- Requiring insurance companies to cover "uninsured motorist" insurance claims when no contact was made between the insured's car and another car, thereby increasing the risk of fraudulent claims;
- Allowing "stacking" of coverage for "underinsured motorists" such that the coverage limits for an accident are not limited to the policy relating to the particular vehicle involved in the accident;
- Forcing excess or umbrella insurers to offer to cover certain claims when the coverage was not requested by the insured; and

WHEREAS, the aforementioned anti-tort reform proposals would significantly increase the cost of providing insurance in Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County would see a substantial increase in its liability insurance premiums if the governor's anti-tort reform proposals are enacted; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire county faces significant budgetary challenges related to the provision of critical state and county services at a time when state and federal financial support for such services is decreasing and the burden placed on Eau Claire County taxpayers is growing; and

WHEREAS, adding new costs for counties and forcing counties to increase their tax levies during our current economic downturn would be devastating to property taxpayers who can ill afford increased taxes or increased insurance costs.

WHEREAS, the governor's proposed biennial state budget, Assembly Bill 75, proposes to make the prevailing wage law applicable to any public works contract over \$2,000; and

WHEREAS, under current law the prevailing wage requirements only apply to multiple-trade public works projects over \$234,000 and singe-trade public works projects over \$48,000; and

WHEREAS, reducing the threshold to \$2,000 will increase the cost of small public works projects previously exempted from the prevailing wage requirement in many communities; and

WHEREAS, the cost increase to pay prevailing wages on all public works projects over \$2,000 will force counties and other local governments to reduce the number and/or size of public works projects or raise taxes to meet the increased costs, which would further burden property taxpayers; and

WHEREAS, the governor's proposed budget also for the first time proposes to make the prevailing wage law applicable to private projects that receive public financing; and

WHEREAS, the impact of these proposed changes to the prevailing wage law would add to the cost of projects in Eau Claire County over the next two years at a time when Eau Claire County is operating under numerous financial constraints including proposed levy limits and tax rate limits; and

WHEREAS, the proposed changes to the prevailing wage law in the budget are non-fiscal policy items that should be addressed as separate legislation so that lawmakers can give more thoughtful consideration to changing the cost threshold for public works projects and clarifying statutory language to distinguish between routine maintenance and construction projects.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors opposes the changes to the prevailing wage law proposed in AB 75, and urges the legislature and the governor to remove these items from the budget bill.

WHEREAS, the Eau Claire Area School District Board of Education, on March 16, 2009, adopted a resolution authorizing the Eau Claire Area School District to participate in the commission, and further authorized members to serve thereon; and

WHEREAS, the commission believes that expanding the membership of the commission by adding the Eau Claire Area School District will provide greater potential for exploration of the policy issues related to expanding intergovernmental shared services in specific operational areas that increase efficiency, improve quality or reduce costs in the delivery of public services in the greater Eau Claire community while maintaining accountability and further supporting the public policy emphasis on the concept of shared services; and

-EAU CLAIRE COUNTY SUPPORT FOR PASSENGER RAIL SERVICE IN THE CHIPPEWA VALLEY AND WEST CENTRAL WISCONSIN-

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County has and will continue to experience population growth; and

WHEREAS, the Chippewa Valley region and surrounding areas along the Highway I-94 Corridor between Eau Claire and Hudson have also experienced population growth patterns; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County is part of the West Central Wisconsin planning region that encompasses the Chippewa Valley and St. Croix Valley areas from Eau Claire/Chippewa Falls through Menomonie and Hudson/River Falls, and this area is recognized as the fastest growing population area in the state; and

WHEREAS, this growth will accelerate congestion on our roadways and hasten the need for a six-lane 1-94 from Hudson to Eau Claire; and

WHEREAS, federal officials in the Midwest Regional Rail System report of 2004 and state officials in the Wisconsin Connections 2030 report have expressed support for passenger rail in Wisconsin, but the West Central Wisconsin area is not included in the immediate planning, but only considered as an area of future concern; and

WHEREAS, this lack of passenger rail could be a detriment to the economic future and quality of life in the Chippewa Valley; and

WHEREAS, the state's own studies already point to the feasibility ofrail service to the region in scenarios examined by WisDOT that included an Eau Claire-Hudson-St. Paul Route that showed that implementing intercity passenger rail service to Eau Claire and West Central Wisconsin would improve the overall financial performance of the system.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors that the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) make the following changes to Chapter 8 of the Connections 2030 Plan:

- Formally adopt the "Eau Claire plus La Crosse" plan for the portion of the rail network between Madison and St. Paul. When fully completed, this would provide frequent passenger trains operating between Chicago, Milwaukee, Madison and St. Paul. Trains would alternate between using the current Amtrak route via La Crosse and Winona, MN and the Chippewa/St. Croix route via Black River Falls, Eau Claire, Menomonie and Hudson.
- 2 Undertake engineering, environmental impact studies and other planning activities for the route via Eau Claire/Hudson simultaneously with the La Crosse route to ensure it is a "ready to go" transportation project.
- 3. Implement the Eau Claire-Hudson-St. Paul "Eau Claire West" alternative as part of Phase II of the network's implementation, as an extension of the initial Madison-La Crosse-St. Paul route.

This potential route

would connect between the Eau Claire West and Milwaukee-Green Bay lines, providing service to the other major area of the state - Central Wisconsin - left out of the rail network.

WHEREAS, the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (the "Act") grants Eau Claire County, Wisconsin (the "county") certain authority to issue Recovery Zone Economic Development Bonds and Recovery Zone Facility Bonds (collectively the "Bonds"); and

WHEREAS, prior to issuing the Bonds, the Act requires the county to make certain findings of fact and designate the county a recovery zone (the "Recovery Zone") pursuant to the requirements of the Act; and

WHEREAS, the Act provides that a Recovery Zone includes areas:

- (1) having significant:
 - (a) poverty;
 - (b) unemployment;
 - (c) rate of home foreclosures; or
 - (d) general distress.
- (2) economically distressed by reason of closure or realignment of a military installation pursuant to the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Act of 1990; or
- (3) for which a designation as an empowerment zone or renewal community is in effect.

WHEREAS, the Eau Claire Area Economic Development Corporation and the Eau Claire County Board (the "county board") has determined that, as a result of the recent economic recession, the county has experienced an increased rate of unemployment, increased rate of home foreclosures and is experiencing general distress; and

WHEREAS, the Eau Claire Area Economic Development Corporation has prepared a factual report ("Report") documenting the findings contained in this resolution and said Report is attached to and incorporated by reference in this resolution; and

WHEREAS, the Eau Claire County unemployment rate has increased from 3.9% in July of2008 to 6.8% in July of2009, home foreclosures in Eau Claire County have increased from 192 through the first three quarters of 2008 to 227 through the first three quarters of2009 and Medical Assistance claims have increased from 16,581 for all of2008 to 18,044 through the only first three quarters of2009.

WHEREAS, at the joint committee meeting of the committees on administration, finance and budget and human resources on June 1, 2009, the committees adopted a motion to budget a 0% salary and benefit increase in 2010 for all employees; and

WHEREAS, on July 21, 2009, the county board adopted resolution File No. 09-10/055 freezing the nonrepresented employees' salary schedule for calendar year 2010 and resolution File No. 09-10/048 requiring nonrepresented employees hired on or after August 1, 2009 to pay the entire employee share of the Wisconsin Retirement Fund; and

WHEREAS, nonrepresented employees understand the budget crisis the county is facing for 2010, and would be willing to contribute to the Wisconsin Retirement Fund in an amount equivalent to the 2010 increase, and an additional 1% of health insurance premiums and make position adjustments and not fill vacancies to assist the county in managing the budget and avoiding layoffs for the nonrepresented employees; and

WHEREAS, at its meeting on November 2, 2009, the committee on human resources approved a motion which would result in a 0% salary and benefit increase in 2010 for non-represented employees by having employees contribute .6% (nonprotective service) and 1% (protective service) of gross wages to the Wisconsin Retirement Fund, increasing the employee share of the health insurance premium from 8% to 9% and that the balance be made up by position adjustments and not filling vacancies created.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors that, effective January 1, 2010, nonrepresented employees contribute .6% (non-protective service) or 1% (protective service) of gross wages to the Wisconsin Retirement Fund, contribute an additional 1% of the health insurance premium and that the balance of the increase in nonrepresented benefits be made up by position adjustments and not filling vacant positions and if the balance is not made up authorizing the county administrator to implement such other methods as he deems appropriate.

medical examination given before his or her joining the department showed no evidence of the impairment or disease; and

WHEREAS, under Senate Bill 429, in a proceeding regarding benefits for a fire fighter, a law enforcement officer or a correctional officer who dies or is disabled as a result of certain infectious diseases, there is a presumption that the disease was caused by the person's employment; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 429 does not require a minimum term of employment to qualify for the presumption.

WHEREAS, under the current law, participants under the Wisconsin Retirement System whose principal duties involve law enforcement or fire suppression or prevention and require frequent exposure to a high degree of danger or peril and a high degree of physical conditioning are classified as protective occupation participants. Current law specifically classifies police officers, fire fighters and various other individuals as protective occupation participants. Under the Wisconsin Retirement System (WRS), the normal retirement age of a protective occupation participant is lower than that of other participants and the percentage multiplier used to calculate retirement annuities is higher for protective occupation participants than for other participants; and

WHEREAS, the proposed bill classifies county jail employees, county employees of a juvenile detention facility and state employees who are employed at state correctional institutions, juvenile correctional facilities, the mental health institutes at Mendota and Winnebago, the Wisconsin Resource Center, secure mental health units or facilities for sexually violent persons as protective occupation participants, but only if collective bargaining agreements covering the employees require the employees to become protective occupation participants; and

WHEREAS, the proposed bill makes protective occupation participant status a mandatory subject of collective bargaining.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors opposes Assembly Bill 634 making protective occupation participant status under the WRS a mandatory subject of collective bargaining under the Municipal Employment Relations Act and the State Employees Labor Relations Act.

WHEREAS, AB 606 proposes to rescind the sunset of PEG fees and allow municipalities to reinstate the fees up to 1%, move oversight from the Department of Financial Institutions to the Public Service Commission, further require video providers to maintain the quality and accessibility to subscribers of community access channels without additional service or equipment charges and allow municipalities to set a video service provider fee of up to 5% of the operator's annual gross receipts with no deductions for right-of-way pennit fees.

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-SUPPORTING DELAYED IMPLEMENTATION OF FARMLAND PRESERVATION REZONING CONVERSION FEE-

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County has participated in the Wisconsin Fannland Preservation Program since the Eau Claire County Fannland Preservation Plan was adopted by the county board in 1983 and exclusive agricultural zoning was adopted in 1982; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County's participation in the Wisconsin Fannland Preservation Program has resulted in the preservation of productive agricultural land and allowed fanners to collect tax credits totaling more than 6 million dollars since 1983; and

WHEREAS, the authorizing statute, Chapter 91 Wisconsin Statutes, remained largely unchanged for nearly 30 years until Governor Doyle and the Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection (DATCP) proposed revisions (known as the Working Lands Initiative) to Chapter 91 in Assembly Bill 75, the proposed 2009-2011 state budget; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Bill 75 was signed into law as 2009 Wisconsin Act 28 on June 29, 2009, and it revised Chapter 91 to require landowners to pay a rezoning conversion fee beginning on January 1,2010 when they rezone their land from the A-1 Exclusive Agricultural District to any other zoning district, whether or not they ever farmed the land or ever collected farmland preservation tax credits; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 91 requires all counties to update their farmland preservation plan over the next five years and, within one year after plan adoption, requires counties to update their exclusive agricultural zoning ordinances to maintain certification for tax credit eligibility; and

WHEREAS, the implementation of the rezoning conversion fee is an imposition on county government and places undue pressure on counties to act immediately to revise their plans and ordinances, without the benefit of state financial assistance; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 91 imposes the rezoning conversion fee on January I, 2010, based on existing plans, ordinances and zoning maps, without the benefit of an updated farmland preservation plan or ordinance; and

WHEREAS, charging the rezoning conversion fee is a burden on property owners who are not farmers, whose land is not currently being farmed, and who never collected farmland preservation tax credits in the past; and

WHEREAS, delaying implementation of the rezoning conversion fee until after revised plan and ordinance adoption and certification allows counties and landowners time to properly address all the planning and zoning requirements of the new Working Lands Program.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors hereby requests that legislation be introduced and passed to delay the implementation of the farmland preservation rezoning conversion fee under §91.48(1)(b) Wisconsin Statutes until a county updates its farmland preservation plan and zoning ordinance and the plan and ordinance are certified by DATCP.

The County Board adopted a budget in November 2007 that included a property tax levy rate increase to meet the debt service requirements for paying off the \$59.1 million construction bonds within 22 years. No further increase would be needed to pay for Alternative 1.

Regarding the impact on property tax levy rates of Alternative 2, it is estimated that property tax levy rates would increase by approximately \$.50 per \$1,000 of equalized value. As an example, the property tax rate on a \$150,000 home would increase by \$75 per year for 25 years.

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-RESOLUTION SUPPORTING LANGUAGE IN ASSEMBLY SUBSTITUTE AMENDMENT I TO AB 447 TO RESTRICT PREDATORY LENDING PRACTICES IN WISCONSIN-

WHEREAS, predatory lenders issue small, short-term high rate loans to consumers that are to be repaid within a specified timeframe. These may be called check cashing, payday loans, cash advance loans or check advance loans; and

WHEREAS, the predatory loan industry entered Wisconsin in 1995 when state laws that prohibited interest rates above 18% were removed; and

WHEREAS, former President Bush and the US congress protected US military personnel against predatory lending practices in the 2007 National Defense Authorization Act by including an amendment to limit interest rates on payday loans; and

WHEREAS, the provisions set forth in Assembly Substitute Amendment I to AB 447 include:

- Limit the amount of loans to a maximum of \$600 or 35% of biweekly income.
- Prohibit auto title loans.
- Prohibit rollovers.
- Limit persons to having one loan at a time.
- Create a statewide database to keep track of borrowers. Database would be overseen by Department of Financial Institutions (DFI).
- Provide penalties for lenders for violate the law.
- Provide borrowers with private causes of action.
- Provide for a four-payment option for persons who fail to repay loans.
- Require lenders to disclose all costs and fees attached to the loan.
- Limit lenders to charging a one-time \$15 fee for returned checks.

WHEREAS, a need exists to protect the vulnerable against the dangers of exploitive lending practices and their negative effects upon communities and those that are least able to bear the cost.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors hereby strongly supports protecting all Wisconsin citizens and families against exploitive lending practices and hereby supports language in Assembly Substitute Amendment I to AB 447 to restrict predatory lepding practices in Wisconsin.



Rezoning Petition of Milton and Melissa Schmidt to rezone a parcel of land from the A-3 Agricultural District to the A-2 Agricultural-Residential District

<u>ANALYSIS</u>

On Tuesday, September 22, 2009, the committee on planning and development convened a public hearing to consider the rezoning petition of Milton and Melissa Schmidt, property owners, to rezone a parcel of land from the A-3 Agricultural District to the A-2 Agriculture-Residential District. The property is described as follows: LOT 1 OF CSM V.12 PG.190 (#2267) lying in the NW-SE and in the SW-SE of Section 30, T27N, R7W, Town of Lincoln. The property is in the northeast corner of the intersection of Birch Tree Lane and County Highway K.

Staff presented a staff report, recommending that the committee file a recommendation to the county board to deny the rezoning petition because the rezoning petition did not meet all of the required standards for rezoning property from the A-3 District to another zoning district. The committee considered the public testimony, the town board's action, staff analysis and statutory requirements and voted to recommend denial of the petition.

Compared to Other Counties, Is the Eau Claire County Jail Project Overpriced?

Supervisors Tami Schraufnagel and Maureen Slauson, and citizens Daniel May, Bob Schraufnagel and Ryan Wells toured jail and government center facilities in Dunn and St. Croix counties on April 14th. This action was taken in response to a letter sent by Judge Benjamin Proctor to the Jail Special Committee, urging committee members and board supervisors to investigate facilities in other counties, in order to gather evidence-based information about jail expansion experiences elsewhere, and also to explore the "secure courts" initiative recommended by the State of Wisconsin. Officials and staff from both counties offered insight into the rationale and decision-making processes underlying the construction of each of these centers. Detailed plans and construction cost figures were provided as well as statistics about sizes of the "as built" facilities.

Today, these counties are satisfied with their facilities, although both experienced problems with contractors during construction and also, in hindsight, would have made different decisions regarding certain structural and proprietary materials issues. Officials supplied the group with a list of potential problems which might occur during Eau Claire County's building process. Neither county experienced public resistance because in both cases, it was decided to relocate the projects away from densely populated downtown areas, to sites on the outskirts of town. Citizens of Hudson actually requested that the county move their project out of downtown to open that valuable real-estate to more appropriate development.

Summary of Projects

Dunn County: Built in 1997 for \$15.5 million (\$20.54 million adjusted for inflation)¹ Dunn County's judicial center houses a multipurpose meeting room, four secure courts, court commissioner hearing room, offices for District Attorney, Child Support, Clerk of Courts, Probate, Menomonie City Police, Dunn County Sheriff and a jail that includes 56 Huber beds and a secure jail pod that holds 102 inmates. (115,000 total sq. ft.)

St. Croix County: Built in 1991 for \$13 million (\$20.3 million adjusted for inflation)¹ St. Croix County's Government Center houses all county operations except Human Services, Aging, Extension, Parks and Highway Departments. (Hudson City Police building located off-site). The center includes four secure courtrooms (with the potential to add four more) and two hearing rooms. The Government Center jail includes 58 Huber beds and a secure jail pod with 120 secure jail beds. (140,000 total sq. ft.)

Eau Claire County - Proposed Jail Expansion: Proposed cost, \$60.9 million

The project includes construction of a 3-pod jail with 266 secure beds and a fourth shelled in pod (185, 000 sq. ft.; no new Huber beds), as well as construction of a law enforcement garage. The project also provides remodeling in the current facility to expand space for law enforcement and relocate certain county departments. The project does not address the need for a new secure courts building. Note: Eau Claire County has off-site office locations for Highway, Parks, Land Conservation and Extension.

Observation: For that price, we could get three

Multiplication of cost figures adjusted for inflation show that the cost of the proposed Eau Claire County project could fund three projects the size of St. Croix County. This hypothetical "3 center" design would contain 12 secure courts, secure jail cells that could house 288, Huber dorms with a 162 bed capacity, 3 large county sheriff law enforcement centers, and 3 times the necessary office space for all court related departments, at 420,000 total sq. ft., a facility much beyond the needs of Eau Claire County.

The Special Committed indicated that Eau Claire County plans to keep county administration and law enforcement downtown even if the jail is moved. It appears that the \$60.9 million projected cost could fund the proposed law enforcement garage (\$1.3 million), remodeling in the current facility (\$8.1 million) and still build a quality Justice Center, including secure courts, adequate jail and Huber facilities, as well as office space for District Attorney, Clerk of Courts, Child Support and Probate.

Why is Eau Claire County's project so expensive?

So far, the answer seems elusive, but it's likely that the following would explain at least part of it. The downtown site has extreme space limitations. All plans explored by the Special Committee for this site are multi-story designs, with future growth possible by adding more stories to the building as needed. St. Croix and Dunn Counties both have single story jails (although the "pod" has 2-stories of cells) with multi-story office/court space, but because they ensured adequate land availability, their planned expansion would be horizontal rather than vertical. Architects who presented at Eau Claire's Special Committee meetings acknowledged that vertical construction is more costly due to special requirements for elevators and stairs, plus added structural elements needed to accommodate footing and column strength requirements to support a taller building.

Poor soil conditions and flood plain concerns at the proposed site limit construction options. The condition of the ground will require supportive piers. Flood plain restrictions disallow more economical, below grade construction. Coincidentally, facilities in both Dunn and St. Croix counties were built on sloping land and into hillsides to provide additional below grade space, offering examples to support layout and design options for a comparable facility suggested for the Galloway Street site in Eau Claire.

The Special Committee repeatedly warned that building anywhere but downtown would be costprohibitive and adding a courthouse to the project would be far too expensive for consideration. That position is called into question, however, when we look at the success of Dunn and St. Croix counties in their expansion efforts.

SUBJECT:	EAU CLAIRE COUNTY 2010 BUDGET GUIDELINES

Economic constraints continue to require prudent and careful planning by all county departments. Again this year, each department is being asked to present a budget proposal using the same levy allocation approved for 2009.

The county has implemented performance management for every department. Each program, either within a department or interdepartmental, will be assessed based on performance and effectiveness, as well as affordability and its contribution to the county's strategic goals. Cooperative and collaborative programs that emphasize cost savings measures, with supporting performance data, will be given primary consideration.

GUIDELINES:

- 1. All Departments and agencies shall submit a proposed 2010 budget request for county levy funds using the same levy allocation approved for 2009.
- 2. Oversight Committees and Departments must prioritize department programs, including the following program information: program description, goals, performance data, effectiveness and detailed budget information. This performance management information will help justify the program's priority rank within the department.
- 3. Departments and agencies may submit addback requests for additional levy funding for both continuing and new programs. Add backs and new program requests must include

cost/benefit analyses, outcome standards and performance measures as part of the proposal.

- 4. Any new program that proposes external funding must include a financial sustainability projection.
- 5. The Oversight Committees, the County Administrator, the Committee on Finance & Budget, and the County Board will consider the following documents and information sources when requesting allocation of the consolidated funds:
 - The standard budget form, including the following sections:
 - * Programs and Services summary by program in priority order
 - * Overview of Expenditures and Revenues spreadsheet
 - * Summary of Requested Addbacks (if necessary)
 - * Departmental Organizational Chart
 - * 2010 Program Financials spreadsheet
 - * Performance Management Summary by Program (New for 2010)
 - * Future Challenges
 - Alignment of the program with the County Strategic Plan (2008)
 - The County Program Prioritization Analysis (2003)
 - Results of budgetary public input sessions
 - Results of the online budget survey instrument, and
 - Other applicable information sources.
- 6. Programs and services may not be funded at 2009 levels. Program outputs, outcomes and effectiveness will be the primary predictors of whether a program will sustain funding. Individual Oversight Committees, the County Administrator and Finance Director, the Committee on Finance and Budget will make the recommendations. The full County Board will make the final decision.
- 7. Departments are encouraged to work cooperatively to develop new and better services for the community, with particular emphasis on prevention programs. Departments shall evaluate whether program outcomes are achieving program goals, based on performance data. Departments shall also review all operations for process changes and alternative service provisions.
- 8. Departments are encouraged to look for alternative funding and revenue streams for programs.

- Specific emphasis should be given to conservation and cost-saving operations.
 Departments with vehicles must continue to support a fuel conservation plan continually looking for methods of reducing fuel consumption.
- 10. New or modified position requests, as well as reallocation of existing positions, will be considered. Total cost of position and relationship to specific program(s) must be included i.e., in-kind services, overhead costs, program outcomes, etc. All requests must follow current county code and personnel manual standards. All grant-funded positions shall be reviewed for sunset clauses. Position requests rejected by the Committee on Human Resources should not be included in the budget.
- 11. Capital improvement plan (5-year plan) requests will be analyzed using all available revenue sources. The total 2010 county-wide capital outlay levy cost shall not exceed the 2009 approved levy cost of \$199,775.
- 12. All departmental fund balances in excess of established fund balance formulas, law or code standards, or in excess of designated non-lapsing funds balances shall revert to the general fund.
- 13. County user fees shall be reviewed for potential increases. The review of fee schedules should include analysis of cost recovery for services. Departments and Committees should review all operations and determine whether user fees should be initiated for cost recovery of programs that primarily benefit the user versus the community at large. All user fee recommendations approved by oversight committees are due in the County Administrator's office by September 1, 2009.
- 14. All 2010 budget proposals shall be submitted to the Finance Director, by Wednesday, August 20, 2009. A separate budget package including all necessary budget worksheets will be available to all departments and agencies on the county intranet.

Community Agencies should follow the same guidelines as county departments. Community Agency budget requests not associated with specific county programs will be reviewed separately from department budgets.

The Finance Department will conduct staff training sessions on the 2010 budget process to explain guidelines and forms. The County Administrator and Finance Director will meet with standing committees as requested to review the 2010 budget guidelines, calendar and processes.

CORRECTIONS

When youth are committed to the Department of Corrections (DOC), Eau Claire County pays the State of Wisconsin, DOC, to provide case management services to the youth and their family. As a result, all the categories listed, simply refer to the status or level of placement for a youth under commitment to DOC (versus under county supervision). Youth can only be committed to corrections if they have been adjudicated (found/pled guilty) for committing certain crimes or certain levels of crimes (generally felonies and Class A Misdemeanors where punishment as adults would result in 6 month prison sentence).

Corrections – Institutions:

Includes:

- Lincoln Hills School (LHS)
- Southern Oaks Girls School (SOGS)

These are the correctional facilities/institutions for youth.

Corrections - Group Home, RCC, TFC:

These are simply youth that are placed in a group home, treatment foster care or a residential care facility and under the supervision of DOC. These are same facilities all counties departments use. Many times, youth are stepped down from the institution into a lower level of placement.

Corrections – Aftercare:

When youth leave LHS or SOGS and stepped down in placement to one of the above facilities, DOC then provides Aftercare.

Corrections SPRITE:

SPRITE is a 30-day challenge type program run by DOC. Youth remain under county supervision with no commitment to DOC occurring.

Corrective Sanctions:

Two Types: 1.) Youth are committed to DOC, but only go LHS or SOGS for approximately 30 days then come back out (usually back to their home) and are under the supervision of DOC. These youth remain in a reception-type are of the institutions and are not put into the general population. They are committed to DOC and are no longer under county supervision. If they violate, or are noncompliant, they can be placed at the institution without any kind of court hearing. This is usually our last attempt to try to keep youth out of a lengthy correctional facility placement.

2.) Youth that have completed their treatment at LHS or SOGS and are returned home under the continuing supervision of DOC. Like above, these youth can be returned to the institution at any time for noncompliance.

Currently, Eau Claire County only has four (4) youth committed to corrections, which is a significant reduction from previous years.

On June 08, 2009 the Committee on Judiciary and Law Enforcement met and discussed the potential ramifications of closing the Eau Claire County Huber Center and bringing out of county secure inmates back to the county jail. The item was on the agenda because of a question raised at a previous County Board Meeting. The purpose of this memo is to share the results from the June 8th meeting discussing the potential for closure of the Huber Center.

Eau Claire County Jail Captain Dan Bresina and Eau Claire County Sheriff Ron Cramer presented and discussed two documents related to the closure of the Huber Center. Attached you will find the documents, the first of which is labeled "Eau Claire County Estimated Allocation of Jail Costs." This document is meant to reflect the estimated costs to run the secure jail, Huber jail, electronic monitoring, and out of county secure housing. The second document labeled "Closure Of Huber" is meant to reflect the other costs and issues related to closure of the Huber Center. I encourage you to read this document from start to finish to understand the potential ramifications associated with closure of Huber.

The Judiciary and Law Enforcement committee feels the closure of the Huber Center and returning the out of county inmates to the jail is not a feasible option; it will not save Eau Claire County money and will create additional safety and security issues in an already deficient jail facility.

#### Closure Of Huber

The following document will describe thoughts and ideas for possible changes to the huber center and potential issues with those changes. I want to thank Corrections Officer G. Lorenz, B. Leach, T. Peterson, R. Olson, D. Riewestahl, Sgt. R. Olson, P. Christensen, Lt. P. Salimes, Sheriff Ron Cramer and Dianne Hughes for sitting in on the meetings. I also want to acknowledge and thank Eau Claire County Board Supervisor Ken Fulgione for sitting in on this discussion with jail staff. Thank you to Finance Director Scott Rasmussen for reviewing the financial figures.

If the option to partially close or completely close huber is considered, the recommendations would be further discussions with the Eau Claire County Judges, Probation Parole, District Attorney, Public Defenders Office, Criminal Justice Collaboration Council, and County Board to consider what criteria and who is appropriate in our community on Electronic Monitoring or Day Reporting. Further recommendations would be to have an architectural study done to look at the ability and costs to change the current layout of huber to aid in safely housing additional secure inmates in huber.

#### **Current Break Down of Huber Inmates**

100 Huber Inmates on average are housed in the Eau Claire County Jail for 2008. Currently of the huber inmates the following is a breakdown of their huber status:

#### **Current Huber Revenues**

Currently the Sheriff's Office Budgets huber revenue on an average of 67 paying hubers or \$437,000.00 per year. We also project revenue of \$33,000.00 per year for huber sit in fees for non-working or other classes of huber inmates.

*Huber Revenue is down from 2007 primarily because of the implementation of Electronic Monitoring. This was without adding additional staff that would have created additional tax levies issues. The loss of revenue is primarily caused by the expense associated with paying for rental of electronic monitoring equipment vs. collecting a straight huber fee.

*We house the non-working hubers in huber because we are trying to find them employment. We are collecting \$3.00 per day for the sit in fee, however it is difficult to collect this money because they are not working. We have non-working inmates in our huber center not because it is the best location for them. We have done this to keep the secure jail from causing additional stress on out of county housing costs.

- The trend I have seen is if the huber comes to jail without a job and finds a job while incarcerated they are not holding onto those jobs once their sentence is complete.
- Many inmates are checking into huber without a job or money to pay to get out for work. Many are reporting intoxicated or come back positive for illegal drugs.

Eau Claire County Sheriff's Office over the past 5 years has "saved" the county about \$1,470,000.00 in out of county secure housing by placing secure inmates in the male huber and female huber center. These savings will continue up to the date of occupancy of the new secure jail. These savings were accomplished by a temporary approval from the State to house secure inmates in huber. Six years ago the Sheriff's Office studied how we could house secure inmates in huber. Part of the study was to calculate the number of secure inmates we could safely house because of structural plant issues and do it without adding additional staff. We also came to committee and requested our process be reviewed to make sure we shared our process and conclusions. We have run into problems with keeping the maximum number of 36 secure inmates in huber because of the lack of viable candidates for the housing configuration.

## Work Release Conversion to Direct Supervision (Architectural design study)

- Officer work station location
- Adding a duress alarm and electronics for computer at work station
- Change bunk locations can this be done structurally?
- Installation of a classroom/program rooms in dayroom area or other location
- Need for an exercise area
- Review of current window coverings
- Removal or open up the front wall in day room for sight lines and dayroom square footage
- Removal or opening up of the sidewalls between two cell blocks
- Installation of video visitation booths. Current visitation set up is unsafe for secure inmate usage

- Acceptable furniture for the direct supervision unit. Will it meet building requirements?
- Corridor issue for having male and female separation issues in Female huber.
- Flooring updates due to construction/room changes
- Audio visual equipment needs for classrooms
- Installation of additional cameras, which will record activities in the jail for security.
- Issues with seating area for eating vs. classroom space or dayroom space will need to be considered.
- Installation of direct supervision desk and related structural issues and cost.
- Officer storage area for supplies which is lockable.
- Inmate storage needs for both in the block storage and property storage for their personal items.
- Towel hooks and locations of such for inmate use once you move the bunks to one location this may be a challenge.

#### Housing Secures In Huber -

Strong consideration needs to be made for direct supervision if we house additional secure inmates in huber. This would require additional staff of a minimum 5 new staff per direct supervision unit. Estimates for 2009 correctional staff are \$68,000 (Top Step/Family) or \$340,000.00 per direct supervision unit.

#### Bringing Back Secure Inmates From Out Of County

If you bring back all out of county inmates the cost savings would be about \$550,000.00. If you bring back all out of county inmates you will still have to consider the inmate capacity of the existing secure jail. By bringing back all out of county secure inmates you may not reduce the need to house some inmates out of county. Reasons for this are population spikes or population may simply go up by the 3-6 %. Recommendation would be to continue to allow for 15-20 inmates out of county at a cost of \$262,000.00 - \$350,000.00 per year.

**Caution** – Inmate management, jail classification or just a rise in overall population may effect the housing of these inmates which may still require the need to house inmates out of county. You will need to add additional staff to help with direct supervision.

#### What If Scenario (Best Case Scenario)

We considered how many inmates we would put out on E.M. or Day Reporting from our current inmates in our huber center. Part of the E.M. process currently being used is to consider their current jail conviction, past jail incarcerations/convictions to include conduct while in jail, past convictions in other counties, conversation with Probation Agents, and a sit down conversation with the inmate. If the person is non-working or

unwilling to pay for the monitor they are not placed out. We used our current criteria to see how many additional inmates we could put out on E.M. and we were not able to exceed our current average of 15 inmates out on E.M. If expansion were to take place we would need to reconsider our criteria for E.M. inmates. We believe the change in criteria would need to be studied outside of the Sheriff's Office. A suggestion would be to have the CJCC look at the process or potentially Judiciary and Law Enforcement.

#### **Closure Of Huber**

<u>What if</u> we changed the criteria and we could place out an average of 40 E.M. inmates, 25-Day Reporting Inmates, and have about 35 non-working inmates remaining to place on E.M., Day Reporting, or remain in the huber center?

E.M. Inmates – 40 on E.M. with a revenue of 4.00 per day = 58,400.00 in revenue. (Revenue is based on 18.00 per day and paying the E.M. company 14.00 per day for the rental of equipment.) We would still need to do random drug tests and check on them at their homes. Classification ahead of placing them on E.M. is required. If violations occur reports are needed and possible re-classification or revocation of E.M. requires paperwork.

Day Reporting -25 on Day Reporting with a revenue of \$13.00 per day = \$118,600.00 in revenue. (Revenue based on \$18.00 per day and paying the E.M. company \$5.00 per day for the rental of equipment.) We would P.B.T. and Drug Test clients to include checking on them at their homes. We would still need to do random drug tests and check on them at their homes. Classification ahead of placing them on Day Reporting is required. If violations occur reports are needed and possible re-classification or revocation of Day Reporting requires paperwork.

Non-Working -35 on E.M. with no revenue at a cost of 14.00 = 178,850.00 in cost to the county. Remember there are no revenues attached to this because we are paying for the monitor. We would P.B.T. and Drug Test clients to include checking on them at their homes. We would still need to do random drug tests and check on them at their homes. Classification ahead of placing them on Day Reporting is required. If violations occur reports are needed and possible re-classification or revocation of Day Reporting requires paperwork.

Non-Working - 35 on Day Report with no revenue and a cost of \$5.00 per day = \$63,900.00 in cost to the county. Remember there are no revenues attached to this because we are paying for the monitor. We would P.B.T. and Drug Test clients to include checking on them at their homes. We would still need to do random drug tests and check on them at their homes. Classification ahead of placing them on Day Reporting is required. If violations occur reports are needed and possible reclassification or revocation of Day Reporting requires paperwork.

Leave them in the Huber Center and try to find jobs or work with programming such as our PWI from UW-Stout would be no additional cost.

The above dollars are figured on keeping the current huber center staff to run E.M., Day Reporting, Secures in huber, and partial huber/full closure of huber.

The bottom line - If you close huber you still need to do something will the inmates. If you place them on electronic monitoring or keep them in huber you still need staff to run the program.

**Female Huber** – Secure inmate duties to include meals and medication services, visitation, huber (E.M.) check ins from courts, and other duties. (5 Officers or current staff) Depends on the number of secure inmates in this area we will need back up every time the female goes into the block or opens the door to the block.

Male Huber - If we continue to house our current secure inmates or go to direct supervision there needs to be an officer at the desk at all times for inmate observation as well as direct support to the direct supervision officer. Other duties include movement of inmates to court, meals and medication services, and back up to female huber to name a few. If we continue to have Huber inmates in male huber there needs to be a person responsible for checking in and out inmates and to follow up with regular huber officer duties. (10 Officers or current staff)

**E.M. or Day reporting Officers** – We need to consider the time consuming paperwork needed prior to placing a person on E.M. or Day Reporting. We need to review the documentation being received daily by the E.M. Company for computerized checks, the contacts needed at the homes or work places, the conversations with Probation and Parole, collection of money and related paperwork, and conduct issues related to violation to name a few. We feel Three compliance officers will have their hands full with 75 inmates out on E.M., Day Reporting, huber and classification in our secure jail. (3 officers or current staff)

- Will all huber inmates keep up to date on payments... Personal experience tells me we will lose some along the way. What will happen to these folks when they don't pay? Will they go back to huber where we will still have an issue with collecting money or do they go to secure jail?
- Violations on E.M. or Day Reporting. What will we do with violations? Do they go back to huber or to secure jail?
- Will we have the number of appropriate people for E.M. and Day Reporting at the above numbers? Maybe we keep all four options in play to include secure jail, huber jail, E.M. and Day Reporting along with reviewing our criteria for E.M./Day Reporting?
- It appears any combination of the above will not reduce the need for Huber Center Staff. In fact we believe we may be tight on staffing and may consider requesting an additional clerical or correctional staff in this area.

If you left the 35 non-working hubers in the huber center you could shave off between \$63,900.00 - \$178,850.00.

Net Difference under this scenario would be an expense of \$345,000.00 - \$433,000.00

#### Issues To Consider

- Huber does not go away just because the County board says it does. The judges may still grant huber and the Sheriff will need to run a huber center.
- What do we do with non-paying electronic monitoring inmates or non-working inmates? We will need to rent monitors at a cost to the county? We will have to staff the monitoring of the inmates so the staff cost will remain the same, but the cost go up with the rental of the equipment.
- Management of secure inmates in a dormitory style lineal design lends to safety and security issues. This is the main reason for our jail-building project for our current secure jail issues.

- Direct supervision would need to be a strong consideration to house additional secure inmates in huber. This would require 24-hour supervision, which means additional staff.
- Remodeling costs will be inevitable to assist with sight lines or staff work stations when direct supervision is implemented in the huber center for secure inmates.
- Discussion was done on cost for drug testing and we feel it would be about the same cost if you hold someone in huber or release on monitor.
- Program space in huber is limited and would not accommodate the transition to secure inmates. Currently huber inmates do not receive the same level of programs as secure inmates so the lack of space for program has not been an issue.
- How do we continue programming outside the jail for folks serving E.M. or Day Reporting? Will P&P do this or others in the community?
- Food cost we feel will remain about the same. If we are feeding sack lunches or secure meals the cost is very comparable.
- Nursing hours will need to be increased by bringing back secure inmates. Our current contract does not cover huber inmates and visits with the nurse. If we bring back 40 or so secure inmates the nursing hours will need to be increased which is a cost item we were looking at for the new jail.
- There are only two holding cells in the huber center and is a very limited number for housing 40-60 additional secure inmates. This would not be a problem if we had space in our current secure jail, but we do not. This again is a problem being solved with the new jail design.
- Closure of huber will eliminate an option for the judicial system to utilize. How will this impact drug court and aim court? Both programs use the huber center to stabilize drug court participants when they first start the program or violate by using drugs/alcohol. A suggestion to speak to the alternative to incarceration courts should be considered prior to a decision being made to close huber.
- The huber center currently requests and receives revocations on average of 130 hubers per year. If we run the electronic monitoring and day reporting program we will also have violations that will cause removal of privileges. If we close the huber center this will mean the inmate goes directly to the secure jail. We may be able to use huber if we keep it partially open as the next step on violations vs. secure jail. A suggestion to further review what has occurred in Lacrosse County as a result of their closure of huber would be a recommended.
- If we bring back secure inmates to the huber center and we experience a shift in classification issue and are no longer able to house the numbers in huber we will be forced to ship out inmates. Direct supervision only works if your direct supervision beds are in proper proportions to indirect more secure beds.
- There are concerns about how we will handle visitation for the influx of secure inmates in huber. We currently are maxed out with visitation spaces for our secure inmates. Video visitation should be considered if we make the decision to house additional secure inmates in huber.
- There are concerns on having a single exit door at female huber when many secure inmates will be going past this location for various reasons.

- There are no recreation spaces available in the huber center. DOC requires recreation time for secure inmates.
- Additional staff will be required for direct supervision and to assist with inmate movement through the facility.
- There will be reduction in out of county transports. This will be a reduction, however we feel we will still need to house out of county secure inmates.
- There will be reduction in probation and attorney's needing to travel to other jail to visit with clients.
- If we cancel the Dunn County Contract because we bring back the inmates what happens if we need space before we open the new jail? I'm only assuming Dunn County will fill it's open beds and we will be left without local beds.
- The Sheriff's Office feels having a three-step approach with Huber, Secure Jail and E.M./Day Reporting is a good mix. If we close huber those who fail programs will end up in secure jail.
- It is not probable we will be able to put out the number of E.M. or Day Reporting Inmates under this scenario
- If we were able to put out these numbers it is unlikely we will be able to collect revenues consistently.
- We will have revocations from E.M. and Day Reporting. The most logical location for these folks if huber is closed is secure jail. Each revocation will mean potential out of county secure housing dollars.
- If you hire the 5 additional staff now it will mean 5 less you will need to hire in January of 2010.
- The potential for being able to classify 40-60 secure inmates in the male huber center as low medium is debatable. Our out of county jails require our best of our best inmates. This dips into the numbers of suitable secure inmates to be housed in the huber center.

I don't know if full closure of huber or even a substantial reduction of huber is the most viable option, however I will support the changes if appropriate staffing levels are considered. Additional items needed would include remodeling of the current huber facility to accommodate direct supervision and technology updates to name a few. I know this document is a bit lengthy, however all potential impact to the jail needs to be considered. I don't believe this document is all-inclusive, but points out some of the challenges to full or partial closure of huber. This document should be used as talking points when considering the request made.

Please mark your calendars to attend the **FIFTH** anniversary of the Eau Claire County Drug Court Program on October 1, 2009. We will hold the anniversary celebration in Branch 1 at the Courthouse at 8:00 a.m. We do have one graduation scheduled for the morning of October 1, and then we will hear briefly from many of our drug court graduates about how their lives have changed since entering into and completing the program. We will celebrate afterward with cake and refreshments.

Two-thirds of adult arrestees and half of juveniles test positive for illicit drugs at arrest, yet without funding for effective alternatives that offer intervention and treatment such as drug court, we continue to incarcerate nonviolent, substance abusing, and addicted offenders at a great price to our nation and citizens. The drug court team believes incarceration is not effective for addicts/alcoholics involved in the criminal justice system, and that the solution falls more in line with the following statements from Judge Dennis Challeen:

"We want them to have self-worth - so we destroy their self-worth."

"We want them to be responsible – so we take away all responsibility."

"We want them to be trustworthy - so we put them where there is no trust."

"We want to them to stop exploiting us – so we put them where they exploit each other." "We want them to be non-violent – so we put them where violence is all around them." "We want them to quit being the tough guy – so we put them where the tough guy is respected."

"We want them to quit hanging around losers – so we put all the losers in the state under one roof."

The answer – "We need to punish the offenders we are afraid of and treat the ones we are mad at."

#### City Council's Response to Resolution #09-10/047

• The Eau Claire City Plan Commission has met and discussed proposed amendatory language to the community facilities chapter of the City Comprehensive Plan regarding locating major public facilities such as a county justice center. The City Plan Commission will be scheduling a public hearing on the proposed amendment. Thereafter the Plan Commission will forward a recommendation to the City Council for action. The Plan Commission recommendation will likely be placed on a December, 2009 City Council agenda.

#### Potential Sites / Review Process

- Proposed Resolution No. 09-10/104 would create a Select Committee to review possible sites for a county justice center and recommend one or two sites to the County Board. The County Board will consider this resolution at the October 20, 2009 session.
- Proposed Resolution No. 09-10/105 would authorize the County Administrator to negotiate an agreement with the Baker Tilly consulting firm to perform a financial analysis of the costs to construct and operate various scenarios related to the justice center program. The County Board will consider this resolution at the October 20, 2009 session.
- County staff have catalogued potential justice center sites on record plus any other proposed sites that have been received by the County. A public solicitation to the community for additional possible sites has been issued with a due date of October 23, 2009. Staff will then prepare a spreadsheet listing all potential sites and all criteria noted in Resolution #09-10/047 and report to the County Board and Select Committee.

First, it is important to distinguish between an outcome and an output.

*What is an Output?* The goods and services produced or delivered by a department, program or provider agency; it is the "how much, how many, how often" data that we've historically counted and become very good at tracking.

In this example, we look at not only how many crisis assessments were done, but also what impact we had on the crisis situation. It's more meaningful for us to know that when a crisis assessment gets done, we are able to divert a client from an inpatient hospitalization 88-90% of the time. We use this outcome information to help us manage this program area, by analyzing what practices help maintain or increase our outcome success, and which ones need to be reviewed or modified.

### Why are Outcomes Important?

- To continuously improve our service delivery
- To increase accountability to citizens and governing committees
- To provide greater clarity about what we are striving to achieve
- To improve our capacity for data driven decision making
- To respond to increased requests for this type of information from citizens, Government Accounting Standards Board (GASB) and elected officials.

  - A. Members can speak from their seats no more than twice on an issue.
  - B. A vote by division of the house can be requested at any time.
  - C. There is no power to recess or postpone consideration of the matters before the Committee of the Whole.
- 2. Section 2.04.170 of the Code also provides the County Board shall resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole as the seventh order of business at the budget adoption meeting and that the First Vice Chair takes over as the Chair of the Committee of the Whole.
- 3. The motion to go into the Committee of the Whole is as follows: "I move we resolve into a Committee of the Whole to consider the 2010 County budget". The motion needs to be seconded and is debatable and adopted by a majority vote. At this time the Chair steps down and the First Vice Chair takes over as the Chair of the Committee of the Whole.
- 4. Debate can be limited during the Committee of the Whole by calling the previous question, which requires six (6) seconds per Section 2.04.240 of the Code.
- 5. Any resolution originating with the Committee of the Whole can be amended and all amendments that are adopted are incorporated into the resolution, which would be presented to the County Board.

- 6. If the Committee wishes to adjourn, one must do the following: MEMBER: "I move that the Committee rise". A second is required followed by a vote. The Committee Chair then reports: "The Committee of the Whole has had under consideration the proposed 2010 Eau Claire County budget and has come to no conclusion thereon and asks leave to sit again at ______.". This should be seconded and voted on by the County Board. (Majority vote required).
- 7. When the Committee of the Whole has completed its business, it should be dissolved as follows: MEMBER: "I move that the Committee rise and report". (A second is necessary). The presiding officer of the assembly resumes the Chair. The Committee Chair returns to his or her place in the board room in front of the presiding officer and addresses the Chair as follows: COMMITTEE CHAIR: "Mr. Chair, the Committee of the Whole has had under consideration the proposed 2010 Eau Claire County budget and has directed me to report the same as follows". The Committee Chair reads the resolution and amendments and hands them to the Chair who has them read again. The Chair then puts the question on all of the amendments. Amendments can be debated further and amended in the County Board meeting as can a main question. After amendments are handled, then the question is put on the resolution as amended.

For additional information see <u>Robert's Rules of Order</u>, pp. 63-65. Please note that if there is a conflict between <u>Robert's</u> and the County Code, the County Code provision prevails.

We have received Eau Claire County's resolution supporting the delayed implementation of the Farmland Preservation Rezoning Conversion Fee. We understand the challenges that the changes in the new farmland protection law may pose for your County, however, we do not feel that a delay in the implementation of the conversion fee is appropriate.

The conversion fee is intended to discourage excessive removal of land from a farmland preservation district. Because the conversion fee is only based on the number of acres to be rezoned and not on the entire size of the landowner's property, the landowner can minimize the imposed fee by rezoning only those acres that are necessary for conversion to non-agricultural uses.

Though there is some alarm over the conversion fee, the reality is that landowners who rezone can recover the conversion fee expense. When land is removed from a farmland preservation district, the land's development potential, and thus its value, normally increases. As a result, the conversion fee is typically small in comparison to the amount that the landowner can receive from selling the land. The cost itself can be passed on to the non-farm purchaser as part of the real estate transaction.

Because most rezoning requests are for the purpose of residential construction, there is another option available to avoid paying the conversion fee. A zoning authority may allow some residential construction within a farmland preservation district without rezoning pursuant to a "conditional use" permit. Standards for issuing a conditional use permit ensure that constructed residences are compatible with the farmland preservation district (see Wis. Stats. S. 91.46). There is no conversion fee associated with the conditional use permit because the land remains within the certified preservation district and is not rezoned out of the district.

In order to take advantage of this option, the local zoning authority would need to adopt a simple zoning ordinance text amendment. The amendment would allow for residential construction in a farmland preservation district provided the residence meets the state

standards under Wis. Stats. S. 91.46. Such an amendment would not take away any existing landowner rights in the farmland preservation districts. Instead, it would give landowners an *additional legal option*: to build compatible residential structures within the farmland preservation district without rezoning or paying any conversion fees. At the same time, the amendment would protect farmland and allow farmers in the affected district to continue claiming tax credits.

The conversion fee attempts to recover some of the often unrecognized benefits that farmland preservation zoning provides and which are subsequently lost when land is removed from a farmland preservation zoning district. Farmland preservation zoning protects large blocks of agricultural land, which can add predictability to farm management decisions, contribute to farm productivity, limit land use conflicts with agricultural operations, encourage agricultural investment, and guarantee a land base for farm expansions as well as new farm owners. When land is removed from these areas, the entire district feels the impact. This reality has been contributing to the state's significant loss of farmland year after year.


The conversion fee acts as a buffer to minimize the impact of rezoning by channeling the money collected toward farmland preservation efforts across the state. These efforts may include aiding in the purchase of agricultural easements under the State's new PACE program or funding farmland preservation planning grants.

Though conversion fee may not be particularly popular, we consider it vital to the new Working Lands Initiative. It is meant to decrease the amount of farmland that Wisconsin loses each year to non-agricultural development and aid in the preservation and protection of this precious resource for future generations.

The County Board of Supervisors of the County of Eau Claire does ordain as follows:

**SECTION 1.** That Paragraph 13. of Subsection E. of Section 2.05.610 of the code be relettered as 14.

**SECTION 2.** That Paragraph 13. of Subsection E. of Section 2.05.610 of the code be created to read:

13. Exercise county board oversight over specialized transportation assistance programs under Wis. Stat. § 85.21.

**SECTION 3.** That Section 2.22.150 of the code be repealed and recreated as Section 2.05.612:

2.05.612 Transportation Coordination Advisory Committee.

A. The committee shall consist of 9 persons knowledgeable of and interested in the special transportation needs in the community and the department appointed by the chair of the county board, upon the recommendation of the ADRC board, for staggered 3-year terms commencing on the 3rd Tuesday of April and in the following manner:

1. Annual vacancies shall be noticed publicly. The ADRC board shall submit a list of nominees to the county board chair prior to the consideration of any committee appointments.

2. One member shall be a county board supervisor.

3. Two members shall be consumers, 1 of whom shall be a rural consumer.

4. One member shall be a person who is elderly.

5. One member shall be a person with a physical disability.

6. One member shall be a City of Eau Claire Division of Transit

representative.

·7.

Three members shall be citizens-at-large, 1 of whom shall be a rural

citizen.

8. All members shall be citizens of the county at the time of appointment and for the duration of their terms and at least 2 members shall be from the rural area.

9. Should any member no longer meet the qualification for appointment, the member's seat shall be declared vacant.

10. Midterm vacancies may be filled from a list of citizens who have applied for annual vacancies but have not been selected, or through a separate public notice, or by using both methods.

B. The county board chair shall appoint a chair pro tem to chair the first meeting. At the first meeting the membership shall elect a chair and vice-chair. The committee chair shall appoint a committee member or department staff member as secretary.

C. The committee shall coordinate information on all transportation services available to transit dependent individuals who are elderly or disabled in Eau Claire County and as part of that process shall:

1. Develop and maintain a resource base and provide assistance on strategies to various private and public bodies in the provision of specialized transportation services.

2. Promote specialized transportation services throughout the county.

3. Monitor state and federal and all other financial aid programs which provide funds for any component of the specialized transportation service and actively pursue those funds as well as local funding.

4. Monitor how current programs are used so that dollars spent are maximized.

D. The committee shall report to the board at its request, but no less than annually.

E. The director shall assign staff assistance to the committee.

F. The committee shall meet as the need arises.

**SECTION 4.** That Subsection C. of Section 2.22.050 of the code be amended to read:

C. The board shall have the following additional powers, duties and responsibilities: 1. It shall exercise county board oversight over specialized transportation assistance programs under Wis. Stat. § 85.21.

-TO AMEND SECTION 2.04.465 OF THE CODE: HIGHWAY COMMITTEE; TO REPEAL SECTION 2.04.475 OF THE CODE: COMMITTEE ON PARKS AND FOREST-

The County Board of Supervisors of the County of Eau Claire does ordain as follows:

**SECTION 1.** That Section 2.04.465 of the code be amended to read:

2.04.465 Highway/parks and forest committee

A. The committee shall be responsible to the county board for the departmental policy and oversight of the county highway department and parks and forest department including Lake Altoona and Lake Eau Claire, county owned dams and adjoining facilities and shall exercise such of those powers and duties under <u>Wis. Stat. § 83.015(2)</u> and Wis. Stat. ch. 83, and 84, <u>27 and 28</u> as may be consistent with the code of general ordinances <u>regarding the</u> operation of the highway and the county parks and forest systems. In such capacity, <u>t</u>The committee shall:

1. Oversee the construction and maintenance of all county trunk roads and bridges and the construction, improvement, equipment, maintenance and operation of the highway department and grounds;

2. Report to the board on all matters under the jurisdiction of the department including highways, county highway speed limits and traffic control devices;

3. Exercise those powers and duties as authorized in Chapter 2.70 and recommend to the board for approval all leases, contracts or agreements not covered therein-:

4. To conduct a thorough study of the county in accord with Wis. Stat. § 27.04, with reference to making reservations and acquisitions of lands for public purposes and the improvements thereof for park related functions, and to carry out such other functions as are specified therein. The county board reserves the authority to adopt, modify, change or extend plans proposed by them as provided in Wis. Stat. § 27.04(2). Such plans shall annually be reviewed by the committee and amendments thereto submitted to the board in the same manner;

5. To have charge and supervision of all county parks, parkways, waysides and special use areas pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 27.05, with the express exception of (4) thereunder, and subject to the provision that all grants, conveyances and devices of land accepted on behalf of the county pursuant to (2) thereunder, are in accord with ordinances thereon;

6. To negotiate and enter into agreements for timber sales from county forests, pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 28.11(6), subject to awarding or approval thereof by the county board of any sale exceeding \$1,000 in appraised value;

7. To administer all county forest lands under the concept of multiple-use management, pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 28.11, reserving to the county board the authority vested therein in Wis. Stat. § 28.11(3)(a) to (e) and (i) thereunder;

8. To take options for purchase of lands in the county for authorized park or forest purposes, such options not to exceed in the aggregate more than 5% of the total land acquisition line item in the departmental budget in any year.

B. No transfers between line items of the adopted county budget shall be made except with the approval of the committee on finance and budget or the county board as provided in Wis. Stat. §§ 65.90(5)(b), and Chapter 4.04.

C. The chair of the county board shall select one member from and residing in each of three areas:

1. The e<u>C</u>ity of Eau Claire;

2. The <u>‡Towns</u> of Bridge Creek, Clear Creek, Fairchild, Lincoln, Ludington, Otter Creek and Wilson; the Villages of Fairchild and Fall Creek; and the <u>eCity</u> of Augusta;

3. The  $\pm$ Towns of Brunswick, Drammen, Pleasant Valley, Seymour, Union and Washington; and the c<u>City</u> of Altoona.

The remaining 2 members shall be appointed at large. The provisions of Wis. Stat. § 83.015(1)(d), shall not apply.

D. The highway department and the committee shall use the system of cost accounting devised by the State Department of Revenue, as required by Wis. Stat. § 83.015(3).

E. The committee shall appoint an advisory committee, approved by the county board chair, whose function it shall be to actively participate in the formulation of the yearly and long range plans for the Eau Claire County forestand parks. It shall be composed of 11 members experienced or interested in the management and development of the county parks and forest and broadly representative of the county population. No members of the county board shall be appointed thereto.

**SECTION 2.** That Section 2.04.475 of the code be repealed.

**SECTION 3**. This ordinance is effective April 20, 2010.

1	19.01.030 Amendments And Periodic Updates.
2	A. The Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors may amend the Eau Claire County
. 3	Wisconsin Comprehensive Plan at any time, in accordance with Section 4.3 of the Eau Claire
4	County Wisconsin Comprehensive Plan, Plan Adoption And Amendment Procedures, which are
5	in accordance with the procedures set forth in Wis. Stat. § 66.1001(4).
6	B. Five years after the effective date of the Eau Claire County Wisconsin
7	Comprehensive Plan, the chair of the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors shall appoint a
8	Comprehensive Plan Steering Committee to review the plan and make recommendations
9	regarding any necessary revisions. The Comprehensive Plan Steering Committee shall:
10	1. Solicit public participation in reviewing the plan using the public
11	information and involvement program established for preparing the original plan or any plan
12	subsequently approved by the county board that meets statutory requirements.
13	2. Review goals and objectives to determine whether they have continued
14	relevance and reflect the current needs of the community.
15	3. Evaluate progress towards completion of implementation actions to
16	determine whether goals, objectives, policies, programs or the implementation actions need to be
17	revised.
18	4. Review policies, programs and implementation strategies to remove
19	completed tasks and identify new approaches if necessary.
20	C. A full update of the plan shall be completed ten years after the effective date of
21	adoption of the Eau Claire County Wisconsin Comprehensive Plan, and then every 10 years
22	thereafter. The chair of the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors shall appoint a
23	Comprehensive Plan Steering Committee at least two years prior to the tenth anniversary of the
24	effective date of adoption and every ten years thereafter to revise and update the entire plan in
25	accordance with Wis. Stat. § 66.1001(4)(a). The same process established for preparation of the
26	original plan, developed in accordance with Wis. Stat. § 66.1001, shall be used to prepare a full
27	update, unless another planning process has been approved by the Eau Claire County Board of
28	Supervisors that is in accordance with Wis. Stat. § 66.1000.
29	
30	<u>19.01.040 Interpretation</u> . The provisions of this ordinance shall be interpreted as a
31	minimum requirement and shall be liberally construed in favor of the purposes of this ordinance.
32	This ordinance shall not be deemed to limit or repeal any other powers granted to Eau Claire
33	County by state law.
34	
35	19.01.050 Severability. Should any section, clause or provision of this ordinance be
36	declared by the courts to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a
37	whole to any part thereof, other than the part so declared to be invalid.
