accidental losses and their consequences.

C. Provision of a safe and healthy work and service environment, in which employees, and the general public can enjoy safety and security in the course of their daily pursuits. It is the county's goal to prevent employee illness and injury and to reduce county losses of property and productivity, which may result because of employee accidents. D.

Specific risk management provisions.

1. Loss control committee (with members representing upper management who will establish county goals, support R.M. risk management activities and monitor for effectiveness).

2. Hazard identification activities (including facilities, equipment, environmental assessments, job hazard analysis and work practice monitoring).

3. Insurance/self-insurance program (distribution of risk where appropriate).

4. Self-insurance of worker's compensation program (reducing claims and losses).

5. Compliance with OSHA and Wisconsin Department of Commerce safety requirements Safety and Professional Services (federal and state laws).

6. Employee and management training programs (such as alcohol and drug awareness; defensive driving; safe work practices, sexual harassment prevention and others).

7. Safety committees (to facilitate employee partnerships for promoting communication of safety needs, expectations, and resources).

8. Contract managing program (enforcing minimum insurance levels and safety requirements for contractors).

9. Safety coordinator Risk Manager (to promote a proactive safety environment; to coordinate and facilitate hazard control activities within the workplace).

2.75.010 Definitions. The following definitions apply to this chapter:

"Committee" means the committee on administration. A.

"Director" means the purchasing director. B.

C, B. "Employee" means all persons, whether paid on an hourly basis or via salary, both management and nonmanagement and represented by a collective bargaining agreement and nonrepresented employed and paid by Eau Claire County regardless of employee status.

D. C. "Loss control" means any action designed to reduce financial losses to the least possible amount.

E. D. "Loss reduction" means any measure taken to reduce the severity of a loss after it occurs. F.E.

"Loss prevention" means any measure taken to reduce the frequency of loss.

G.F. "Workers compensation coordinator" <u>the risk manager</u> <u>means</u> <u>shall be</u> the employee assigned the responsibility for coordinating the workers compensation paperwork.

2.75.020 Responsibilities of director Risk Manager.

A. The <u>director risk manager</u> shall have the responsibility of implementing the county's risk management program and shall enforce county <u>polices</u>- <u>policies</u> and procedures by directive. The loss control committee shall promulgate policies and procedures which shall be formulated and recommended by the <u>director risk manager</u>.

B. With respect to employee safety matters, subject to the supervision of the county administrator, the director risk manager shall have line authority over all county administrative personnel department heads and officers solely for the purpose of implementing the county risk management program with respect to this chapter.

C. The <u>director risk manager</u> is authorized to appoint, with the concurrence of the respective department heads, safety committees and loss control committees to be composed of supervisory and nonsupervisory personnel therein. Such committees shall assist the <u>director risk manager</u> in the formulation of risk management policies and procedures and in their implementation.

D.

Other responsibilities include:

1. Identifying and measuring all risk of accidental loss.

2. Selection and recommendation of appropriate risk management techniques for specific exposure problems.

3. Develop <u>Utilize</u> and maintain an information system for timely and accurate recording of losses, claims, insurance premiums and other costs.

 $\overline{3}$ <u>4.</u> Analyzing and allocating insurance premiums, uninsured losses and other risk costs to the budgetary units.

2.75.030 Responsibility of Departments.

A. The respective department heads and their subordinate supervisors shall cooperate with and implement the directors of the director risk manager.

B. Department heads shall be primarily responsible for the implementation of county risk management policies, procedures and activities.

C. Subject to the general supervision of their department heads, supervisors shall be responsible for the following aspects of the safety program:

. Inspection of work areas or job sites for physical hazards;

2. Supervision of employees for the purpose of ascertaining and enforcing compliance of their work habits with county risk management policies and procedures; and

3. Within one working day of the knowledge of the occurrence or the report thereof, whichever is first, the reporting to the worker's compensation coordinator of all employee accidents, injuries and near misses and the causes thereof.

D. Failure of department heads or subordinate administrators to comply with the county risk management policies and procedures may result in discipline invoked by the county administrator or the appropriate department head, in accordance with 2.75.040 D.

2.75.040 Employee responsibility.

A. All employees shall comply with such provisions of the county risk management policies and procedures as may affect or concern their job description, work habits and work sites.

B. Each employee who suffers an injury or is involved in an accident on the job shall report the same verbally to the supervisor as soon as is physically possible after the occurrence. Within one working day he or she shall submit the employee incident form, upon forms as supplied by the supervisor, a detailed written report of the nature of the occurrence. The injured employee shall keep the supervisor or the worker's compensation coordinator informed of the injury status, including informing the supervisor or worker's compensation coordinator within one working day after learning of a recommended surgery for cure or treatment of the injury. The injured employee shall make "contact" with the supervisor or worker's compensation coordinator at least once every 7 loss lost work days. "Contact" meaning: Providing detailed information regarding the condition of the employee's injury in the form of written physician reports; and status updates (via a personal telephone call or visit) of other relevant findings and plans.

C. Employees shall submit only worker's compensation claims pertaining to employment at Eau Claire County. Inappropriate and fraudulent claims will be denied. Information related to fraudulent claims will be forwarded to the district attorney for appropriate action and to the human resources department for the appropriate discipline which may lead to termination.

D. Failure to comply with the county risk management policies and procedures may result in discipline of an employee based upon just cause. Discipline shall be invoked by the appropriate department head based upon information provided by the director and the human resources director.

The County Board of Supervisors of the County of Eau Claire does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. That Chapter 8.35 of the code be created to read:

Chapter 8.35

COMMUNICABLE DISEASE MASK REQUIREMENT

Sections:

8.35.010 Purpose.
8.35.020 Definitions.
8.35.030 Jurisdiction.
8.35.040 Requirement to wear a face covering.
8.30.050 Exceptions to the requirement to wear a face covering.
8.35.060 Enforcement.
8.35.070 Effective date and sunset.

<u>8.35.010 Purpose</u>. The purpose of this ordinance is to promote and protect the public health, safety, and general welfare of the residents of Eau Claire County during the 2020-2021 world-wide COVID-19 pandemic and to

be prepared in the event that the current order issued by the governor of the State of Wisconsin is vacated or not extended.

8.35.020 Definitions. The following definitions apply throughout this ordinance:

A. "Face Covering" shall mean a piece of cloth or other material that is worn to cover the nose and mouth completely. A "face covering" includes but is not limited to a bandana, a cloth face mask, a disposable paper mask, a neck gaiter, or a religious face covering. A "Face Covering" does not include face shields, mesh masks, masks with holes or openings, or mask with vents.

B. "Local health officer" shall mean the city-county health officer as defined by sec. 252.01(3), Wis Stats.

C. "Physical distancing" shall mean maintaining at least six feet of distance from other persons who are not members of your household or living unit.

<u>8.35.030 Jurisdiction</u>. Pursuant to sec. 251.08, Wis. Stats., jurisdiction of this ordinance by the Eau Claire City County Health Department shall extend to the entire area within Eau Claire County, except that jurisdiction does not extend to cities, villages, and towns that have local health departments.

<u>8.35.040 Requirement to wear a face covering</u>. Every person, age five or older, who is located within the jurisdiction of Eau Claire County shall wear a face covering if the following apply:

A. The person is indoors or in an enclosed space, other than a private residence; and,

B. Another person or persons who are not members of the individual's household or living unit are present in the same room or enclosed space.

C. Face coverings are strongly recommended in all other settings, including outdoors, when it is not possible to maintain physical distancing.

D. Buildings with public access are required to post a notice at their entrance that face coverings are required.

8.30.050 Exceptions to the requirement to wear a face covering.

A. Persons who are otherwise required to wear a face covering may remove the face covering in the following situations:

1.While eating or drinking.

2. When communicating with an individual who is deaf or hard of hearing and communication cannot be achieved through other means.

3. While obtaining a service that requires the temporary removal of the face covering, such as dental services.

4.While sleeping.

5. While swimming or on duty as a lifeguard.

6. While a single individual is giving a religious, political, media, educational, artistic, musical, or theatrical presentation for an audience, the single speaker may remove the face covering when actively speaking if the speaker remains at least 6 feet away from all other individuals at all times, when his or her face covering is removed.

7. When engaging in work where wearing a face covering would create a risk to the individual as determined by government safety guidelines.

8. When a federal or state law or regulation prohibits the wearing of a face covering.

B.According to Centers for Disease Control (CDC) guidelines, the following are exempt from the requirement to wear a face covering:

1. Children between the age of 2 and 5 are encouraged to wear a face covering when physical distancing is not possible. The CDC does not recommend face coverings for children under the age of 2.

2. Persons who have trouble breathing.

3. Persons who are unconscious, incapacitated, or otherwise unable to remove the face covering without assistance.

4. Persons with medical conditions, intellectual or developmental disabilities, mental health conditions, or other sensory sensitivities that prevent the person from wearing a face covering.

5. Incarcerated individuals. The Eau Claire County Jail will continue to comply with COVID-19 protocols to ensure the health and safety of staff and people who are incarcerated.

<u>8.35.060 Enforcement</u>. Failure of an individual to comply with this ordinance may result in the issuance of a citation by the local health officer, or his or her designee, or any law enforcement officer, resulting in a forfeiture of \$200.00 per incident, with each incident constituting a new and separate violation.

<u>8.35.070 Effective date and sunset</u>. This ordinance will go into effect only if the Emergency Order dated November 20, 2020 issued by the governor of the State of Wisconsin requiring the use of face coverings, or any successor face covering order of the governor is vacated by a decision of the Supreme Court of the State of Wisconsin, the legislature, or if the governor does not extend the order. This ordinance will be published as a class 1 notice and will become effective the day after publication. This ordinance will sunset on June 30, 2021 and will be automatically repealed on that date unless otherwise repealed earlier by action of the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors.

CREATING SECTION 4.30.140 OF THE EAU CLAIRE COUNTY CODE; CHILD SUPPORT AGENCY FEES

WHEREAS, pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.53, Eau Claire County administers the Wisconsin child support program at a local level consistent with the terms and provisions of a contract with the Wisconsin Department of Children and Families.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.53 and consistent with the term and provisions of said contract, the Eau Claire County Child Support Agency (hereafter "CSA") provides federally funded child support enforcement services under 42 U.S. Code Part D, commonly referred to as the IVD program (pronounced 4-D), and IVD cases are worked by CSA staff to establish paternity, child support obligations and enforcement as a result of a referral to CSA by the Department of Human Services because the parties to the case are receiving state or federal aid assistance or because the customer applied directly for CSA services. The CSA receives reimbursement from the state for providing IVD services; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.53 and consistent with the term and provisions of said contract, the CSA also provides certain unfunded mandated services to non-IVD (hereafter "NIVD") cases where there is not an application for CSA services and/or where there is no public assistance being received by the parties in the case, but where the CSA is mandated to put the case record into the statewide KIDS database; and

WHEREAS, although private attorneys typically represent the parties in NIVD cases, the cases are entered into the KIDS system by the CSA for tracking financial billing and payments, but the CSA receives no Federal reimbursement for work conducted on these types of cases; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Federal Office of Child Support Enforcement (OCSE) guidance, counties may elect to charge a fee for NIVD services and selective IVD services, specifically, providing payment histories and your undersigned committee does believe it is in the best interest of Eau Claire County to adopt the fee schedule as indicated below.



MEMORANDUM

TO: NICK SMIAR, COUNTY BOARD CHAIR

RE: PROPOSED ORDINANCES 20-21/027 AND 20-21/028

Pursuant to your request I have reviewed the above referenced proposed ordinances in comparison to the current budget procedures found in the Eau Claire County Code and Wis. Stat. §59.60.

Proposed ordinance 20-21/027 adopts the language of §59.60 based on the language of §59.60(1) *"any county with a county executive or county administrator may elect to be subject to the provisions of this section."* This proposed ordinance largely adopts the language of Wis. Stat. §59.60 that applies to counties with a county administrator. This proposed ordinance would modify the budget procedure that already exists under Chapter 4.02 of the county code.

Proposed ordinance 20-21/028 creates a new budget procedure in Chapter 4.02 of the code that is "consistent" with Wis. Stat. §59.60. This proposed ordinance does not adopt all of the language of Wis. Stat. §59.50 but creates budgeting procedure that is "consistent" with §59.60. This proposed ordinance would modify the budget procedure that already exists under Chapter 4.02 of the county code.

The following is a comparison of 20-21/028 to the current county code and the language of Wis. Stat. §59.60 (found in 20-21/027):

Section 1, proposed amendments to 2.04.085 of the code.

2.04.085 B. 1. Creates the language: "*Review and participate in the development of the annual budget as provided in Chapter 4.02.*"

Under the current language of 4.02.060 the "department budgets shall be completed and reviewed by governing committees and submitted to the finance director by August 20." Wis. Stat. §59.60 does not give a role to the finance and budget committee in the development of the annual budget, that is left to the county administrator. §Wis. Stat. 59.60(7) gives authority

to the finance and budget committee to submit "*its recommendations for amendments to the administrator's budget.*" After the submission of the budget to the board, and after the public hearing.

2.04.085 B. 2. Creates language: "Hold public input hearings on the development of the annual budget."

This language does not currently exist in the county code. Wis. Stat. §59.60(7) requires the *"board*" to hold a public hearing after publication of a summary of the budget by the finance and budget committee.

2.04.085 B.3. "Monitor and make recommendations regarding departmental budget compliance throughout the year"

This function is already existing and is assigned to standing committees under section 2.04.140 B. 4. *"Each committee shall have the following powers: 4. To review, at least quarterly, the budgetary printouts of every department , agency, board or commission under its jurisdiction."*

The proposed language does not indicate to whom the finance and budget committee would be making recommendations to regarding budget compliance, or if it changes the responsibilities of the other standing committees with regards to reviewing the budgets of the departments they govern.

2.04.485 B.8. "Evaluate and consider the county's fund balance consistent with county policy."

While not otherwise enumerated in the code this would be consistent with the role of the finance and budget committee as the governing committee for the Finance Department.

Section 2. Amendment to 2.06.060 of the code.

The proposed ordinance changes the statutory reference from Wis. Stat. §59.18(5) to Wis. Stat.§59.60, and thereafter replaces the phrase "*Is responsible for submission of the annual budget to the board*" with "*shall submit*" the annual budget to the board;" and, "consult" is replaced with "*collaborate*" with the committee on finance and budget regarding procedures, format, and priorities in the preparation of the budget "as required under Chapter 4.02."

2.06.060 is that part of the Chapter of the code that creates the position of the County Administrator. The current version of §2.060.060 is language that is copied directly from the language of Wis. Stat. §59.18(5) which reads: *Notwithstanding any other provision of the law, the county administrator shall be responsible for the submission of the annual budget to the board.*"

Section 3. Amendments to Chapter 4.02 of the code.

4.02.001. "*Consistent with* §59.60." This creates a new budget procedure for Eau Claire County, amending the existing budget procedure found in Chapter 4.02. This language makes it consistent with §59.60 but does not adopt or elect to be subject to the provisions of §59.60. This does not violate 59.03 (home rule), because election to be subject to §59.60 by the county is not mandatory, and because the county, has the ability to create its own budget procedure, as long as it does not otherwise violate state statute.

4.02.010. This language is the same or similar to the language of §59.60(4), with the exception of the date. Ordinance 20-21/028 keeps the current dates set forth in Chapter 4.02 of the code. Wis. Stat. §59.50 would change the date to July 15.

4.02.020. deletes the review by "governing committees" and requires "After submission, the county administrator shall hold public hearings with the department head or representative of the department, in conjunction and cooperation with the department's governing committee and the committee on finance and budget. The department head shall appear and give information with regards to the appropriations requested, including programs and other justification of expenditures, and other data that the county administrator may request. The administrator may make changes the administrator deems proper."

This language is not clear if it requires departments to go to one meeting with the administrator, the governing committee and the finance and budget committee, or if there will continue to be separate meetings of the administrator and governing committee and finance and budget committee. Wis. Stat. §59.60 does not requires a separate review by the finance and budget committee. It only gives the finance and budget committee authority to submit amendments to the budget prior to consideration by the full board.

The proposed language codifies the current practice requiring departments to attend meeting with the administrator, the governing committee and the finance and budget committee.

4.02.030. This language is consistent with §59.60.

4.02.040 The language *"The committee shall hold public hearings"* is not consistent with §59.60(7) which requires the *"board"* to hold public hearings.

4.02.060. This language changes from "*two weeks*" to "*14 days*" as the time period prior to the public hearing when the budget books shall be provided to supervisors.

4.02.070. Creates requirement for the county board to hold a public hearing. This is consistent with §59.60(7), but it would be second public hearing on the budget after the one held under the proposed language of 4.02.040 by the finance and budget committee.

Because of the similarity of these two proposed ordinances I would suggest that you provide a copy of this memorandum to board members to help them determine the differences in the proposed ordinances.

RE: PROPOSED ORDINANCE 20-21/028

QUESTION: Chair Smiar, you have asked me review ordinance 20-21/028 and provide a summary of the changes that 20-21/028 makes to the code, and then provide that information to the Board.

BACKGROUND:

Proposed ordinance 20-21/028 amends the following sections of the county code:

2.04.085 Committee on Finance and Budget 2.06.060 County Administrator Chapter 4.02 Budgeting Procedure

Chapter 4.02 of the code as it currently exists provides little guidance with regards to the annual process of creating a budget. Ordinance 20-21/028 is creates a formal budget process for the county.

When considering Ordinance 20-12/028 you should also be aware of the following:

The position of county administrator is created by Wis. Stat. §59.18 and Chapter 2.06 of the county code. Wis. Stat. §59.18(2) *The County Administrator is the chief administrative officer of the county.* §59.18(5) *The county administrator shall annually, and otherwise as necessary, communicate to the board the condition of the county, and recommend such matters to the board for its consideration as the county administrator considers expedient.* Notwithstanding *any other provision of the law, the county administrator shall be responsible for the submission of the annual budget to the board.* (partially adopted by 2.06.060 of the county code)

The finance and budget committee is a standing committee of the county board. Section 2.04.485 generally sets forth the responsibilities of the finance and budget committee. The responsibilities of the committee under Section 2.04.485 currently does not include a role in the creation of the annual budget. The committee does however have responsibilities under Section 2.04.140 B.4. as a standing committee to "*review at least quarterly, the budgetary printouts of every department board or commission under its jurisdiction.*" The finance and budget committee also has responsibilities under Chapter 4.02 (Budgetary Procedure) related to the user fee schedule.

PROPOSED ORDINANCE 20-21/028

Proposed Ordinance 20-21/028 is divided into three sections:

Section 1: Amendment to 2.04.485 Committee on Finance and Budget.

The proposed amendment to 2.04.485 creates the following powers and duties for the finance and budget committee not previously stated in 2.04.485:

- 1. Review and participate in the development of the annual budget as provided in chapter 4.02
- 2. Hold public input hearings on the development of the annual budget.
- 3. Monitor and make recommendations regarding departmental budget compliance throughout the fiscal year.
- 4. Establish county fiscal policies and strategies.
- 5. Evaluate and consider the county's fund balance consistent with county policy.

Section 2. Amendment to 2.06.060 County Administrator Budget Preparation and execution.

The proposed language is:

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Pursuant to Wis. Stat. §59.48 .<u>60 and pursuant to Chapter 4.02</u>, the county administrator <u>shall</u> <u>submit</u> is responsible for submission of the annual budget to the board. The county administrator will <u>consult</u> <u>collaborate</u> with the committee on finance and budget regarding procedures, format, and priorities in the preparation of the budget <u>as required under Chapter 4.02</u>.

The language as it currently exists is a restatement of a portion of Wis. Stat. §59.18(5).

The modification removes "Is responsible for submission of" and replaces it with "shall submit" the annual budget. This language in combination to the changes in 2.04.485 changes responsibility for creation of the annual budget from the county administrator, to a process where the budget is created/developed by the finance and budget committee with the county administrator who "collaborates" with the committee.

Section 3. Chapter 4.02 Budgetary Procedure.

4.02.001 <u>Purpose Consistent with Wis. Stat §59.60</u>. This proposed language does not adopt the language of Wis. Stat. §59.60 but is creating a budgetary procedure "consistent" with that section of the statutes. Wis. Stat. §59.60 is a section of the statutes that allows counties with a county administrator to adopt the budgetary procedures of that section of the statutes.

4.02.010 The proposed ordinance creates dates by which departments are to submit budget information to the finance director:

4.02.020 Department Budget Review. Is amended as follows: Department budgets shall be completed and reviewed by governing committees and submitted to the finance director by August 20. The deadline may only be extended by written authorization of the county administrator. After such submission, the county administrator shall hold public hearings with the department head or a representative of the department, in conjunction and cooperation with the department's governing committee and the committee on finance and budget. The department head shall appear and give information with regard to the appropriations requested, including programs and other justifications of expenditures, and other data that the county administrator may request. The administrator may make changes the administrator deems proper.

This creates the first of two public hearings under the proposed ordinance that the finance and budget committee will participate in. Under the current code there is not language requiring either the finance and budget committee or the county administrator to hold public hearings. The past practice has been that the departments would present their budget to the administrator and to their governing committee where it would be reviewed at the regularly scheduled meeting of the governing committee. The finance and budget committee for many years has required departments to attend a separate meeting to independently review departmental budgets.

4.02.040 Referral to the Committee on Finance and Budget. The county board shall refer the administrator's budget to the committee on finance and budget for publication as a class 1 notice with a summary of the administrator's proposed budget. The committee shall hold public hearings. After such public hearing, the committee on finance and budget shall submit to the board its recommendation for amendments to the administrator's budget.

This language is consistent with the language of §59.60 except that in Wis. Stat. §59.60(7) it is the county board and not the finance and budget committee who is responsible for holding the public hearing. Under the proposed language of ordinance 20-21/028 this is the second public hearing the finance and budget committee would participate in as part of this budget process. This new language also creates the responsibility for the finance and budget committee to submit recommendation for amendment(s) to the administrator's budget to the board. In the code as it currently exists the finance and budget committee does not have a responsibility to review and submit proposed amendments to the budget to the county board. However, it has been a past practice of the finance and budget committee to submit amendments to the board, after they have conducted their own review of the budget.

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4.02.070 County Board public hearing, review, and approval. The county board shall hold a public hearing on the annual budget at which time the citizens may appear to express their opinions. After such public hearing, the county board shall deliberate the annual budget and consider the amendments presented by the committee on finance and budget. Any additional amendments must be presented and voted upon as individual items by the county board.

This creates a third public hearing of the budget, this one to be held by the county board, and it requires the board to consider the amendments of the finance and budget committee.

Consideration of the amendments of the committee by the board is consistent with the language of §59.60 and past budgetary practice. There currently exists a requirement for a public hearing by the county board during the annual budget meeting. It is listed as agenda item number 5 under Section 2.04.030 D., Order of Business for the Annual Meeting.

SUMMARY:

4

The proposed language of Section 1 of the ordinance creates new powers and duties under Section 2.04.485 of the county code. It expands the powers of the finance and budget committee by giving it role in the development of the budget, authority to hold public hearings on the budget, monitoring and making recommendations to departments throughout the year, establish fiscal policies and strategies, and to evaluate and consider the county's fund balance consistent with county policy.

As a county administrator form of government, it is the role of the County Administrator to develop and submit the annual budget to the board. Guidance on this issue is offered by Wis. Stats. §59.18(5) and Wis. Stat. 59.60 that make the administrator responsible for creation and submission of the annual budget to the county board. While there are not specifically defined roles for the finance and budget committee in the code or the statutes, if one were to look for guidance it could be found in Wis. Stat. §59.60 where the role of the financé and budget committee is to suggest amendments to be considered by the board after a public hearing is held by the county board (§59.60(7)).

Monitoring and making recommendations to department budgets throughout the year is currently a function of the governing committees. Who according to §2.04.140 B.4. shall review at least quarterly, the budgetary printouts of every department board or commission under its jurisdiction. Currently, and according to the county code, the finance and budget committee is limited to reviewing the budgetary printouts of the departments under its jurisdiction. The proposed language would expand the role of the finance and budget committee to review the budgets of all department s including those under the jurisdiction of other committees.

Currently, there is no authority stated in the county code for the finance and budget committee to on its own, hold public hearings on the budget. The county board has traditionally held a public hearing at the start of the budget meeting (§2.04.030 D.) Guidance on this issue would come from Wis. Stat. §59.60(7) that indicates that the county board would hold a public

hearing on the budget after referral to and publication of a first class notice by the finance committee. The proposed changes have the finance and budget committee participating in three proposed public hearings for the budget the first with the administrator and the departments under the proposed changes to §4.02.020; the second by holding its own public hearings under §4.02.040; and the third as part of the county board public hearing under §4.02.070.

Establishing fiscal policies and to evaluate and consider the county's fund balance are functions ultimately the responsibility of the county board, with updates on information being provided to the board from the county administrator as the chief administrative officer. It is unclear from the proposed language to what extent the role of the finance and budget committee will be with regards to evaluating and considering the fiscal policies of the county and the fund balances of the county. Currently, the committee does review and approve fiscal policies that are recommended by the finance department. This is consistent with its role as the governing committee for the finance department. Likewise, I would assume that the finance department as part of its regular reports to the committee is including an update to the committee on the status of the fund balance.







RESOLUTION

AUTHORIZING THE EXPENDITURE OF FUNDS TO CONDUCT A FORENSIC AUDIT OF THE FINANCES OF THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES

WHEREAS, the Department of Human Services has overspent its budget consistently over the last three years (2017-2019), for a cumulative amount of over \$7,500,000; and,

WHEREAS, during the same three-year period the number of staff in the Department of Human Services has increased by 70 individuals, or about 45 percent. This includes 17 FTEs from the juvenile detention center; and,

WHEREAS, the overage in the budget for the Department of Human Services for the year 2019 exceeded \$3,100,000 of levy, or about 35 percent overage of levy, and 10 percent of the overall budget; and,

WHEREAS, the Department of Human Services made an accounting error of approximately \$1,200,000 in the 2019 end of year reconciliation; and,

WHEREAS, the finances of the Department of Human Services appear to be in disarray despite a fiscal staff of more than 20 full time equivalent employees; and,

WHEREAS, criminal charges were recently filed against a former employee of the Department of Human Service, that allege the employee stole credit cards and gift cards from the department, and that the theft went unnoticed for approximately a year due to the inadequate accounting and reconciling; and,

WHEREAS, a previous request for a program audit of the Department of Human Services resulted in a cursory analysis and a two-page memo from the auditors.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors authorizes a complete forensic audit to be completed of the Department of Human Services, with the scope of work to be determined jointly by the Committee on Administration and Committee on Finance and Budget; and,

NOW THERFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Board of supervisors authorizes the expenditure of up to \$100,000 to complete a forensic audit of the finances of the Department of Human Services by an accounting firm, the name of which will be determined jointly by the Committee on Administration and the Committee on Finance and Budget.

As an alternative means of protecting the public health, safety and welfare of the county and its residents, the county board may consider adoption by ordinance of a local health officer order, or advisory, in whole or in part, at any time. Ordinance adoption following a properly noticed meeting and public discussion shall be necessary in order to continue enforceability of any local health officer order, in whole or in part, after the time period of one year related to the same incident or local health condition.

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8.30.060 Procedural safeguards. Any order issued pursuant to this chapter shall satisfy
 all of the following or failing to do so shall be only advisory in nature.

A. As soon as practicable upon issuance of an order and regularly thereafter, the local health officer shall undertake an investigation of all relevant local medical and public health conditions and report the same to the board of health for review and recommendation.

15 B. Such orders shall be no longer than 30 days in effect but may be renewed for 16 succeeding 30 day or shorter periods based on local conditions.

17 C. The local health officer shall make a report to the county board regarding the local 18 conditions and the necessity of any requirements in the local health order at every held regularly 19 scheduled county board meeting during the order, which shall be at least every 30 days.

D. Publication as a class one notice under ch. 985, Wis. Stats. for public notice and awareness of standards of conduct they must follow or be subject to enforcement. Such orders shall have the full force and effect of law immediately upon publication of the order as a class 1 notice under ch. 985, Wis. Stats., and, unless otherwise specifically provided, shall take effect immediately following publication. Publication shall be required upon the initial issuance of the order and for any renewal of the order in which the substantive requirements for an individual or entity's actions have changed.

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<u>8.30.070 Substantive Safeguards.</u> Any order issued pursuant to this chapter shall also
 satisfy all of the following or failing to do so shall be only advisory in nature.

A. Only impose such restrictions and requirements as are necessary based on a factual inquiry into local circumstances to prevent, suppress and control direct human health risks proximately related to a highly infectious, novel or otherwise unusually difficult to treat communicable disease, illness, or comparable community wide public health threat that without prompt action significantly threatens the health and imperils the lives of residents as determined in the professional judgment of the local health officer.

B. To the extent feasible, orders shall be content neutral, non-discriminatory, avoid classifications and shall be reasonable and necessary in scope and duration. Classification shall only be used when necessary, and if necessary, then only when classification substantially relates to the mitigation of a threat to public health based on local conditions and as supported by best available scientific understanding. n scope and duration.

C. State the strategic purpose of the order.

42 D. State a finding by the local health officer that voluntary targeted disease control
43 strategies are inadequate to achieve the order's purpose and that compulsory measures are

State the current scientific understanding on which the order relies are is based, including any available evidence and the reasoning behind any determinations the public health officer has made regarding the transmission and virulence of the infectious agent or toxin, the routes by which the it is transmitted, and the factors the determine the risk of transmission as they relate to the content of the order, including the local health officer's finding that a
