### -OPPOSING PROPOSED STATE JUVENILE CORRECTIONAL FACILITY RATE INCREASES-

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin has partnered with counties to provide Youth Aids funding to offset costs related to court ordered out-of-home placement of juvenile offenders; and

WHEREAS, counties are mandated to pay the cost of court ordered placement of juveniles in state operated juvenile correction facilities; and

WHEREAS, the proportionate share of the costs for juvenile out-of-home placements statewide borne by the counties has increased dramatically from 8% in 1982 to over 57% in 2002; and

#### -SUPPORTING LEGISLATION REGULATING METHAMPHETAMINE-

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin State Legislature is considering legislation regarding the controlled substance methamphetamine and the materials used to make it. The intent is to limit access to key ingredients in methamphetamine, particularly pseudoephedrine; and

WHEREAS, methamphetamine ("meth") abuse is a serious and growing problem affecting Wisconsin. The number of meth criminal cases has increased from 314 statewide in 2002 to 545 in 2004 with many of the cases concentrated in the northwestern part of the state. About 20 states, including Illinois, Minnesota and Iowa, regulate pseudoephedrine-based cold and allergy pills. Wisconsin currently does not, and law enforcement fears the state is becoming a safe haven for meth labs; and

WHEREAS, methamphetamine has horrible affects on not only the people who abuse the drug, but also on those who "cook" the meth, and other household members, especially children. For example, approximately 35 percent of meth labs seized in Colorado involved families with children. Children rescued from meth labs often test positive for toxic levels of meth and the ingredients of meth; and

WHEREAS, buildings with methamphetamine labs are a public health risk. The toxic nature of the ingredients of meth can cause explosions, fires, toxic fumes and irreparable damage to human health and the environment. For example, motel rooms and apartments used to make meth can be a health risk for the next unsuspecting tenants. There are currently no safety standards for cleaning buildings that have been contaminated by the materials and byproducts associated with meth production; and

WHEREAS, the number of methamphetamine arrests in Eau Claire County increased by nearly 400 percent between the years 2003 and 2004.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors supports efforts to control over-the-counter drugs and other materials used in the illegal production of methamphetamine.

WHEREAS, there is no fiscal impact to the creation of the full-time Social Worker I/II/III position since the employees in the job share positions receive prorated benefits; therefore, the combining of the positions will not create any additional levy impact since the benefits have been budgeted; and

WHEREAS, one part-time position is currently vacant; therefore, the employee in the other part-time position would assume the full-time status.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that two part-time job share Social Worker I/II/III positions be deleted and one full-time Social Worker I/II/III be created in Human Services and the position master be amended to reflect such change in positions.

WHEREAS, 11 counties and the Ho Chunk Indian Nation have established a regional group, recognized by the Wisconsin Office of Justice Assistance, that includes the following counties: Buffalo, Chippewa, Clark, Dunn, Eau Claire, Jackson, La Crosse, Monroe, Pierce, Pepin, St Croix and Trempealeau. under the name "West Central Interoperability Alliance" (WCIA), to remedy communications needs cooperatively according to recommendations of that Office; and

WHEREAS, the West Central Interoperability Alliance participated in a Public Safety Interoperability Study funded by the Wisconsin Office of Justice Assistance; and

WHEREAS, the study identified equipment that would greatly improve public safety communication interoperability within each county throughout the region; and

WHEREAS, the Office of Justice Assistance is administering an "equipment" grant program that will reimburse counties for 75 percent of the total cost of an approved grant request; and

WHEREAS, there has been and will continue to be a competitive funding advantage for groups of counties working together on such initiatives collectively; and

WHEREAS, Clark County has been selected to serve as the lead county (fiscal agent) for the equipment portion of the grant upon acceptance.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT Eau Claire County agrees to pay an equipment match fee not to exceed \$22,800 from the contingency fund to Clark County, acting on behalf of the WCIA Consortium of Counties, providing WCIA is successful in obtaining the OJA Interoperability Equipment Grant Funding.

# -OPPOSING DOWNSIZING OF INTERMEDIATE CARE FACILITIES FOR THE MENTALLY RETARDED (ICF-MR)-

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin has amended Section 46.279 of the Wisconsin Statutes, to require a court determination of "most integrated setting" to determine appropriate levels of placement for developmentally disabled people who are protectively placed by the courts; and

WHEREAS, the intent of this statutory change is to encourage community placements of individuals and prohibit long term institutional placements unless the court determines that to be the most integrated setting for the person; and

WHEREAS, the concept of the most integrated community setting for individuals is clearly a desirable objective; and

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin and the Department of Health and Family Services have allocated a sum certain amount of funding to counties to either pay the cost of continuing an individual's placement in an intermediate care facility for the mentally retarded or to create a community placement for the individual and for all new protective placements in the future; and

WHEREAS, this shifting of responsibilities creates additional demands and costs upon counties; and

WHEREAS, the new statutory language in Section 46.279 of the Wisconsin Statutes makes "the most integrated setting" the dominant factor in a court's determination of a protective placement order; and

WHEREAS, this statutory change has the effect of potentially eliminating any budgetary constraint arguments counties may make under "county shield" language in Section 55.06(9) of the Wisconsin Statutes, and would require counties to pay the non-federal share of any court ordered placements into intermediate care facilities; and

WHEREAS, there are no assurances that these state funds are sufficient to cover the cost of maintaining these citizens in either their current intermediate care facility placement or a community placement; and

WHEREAS, if this state allocation proves to be insufficient to meet the needs of these citizens it will create an additional unfunded mandate upon the counties; and

WHEREAS, in the April 5, 2005 referendum 85 percent of Wisconsin citizens said that the State of Wisconsin, and not the individual counties, should pay the cost of state mandated human services.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors opposes this action unless there are assurances from the State of Wisconsin that they will cover all reasonable costs associated with the downsizing of intermediate care facilities for the mentally retarded and new court ordered or ongoing protective placements and requests that the Wisconsin Legislature, in its next regular session, take action to correct this potential cost shift and unfunded mandate by assuring complete funding; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Clerk will forward a copy of this resolution to area legislators, Governor Jim Doyle and the Wisconsin Counties Association.

-AUTHORIZING PARTICIPATION IN A MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL COMPREHENSIVE PLANNING PROJECT; APPROVING AN AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COUNTY AND MUNICIPALITIES FOR WORKING COOPERATIVELY ON COMPREHENSIVE PLANNING WHICH INCLUDES APPROVING AN EAU CLAIRE COUNTY COMPREHENSIVE PLAN STEERING COMMITTEE; AUTHORIZING THE COUNTY TO APPLY FOR A COMPREHENSIVE PLANNING GRANT ON BEHALF OF THE COUNTY AND PARTICIPATING MUNICIPALITIES; AND ALLOCATING FUNDING FOR THE PROJECT-

WHEREAS, in November, 1999, Subchapter X of Chapter 66 of the Wisconsin Statutes was enacted, commonly referred to as the Wisconsin "Smart Growth" law, establishing requirements for comprehensive planning in the State of Wisconsin which requires Eau Claire County and most municipalities in the county to prepare comprehensive plans; and

WHEREAS, the Smart Growth law supports intergovernmental cooperation requiring any jurisdiction that prepares a comprehensive plan to evaluate and plan for intergovernmental cooperation; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Planning and Development met with all interested municipalities in the County between the summer of 2000 and the fall of 2005 to discuss the requirements of the Smart Qrowth Law, to consider various approaches to a multi-jurisdictional planning project and to select an acceptable approach or planning process for working cooperatively in a multi-jurisdictional project; and

WHEREAS, the agreement, attached as Exhibit A, has been prepared to confirm the arrangements under which the County and participating municipalities will work in cooperation with one another on this project, as follows: All participating jurisdictions will work together following the same timetable and the same process in preparing their plans. Each participating jurisdiction will review the conclusions, goals and objectives and plans formulated by neighboring and overlapping jurisdictions participating in the project, and if inconsistencies emerge, the affected jurisdictions will immediately engage in discussions towards resolution of those inconsistencies. The County will apply for a multi-jurisdictional comprehensive planning grant for the project on behalf of all participating jurisdictions will allocate matching funding for the project. A consultant will be hired and will prepare separate plans for each participating jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, a provision of the agreement calls for the creation of a County Comprehensive Plan Steering Committee which would work on behalf of the Committee on Planning and Development to direct the development of the County's comprehensive plan, submit reports routinely to the Eau Claire County Committee on Planning and Development and work jointly with the Committee on Planning and Development to present the final plan to the citizens of the County, conduct appropriate public hearings on the plan and present the final plan to the Eau Claire County Board for adoption; and

WHEREAS, the membership of the Steering Committee, as provided in the agreement, is as follows: 1) a representative of the Eau Claire County Committee on Planning and Development, appointed as chair pro tern, as a voting member; 2) a representative from each municipality who will enter into this agreement and prepare a comprehensive plan under this project, as voting members; 3) a representative from each municipality who will not be entering into this agreement, who have either already prepared a comprehensive plan, are in the process of preparing a plan or are not interested in preparing a plan at this time, as voting members; 4) a representative from the Chippewa-Eau Claire Metropolitan Planning Organization, as an ex-officio non-voting member; and 5) other exofficio non-voting members who may be appointed from various disciplines including, but not limited to, a school district representative, an environmental/conservation organization or agency representative and a real estate representative; and

WHEREAS, a grant program has been established by the state that provides funding to local units of government to pay for part of the cost of preparing comprehensive plans, including supplementary funding for jurisdictions that participate in a multi-jurisdictional planning project that emphasizes intergovernmental cooperation; and

WHEREAS, various municipalities in Eau Claire County have agreed to participate in this project, have agreed to allocate matching funding for the project and have agreed to have the County apply for grant funding on their behalf; and

WHEREAS, funding for the project, as outlined in Appendix C of the agreement attached as Exhibit 1, in the amount of \$62,500 to match a \$87,500 grant to cover consultant costs, plus \$17,340 in overtime costs, for a total of \$79,840 to be paid over at least a 30-month period in at least three budget years beginning in April or May of 2006, must be allocated to the project when the grant application is submitted for the project, due by November 1, 2005.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors hereby ordains that the County shall participate in a multi-jurisdictional comprehensive planning project in accord with the cooperative arrangements established in the agreement attached as Exhibit 1.

BE IT FUTHER RESOLVED, that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors hereby approves the agreement between the County and local municipalities for working cooperatively on a multi-jurisdictional comprehensive planning project, attached as Exhibit 1, including the approval of the creation of a County Comprehensive Plan Steering Committee in accord with the provisions of the agreement, and authorizes the County Administrator to sign agreements with participating municipalities.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors hereby authorizes the County to submit an application for a comprehensive planning grant from the State of Wisconsin, acting as the agent in applying for the grant on behalf of Eau Claire County and all of the participating municipalities.

WHEREAS, the easement would be over 3,750 feet in length by 30 feet wide, totaling approximately 2.58 acres; and

WHEREAS, there would be continuous discharge into the river of treated effluent only; and

WHEREAS, since the outfall is proposed to discharge into the shorelands/floodplain overlay districts of the Eau Claire River, a conditional use permit is required and has been granted by the Committee on Planning and Development; and

WHEREAS, in addition the project requires Army Corps of Engineers and DNR permits.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors that it approves an easement over county forests land with the Village of Fall Creek for an outfall sewer pipe from the waste water treatment facility to the Eau Claire River.

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Department of Revenue (DOR) miscalculated sales taxes for counties throughout Wisconsin, resulting in some counties receiving overpayments and some counties receiving underpayments of their share of sales tax revenues; and

WHEREAS, DOR has calculated total overpayments and underpayments for affected counties, but DOR does not know specific amounts per year; and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County's 2005 sales tax amounts were over calculated, resulting in an overpayment to the County of, at this time, \$53,000; and

WHEREAS, DOR expects to give a full report by the end of this year (2005); and WHEREAS, DOR retains 1.75 percent of total county sales tax collection for program administration, a portion of which lapses to the state's general fund; and

WHEREAS, an audit of the DOR administration of the county sales tax collection was performed by the Legislature Audit Bureau in 2001, concluding that a new computer system would provide more accurate and timely reporting of sales tax collections

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors that, as a result of the miscalculations and remaining uncertainties, state officials obtain independent audits of the calculations of sales taxes in past years and verification of the reliability of the system used for calculations for future years. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association is requested to join in this call for correction of the sales tax system to assure its accuracy and reliability.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors strongly urges the State Legislature to increase tipping fees in Wisconsin to reduce or eliminate the economic incentive for out-ofstate waste being deposited in Wisconsin landfills.

WHEREAS, most out-of-county of residents are from Chippewa, Trempealeau, Buffalo, Jackson and Sawyer Counties.

WHEREAS, at its regularly scheduled meetings on August 9, 2005 and August 30, 2005, the Committee on Personnel approved certain requests from various departments for new positions and amended FTEs of existing positions; and

WHEREAS, both the Eau Claire County Code of General Ordinances and the Eau Claire County Personnel Manual require that such requests be submitted to the Board in time for due deliberation during the budget process; and

WHEREAS, such approved requests are as follows:

- <u>Department on Aging</u>: Increase the hours of the **Family Caregiver Coordinator** from .875 FTE (35 hours) to full time effective January 1, 2006. The position cost is contingent upon funding through the Older Americans Act for 35 hours, and the additional 5-hour increase will be funded from Memory Care Connections Grant. The cost difference for the increase is \$5,744.88.
- <u>Beaver Creek Reserve:</u> One 5 FTE (20 hours) **Custodian**, effective January 1, 2006, at a total cost of\$17,490.95. The position cost is contingent upon funding from the already budgeted seasonal position of\$5,464 and \$13,500 from the Augusta School District. A sunset date of December 31, 2006, will be maintained for review of the position funding.
- <u>Clerk of Courts:</u> Increase the hours of the **Office Associate 3** from 5 FTE (20 hours) to .68 FTE (27 hours), effective January 1, 2006. The position cost is contingent upon funding from the Community Services surcharge with anticipated revenue of \$25,380. The cost difference for the increase is \$6,523.73.
- <u>Corporation Counsel</u>: Increase the hours of the Assistant Corporation Counsel from .75 FTE (30 hours) to .83 FTE (33 hours) effective January 1, 2006. The position cost is contingent upon 75 percent Medical Assistance and 25 percent reduction of service costs from assessments and evaluations resulting in savings from community aids and tax levy. A quarterly report will be provided to the Committee on Personnel showing the funding and revenue generated from the position versus the position cost.

- o No. 2-06: One 1.0 FTE (40 hours) **Office Associate 3**, effective January 1, 2006, at a total cost of\$49,376.81. The position cost is contingent upon CIPIB, CIPIA, COPW, CIPII Administrative Monies. A quarterly report will be provided to the Committee on Personnel showing the funding and revenue generated from the position versus the position cost.
- o No. 3-06: One 1.0 FTE (40 hours) **Social Worker I/II/III**, effective January 1, 2006, at a total cost of\$71,078.73. The position cost is contingent upon 38 percent Community Aids and 62 percent tax levy; however, savings generated by the position from existing therapeutic foster care funding is anticipated to cover the cost. A quarterly report will be provided to the Committee on Personnel showing the funding and revenue generated from the position versus the position cost.
- o No. 4-06: One 1.0 FTE (40 hours) Financial & Employer Planner, effective January 1, 2006, at a total cost of \$58,742.51. WHEREAS, under Wis. Stat.§ 59.52 (19), the County Board may accept gifts for any governmental purpose within the powers of the County; and

WHEREAS, the property would be managed by the Friends of Beaver Creek Reserve based on the conditions established by the Elliotts as stated below.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors, that it accepts the gift of 22 acres of real property from Robert and Ann Elliott described as "That part of the Northeast Quarter (NE<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>) of the Northwest Quarter (NW<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>) lying south and east of County Road K, Section 19, T27N, R7W, Town of Lincoln, Eau Claire County, Wisconsin.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the conditions for accepting this gift are as follows: (1) Transfer by warranty deed. (2) The land will be available for nature study, wildlife and woodland management demonstration projects and other educational activities. (3) The land will be closed to hunting and trapping except hunting and trapping will be allowed if necessary to control populations of animals causing damage to the habitat. (4) The land will become part of the Beaver Creek Reserve and be maintained consistent with the Articles of Incorporation and bylaws of the Friends of Beaver Creek Reserve. (5) The land will be subject to the deed restriction that said property shall be used exclusively as part of Beaver Creek Reserve. If, at any time, said property is put to any use other than as a part of Beaver Creek Reserve, said property, at the Grantor's option, shall revert to the Granter.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that if deemed necessary the county surveyor will do the survey work necessary to create the certified survey map splitting off22 acres from the existing 32-acre parcel.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that if the premises herein conveyed are condemned or otherwise taken by lawful action of the State or other governing body with the powers of eminent domain, any compensation or award shall be awarded to the Friends of Beaver Creek Reserve Endowment.

-REQUESTING THE WISCONSIN LEGISLATURE TO PROTECT THE PRIVATE PROPERTY RIGHTS OF EAU CLAIRE COUNTY RESIDENTS-

WHEREAS, the United States Constitution, in Article 5 of the Bill of Rights and the Wisconsin Constitution in Article I, Section 13 and Article XI, Section 2, expressly provide for the protection of the private property rights of its citizens; and

WHEREAS, the power of eminent domain has been reserved to the local, state and federal governments for the sole purpose of acquiring private property through the use of condemnation proceedings when said privately held properties are needed for public purposes; and

WHEREAS, the United States Supreme Court recently handed down a decision upholding what they maintain is a local government's ability to take private property for a vaguely defined "public good" such as economic development or increased tax revenues to the local government itself; and

WHEREAS, this Supreme Court decision put at risk the very right of private individuals to be free from government interference in their right to keep and enjoy their private property; and

WHEREAS, this action by the Supreme Court is contrary to and contravenes the aforementioned constitutional protections against such capricious and willful attacks by any governmental body upon the rights of the citizens.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Eau Claire county Board of Supervisors that it recognizes and supports the original concept of the framers of the constitution wherein the power of the eminent domain shall be used only as a last resort to acquire private property for a public project and that any such public project can be demonstrated to be necessary to accomplish the general welfare of the citizens of that jurisdiction. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors deems any departure from the original principles of eminent domain to be an assault on our basic foundations of liberty and a threat to the rights of private property ownership and strongly urges all municipal jurisdictions within the State of Wisconsin to encourage the Wisconsin State Legislature to use all means necessary to strengthen the original purpose of the rights of eminent domain within the State Constitution.

WHEREAS, Wisconsin counties are mandated by the state to pay the cost of individuals placed in the two state mental health institutions at Winnebago and Mendota; and

WHEREAS, any county cannot budget for the cost of these placements each year because they are entirely unpredictable from year to year; and

WHEREAS, the daily cost of a placement for an adult at Mendota Mental Health Institution is \$670 per day and \$645 per day at Winnebago Mental Health Institution; and

WHEREAS, one adult placed in one of these state institutions costs one quarter of a million dollars a year; and

WHEREAS, in 2005 through August, Eau Claire County had five adults placed at either Winnebago Mental Health Institution or Mendota Mental Health Institution at a cost of \$79,054; and

WHEREAS, Human Service Departments across the state have a primary role in providing community services to a large number of residents in need and the immense and variable cost of state mental health institute placements severely reduces the County's ability to provide those needed services in the community; and

WHEREAS, in the April, 2005 elections, & percent of the voters in Wisconsin voted that these human services costs should be paid for with state tax dollars and not property tax dollars; ind

WHEREAS, the cost of these placements does not fluctuate drastically from one year to the next on a statewide basis but changes dramatically from county to county each year depending on one or two cases; and

WHEREAS, there is no good public policy reason why the property taxpayers of Eau Claire County should bear this limitless risk every year; and

WHEREAS, since the State of Wisconsin approves the rate increases at these two state institutions, the State would have much more incentive to examine the necessity of the proposed rates if they were responsible for paying the cost of the placements.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Eau Claire County calls upon the Governor and Legislature to pass legislation that removes this cost, which is clearly a state responsibility, from the property tax.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors is hereby attaching an invoice for the cost of these placements for 2005 that were inappropriately billed to the property taxpayers of Eau Claire County.

WHERAS, in 2004, the Eau Claire County Child Support Agency collected \$15, 863,000; and

WHEREAS, this reduction in funding would result in a decrease in funds for the child support program in Wisconsin of \$96 million over the next five years, and reduce Eau Claire County's funding by nearly 43 percent; and

WHEREAS, this proposed funding cut is of such magnitude that it is impossible for the County to subsidize the difference and will result in a loss of staff and resources to effectively manage the program; and

WHEREAS, if enacted this funding cut will have a tremendous impact on the population served by the Child Support Agency in the amount of dollars collected for the support of children, which dollars directly affect the local economy; and

WHEREAS, the Senate has passed a Budget Reconciliation Bill that does not include these funding cuts; and

WHEREAS, an appointed conference committee will now meet to resolve the differences between the House and Senate versions of the Bill.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors that they support the Senate version of the Budget Bill which leaves funding for the child support program intact at its current levels.

WHEREAS, PricewaterhouseCoopers LLP has analyzed data from states that have mental health and substance abuse parity laws and to date has found no examples where parity has resulted in dramatic increases in the cost nor any examples where parity has resulted in a measurable increase in the number of uninsured; and

WHEREAS, most children and adolescents who need mental health/substance abuse services do not receive them; and

WHEREAS, an alarming number of children and adults with mental illness are in the criminal justice system inappropriately; and

WHEREAS, families most often tum to counties and court ordered services so that their children will receive the services they need but cannot afford; and

WHEREAS, when privately-insured individuals exhaust their benefits, they tum to the public sector for treatment, which increases costs to federal, state and local governments, estimated to be an annual ADDITIONAL \$40 million cost to the State of Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 128 and Assembly Bill 252 would not become law until 2007.

## 18.02.020 Definitions.

The following definitions shall apply in this title unless the context dictates otherwise:

1. "A zones" means those areas shown on the official floodplain zoning map as inundated by the base flood or regional flood, numbered as AO, AI to A30, A99, or as unnumbered A Zones. A Zones may or may not be reflective of flood profiles, depending on the availability of data for a given area.

2 "Adult cabaret" means a nightclub, bar, theater, restaurant or similar establishment which frequently features live performances by topless or bottomless dancers, go-go dancers, exotic dancers, strippers or similar entertainers where such performances are distinguished or characterized by an emphasis on specified sexual activities or by exposure of specified anatomical areas or which regularly feature films, motion pictures, video cassettes, slides or other photographic reproductions which are distinguished or characterized by an emphasis upon the depiction or description of "specified sexual activities" or "specified anatomical areas" (as defined herein) for observation by patrons. An adult cabaret does not include theaters, performing arts centers, civic centers and dinner theaters where live dance, ballet, music and dramatic performances of serious artistic merit are offered on a regular basis and in which the predominant business or attraction is not the offering to customers and where the establishment is not distinguished by an emphasis on, or the advertising or promotion of, employees engaging in nude erotic dancing.

3 "Adult BQook S2tore" means an establishment having as a predominant portion of its stock in trade, books, magazines and other periodicals or video cassettes which are distinguished or characterized by their emphasis on matter depicting, describing or relating to "specified sexual activities" or "specified anatomical areas" (as defined herein).

4. "Adult motion picture theater" means an enclosed building which is significantly or substantially used for presenting motion picture films, video cassettes, cable television, or any other such visual media, distinguished or characterized by an emphasis on matter depicting, describing or relating to "specified sexual activities" or "specified anatomical areas" (as defined herein) for observation by patrons therein.

5. "Agricultural-related business" means a business which is operated from a property located h an agricultural district which services the local farm community through the repair or servicing of farm machinery or equipment or the sale of products that are grown on the property.

6. "Alley" means a public way used as a secondary vehicular access to the side or rear of abutting property.

7. "Apartment" means a room or rooms in a multiple dwelling structure or multiple use structure intended to be used as a separate housing unit.

8 "Automotive gasoline station" means a business whose principal activity is the sale of gasoline, oil and other automotive products and the accessory performance of minor tune-up and repair work.

9. "Automotive repair service" means a business whose principal activity is body or engine repairs or painting of motor vehicles.

10. "Automotive sales and service" means a business whose principal activity is the sale of new or used motor vehicles and the performance of repair work as an integral part of the business.

11. "Base Fflood" means a flood having a 1% chance of being equaled or exceeded in any given year, published by FEMA as part of a FIS and depicted on a FIRM.

12 "Base flood elevation" means an elevation equal to that which reflects the height of the base flood.

"Basement" means a portion of a building with the floor located below the mean grade level. For the 13 purpose of this Subtitle, any such basement with more than 4 feet above grade level shall be counted as a story.

"Bed and breakfast establishment" means any place of lodging that provides 8 or fewer rooms for rent 14 a 12 month period, is owner-occupied and h which the only meal served to quest is breakfast. for more than 10 nights in

"Block" means a platted tract of land bounded by streets or by a combination of streets and public 15 parks or other recognized lines of demarcation.

"Boarding I=lhouse" means an owner occupied dwelling where lodging and meals are furnished for 16. compensation for 3 or more persons not members of the same family.

"Boathouse" means a structure at or near the water to houseboats or boating accessories. 17

"Building" means a structure, including a roof supported by walls designed or built for the support, 18. enclosure, shelter or protection of persons, animals, chattels or property of any kind.

19 "Bulkhead line" means a geographic line along a reach of navigable water that has been adopted by a municipal ordinance and approved by the DNR pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 30.11, and which allows complete filling on the landward side except where such filling is prohibited by the floodway provisions of this subtitle.

20 'Camping unit" means any portable device, no more than 400 square feet in area used as a temporary shelter including, but not limited to, a camping trailer, motor home, bus, van, pick-up truck camper or tent.

'Certificate of compliance" means a certification by the zoning administrator that a structure, use, or 2Gf.1. development is in compliance with all provisions of this ordinance..

"Certificate of occupancy" means a certificate issued by the department stating that the use of land 24 22. and the use and location of structures conforms to the provisions of this Subtitle and any additional requirements placed on the property through the conditional use or variance procedure.

"Channel" means a natural or artificial watercourse with definite bed and banks which confine and 23. conduct normal flow of water.

"Church" means a building designed or used as the principal place of worship of a religious 24 organization or congregation along with associated uses such as fellowship rooms, and Sunday School rooms. The term church includes temple or synagogue, but does not include elementary or secondary schools, day care centers or seminaries.

"Clinic" means an establishment of physicians or dentists for the examination and treatment of 24 25. persons on an outpatient basis.

"Clinic, veterinarian" means an establishment for the examination and treatment of animals.

<u>26.</u> ag <u>27.</u> "Club" means an association of persons using a structure for a common purpose but not including groups organized primarily to render a service which is customarily carried on as a business.

'Committee" means the committee on planning and development.

2+ 28. "Community living arrangement" means any of the following facilities licensed or operated, or 29.

permitted under the authority of the department: child welfare agencies under Wis. Stat. § 48.60, group homes for children under Wis. Stat. § 48.02(7) and community-based residential facilities under Wis. Stat. § 50.01; but does not include day care centers, nursing homes, general hospitals, special hospitals, prisons and jails.

"Conditional IJyse" means a use, either public or private, which, because of its unique characteristics, 2-9 <u>30.</u> cannot properly be classified as an approved or permitted use in a particular district. Based on the facts in each case, the impact of the proposed use upon neighboring lands and the public need for the particular use at the particular location, the committee may discretionarily grant such a use, subject to standards and conditions as may be deemed appropriate and necessary.

W 31. "Consistent with agricultural use" means a use of land, other than an agricultural use, that will do none of the following:

Convert, to a nonagricultural use, land that has been in agricultural use for at least 12 а consecutive months during the last 36 months.

Limit the potential for agricultural use of surrounding lands.

Conflict with any current agricultural use of land.

"Crawlways" or "Crawl space" means an enclosed area befow the first usable floor of a building, 32 generally less than 5 feet in height, used for limited access to plumbing and electrical utilities.

"Day care center" means a facility used for the care of preschool or school age children which meets <u>33.</u> the requirements of a day care center formulated by the Wisconsin Department of Health and Family Services.

"Deck" means an unenclosed exterior structure that has no roof or sides, but has a permeable floor 34. which allows the infiltration of precipitation.

"Department" means the department of planning and development.

"Development" means any artificial change to improved or unimproved real estate Including, but not 36 limited to, the construction of buildings, structures or accessory structures; the construction of additions or alterations to buildings or structures; the construction of additions or alterations to buildings, structures or accessory structures; the repair of any damaged structure or the improvement or renovation of any structure, regardless of percentage of damage or improvement: the placement of buildings or structures: mining, dredging, filling, grading, paving, excavation or drilling operations: the storage, deposition or extraction of materials or equipment; and the installation, repair or removal of public or private sewage disposal systems or water supply facilities.

"District" means a specific area designated with reference to this code and the official zoning maps M <u>37.</u> within which the regulations governing the use and erection of structures and the use of premises are uniformly applied. 38. "Drainageway" means a natural or artificial watercourse including, but not limited to, streams, rivers,

creeks, ditches, channels, canals, conduits, culverts, waterways, gullies, ravines or washes in which water flows in a definite direction or course, either continuously or intermittently, or in which runoff water accumulates permanently or temporarily, including any adjacent area subject to inundation by overflow or floodwater.

These services include underground, surface, or overhead gas, electrical, steam water, sanitary sewerage, storm water drainage and communication systems and accessories thereto, such as poles, wires, mains, drains, vaults, culverts, laterals, sewers, pipes, catch basins, conduits, cables, fire alarm boxes, police call boxes, traffic signals, pumps, lift stations and hydrants, but not including buildings. It provides maps designating those areas affected by the regional flood and provides both flood insurance rate zones and BFE and may provide floodway lines. The flood hazard areas are designated as numbered and unnumbered A-Zones. FIRMs, that accompany the FIS, form the basis for both the regulatory and the insurance aspects of the National Flood Insurance Program.

"Flood protection elevation" means a point 2 feet of freeboard above the water surface profile 51-63. associated with the regional flood and the official floodway lines.

64 "Flood storage" means those floodplain areas where storage of floodwaters has been taken into account during analysis in reducing the regional flood discharge.

58 65 . "Floodway" means those floodlands, including the channel, required to carry and discharge the regional flood.

"Frontage" means the width of a lot as measured on a public street, road or highway and having 82 69. access to said street, road or highway.

"Garage, private" means an accessory structure or portion of a principal structure utilized for the 70. private storage of motor vehicles

44-7 130. "Repair shop" means a place where motor vehicles or other materials are restored to a sound or good or operable state after decay, injury, dilapidation or partial destruction.

"Resource recovery facility" means a building in which collected recyclables from residential and commercial sources, including aluminum food and beverage containers, glass food and beverage containers, magazines or other materials printed on similar paper, newspapers or other material printed on newsprint, kraft paper (e.g. grocery bags), corrugated cardboard, office paper, plastic food and beverage containers, steel or blmetal food or beverage containers or other incidental recyclable items that may be delivered from time to time provided no dismantling is necessary according to market requirements and in which the incoming recyclables are sorted, shredded, crushed, baled or otherwise separated using equipment not to exceed 15 horsepower, for later shipment to markets. e. "Campaign sign" means a sign erected for the purpose of soliciting support for or application to a candidate or a political party or relating to a referendum question h an election held under the laws of the State of Wisconsin.

f. "Construction" means a temporary sign placed at a construction site identifying the project or the name of the architect, engineer, contractor, financier or other involved parties.

g "Directional" means a sign which bears the address and name of a business, institution, church or other use or activity plus directional arrows or information on location.

h "Flashing" means an illuminated sign upon which the artificial light is not kept constant in terms of intensity or color at all times when the sign is illuminated, (not including time, temperature and public information signs).

i "Free-standing" means a stationary or portable, self-supported sign not affixed to any other structure.

j. "Illuminated" means a sign which is lighted by an artificial light source either directed upon it or illuminated from an interior source.

k "Information" means a sign giving information to employees, visitors of delivery vehicles but containing no advertising or identification.

"Monument" means a freestanding sign having a low

profile with no open space between the ground and the sign and having a sign structure constructed of masonry, wood or materials similar in appearance.

m "Name plate" means a sign indicating the name and address of a building and its functions or the name of an occupant thereof and the practice of a permitted home occupation or an agricultural related business.

"Portable" means a sign so designed as to be movable from one location to another and which is not permanently attached to the ground, sales display or device or structure.

"Projecting" means a sign, other than wall sign, which is affixed to a building and which o extends in a perpendicular manner from the building wall.

"Roof means a sign which is erected, constructed or attached wholly or in part upon the roof of a building and which projects completely above the parapet wall.

"Seasonal agricultural product" means a sign which identifies a seasonal agricultural business such as but not limited to strawberry farms, apple orchards or truck farms and the direction to that business.

"Temporary" means any sign which is erected or displayed for a specified period of time. "Wall" means a sign which is affixed to the exterior wall or mansard roof of a building and s

which is parallel to the building. 427 140. "Sign alteration" means any structural change to a sign but shall not include routine maintenance, painting or change of copy of an existing sign.

"Principal structure" means the main structure on a lot.

440 154. "Structure height" means the vertical distance measured from the mean grade level to the highest point of a flat surface roof, to the deck line of a mansard roof, or to the mean height level between eaves and ridge of gable, hip and gambrel roofs.

444 155 "Structure setback" means the minimum distance between structure or use and property line or a road right-of-way line or high water mark of a water body.

"Subdivision" has the meaning given in Wis. Stat. § 236.02(12) 156.

157. "Substantial damage" means damage of any origin sustained by a structure whereby the cost of restoring the structure to its pre-damaged condition would equal or exceed 50% of the equalized assessed value of the structure before the damage occurred.

Substantial improvement" means any repair, reconstruction or improvement of a structure the cost of which equals or exceeds 5% of the present equalized assessed value of the structure either before the improvement or repair is started, or, if the structure has been damaged and is being restored, before the damage occurred. The term does not, however, include either: (1) any project for improvement of a structure to comply with existing state or local health, sanitary, or safety code specifications which are solely necessary to assure safe living conditions, or (2) any alteration of a structure or site documented as deserving preservation by the Wisconsin State Historical Society or listed on the National Register of Historic places. Ordinary maintenance repairs are not considered structural repairs, modifications or additions; such ordinary maintenance repairs include internal painting, decorating, paneling, and the replacement of doors, windows and other nonstructural components.

159. Tailing ponds" means those areas where liquefied accumulations of waste from the processing of mining are placed on the land surface.

444 <u>160.</u> "Travel trailer" means a vehicular portable structure built on a chassis, with or without complete kitchen, toilet, such facilities designed to be used for temporary habitation for travel or recreation.

449 166. 'Watershed" means the entire region or area contributing runoff or surface water to a particular watercourse or body of water.

4aO 167. "Well" means an excavation opening in the ground made by digging, boring, drilling, driving or other methods for the purpose of obtaining groundwater regardless of its intended use.

18.20.001 Purpose and Finding of fact

A. Statement of purpose. This ordinance is intended to regulate floodplain development to protect life, health and property; minimize expenditures of public funds for flood control projects; minimize rescue and relief efforts undertaken at the expense of the taxpayers; minimize business interruptions and other economic disruptions; minimize damage to public facilities in the floodplain; minimize the occurrence of future flood blight areas in the floodplain; discourage the victimization of unwary land and homebuyers; prevent increases in flood heights that could increase flood damage and result in conflicts between property owners; and discourage development in a floodplain if there is any practicable alternative to locate the activity, use or structure outside of the floodplain.

B. Finding of fact. Uncontrolled development and use of the floodplains and rivers of Eau Claire County would impair the public health, safety, convenience, general welfare and tax base.

# 18.20.010 General Provisions.

A. Areas to be regulated. This ordinance regulates all areas that would be covered by the regional flood or base flood. Based flood elevations are derived from the flood profiles in the flood insurance study. Regional flood elevations may be derived from other studies. Areas covered by the base flood area identified as A zones on the flood insurance rate map.

B. Official maps and revisions. The boundaries of all floodplain districts are designated as floodplains or A-Zones on the maps listed below. Any change to the base flood elevations (BFE) in the flood insurance study (FIS) or on the flood insurance rate map (FIRM) must be reviewed and approved by the DNR and FEMA before it is effective. No changes to regional flood elevations on non-FEMA maps shall be effective until approved by the DNR. These maps and revisions are on file in the department. If more than one map or revision is referenced, the most current approved information shall apply.

Flood insurance rate map (FIRM), panel number 555552 001 CB through 0525B, dated August 16, 1993.
 Areas that have received a LOMA (letter of map amendment) from FEMA and approved by the DNR are

2. Areas that have received a LOMA (letter of map amendment) from FEMA and approved by the DNR are removed from the FIRM and exempted from the floodplain regulations.

C. Establishment of districts. The regional floodplain areas are divided into three districts as follows:

 The Floodway District (FW) is the channel of a river or stream and those portions of the floodplain adjoining the channel required to carry the regional floodwaters.
 The Floodfringe District (FF) is that portion of the floodplain between the regional flood limits and the

floodway.

3. The General Floodplain District (GFP) is those areas that have been or may be covered by floodwater during the regional flood.

D. Locating floodplain boundaries. Discrepancies between boundaries on the official floodplain zoning map and actual field conditions shall be resolved using the criteria in paragraphs 1 or 2 below. If a significant difference exists, the map shall be amended according to 18.20.080. The department can rely on a boundary derived from a profile elevation to grant or deny a land use permit, whether or not a map amendment is required. The department shall be responsible for documenting actual predevelopment field conditions and the basis upon which the district boundary was determined and for initiating any map amendments required under this section between the department and an applicant over a district boundary line shall be settled according to 18.31.020 and the criteria in 1 and 2 below.

1. If flood profiles exist, the map scale and the profile elevations shall determine the district boundary. The regional or BFE shall govern if there are any discrepancies.

2. Where flood profiles do not exist, the location of the boundary shall be determined by the map scale, visual on-site Inspections and any information provided by the DNR.

(Note. Where the flood profiles are based on established BFE from a FIRM, FEMA must also approve any map amendment pursuant to 18.20.080.)

E Removal of lands from floodplain. Compliance with the provisions of this ordinance shall not be grounds for removing land from the floodplain unless it is filled at least 2 feet above the regional or base flood elevation, the fill is contiguous to land outside the floodplain, and the map is amended pursuant to 18.20.080.

(Note: This procedure does not remove the requirements for the mandatory purchase of flood insurance. The property owner must contact FEMA to request a letter of map change (LOMC).)

F. Compliance. Any development or use within the areas regulated by this ordinance shall be in compliance with the terms of this ordinance and all applicable local, state and federal regulations.

G. Municipalities and state agencies regulated. Unless specifically exempted by law, all cities, villages, towns and counties are required to comply with this ordinance and obtain all necessary permits. State agencies are required to comply if Wis. Stat. § 13.48(13) applies. The construction, reconstruction, maintenance and repair of state highways and bridges by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation is exempt when Wis. Stat. § 30.12(4)(a) applies.

H. Abrogation and greater restrictions.

1. This ordinance supersedes all the provisions of any municipal zoning ordinance enacted under Wis. Stat. §§ 59.69, 59.692 or 59.694 for counties; Wis. Stat. § 62.23 for cities; Wis. Stat. § 61.35 for villages; or Wis. Stat. § 87.30 which relate to floodplains. If another ordinance is more restrictive than this ordinance, that ordinance shall continue in full force and effect to the extent of the greater restrictions, but not otherwise.

2, This ordinance is not intended to repeal, abrogate or impair any existing deed restrictions, covenants or easements. If this ordinance imposes greater restrictions, the provisions of this ordinance shall prevail.

I. Interpretation. In their interpretation and application, the provisions of this ordinance are the minimum requirements liberally construed in favor of the governing body and are not a limitation on or repeal of any other powers granted by the Wisconsin Statutes. If a provision of Title 18, required by Wis. Admin. Code ch. NR 116, is unclear, the provision shall be interpreted in light of the standards in effect on the date of the adoption of this chapter or in effect on the date of the most recent text amendment to Title 18 which relate to floodplain regulations.

J. Warning and disclaimer of liability. The flood protection standards in Title 18 are based on engineering experience and scientific research. Larger floods may occur or the flood height may be increase by man-made or natural causes. This ordinance does not imply or guarantee that non-floodplain areas or permitted floodplain uses will be free from flooding and flood damages. Nor does this ordinance create liability on the part of, or a cause of action against, Eau Claire County or any officer or employee thereof for any flood damage that may result from reliance on this ordinance.

K Annexed areas for cities and villages. The Eau Claire County Floodplain zoning provisions in effect on the date of annexation shall remain in effect and shall be enforced by Eau Claire County for all annexed areas until Eau Claire County adopts and enforces an ordinance which meets the requirements of Wis. Admin. Code ch. NR 116, and the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). These annexed lands are described on Eau Claire County's official zoning map. All plats or maps of annexation shall show the regional flood elevation and the location of the floodway. County floodplain zoning provisions are incorporated by reference for the purpose of administering this section and are on file in the office of the municipal zoning administrator.

L General development standards. The department shall review all permit applications to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a flood-prone area, all new construction and substantial improvements shall be designed or modified and adequately anchored to prevent flotation, collapse or lateral movement of the structure resulting from hydrodynamic and hydrostatic loads; be constructed with material resistant to flood damage; be constructed by methods and practices that minimize flood damages; and constructed with electrical, heating, ventilation, plumbing and air conditioning equipment and other service facilities designed and/or located so as to prevent water from entering or accumulating within the components during conditions of flooding. All subdivision and certified survey map proposals (including manufactured home parks) shall include regional flood elevation and floodway data for any development that meets the subdivision and certified survey map conditions of the subdivision.

## 18.20.020 General standards applicable to all floodplain districts.

#### A. Hydraulic and hydrologic analyses.

1. Except as allowed in 3 below, no floodplain development shall: obstruct flow, defined as development which blocks the conveyance of floodwaters by itself or with other development, increasing regional flood height: or increase regional flood height due to floodplain storage area lost, which equals or exceeds 0.01 foot.

2 The department shall deny permits if it is determined the proposed development will obstruct flow or increase regional flood heights 0.01 or more, based on the officially adopted FIRM or other adopted map, unless the provisions of 3 are met. 3 Obstructions or increases equal to or greater than 0.01 foot may only be permitted if amendments are made

to this ordinance, the official floodplain zoning maps, floodway lines and water surface profiles, in accordance with 18.20.080.

(Note. This section refers to obstructions or increases in BFE as shown on the officially adopted FIRM or other adopted map. Any such alterations must be reviewed and approved by FEMA and the DNR.)

B Watercourse alterations.

1. No land use permit to alter or relocate a watercourse in a mapped floodplain shall be issued until the department has notified in writing all adjacent municipalities, the DNR and FEMA regional offices and required the applicant to secure all necessary state and federal permits. The flood carrying capacity of any altered or relocated watercourse shall be maintained.

2 As soon as is practicable, but not later than 6 months after the date of the water course alteration or relocation, the department shall notify FEMA of the changes by submitting appropriate technical or scientific data in accordance with NFIP guidelines that shall be used to revise the FIRM, risk premium rates and floodplain management regulations required. The applicant seeking the watercourse alterations shall pay the expense of preparing all required data for FEMA.

C. Wis. Stats. chs. 30 and 31 development. Development which requires a permit from the DNR, under Wis. Stats. chs. 30 and 31, such as docks, piers, wharves, bridges, culverts, dams and navigational aids, may be allowed if the necessary permits are obtained and amendments to the floodway lines, water surface profiles, BFE's established in the FIS, or other data from the officially adopted FIRM, or other floodplain zoning maps or the floodplain zoning ordinance are made according to 18.20.080.

D. Public or private campgrounds. Public or private campgrounds are not allowed below the regional or base flood elevation for the location of the proposed campground.

#### 18.20.030 Floodway District (FW).

A Applicability. This section applies to all floodway areas on the floodplain zoning maps and those identified pursuant to 18.20.050 D.

B. The following open space uses are allowed in the FW and the floodway areas of the GFP, if they are not prohibited by any other ordinance; they meet the standards in 18.20.030 C. & D.; and all permits or certificates have been issued according to 18.20.060 and Chapter 18.31:

1. Agricultural uses, such as farming, outdoor plant nurseries, horticulture, viticulture and wild crop harvesting.

2 Nonstructural industrial and commercial uses, such as loading areas, parking areas, and airport landing

strips.

3. Nonstructural recreational uses, such as golf courses, tennis courts, archery ranges, picnic grounds, boat ramps, swimming areas, parks, wildlife and nature preserves, game farms, fish hatcheries, shooting, trap and skeet activities, hunting and fishing areas and hiking and horseback riding trails, subject to fill limitations of 18.20.030 C.4.

4. Uses or structures accessory to open space uses, or classified as historic structures that comply with 18.20.030 C. & D.

5. Extraction of sand, gravel, or other materials that comply with 18.20.030 C.4.

6. Functionally water-dependent uses, such as docks, piers or wharves, dams, flowage areas, culverts, navigational aids and river crossings of transmission lines, and pipelines that comply with Wis. Stat. §§ 30 and 31.

7. Public utilities, streets and bridges that comply with 18.20.030 C.3.

C. Standards for development in floodway areas.

1. General: a Any development in floodway areas shall comply with 18.20.020 and have a low flood damage

potential.

b. Applicants shall provide the following data to determine the effects of the proposal according to

18.20.020 A:

LA cross-section elevation view of the proposal, perpendicular to the watercourse, showing

if the proposed development will obstruct flow; or ii. An analysis calculating the effects of this proposal on the regional flood elevation

(height).

c. The department shall deny the permit application if the project will increase flood elevations upstream or downstream 0.01 foot or more based on the data submitted for b. above.

2 Structures. Structures accessory to permanent open space uses classified as historic structures or functionally dependent on a waterfront location may be allowed by permit if the structures comply with following criteria:

a. The structures are not designed for human habitation and do not have a high flood damage

potential;

b. The structures are constructed and placed on the building site so as to increase flood heights less than 0.01 foot and minimally obstruct the flow of floodwaters. Structures shall be constructed with the long axis parallel to the flow of floodwaters and on the same line as adjoining structures;

c. The structures are properly anchored to prevent them from floating away and restricting bridge openings or other restricted sections of the stream or river; and

d. The structures have all service facilities at or above the flood protection elevation.

3. Public utilities, streets and bridges may be allowed by permit, if:

a Adequate floodproofing measures are provided to the flood protection elevation; and

b. Construction meets the development standards of 18.20.020 A.

4. Fills or deposition of materials may be allowed by permit, if:

a. The requirements of 18.20.020 A. are met;

b. No material is deposited in the navigable channel unless a permit is issued by the DNR pursuant to Wis. Stat. ch. 30. Stats., and a permit pursuant to s. 404 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, Amendments of 1972, 33 U.S.C. 1344 has been issued, if applicable, and the other requirements of this section are met;

c. The fill or other materials will be protected against erosion by riprap, vegetative cover, sheet piling or bulkheading: and

d. The fill is not classified as a solid or hazardous waste material.

D. Prohibited uses. All uses not listed as a permitted uses in 18.20.030 B. are prohibited, including the following uses: 1. Habitable structures with high flood damage potential or those not associated with permanent open-space

uses:

2. Storing materials that are buoyant, flammable, explosive, injurious to property, water quality, or human, animal. plant, fish or other aquatic life:

3. Uses not in harmony with or detrimental to uses permitted in the adjoining districts;

4. Any private or public sewage systems except portable latrines that are removed prior to flooding and systems associated with recreational areas and DNR approved campgrounds that meet the applicable provisions of local ordinances and Wis. Admin. Code chs. Comm 83;

5 Any public or private wells, which are used to obtain potable water, except those for recreational areas that meet the requirements of local ordinances and Wis. Admin Code chs. NR 811 and NR 812;

6. Any solid or hazardous waste disposal sites;

7. Any wastewater treatment ponds or facilities, except those permitted under Wis. Admin. Code chs. NR

110.15(3)(b);

8. Any sanitary sewer or water supply lines, except those to service existing or proposed development located outside the floodway, which complies with the regulations for the floodplain area occupied.

18.20.040 Floodfringe District /FF).

A. Applicability. This section applies to all floodfringe areas shown on the floodplain zoning maps and those identified pursuant to 18.20.050 D.

B. Permitted uses, Any structure, land use, or development is allowed in the FF if the standards in 18,20,040 C, are met. the use is not prohibited by this or any other ordinance or regulation and all permits or certificates specified in Chapter 18.31 have been issued

C. Standards for development in flood fringe areas.

1. All of the provisions of 18,20,020 A, shall apply. In addition, the following requirements shall apply according to the use requested.

2. Residential uses. Any habitable structure, including a manufactured home, which is to be erected, constructed, reconstructed, altered, or moved into the floodfringe area, shall meet or exceed the following standards;

a. The elevation of the lowest floor, excluding the basement or crawlway, shall be at or above the flood protection elevation on fill. The fill shall be 1 foot or more above the regional flood elevation extending at least 15 feel beyond the limits of the structure. The DNR may authorize other floodproofing measures if the elevations of existing streets or sewer lines makes compliance impractical and the Board of Land Use Appeals grant a variance.

b. The basement or crawlway floor may be placed at the regional flood elevation if it is floodproofed to the flood protection elevation. No basement or crawlway floor is allowed below the regional flood elevation;

c Contiguous dryland access shall be provided from a structure to land outside of the floodplain,

except as provided in d.

d. In developments where existing street or sewer line elevations make compliance with c impractical, the department may permit new development and substantial improvements where access roads are at or below the regional flood elevation if:

i. The county has written assurance from police, fire and emergency services that rescue and relief will be provided to the structure(s) by wheeled vehicles during a regional flood event; or

iì. The county has a natural disaster plan approved by Wisconsin Emergency Management and the DNR.

3. Accessory structures or uses. An accessory structure or use not connected to a principal structure shall be constructed with its lowest floor no more than 2 feet below the regional flood elevation, subject to flood velocities of no more than 2 feet per second, and shall meet all the provisions of 18.20.030 C1 to 4 and 18.20.040 C.6.

4. Commercial uses. Any commercial structure which is erected, altered or moved into the floodfringe area shall meet the requirements of 18.20.040 B.2. Subject to the requirements of 18.20.040 C.6, storage yards, surface parking lots and other such uses may be placed at lower elevations if an adequate warning system exists to protect life and property.

5. Manufacturing and industrial uses. Any manufacturing or industrial structure which is erected, altered or moved into the floodfringe area shall be protected to the flood protection elevation using fill, levees, floodwalls, or other flood proofing measures in 18.20.060. Subject to the requirements of 18.20.040 C.6, storage yards, surface parking lots and other such uses may be placed at lower elevations if an adequate warning system exists to protect life and property.

6. Storage of materials. Materials that are buoyant, flammable, explosive or injurious to property, water quality, human, animal, plant, fish or aquatic life shall be stored at or above the flood protection elevation or floodproofed in compliance with 18.20.060. Adequate measures shall be taken to ensure that such materials will not enter the water body during flooding.

7. Public utilities, streets and bridges. All utilities, streets and bridges shall be designed to be compatible with comprehensive floodplain development plans; and

a When failure of public utilities, streets and bridges would endanger public health or safety or where such facilities are deemed essential, construction of, and substantial improvements to, such facilities may only be permitted if they are floodproofed in compliance with 18.20.060;

b. Minor roads or nonessential utilities may be constructed at lower elevations if they are designed to withstand flood forces to the regional flood elevation.

8. Sewage systems. All on-site sewage disposal systems shall be floodproofed, pursuant to 18.20.060 to the flood protection elevation and shall meet the provisions of all local ordinances and Wis. Admin. Code chs. Comm 83.

9. Wells. All wells shall be floodproofed, pursuant to 18.20.060, to the flood protection elevation and shall meet the provisions of Wis. Admin. Code chs. NR 811 and NR 812.

10. Solid waste disposal sites. Disposal of solid or hazardous waste is prohibited in the floodfringe areas.

Deposition of materials. Any deposited material must meet all the provisions of this floodplain ordinance.
 Manufactured homes.

a Owners or operators of all manufactured home parks and subdivisions shall provide adequate surface drainage to minimize flood damage and prepare, secure approval and file an evacuation plan, indicating vehicular access and escape routes with the local emergency management authorities.

b h existing manufactured home parks, all new homes, replacement homes on existing pads and substantially improved homes shall have the lowest floor elevated to the flood protection elevation and be anchored so they do not float, collapse or move laterally during a flood.

c. Outside of existing manufactured home parks, including new manufactured home parks and all single units outside of existing parks, all new replacement and substantially improved manufactured homes shall meet the residential development standards for the F in 18.20.040 C.2.

13. Mobile recreational vehicles. All mobile recreational vehicles that are not fully licensed and ready for highway use shall meet the elevation and anchoring requirements in 18.20.040 C.12. b and c A mobile recreational vehicle is ready for highway use if it is on its wheels or jacking system, is attached to the site only by quick-disconnect utilities and security devices and has no permanently attached additions.

#### 18.20.050 General floodplain District (GFP)

A. Applicability. The provisions for this district shall apply to all floodplains for which flood profiles are not available or where flood profiles are available but floodways have not been delineated. Floodway and FFs shall be delineated when adequate data is available.

B. Permitted Uses. Pursuant to 18.20.050 D, it shall be detenmined whether the proposed use is located within a floodway or floodfringe area.

1. Those uses penmitted in the FW and the FF are allowed within the GFP according to the standards of 18.20.050 C, provided that all penmits or certificates required under Chapter 18.31 have been issued.

C. Standards for development in the GFP. 18.20.030 applies to floodway areas and 18.20.040 applies to the floodfringe areas. The rest of this section applies to either district.

D. Determining floodway and floodfringe limits. Upon receiving an application for development within the GFP, the department shall:

1. Require the applicant to submit 2 copies of an aerial photograph or a plan which shows the proposed development with respect to the GFP limits, stream channel, and existing floodplain developments, along with a legal description of the property, fill limits and elevations, building floor elevations and flood proofing measures.

2. Require the applicant to furnish any of the following information deemed necessary by the DNR to evaluate the effects of the proposal upon flood height and flood flows, regional flood elevation and to determine floodway boundaries:

a. A typical valley cross-section showing the stream channel, the floodplain adjoining each side of the channel, the cross-sectional area to be occupied by the proposed development and historic high water information.

b. Plan (surface view) showing elevations or contours of the ground; pertinent structure, fill or storage elevations; size location and layout of all proposed and existing structures on the site; location and elevations of streets, water supply and sanitary facilities; soil types and other pertinent information;

c. Profile showing the slope of the bottom of the channel or flow line of the stream.

d. Specifications for building construction and materials, floodproofing, filling, dredging, channel improvement, storage, water supply and sanitary facilities.

3. Transmit 1 copy of the information described in 18.20.050 D. 1 & 2 to the DNR Regional Office along with a written request for technical assistance to establish regional flood elevations and, where applicable, floodway data. Where the provisions of Chapter 18.31 apply, the applicant shall provide all required information and computations to delineate floodway boundaries and the effects of the project on flood elevations.

## 18.20.060 Floodproofing.

A. No permit or variance shall be issued until the applicant submits a plan certified by a registered professional engineer or architect that the floodproofing measures will protect the structure or development to the flood protection elevation.
 B. Floodproofing measure shall be designed to:

- 1. Withstand flood pressures, depths, velocities, uplift and impact forces and other regional flood factors.
- 2 Protect structures to the flood protection elevation.
- 3. Anchor structures to foundations to resist flotation and lateral movement.

4. Insure that structural wall and floors are watertight to the flood protection elevation, and the interior remains completely dry during flooding without human intervention.

C. Floodproofing measures could include:

- 1. Reinforcing walls and floors to resist rupture or collapse caused by water pressure or floating debris.
- 2. Adding mass or weight to prevent flotation.
- 3. Placing essential utilities above the flood protection elevation.
- 4. Installing surface or subsurface drainage systems to relieve foundation wall and basement floor pressures.
- 5. Constructing water supply wells and waste treatment systems to prevent the entry of floodwaters.
- 6. Putting cutoff valves on sewer lines or eliminating gravity flow basement drains.

### 18.20.070 Data requirements to analyze developments.

A. The applicant shall provide all survey data and computations required to show the effects of the project on flood heights, velocities, and floodplain storage, for all subdivision proposals as •subdivision" is defined in Wis. Stat. § 236.02(12) and other proposed developments exceeding 5 acres in area or where the estimated cost exceeds \$125,000. The applicant shall provide:

1. An analysis of the effect of the development on the regional flood profile, velocity of flow and floodplain

storage capacity;

2. A map showing location and details of vehicular access to lands outside the floodplain;

3. A surface drainage plan showing how flood damage will be minimized;

4. An estimated cost of the proposal shall include all structural development, landscaping, access and road development, utilities and other pertinent items but need not include land costs.

## 18.20.080 Amendment Procedures.

A. The county may change or supplement the floodplain district boundaries and this ordinance in the manner provided by law. Actions which require an amendment Include, but are not limited to, the following:

1. Any change to the official floodplain zoning map, including the floodway line or boundary of any floodplain

area.

2. Correction of discrepancies between the water surface profiles and floodplain zoning maps.

3. Any fill in the floodplain which raises the elevation of the filled area to a height at or above the flood protection elevation and is contiguous to land lying outside the floodplain.

4. Any fill or floodplain encroachment that obstructs flow, increasing regional flood height 0.01 foot or more.

5. Any upgrade to a floodplain zoning ordinance text required by s. Wis. Admin. Code chs. NR 116.05, or otherwise required by law, or for changes by the municipality.

6. All channel relocations and changes to the maps to alter floodway lines or to remove an area from the floodway or the floodfringe that is based on a base flood elevation from a FIRM requires prior approval by FEMA.

B. Procedures. Ordinance amendments may be made upon petition of any interested party according to the provisions of Wis. Stats. § 59.69. Such petitions shall include all necessary date required and as follows:

1. The proposed amendment shall be referred to the zoning agency for a public hearing and recommendations to the county board. The amendment and notice for the public hearing shall be submitted to the Regional Office of the DNR for review prior to the hearing.

2 No amendments shall become effective until reviewed and approved by the DNR.

3 All persons petitioning for a map amendment that obstructs flow, increases regional flood height 0.01 foot or more, shall obtain flooding easements or other appropriate legal arrangements from all adversely affected property owners and notify local units of government before the amendment can be approved by the county board.

4. For amendments in areas with no water surface profiles, the committee shall consider data submitted by the DNR, the department's visual, on-site inspections and other available information.

18.20.090 Notification of the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR)

A Written notice shall be given to the regional office of the DNR at least 10 days prior to hearings on variances, conditional uses, appeals and map and text amendments.

B Copies of decisions on variances, appeals, conditional uses and map and text amendments shall be submitted to the regional office of the DNR.

C. No amendment to the maps or text of this ordinance shall become effective until reviewed and approved by the DNR.

18.20.100 Approval of other agencies. It is the responsibility of the landowner or his or her agent to secure all other necessary permits or approvals from all appropriate federal, state, and local agencies, including those required under the Federal Water Pollution Control Act amendments of 1972, 33 U.S.C. 1341, et.seq.

SECTION 4. That Subsection C. of Section 18.24.001 of the code be created to read:

C. These standards conform with Wis. Stat.§ 59.69(10). They shall apply to all modifications or additions to any nonconforming use or structure and to the use of any structure or premises which was lawful before the passage of this ordinance or amendments thereto.

SECTION 5. That Subsection F. of Section 18.24.010 of the code be created to read:

F. The construction of a deck that does not exceed 200 square feet and this is adjacent to the exterior wall of a principal structure is not an extension, modification or addition. The roof of the structure may extend over a portion of the deck in order to provide safe ingress and egress to the principal structure.

SECTION 6 That Subsection A. of Section 18.24.015 of the code be amended to read:

A. Normal maintenance <u>is-allowed is not considered a modification or addition: normal maintenance includes painting</u>, decorating, paneling, and the replacement of doors, windows, and other nonstructural components and the maintenance, repair or replacement of existing private sewage or water supply systems or connections to public utilities.

SECTION 7. That Paragraph 2 of Subsection C of Section 18.24.015 of the code is repealed and recreated to read:

2 If any nonconforming structure or any structure with a nonconforming use is destroyed or is substantially damaged, it cannot be replaced, reconstructed or rebuilt unless the use and the structure meet the current ordinance requirements. A structure is considered substantially damaged if the total cost to restore the structure to its pre-damaged condition exceeds 50% of the structure's present equalized assessed value. For nonconforming buildings that are damaged or destroyed by a non-flood disaster, the repair or reconstruction of any such nonconforming building may be permitted in order to restore it after the non-flood disaster, provided that the nonconforming building will meet all of the minimum requirements under 44 CFR Part 60 or under the regulations promulgated thereunder.

SECTION 8 That Subsection G of Section 18.24.015 of the code be repealed and recreated to read:

G. Nonconforming structures within the floodplain districts shall not be modified or added to unless they meet the following requirements:

1. No modification or addition shall be allowed to any nonconforming structure or any structure with a nonconforming use in a floodway area unless such modification or addition:

a Has been granted a permit or variance which meets all ordinance requirements.

- b. Meets the requirements in Chapter 18.24.
- c Will not increase the obstruction to flood flows or regional flood height.

d. Any addition to the existing structure shall be flood proofed, pursuant to 18.20.060, by means other than the use of fill, to the flood protection elevation.

e. No new on-site sewage disposal system, or addition to an existing on-site sewage disposal system, except where an addition has been ordered by a government agency to correct a hazard to public health, shall be allowed in a floodway area. Any replacement, repair, or maintenance of an existing on-site sewage disposal system in a floodway area shall meet the applicable requirements of all municipal ordinances and Wis. Admin. Code ch. Comm 83.

f. No new well or modification to an existing well used to obtain potable water shall be allowed in a floodway area. Any replacement, repair or maintenance of an existing well in a floodway area shall meet the applicable requirements of all municipal ordinances and Wis. Admin Code chs. NR 811 and NR 812.

2. No modification or addition to any nonconforming structure or any structure with a nonconforming use, which over the life of the structure would exceed 50% of its present equalized assessed value, shall be allowed unless the entire structure is permanently changed to a conforming structure with a conforming use in compliance with the applicable requirements of this ordinance. Contiguous dry land access must be provided for residential and commercial uses in compliance with 18.20.040 C. The costs of elevating a nonconforming building or a building with a nonconforming use to the flood protection elevation are excluded from the 50% provisions of this paragraph.

3. Where compliance with the provisions of the previous paragraph would result in unnecessary hardship and only where the structure will not be used for human habitation or be associated with a high flood damage potential, the Board of Land Use Appeals, using the procedures established in 18.31.020, may grant a variance from those provisions of the previous paragraph for modifications or additions using the criteria listed below. Modifications or additions which are protected to elevations lower than the flood protection elevation may be permitted if.

a No floor is allowed below the regional flood elevation for residential or commercial structures.

- b. Human lives are not endangered.
- c. Public facilities, such as water or sewer, will not be installed.
- d. Flood depths will not exceed 2 feet.
- e. Flood velocities will not exceed 2 feet per second.

f. The structure will not be used for storage of materials that are buoyant, flammable, explosive or injurious to property, water quality or human, animal, plant, fish or aquatic life.

4. If neither the provisions of 1 nor 2 above can be met, one addition to an existing room in a nonconforming building or a building with a nonconforming use may be allowed in the flood fringe if the addition:

a. Meets all other regulations and will be granted by a land use permit.

b. Does not exceed 60 square feet.

c. h combination with other previous modifications or additions to the building, does not exceed 50% of the present equalized assessed value of the building.

5. In the FF, all new private sewage disposal systems, or additions to, replacement, repair, or maintenance of a private sewage disposal system shall meet all the applicable provisions of all local ordinances and Wis. Admin. Code ch. Comm 83.
6. In the FF, all new wells, or additions to, replacement, repair or maintenance of a well shall meet the

applicable provisions of this ordinance and Wis. Admin Code chs, NR 811 and NR 812.

7. A nonconforming historic structure may be altered if the alteration will not preclude the structures continued designation as a historic structure, the alteration will comply with 18.20.030 C, flood resistant materials are used, and construction practices and floodproofing methods that comply with 18.20.060 are used.

SECTION 9. That Subsection A. of Section 18.31.010 of the code be amended to read:

A. Advise applicants for permits concerning the provisions of this subtitle and assist applicants in preparing applications and assure that the regional flood elevation for a proposed development is shown on all permit applications.

**SECTION 1**O. That Subsection H. of Section 18.31.010 of the code be amended to read:

H. Maintain permanent and current records of matters pertaining to this subtitle including all original and current zoning district maps, text and map amendments, permits and variances issued, status of nonconforming uses and structures, inspections made, all water surface profiles, and a list of all documentations of certified floodplain elevations and all substantial damage assessment reports for floodplain structures.

SECTION 11. That Subsection J. of Section 18.31.010 of the code be amended to read:

J. Submit copies of any required data, variances, amendments, case-by-case analyses, annual reports, <u>substantial</u> <u>damage assessments performed and all related correspondence concerning the assessments</u> and any other required information pertaining to the shoreland and floodplain overlay districts to the DNR.

**SECTION 12.** That Subsection L of Section 18.31.01 Oof the code be repealed and recreated to read:

L Inspect all damaged floodplain structures and perform a substantial damage assessment to determine if substantial damage to the structures has occurred.

SECTION 13. That Paragraph 3. of Subsection C. of 18.31.020 of the code be amended to read:

3. Grant variances from the terms of this subtitle where, owing to special conditions, the literal enforcement of this subtitle would result in unnecessary hardship. For the purposes of this section, "unnecessary hardship" is defined as an unusual or extreme decrease in the adaptability of the property to the uses permitted by the zoning district caused by facts such as rough terrain or soil conditions uniquely applicable to that particular piece of property, as distinguished from those conditions applicable to most or all other property in the same zoning district. Variances-shall-be-granted-only-so-thatthe-spirit-of-this-subtitle-is-observed and-substantialjustice-done. Variances must be consistent with the purpose of the ordinance. Variances must not be contrary to the subtantial variances must he granted.

SECTION 15. That Subsections k and L of Paragraph 6. of Subsection C. of Section 18.31.020 of the code be created to read:

k. Variances can only be granted for lots that are less than one-half acre and are contiguous to existing structures constructed below the RFE.

I Variances shall only be granted upon a showing of good and sufficient cause, shall be the minimum relief necessary, shall not cause increased risks to public safety or nuisances costs for rescue and relief efforts and shall not be contrary to the purpose of the ordinance.

SECTION 16. That Paragraph 8. of Subsection C. of Section 18.31.020 of the code be created to read:

8. Hear and decide disputes concerning the district boundaries shown on the official floodplain zoning map and shall follow the procedures below:

a If a floodplain district boundary is established by approximate or detailed floodplain studies, the flood elevations or profiles shall prevail in locating the boundary. If none exist, other evidence may be examined.

b. In all cases, the person contesting the boundary location shall be given a reasonable opportunity to present arguments and technical evidence to the board.

c. If the boundary is incorrectly mapped, the board should inform the zoning committee or the

department and the person contesting the boundary location to petition the governing body for a map amendment.

SECTION 17. That Subsection B. of Section 18.31.030 of the code be repealed and recreated to read:

B. A site plan drawn to scale shall be submitted with the permit application form and shall contain:

1. Location, dimension, area and elevation of the lot.

2. Location of the ordinary highwater mark of any abutting navigable waterways.

3. The location of any existing and all proposed structures and any other site improvements such as parking lots, sanitary systems, wells and access roads.

4. Location of floodplain and floodway limits as determined from the official floodplain zoning maps.

5. The elevation of the lowest floor of the proposed building(s) and any fill using National Geodetic and Vertical

Datum (NGVD).

6. Data sufficient to determine the regional flood elevation in NGVD at the location of the development and to determine whether or not the requirements of the floodway and FFs.

7. Data to determine if the proposed development will cause an obstruction to flow or an increase in regional flood height or discharge according to hydraulic and hydrologic analysis.

SECTION 18. That Paragraph 5. of Subsection C. of Section 18.31.030 of the code be amended to read:





#### <u>RESOLUTION</u>

### -AUTHORIZING AN APPEAL TO THE WISCONSIN DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES' ORDER TO DISCONTINUE THE ANNUAL WINTER DRAWDOWN ON LAKE ALTOONA-

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources issued an order dated July 15, 2005 which would eliminate the annual drawdown on Lake Altoona effective October 31, 2006; and

WHEREAS, the annual two-foot drawdown has been in effect since February, 1952 as an order of the Public Service Commission and was instituted as a result of lake residents desiring to minimize damage to private property from shifting ice and spring flooding; and

WHEREAS, it is felt that with continuation of a winter drawdown with the ice pack being farther away from shoreline improvements, damage from ice shifting is minimized, if not completely eliminated, and early spring flooding would have less impact on shoreline property with a lower water level over winter; and

WHEREAS, the Lake Altoona District, to this point, has not changed its position of supporting the annual drawdown; and

WHEREAS, even though a recent Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources report indicated aquatic plant community differences between Lake Eau Claire, which has no drawdown, and Lake Altoona, it is felt continuing the drawdown to minimize or eliminate damage to private and public shoreline should take precedence.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors that, acting in the best interest of the public, it hereby appeals the DNR order dated July 15, 2005, to discontinue the annual, two-foot, winter drawdown on Lake Altoona.

### -AUTHORIZING WITHDRAWAL OF TWO ACRES OF LAND FROM THE COUNTY FOREST PROGRAM FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF AN ACCESS ROAD TO 153.5 ACRES OF PRIVATE LAND IN EXCHANGE FOR LAND AND CASH; AUTHORIZING THE LAND EXCHANGE AND DEPOSIT OF \$50,000 INTO THE COUNTY FOREST LAND ACQUISITION ACCOUNT-

WHEREAS, a land trade plus cash transaction has been proposed by Secluded Land Company (SLC), LLC, whereby the County would trade two acres of county forest land to enable an access road to private land planned for development in the Town of Bridge Creek; and

WHEREAS, in exchange for the two acres of county forest land to be used for access to the development, Secluded Land Company has agreed to give the County four acres of land adjacent to other county forest land plus \$50,000; and

WHEREAS, the transaction is contingent upon SLC being granted all approvals from Bridge Creek Township, the Department of Transportation and the Department of Natural Resources; a covenant in the deeds that the landowners of the lots are aware that timber management and public hunting are allowed uses of the adjacent county forest land, and that the County be granted access to cross and utilize the proposed road for timber management purposes.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors, that it hereby authorizes the withdrawal of two acres of land from the county forest program as shown on the attached fact sheet in exchange for four acres from Secluded Land Company and \$50,000.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the \$50,000 revenue from this transaction be deposited into the county forest land acquisition account (#100-22-57111-821) and shall be used solely for the purchase of additional county forest land within or adjacent to the county forest boundary.

### -CREATION OF FOUR NEW FULL-TIME SOCIAL WORKER I/II/III POSITIONS FOR 2006 AS PART OF THE JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM WITH PLACEMENT IN THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES-

WHEREAS, the Department of Human Services Board and the Committee on Judiciary & Law Enforcement appointed an ad hoc subcommittee to study the juvenile justice system in Eau Claire County. This ad hoc committee, chaired by Judge Lisa Stark, is comprised of individuals who represent state, county and city government, non-profit agencies, the Eau Claire Area School District and others that have an impact upon and/or provide services and programming to juveniles, families and the juvenile justice system; and

WHEREAS, since late 2004, the ad hoc committee has met and spent considerable time reviewing factors contributing to the decision of the joint boards to appoint a committee to study the Eau Claire County juvenile justice system; and

WHEREAS, from their findings and recommendations, the Department of Human Services Board and the Committee on Judiciary & Law Enforcement at their meeting on June 30, 2005, voted unanimously to direct the Department of Human Services to propose the following positions:

- o Three full-time Social Worker I/II/III positions as part of the MARTY project to work with youth identified as at risk involving enforcement of juvenile related issues including truancy, underage alcohol consumption, tobacco use and family concerns;
- o One full-time Social Worker I/II/III position as part of the Intensive Supervision Program (ISP) providing monitoring of juveniles in their familial home to ensure the safety of the juvenile, their family and the community; and

WHEREAS, at its regularly scheduled meetings on August 9, August 30, and September 28, 2005, the Committee on Personnel reviewed and granted approval of these four new positions; and

WHEREAS, both the Eau Claire County Code of General Ordinances and the Eau Claire County Personnel Manual require that such requests be submitted to the Board in time for due deliberation during the budget process and there is a levy impact of \$284,315 for these positions.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors hereby approves the above-stated Juvenile Justice System position requests effective January 1, 2006.
