
This letter concerns the accessibility of public and private lands lying Houth of I-94 and West of Hwy,, 93,, More specifically, planning and designating the location of future roads for this expanse of land..

It is interesting to note this is not a new issue with regard to this HW Quadrant of land.. Discussions of possible street layouts were entertained even as the Interstate was under construction and the interchange first proposed.. Having witnessed the growth in this area over many years, it was easy ta see the future would make some kind of road way network serving lands abutting I-94/Hwy. 93 on all four sides necessary. To this end, We approached the Planning and Developement Department in 1982 when we learned the county had acquired the old Larch estate,, These initial meetings bare no fruit. In 1984 we again approached the Planning and Development Department on working out street locations in the SW quadrant because the Rural Electric Coop asked to place a transmission line across the property from Lowes Creek to Hwy..93. Surely, we thought, the logic of locating a future roadway and power lines together would prevail. Finally, frustrated and with no direction from the county we granted an easement to the power company adjacent to the interstate where it seems most all service roads go.

In March 1985, we were confident that the access corridor issue would finally be addressed. On April 23, 1985, a Planning Background study by the Planning and Development Dept.stated= 'access to Hwy. 93 should be thought:. out so service roads can be in place in advance of development'. You might imagine our surprise in 1987 when site plans for developement were first considered with no mention of accessing over 100 acres left in thc;:ti,,l\,n ct:-!)

In any other situation of this nature, land owners are called upon to mutually provide appropriate access for the common good. In this instance the county is one of the land owners, all the more appropriate they are a part of the process that paves the way for future growth and prosperity. To enhance the economic development:. of this area as a whole, we urge the county to set aside land for future service road just as the individual property owners have long since been willing to do.

I am pleased that the Administration Committee will be formulating a policy on sale of county land (re: Spickler sale). I hope this policy will require automatic appraisal of any county land before its sale. In addition, I hope the Committee reviews policies of other communities who have faced the same dilemma. The Metropolitan Council (300 Metro Square, St. Paul, MN) and Hennepin County Parks in the Twin Cities may be able to provide additional information. Furthermore, a review of the journals in the public administration field may prove very helpful. Metropolitan areas "controlled growth" policies may have some applicability to Eau Claire County's situation.

Today individuals prefer to live in areas with a high "quality of life." Eau Claire County is in a unique position to incorporate quality of life factors into the proposed policy. Such planning now will enhance the future desirability of the Eau Claire County area. In addition, such planning will complement the county's careful control over the levy increases.

As a tax payer and local business in Eau Claire we have had the right to observe and analyze the proposals made to the County by Consumat Systems. I must say that they have super salesmen that could sell the committee on their proposal in view of the malfunction problems that they have had with their 3quipment and the law ouits reported in the news media.

Grudem Brothers Company have been in business over 50 years and we have never had a law suit from any of our customers as we endeavor to satisfy our customers and we find that by so doing, we have repeat business which is generally better than the original business.

The proposal which we have reviewed is very confusing and if we interpret them right the tipping fees will be considerably higher than our proposal of \$40.DO per ton. It appears that they have had a flexible fee which would increase every year so that eventually their fees would average approximately twice what our guaranteed fee for ten years is.

They have furnished an information and clarification on 20 pages. The first of these pages consists of mostly alibis and excuses for the malfunctions of the Red Wing and Barron County units.

It would seem that if they had proper customer relations they should correct these Jobs before trying to sell additional units which may also be troublesome. There is no definatate assurance that a new unit installed for Eau Claire would be any better than the other units they have installad.

On page 7, question 18, they are estimating \$117,500.00 for spare parts, equipment and tools per year. Lundell estimates that they do not cdquire any more than \$1□,000.00 in spare parts as all of their equipment is standardized bearings and so forth.

On page 11, they have estimated \$250,DOD.DO for maintenance costs. If the maintenance amounts to such a figure the equipment will definately not be running for extended periods of time.

On page 12, they also have \$550,220.00 for all other operating and maintenance costs. These two figures seem terrifically high but apparently with the experiences they are having at Barron they may be realistic.

A good share of this 20 page report provides extra costs for Eau Claire such as the county furnishing an employee in an office they provide to monitor their operation. Also, they have anticipated that thi County would do the ash hauling and if not there would be a \$49,500 extra investment in a truck to haul the ashes.

The ash from Consumat System we would estimate to be at 10 - 15% and at Red Wing they apparently haul out at least two truck loads a day of a very wet, messy ash. With our system of recycling, we doubt that there would be much over 1% that could not be recovered.

There is no question that recycling is the coming way to handle garbage from small units. In this way most of the garbage can be recovered for useable purposes.

The large garbage operators tell us that 1,000 tons per day is the minimum that should be considered for a burning plant and that all of the other small garbage operations should be recycled and the fuel sold to the larger plants that can properly burn it to eliminate the dioxines and other objectionable particles.

The plant that is proposed for Eau Claire is too large of an investment for the volume involved and it is very questionable that the plant could operate with such a high expense and low volume of product.

Our proposal consists of taking care of the volume from Eau Claire, 200 tons per day, and also we are providing capacity to take care of all of the smaller municipalitiez in car area 9D that we would be good neighbor and eliminate the garbage problems for the adjacent area.

We urge you to VOTE !iQ on the Consumat proposal and to VOTE YES for the Grudem Brothers Company proposal so we could proceed to have our plant in operation in less that one year. Whereas, Consumat's proposal indicates January 1, 1990.

We assure you that our proposal will save the County a large amount of money and will be very beneficial to the County.

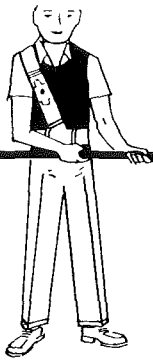



WHE 8AS, the Career Development Center (CDC) has served the Eau Claire community for many years by providing training and employment for handicapped individuals, and

WHEREAS, CDC is experiencing financial difficulty which is jeopardizing continuation of these essential training programs, and

WHEREAS, CDC Operates on a contractual basis with various government assistance agencies in providing training services for its clients, and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County Human Services is the largest governmental agency using the services of CDC, and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County is required by state statute to provide for the training and employment of handicapped individuals residing within Eau Claire County, and

WHEREAS, Eau Claire County has provided some emergency funds in early 1988 to assist CDC during this financial crisis, but is unable to provide sufficient funds to alleviate the problem, and

WHEREAS, the City Council is supportive of CDC operations but recognizes that consideration of financial solutions to this problem are more equitably solved on a county-wide funding basis, and

WHEREAS, the City Council is willing to cooperate with Eau Claire County and provide a loan for CDC purposes, provided that Eau Claire County will accept such loan and secure the repayment of such funds,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Eau Claire that a \$100,000 Economic Development Fund loan (10 yr. amortization, 7% per annum interest) is hereby authorized to be offered to Eau Claire County for their use in providing cash flow assistance to the Career Development Center, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Manager and City Clerk be and are hereby authorized to execute all loan documents if the loan offer is accepted by Eau Claire County.

TRANSPORTATION WEEK ACTIVITIES

OPEN HOUSE - RUSK SCALE - MAY 13, 1987

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In conjunction with National Transportation Week activities, District No. 6

Wisconsin State Patrol will host an Open House at the Rusk Weigh Station  
the  
in Dunn County on Wednesday, May 13, 1987, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and  
2:00 p.m.

During the open house, visitors will be able to witness the state of the  
art weigh-in-motion electronic scale in operation. Other features of the open  
house include a portable LoDec Electronic Scale set up for operation, Motor  
Carrier Safety Assistance Program inspections, and a school bus set up for  
inspection purposes.

The weigh-in-motion scale, now in its second year of operation, remains the  
mainstay of the District Six motor carrier weight enforcement program. Recent  
addition of a computer terminal allows state inspectors to make nearly  
instantaneous checks on a carrier's status for registration, permits, and  
insurance requirements from the central files in Madison.

A portable LoDec Scale allows state inspectors to screen motor carriers at  
locations not having a fixed scale facility. This highly mobile scale is one of  
two operated by the State Patrol and has proven to be especially effective in  
detering those who intentionally bypass a fixed scale.

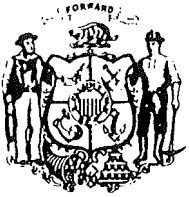
Motor carrier equipment and driver requirements are the responsibility of the Motor Carrier Safety Assistance Program inspectors. This function, dubbed MCSAP, is a thorough inspection of a heavy truck's equipment, as well as the driver's fitness for further operation. Approximately half of all trucks inspected are placed out of operation for major equipment violations or driver requirements. The most common violations are poor brakes and broken springs on tractors or trailers, and drivers operating beyond their allotted hours.

State Patrol School Bus Inspectors will be on site to discuss the Patrol's bus inspection program, along with a bus for reference. Every school bus used in the state is subject to an annual inspection, as well as unannounced spot checks. Some 87 items, from steering requirements to cleanliness, are routinely inspected.

The Rusk Seale is located along the westbound lane of I-94 in Dunn County, approximately half way between the Highway 12 and 29 interchange and the Highway 25 Menomonie exit. Those attending from the Menomonie area and west may wish to take Highways 12 and 29 east from Menomonie and enter I-94 westbound at the Highway 12, 24 40 and I-94 interchange near Elk Mound.

We are happy to receive Eau Claire County's application to operate a private water system program under the authority of s. 59.067 and 162.07, Stats. and ch. NR 145, Wis. Adm. Code.

On May 11, 1987, the Department of Natural Resources received an application from Eau Claire County for authorization to administer ch. NR 112, Wis. Adm. Code, at delegation level 1 and 3.

Section NR 145.11, Wis. Adm. Code, requires that the following be submitted to the county and approved by the Department:

1. A copy of the private water systems ordinance that will be adopted by the county board of supervisors.
2. A description of the enforcement procedures to be used by the county for follow-up on noncompliance with ch. 162, Stats., ch. NR 112, Wis. Adm. Code, or the county ordinance.
3. A signed statement from the district attorney or corporation counsel indicating a willingness to prosecute cases of noncompliance with ch. 162, Stats., ch. NR 112, Wis. Adm. Code, or the county ordinance.
4. The expected number of staff hours available per year for each level of delegation for the private water systems program. The number of staff to be trained at each delegation level is to be included.

You have submitted each of the documents described above. The Department hereby approves the program submitted by the county and authorizes Eau Claire County to operate a private water systems program at Delegation Level 1 beginning after June 1, 1987, when the county ordinance is published and becomes effective, and Delegation Level 3, 18 months after the publication of the County ordinance. This approval is conditioned upon Eau Claire County transmitting to the Department a copy of the adopted private water systems ordinance within one month after County Board approval.

Dear County Supervisor,

You are being asked by the Department of Natural Resources to assume the responsibility of enforcement of the Wisconsin Well Code which covers water well construction and pump installation in your County. CNR Chapter NR145.

Unless you have on hand unusually qualified personnel, we believe it is a bad idea at this time.

Who are "We"?

Our Organization is made up of the Manufacturers and Distributors of the vast majority of the equipment installed in Wisconsin. Our members sell tons of it every week from 35 warehouses scattered throughout Wisconsin. Additionally, the State licensed installing contractors group think it is a bad idea, but they speak for themselves.

Why is it a bad idea?

Because this legislation, Assembly Bill 595 enacted in 1984, was expecting to have trained personnel on the State level, and an adequate water sampling system in place, prior to being sent to the County for the first level of enforcement. Neither has happened because the job was seriously under-rated from the start. There are competent people with the CNR, but not enough at the skill level needed. There are water sampling services available in Wisconsin, but not enough foreseeable to handle your third level of enforcement,

What should be done?

County enforcement should be held in abeyance for the 3 or 4 years necessary for the DNR to certify their District personnel in 1) Construction of Small Diameter Water Wells, 2) Private Water System Installation, and 3) Corrective Asures and Monitoring Wells. Certification programs are available in intensive 3 1/2 day schools instructed by the National Water Well Association staff, using State facilities, at approximately \$20,000 per school for 75 people. They are comparable to those given to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) personnel in Chicago, and State personnel in Florida by the NWWA Staff. Considering the budget amounts being asked for by the DNR, we believe this education program to be very cost effective. It will put in place trained people to whom County personnel can turn to for Code interpretation and variance requests. The Counties will not have adequate support from the DNR in these areas now.

Why is the Wisconsin Pump and Well Suppliers interested in the County level enforcement of the Well Code?

Because as the small businessmen representing this Industry in Wisconsin, we do not want confusion and unnecessary costs for the 36% of the State's population who rely on individual wells for their water supply, Our Organization is not afraid of regulation, nor are our Contractor installing customers. Neither we, nor they, created or substantially contributed to what is thought to be a pollution problem created basically in heavy population centers. We are not particularly interested in having that same 36% pay for a ground water sampling program which really is somebody else's problem, but that's a whole different story.

What we want is regulation by a strong group of certifiably trained State enforcement personnel, who can provide you support on the County level, if the State legislators are determined to put it there.

We want the various and sundry County permit fees, which will be in addition to the Water Sampling Expense and will be passed on to rural Wisconsin, to be such to allow this work to remain within the present license and permit system.

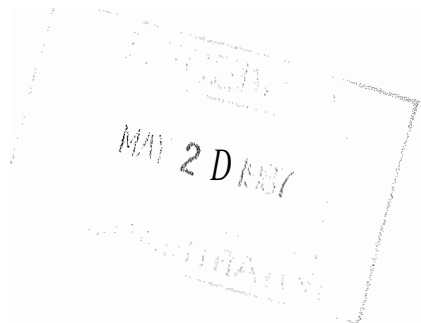
Both local TV stations had features on the ride during their Sunday evening news broadcasts.

Dear Mr. Chatterson:

I understand there has been questions among some counsel members regarding our request to establish a hanger and fueling facility at the Eau Claire County Airport. This letter is to clarify our intent.

In March of this year we met with Burt Wright, Superintendent of the airport, requesting permission to build a 2,880 square foot hanger on the airport, and install two 10,000 gallon tanks and a card operated fuel island (which we manufacture in Eau Claire under the name "U-Fuel"). We chose a site next to the DNR hanger since utilities were available and our fueling island would be close to the DNR's fuel tanks and the county maintenance fuel tanks. (See Exhibit A)

This location and hanger was approved by the Transportation Committee, but was referred to the Administration Committee upon presentation to the County Council on April 7th. There was a concern with the proposed location conflicting with future terminal expansion.

Upon subsequent meetings with the Transportation Committee it was determined that we should conform to the minimum standards for a fueling facility at the airport requiring a larger hanger, offices, full time employees, etc. It was also determined that a location northeast of the terminal and hangers was more desirable, conformed with the intent of airport master plan for expansion, and would allow an access road and utilities to be constructed from Runway Avenue at a minimal cost: (less than \$50,000) .

We agreed to conform to minimum standards, amended our contract with the builder and paid one third down on a larger hanger with offices. We also decided to move our fueling operations office to the new location. This will work out well since our products are sold principally to airports and much of our transportation is by our own aircraft. It also allows us to conform to Eau Claire County's minimum standards. (See Exhibit B)

Recognizing that initially we will have excess space, we contacted air freight carriers and other aircraft related businesses and found an interest in leasing space and locating on the airport. We also received request from private aircraft owners to lease hanger space of which there is a shortage.

Our primary goal is to operate our fueling facility distribution and servicing from the proposed airport location and to provide limited fueling service to light aircraft. We do not see ourselves, nor is our facility constructed to service large aircraft, provide major aircraft maintenance, or be a significant competitor to the existing airport operator. We feel our presence will increase usage of the airport, provide additional jobs, generate user fees, taxes, and attract other business to the airport.

The Transportation Committee approved the new location and a three phase plan for construction. With Federal funding, for which this project is eligible, the net cost to the County would be approximately \$5,000.

We ask that you support our request to locate on the airport. We would be happy to answer any questions. You may contact me at work at 836-0905 or at home at 836-0906.

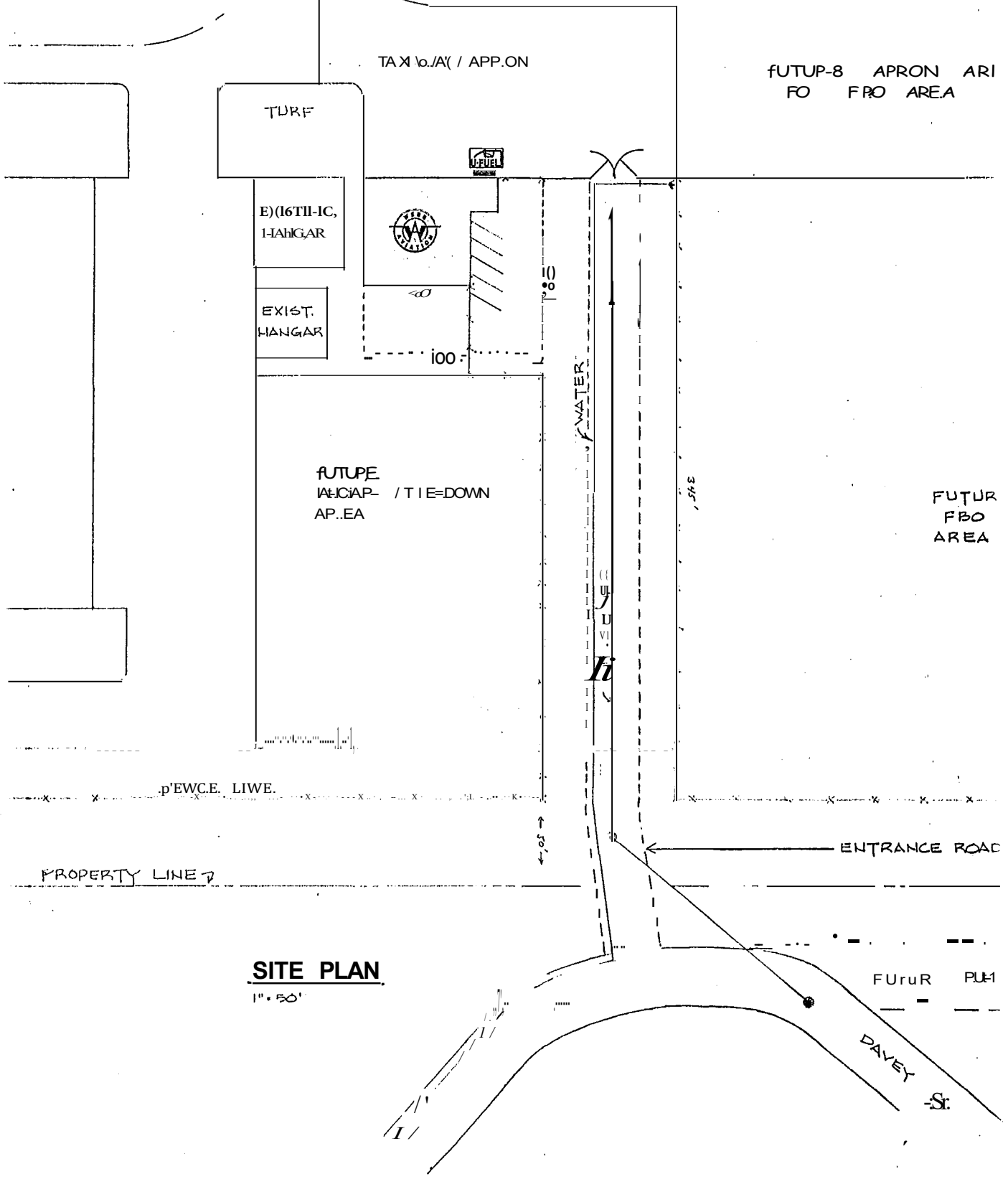
**DETAILED SITE PLAN**

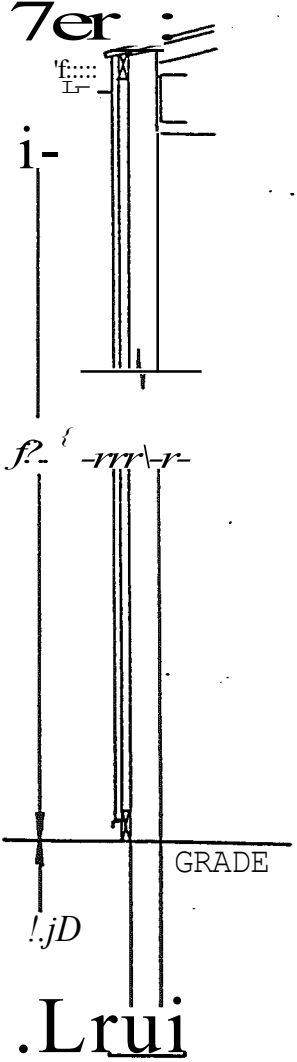

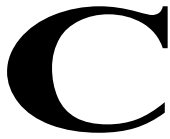
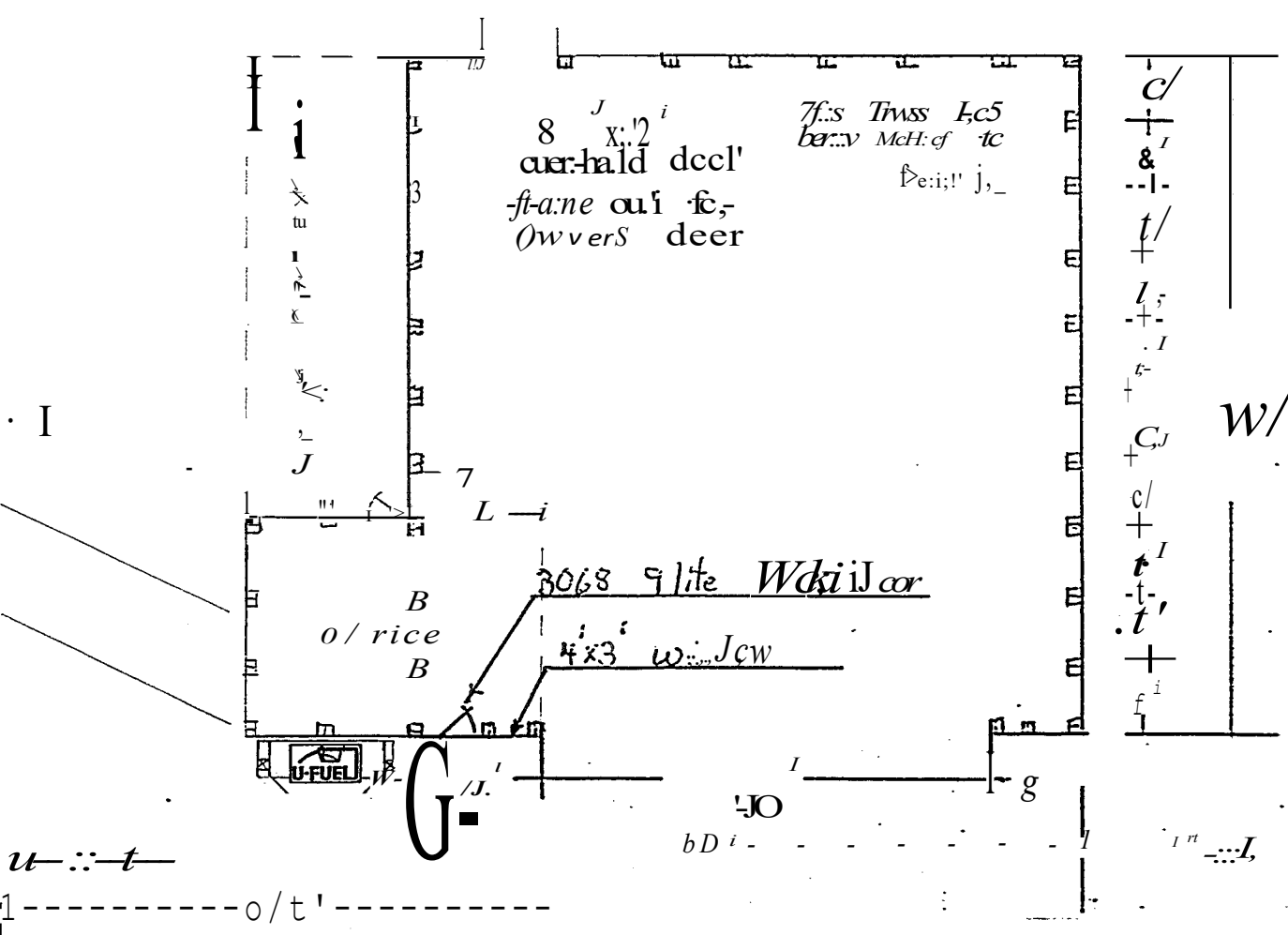

The Eau Claire County Overall Economic Development (OEDP) Committee met on May 27, 1987 and again on June 5, 1987. As usual, participation and discussions were excellent. This committee really takes this process serious, more so than any other county committee I meet with. I have attached the priority rankings of economic development projects that were arrived at by this committee. The top four projects (Industrial Development and Recruitment, Northside Bridge, Waste-To-Energy Facility, and Incubation Center) were rated much higher than projects ranked in the fifth to twelfth positions.

The next step of the OEDP process involves the Regional Planning Commission considering the Eau Claire County projects in relation to other projects submitted by the six other counties in the District. As in past years, as the Commission prepares the seven-county OEDP, they will try to maintain the exact same priority order of Eau Claire County projects as was presented by the Eau Claire County OEDP Committee.

Commission approval of the seven-county OEDP is expected in July. We will be asking for Eau Claire County Board approval of the seven-county OEDP in August or September. I will be contacting you later regarding this.

Re: Potential Placement of U-Fuel Facility, Eau Claire County Airport

Dear County Board Members:

I am writing to you as a pilot and owner concerning the above matter. I have spent a great deal of time, effort, money and ultimately my youth in the last several years, flying in and out of Eau Claire. Further, I have used the facilities both by renting a hangar from the County as well as Gibson throughout this period of time extending from approximately 1973 to the current date. I look forward with great enthusiasm and excitement to the new facility to be built in Eau Claire, particularly after hearing the grumbles and murmurings from passengers and pilots over the last years asking why something better could not be done in this County. I salute you for making that possible.

My concern in writing, however, extends from the U-fuel facility currently under your consideration. For those of us who have been gassing our own cars for the last ten years, it may seem that this is a great deal to do about nothing. However, it is so important, particularly for those who are not in the cockpits to understand the potential problems I believe emanate from such a facility. There is an old bromide about flying to the effect that you cannot find a service station in the air. This, in large measure, explains to a pilot some of the problems one has with U-fuel facilities.

As envisioned, all opportunity of self-inspection of the aircraft as well as that assisted by the linemen is lost. As such, missing lights, oil leaks and prop damage inspection, all of which have been caught by line "boys" throughout my years, could be missed. Herein, it is important to bear in mind that oftentimes those refuelings take place late at night,

particularly in arctic weather where one hastens passengers to warm facilities, leaving a line boy standing in the cold to inform you on your return of something he has caught that, in turn, may save you money or your life. To lose this, in my judgment, is to lose a great deal.

Further, if I am informed correctly, under the U-fuel facility, it would in some way limit, deter or interfere with the potential of obtaining service from an FBO, then everyone who flies as passenger and pilot in this area should be viciously concerned. There are simply too many times when one needs routine care, whether it be oil change service, preheats, assistance with non-ambulatory passengers, ad nauseam, that makes this suggestion untenable. Moreover, the spirit of aviation permits a combination of corporate jet aircraft to be side by side with home built and in this sense, to think that the refueling and as such, need to fix grounds to aircraft and the like, is to be left in the hands of amateurs, becomes a perilous thought indeed. Imagine, one literally could have aircraft and personnel present side by side standing seemingly by the U-fuel pump, ultimately, being filled by student pilots or even members of the general public without any concept of dangers of jet wash or potential touching of a hot prop with latent compression that spins it one more time even after the key is off, much to the tragic reality of the passerby and a whole host of other scenarios that simply are waiting to occur in the absence of intelligent supervision by line boys.

As I reflect, therefore, I am hard pressed to think of a reason that would make this facility in the best interest of Eau Claire as a whole, to general aviation as a group, and certainly is not in the interest of the public being deprived of safety checks and services without their even knowing it. Moreover, I see the plan itself to be an antithesis to what Eau Claire ostensibly, is attempting to do regarding their new facility at this time. In a way, it is similar to building a lavish gymnasium and not hiring a coach and, in effect, letting the team players at different skills levels work it out on their own. Moreover, I am mindful that it also has to ultimately effect financially the County and economically Mr. Gibson as well. He has shouldered his responsibility for plus 20 years. for and on behalf of the County and general aviation in Eau Claire. Anything, in my mind, to in any way limit a fair and economic return to the Gibson family, particularly in a day and age when general aviation is on its financial knees, is in the interest of no one.

Accordingly, I would hope that you would see fit to leave things as they are in terms of the fueling operations here in Eau Claire.

Dear County Supervisors:

On July 21, 1987, you will be asked to consider the issue of the proposed Webb Aviation hanger and self-fueling facility. To assist you in your consideration, I would like to provide the following background information.

#### Facilities

The proposed facility to be constructed at the Eau Claire County Airport consist of an 60' x 60' hanger with attached office space. The hanger and office space will be initially utilized for the storage of aircraft with a portion of the hanger/office space leased to U-Fuel, Inc. for the purpose of assembly of electronic components and to house a data processing center.

In addition, adjacent to the hanger/office complex will be a self-service fueling facility. The facility has been designed to fuel aircraft 24-hours per day. The station will dispense both low octane fuel (often referred to as "auto gas" because it is a similar fuel to that burned in automobiles) and high octane avgas.

#### Economic Impact

General aviation activity at Eau Claire County Airport is on the increase. Fuel sales are up 13% over 1986 as indicated by tax receipts. The availability of a self-servicing fueling facility can accelerate this growth by providing additional service to more pilots for a greater number of hours during the day.

The location of the U-Fuel headquarters in the Webb Aviation facilities will bring an increased level of activity and employment to the Airport.

The Webb facility will compliment Gibson Aviation by providing more ramp space and tie down area for small aircraft and increasing Gibson's ability to provide better service to the larger more profitable aircraft.

#### Self-Fueling

Self-fueling by pilots is not new. There are many airports, some smaller than Eau Claire, where pilots fuel their own aircraft.

The economics of flying are such that self-fueling allows people to fly who wouldn't normally be able to afford it. The pilot of a small plane may not choose to have or pay for full service or subsidize all the services provided to large corporate aircraft through higher fuel costs.

#### County Expense

Webb Aviation is paying for 100% of the cost of its hanger, offices, facility, and utilities and will be paying the normal rent and fuel flowage fee. The only expense to the County is for ramp area which is provided to everyone who builds at the airport (this expense is eligible for federal and state funding).

#### Potential Liability of the County

The proposed facility has been designed by a consulting engineering firm with input on a non official basis from representatives of DILHR, the FAA, the Wisconsin Bureau of Aeronautics, a major oil equipment manufacturer, and installers. It incorporates many safety features not yet required by law or regulation. The equipment selected is considered to be some of the best in the industry. Aside from its' superior quality, the facility will be insured, with the county named as a co-insured in accordance with the county regulations.

#### Feasibility

Many aircraft, 1977 and older, were designed to use low octane fuel. Pilots owning these aircraft burn auto fuel rather than shorten the lives of their engines by burning Avgas. It is also 31% cheaper.

Manufacturers are now introducing new liquid cooled engines for aircraft which burn auto fuel. These engines run cooler and longer. Older, high performance aircraft are being retro-fitted with these liquid cooled engines.

Last week the County Housing Authority was advised by WHEDA that we had received a \$40,000 grant for which we applied this past June,

WHEDA's forty thousand dollars will be added to \$10,000 from the Housing Authority to form a \$50,000 rental housing rehabilitation and rent subsidy program. We intend to loan \$35,000 at five percent interest for a five year term to owners of vacant buildings that are suitable for development as apartments. Our goal is to help produce four units of two and three bedroom rental housing and subsidize rents on those units for the term of the loan(s) so that the rental units are affordable to low and moderate income families. We are excited about the project because it will be the County Housing Authority's first effort in helping develop new rental housing - a long time goal of the PHA.

I anticipate that the Housing Authority will sign a grant agreement with WHEDA sometime during the next sixty days. Shortly later we will advertise the program and solicit project proposals.

This is the second year in a row that the Eau Claire County Housing Authority has been awarded a WHEDA Foundation grant. Attached is the WHEDA announcement.

My name is Robert Murphy and I live at 2241 Jannet Avenue in Eau Claire, Wisconsin.

I am speaking in favor of the passage of the ordinance of an Eau Claire County obscenity ordinance. I would like my letter distributed to all County Board members,

I speak primarily as a counselor and base my observations on 16 years experience as a pastoral counselor. My training as a counselor includes the undergraduate level, the graduate level, and the postgraduate level.

The people with whom I have counseled in contact include individuals and families, of my present and former congregations, referrals from other pastors, referrals from some practitioners in the medical community, and various other professionals serving the Eau Claire community.

What I am trying to communicate is I am not a novice. My experience as a counselor represents a broad range of counseling experience over the past 16 years.

It has been my sad experience to counsel with individuals addicted to obscene and pornographic material, as well as victims (or the families of victims) of people addicted to pornographic material. I would like to express three consistent, longterm observations:

- I. THE VIEWING OF OBSCENE OR PORNOGRAPHIC MATERIAL IS ADDICTIVE AND PROGRESSIVE IN NATURE. What often starts as a simple interest or curiosity in human nudity or sexuality grows in degree and intensity regarding what it takes to satisfy that interest or curiosity. Soft-core pornography leads to hardcore pornography. Pictures, written text, and videos of normal sexual contact lead to interest in and desire for the abnormal sexual material (kiddie porn, bondage, bestiality, etc.)



II. A second long-term observation is: IRREGULAR USE OR EXPOSURE TO OBSCENE OR PORNOGRAPHIC MATERIAL ENCOURAGES AND PROMOTES PROMISCUITY. It is accepted within the field of study of human behavior that we as human beings often act out that to which we are constantly exposed. I can point to my census files and document cases in our community where long-term consumption of pornographic material has played a major contributing role in encouraging actual participation in incest, indecent exposure, child sexual abuse, adultery, fornication, sexual bondage, and bestiality. Having pornographic material so readily available in our community plays an encouraging role for such behavior among the citizens in our city. Now, I am not suggesting that passage of an obscenity ordinance will eliminate all such behavior, BUT IT WILL HELP REMOVE ONE OF THE MAJOR CONTRIBUTING FACTORS.

III. A third observation, which is confirmed by my experience, is that MUCH OF THE OBSCENE MATERIAL SOLD TO ADULTS DOES END UP IN THE HANDS OF MINORS. It is easy to say that it is the responsibility of the parents to see that it does not happen. However, it is often not the parent who does the purchasing--it is an older brother or sister, and aunt or uncle, a neighbor, or the material is simply left in the streets and picked up by a child.

It seems to me that merely restricting the zone in which this material may be purchased would solve none of the observation; I am making.

Let me close with an analogy. If we had a dangerous cliff in our community over which numbers of citizens were falling and being injured or killed, would our resources be better spent and would we serve our community more effectively if we attempted to improve the quality of the rescue service to those injured and killed from medical attention... OR WOULD WE BE WISER TO BUILD A FENCE AT THE TOP OF THE CLIFF TO HELP KEEP THEM FROM FALLING?

MR. CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE COUNTY BOARD, I ENCOURAGE YOU TO BUILD A FENCE BY ADOPTING AN EAU CLAIRE COUNTY OBSCENITY ORDINANCE! Thank you.

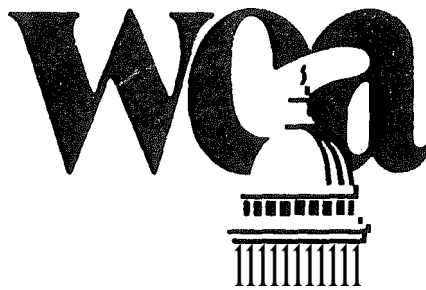

**RE: NOMINATIONS FOR WCA STEERING COMMITTEES**

The Wisconsin Counties Association Board of Directors recently approved a proposal for the creation of seven steering committees to be advisory to the WCA Board of Directors (see attachment). These steering committees **will** review legislative priorities and make policy recommendations to the WCA Board.

Each steering committee will consist of no more than 50 members, of which at least two-thirds will be county board supervisors or executives. The steering committee structure is modeled after that used by the National Association of Counties, and is expected to increase county board supervisor participation in WCA.

The first steering committee authorized by the WCA Board is the County Organization and Administration Steering Committee. This committee will be responsible for recommending revisions to the county government statute, Chapter 59, and will become effective on January 1, 1988. Therefore, we will be accepting nominations at this time for the County Organization and Administration Steering Committee only. Appointments to the committee will be made by WCA President Hubert Braun for a one-year term, ending December 31, 1988. Please use the attached form for nominating elected or appointed county officials to the committee. The deadline for submitting nominations to WCA is December 28, 1987.

**WISCONSIN COUNTIES ASSOCIATION**

Steering Committees.

Section 1. Creation: Pursuant to Article **XII**, Section 3 of the Wisconsin Counties Association Constitution, the following Steering Committees are created.

County Organization and Administration: Responsible for revisions to Chapter 59, issues affecting Home Rule, mandates, elections, reapportionment, Open Meetings and Open Records Laws, and the offices of the county clerk, register of deeds and surveyor. (effective 1/1/88)

Health and Human Services: Responsible for issues affecting aging, public health, mental health, alcohol and drug abuse, developmental disabilities, social services, nursing homes and mental health facilities. (to become effective upon subsequent Board action)

Transportation and Public Works: Responsible for issues affecting highways, airports, mass transit, and county building and grounds. (to become effective upon subsequent Board action)

Judicial and Public Safety: Responsible for issues affecting the court system, jails, prosecutorial system, probate, and the offices of the sheriff, district attorney and clerks of circuit courts. (to become effective upon subsequent Board action)

Personnel and Labor Relations: Responsible for issues affecting retirement benefits, labor negotiations and binding arbitration, civil service systems, and employment in general. (to become effective upon subsequent Board action)

Environment and Land Use: Responsible for issues affecting planning and zoning, environmental protection, solid waste management, soil and water conservation. (to become effective upon subsequent Board action)

Taxation and Finance: Responsible for issues affecting property taxes, local sales and use taxes, other sources of revenues, shared revenues, investment laws, county budgeting and the office of the treasurer. (to become effective upon subsequent Board action)

Section 2. Duties: Within each program area of concern to county government, the Steering Committee is to aid the WCA Board of Directors in establishing Association policy on state and federal legislation and administrative matters.

Section 3. Committee Membership: Each steering committee shall have no more than 50 members, at least two-thirds of which shall be county elected supervisors or executives. At least one member of each steering committee shall be a member of the Wisconsin Counties Association Board of Directors. The remaining members may be other elected or appointed county officials.

Section 4. Term: The term of appointment shall be for 1 year, beginning January 1 and ending December 31.

Section 5. Appointment: The members of the Steering Committee shall be appointed by the President of the Wisconsin Counties Association, upon the advice and recommendation of county board chairs and executives.

1. County board supervisors interested in serving on a Steering Committee must submit an application which includes an approval by the County Board Chair.
2. County executives interested in serving on a Steering Committee shall submit an application.
3. Other county elected or appointed officials interested in serving on a Steering Committee must submit an application which includes an approval by the County Board Chair and/or Executive.

Section 6. Compensation: The Wisconsin Counties Association will not pay expenses of members of the Steering Committees.

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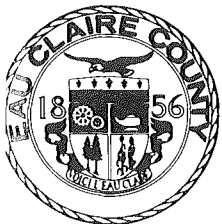

BFGOODRICH AGREES TO SELL ITS SHARE  
OF JOINT VENTURE TIRE COMPANY

Akron, Ohio, Dec. 22 — The BFGoodrich Company and Clayton & Dubilier, Inc. announced today that they have signed a letter of intent for the sale of Goodrich's 50 percent interest in The Uniroyal Goodrich Tire Company to an investor group to be formed by Clayton & Dubilier. The sale is contingent on execution of a definitive agreement, obtaining financing, approval by the companies' boards of directors and certain governmental approvals.

Under terms of the agreement, BFG is to receive \$225 million in cash, plus warrants that can be exercised within seven years that effectively allow Goodrich to purchase a seven percent interest in The Uniroyal Goodrich Tire Company.

Goodrich presently has a 50 percent interest in Uniroyal Goodrich, the second largest producer of automobile and light truck tires in North America. The Uniroyal Goodrich Tire Company was formed on August 1, 1986 by combining the tire businesses of The BFGoodrich Company and Uniroyal Tire Company. The joint venture company has 19,000 employees, operates

manufacturing facilities in the U.S., Canada and Mexico, and expects to have sales of approximately \$2.0 billion in 1987.

Commenting on the announcement, Goodrich chairman and chief executive officer John D. Ong said, "We have had in mind selling our interest in Uniroyal Goodrich eventually so that we can focus our resources on our chemical and aerospace businesses. The Clayton & Dubilier offer fits our strategy and will allow us to accelerate the growth of these core businesses.

"The continuing, successful implementation of our strategic plans has reshaped BFGoodrich into a very different and more profitable company," Ong said. "Our financial condition has improved as dramatically as our portfolio of businesses has changed, and we anticipate that we will continue to enhance shareholder values in the years ahead."

Ong said that he remained confident Uniroyal Goodrich will be an able competitor in the fast changing tire industry and meet the goals originally envisioned for it. "As Uniroyal Goodrich meets these goals, the warrants will allow us to participate in the increased value of the company," he added.

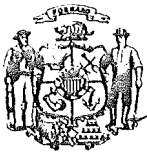

The Wisconsin Council on Developmental Disabilities has reviewed the developmental disabilities information you submitted regarding service plans for CY 1988.

The Council made the following comments and observations:

Eau Claire County Human Services Department

1. Acknowledge an overall increase in the budget for DD community services, due to increased revenues from the Community Options Program, the Community Integration Programs (both CIP I-A and CIP I-B), and the Family Support Program, and new Medical Assistance Waiver funding for case management services.
2. Commend the Department for continuing to expand its strong participation in CIP I-A, which will be serving seventeen persons in Eau Claire County by the end of 1988.
3. Commend the Department for planning to implement a "three year plan for moving as many developmentally disabled nursing home residents as is appropriate to less restrictive community settings," which includes specific plans for four such community placements in 1988.
4. Commend the Department for developing a community skills training program for persons with behavior challenges.
5. Commend the Department for planning to expand supported employment, for coordinating with the schools to plan for the transition of students into the community, and for reexamining in the vocational area people's service needs, the overall service philosophy, and the long range planning goals for work-related services for Eau Claire County.
6. Commend the Department for expanding services in 1988 in the areas of respite care, supervised apartments, and guardianships for nursing home residents. Encourage continued attention be given to the need to further expand respite care options and services.

7. Note the growing waiting lists, especially for work-related services. The Council will continue to work towards the availability of adequate funding to ensure that current and future service needs can be addressed.

Best regards to you and your staff in providing services to persons who are developmentally disabled.

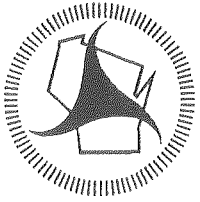

A request by Eau Claire County for changes in its County Trunk Highway system as stated in Resolution Number 87-88/192, dated November 3, 1987, was reviewed on March 31, 1988. The proposed changes consisted of:

- 1) The removal of a portion of County Trunk Highway "QQ" in the Town of Seymour beginning at the west intersection with Bullhead Pond Drive, being located approximately 0.34 mile north and 0.45 mile west of the Southeast Corner of Section 18, Township 27 North, Range 8 West, thence southerly, easterly, and northerly for approximately 1.67 miles to the east intersection with Bullhead Pond Drive, being located approximately 0.36 mile north and 0.48 mile east of the Southwest Corner of Section 17, Township 27 North, Range 8 West. Said road shall revert to the Town of Seymour.
- 2) The removal of a portion of County Trunk Highway "QQ" in the Town of Seymour beginning at the intersection with the westernmost north-south leg of County Trunk Highway "QQ", being located approximately 0.45 mile west of the Southeast Corner of Section 18, Township 27 North, Range 8 West, thence westerly for approximately 0.21 mile to the end of said road, being located approximately 0.34 mile east of the Southwest Corner of said Section 18. Said road shall revert to the Town of Seymour.

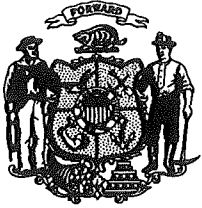

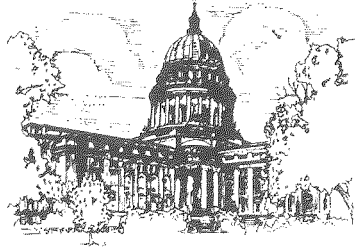

Thank you for sending along resolutions expressing Eau Claire County Board's position on Senate Bill 90 and a provision of Senate Bill 72, Governor Thompson's annual revenue bill.

Senate Bill 90 authorizes district attorneys to destroy any record that has been photographed and other records within certain time limits. The bill has been referred to the Senate Committee on Judiciary and Consumer Affairs, which held a public hearing February 24. I do not believe that Committee Chair, Senator Lynn Adelman, has scheduled the bill for a committee vote yet. However, if the bill does reach the Senate floor, I will certainly give the board's view on the bill careful consideration when casting my vote.

The board has also expressed concern about section 245-248 of Governor Thompson's revenue bill (SB 72). I received comments about this provision from most counties in the 31st Senate District, all of it, not surprisingly, in the negative.

Senate Bill 72 is now before the Joint Committee on Finance, which will submit its version of SB 72 to the State Senate in May. There is a possibility that section 245-248 will have been modified or removed by that time, but the event that they have not, I will discuss your position with my colleagues during Senate deliberation on the bill.

Thank you for taking the time to express your concern about the .20 mill forestry tax the state levies on property to finance forestry activities.

In his state budget bill, Governor Thompson recommended a reduction of \$5.8 million over two years in Department of Natural Resources forestry expenditures (ie., acquisition, preservation and development; improvement and maintenance, fire control, etc.). This recommendation, however, did not include elimination or reduction of the mill tax itself. Governor Thompson recommended a reduction in forestry account expenditures, because, in his words, "forest mill tax collections are projected to be insufficient to support existing forestry expenditures because of reductions in the equalized value of farmland."

On a more positive note, the Senate has amended the Governor's budget by increasing county forest aid payments from 20 cents an acre to 40 cents an acre annually, a two-year funding increase of \$920,000.

After two sessions of introducing the legislation for much needed funding for county jails, my efforts were successful and the "Jail Tax" legislation passed as an amendment to the 1987-1988 State Budget.

The "Jail Tax" assessment will go into effect on October 1, 1987. The measure as passed provides that whenever a court imposes a fine or forfeiture for a violation of state law, county ordinance, or municipal ordinance, except for those ordinances involving non-moving traffic violations, a jail assessment in the amount of 1% of the fine or \$10, whichever is greater, will also be imposed. The revenue from the surcharge will then be used by the county for construction, remodeling, repair, or improvements of county jails.

The following is the number of cases (1986) which would be subject to the \$10 jail assessment surcharge. It is impossible to predict an actual amount and these numbers indicate the maximum cases.

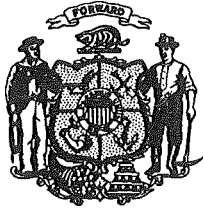

Thank you very much for writing to me to offer your views on the provisions in the budget pertaining to recycling and waste incineration. I appreciate your interest.

These sections of the budget require that a municipality which adopts a waste flow control ordinance may not operate an incinerator unless it recycles 20% of the solid waste to be incinerated or institutes mandatory source separation of four solid wastes, ensures waste separation and recycling collection facilities are in operation, institutes mandatory composting of all yard waste, collects household hazardous waste biennially, and reviews the feasibility of recycling lead-acid and mercury batteries. These sections also grant the Department of Natural Resources authority to require the municipality to cease incinerator operation if, after a hearing, it is determined the municipality has not met the recycling requirements.

I have partially vetoed these sections to eliminate the recycling requirements and DNR's enforcement authority. Because recycling initiatives depend on market demand, setting arbitrary percentages is unrealistic. There is no documented basis for choosing the 20% figure. Communities throughout the county with aggressive and successful recycling initiatives have found it difficult, after many years of progress, to recycle as much as 10 to 15% of their solid waste.

The provision linking mandatory recycling requirements to incinerator operation is vetoed because it would have a significant effect on investor willingness to finance such a facility and would effectively prevent a municipality from selling bonds for its construction.

I believe municipal decision-making on solid waste disposal should consider recycling options which are economically feasible. For this reason, I have retained language in the budget requiring municipalities to recycle solid waste to the extent of economic feasibility.



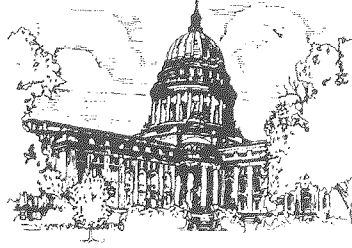

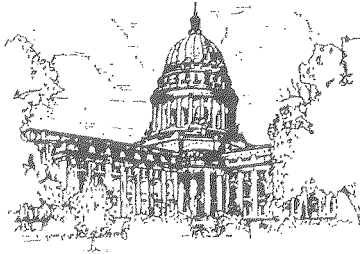

Wisconsin has been without an obscenity statute since June of 1980. Since that time, I have attempted to secure passage of legislation defining obscenity along the three-pronged guidelines provided by the U.S. Supreme Court in the Miller California decision.

However, that effort has been unsuccessful, and for more than seven years Wisconsin has been among only a handful of states which do not have a statute defining obscenity.

In the absence of a state statute defining obscenity, Wisconsin communities and counties are beginning to enact their own local ordinances, based on the Miller guidelines set forth in Senate Bill 31 and Assembly Bill 175.

The concern of Wisconsin people is also evidenced by the formation this year of the Wisconsin S.O.S. Coalition. S.O.S is a statewide call for enactment of a constitutionally sound obscenity statute.

Although Senate Bill 31 and Assembly Bill 175 have had public hearings, it appears parliamentary maneuvering and game playing by key opponents in the legislature will block passage of the bills again this session.

I'm writing to urge you to contact your statewide organization to express your support for a constitutional, enforceable obscenity statute. It would be helpful if you would request the Wisconsin Counties Association to take a positive and assertive position on Senate Bill 31 and Assembly Bill 175.

Strong political clout is essential to secure passage of this legislation. Please do what you can to lend your help. Until Wisconsin has an obscenity statute, the hard-core pornographers will continue to set our obscenity standards and continue to make millions of dollars while doing so.

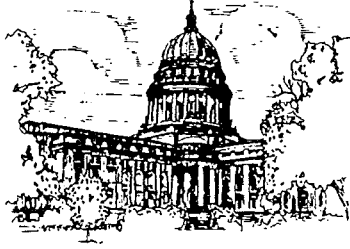

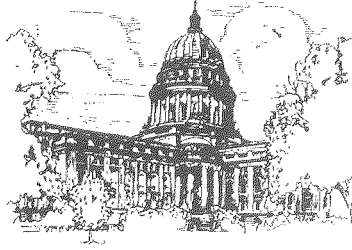

Thank you for the Eau Claire County Board resolutions supporting 100% state funding for reimbursement to the counties for the cost of housing state prisoners in county jails and for a separate Medical Assistance reimbursement formula for county nursing homes.

The Assembly had included in the budget, a provision to establish a study committee on the impact of the nursing home reimbursement formula on county nursing homes. However, the Assembly adjournment prior to completion of the budget has resulted in that bill, and all amendments attached to it, being killed. The Legislature will return on April 18th to begin the budget process over again.

Sheriff Dick Hewitt contacted me regarding the matter of housing state prisoners in your County Jail. I am now awaiting a response from the Department of Health and Social Services on this matter.
