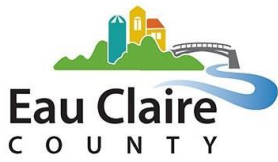

1 **PROCLAIMING FEBRUARY 5, 2024 AS TRANSIT**
2 **EQUITY DAY TO BRING COMMUNITY AWARENESS TO**
3 **THE ISSUES OF UNEQUAL ACCESS OF PUBLIC**
4 **TRANSIT**
5

6 **WHEREAS**, Rosa Parks was an iconic figure in the movements for social justice and racial
7 equality, and played a major role in the inception of the Civil Rights movement that ended
8 legal segregation in the United States; and
9

10 **WHEREAS**, the immediate focus of Rosa Parks’ historic protest was the unequal access of
11 African Americans to public transit; and
12

13 **WHEREAS**, unequal access to public transit based on race, income, and disability have
14 persisted to this day, and have to a degree become worse, with cuts in public funding for transit
15 and consequent fare increases in many transit systems; and
16

17 **WHEREAS**, affordable, reliable public transit is an essential public service, on par with
18 utilities such as water and electricity and part of a strategy to combat climate change; and
19

20 **WHEREAS**, the expansion of public transit provides the opportunity to continue the tradition
21 of Rosa Parks and the civil rights movement by ensuring that transit systems are affordable and
22 accessible, and that people of color, economically disadvantaged people, people with
23 disabilities, and other marginalized populations have full access to the benefits of public
24 transit; and

26 **WHEREAS**, the expansion of public transit provides an unprecedented opportunity to create a
27 large number of good, environmentally sustainable, high-skill, family-supporting transit
28 operation jobs, as well as construction jobs for building new transit facilities; and
29

30 **WHEREAS**, increased community access to public transit enforces a reduction in racial,
31 economic and other disparities while building mobile equity within the community.
32

33 **NOW, THEREFORE**, I, Nancy Coffey, Chair of the Eau Claire County Board of
34 Supervisors do hereby proclaim Monday, February 5, 2024, as Transit Equity Day and support
35 the Eau Claire Transit system’s tradition of placing a red rose upon the front seat of every city
36 bus and each paratransit van, to remember Rosa Parks on her birthday, and draw attention to
37 the continuing racial, economic, and other inequalities in access to adequate public transit in

The National Association of Counties and the Western Interstate Region (WIR) Board of Directors have created the National Center for Public Lands Counties (The Center) under the umbrella of NACo. Counties in Wisconsin and across the country are leaders in various ways including land use and management. While we are leaders in this area, there is little study done on how we can play a role in federal lands.

The Center's mission is to effectively demonstrate how prosperous public lands create a prosperous America by giving counties an opportunity to share these stories with their peers, policymakers, the media, think tanks and other key influencers. The Center's research will highlight the economic, environmental, and social impact public lands have on counties. The Center will provide economic and scientific data to better inform decisions and meet unique challenges in housing, taxation and infrastructure maintenance on and off federal lands.

The Center will be governed by a board consisting of elected officials from across the country and the WIR Executive Committee, the NACo CEO/ Executive Director.

To establish The Center, the NACo and WIR set a fundraising goal of \$15 million in two years. As of August, \$4.7 million has been raised through contributions by counties across the nation. This amount will provide The Center with the money needed to start their important work. The hope is that counties in Wisconsin will make a voluntary contribution to support The Center so that vital research on county intergovernmental partnerships to improve outcomes on federal lands can be conducted. No dollars will be utilized for lobbying or political reasons.

Over the past two years, your county has received a payment entitled Local Assistance and Tribal Consistency Fund (LATCF). LATCF is a general revenue enhancement program that aids eligible Tribal governments, eligible revenue sharing counties and eligible revenue sharing consolidated governments. NACo is the reason you received these funds. NACo's work in the area of public lands highlighting the need for a stronger financial relationship between the federal government and counties resulted in your county receiving \$50,000 in 2022 and \$50,000 in 2023 for a total of \$100,000.

NACo and WCA are requesting that your county contribute a very modest one-time amount of 1% of the amount you received in LATCF monies. 100% of the one-time funds you contribute

will go to fund the National Center for Public Lands Counties further highlighting the need for the federal government to recognize the economic impact public lands have on counties.

Below is a list of the counties which have received LATCF funds. All counties receiving these funds are being requested to contribute to the National Center for Public Lands Counties effort.

OUR WHY: MISSION AND OBJECTIVES

- **MISSION: Advance the policy and practice research and learning networks** for America's public lands counties
- **IMPERATIVE: Elevate the long-term policy and practice research, capacity and knowledge exchange of elected and appointed leaders from America's public lands counties**, including with federal and state policymakers, key influencers, the media, and the public
- **OBJECTIVES:**
 - **Enrich the understanding of national, state, tribal and county policymakers and influencers** of the unique policy and practice issues facing America's county officials in areas with federal public lands
 - **Curate the policy and practice research, case studies, public forums, and learning networks necessary** to advance and inform our nation's policies and practices (including at the federal, state and local levels) impacting public lands counties
 - **Deepen intergovernmental relationships and dialogue on the intersection of federal, state and local policymaking and practices** across the broad range of issues facing public lands counties, such as: landscape health, wildfire risk mitigation, watershed protection, economic competitiveness and job creation, enhanced public access to federal lands and waters, species management and biodiversity health

OUR CONTEXT: COUNTY ROLE IN PUBLIC LANDS MANAGEMENT

- **County governments are leaders in the intergovernmental partnership** with federal lands management agencies
- **County officials work with all levels of government, private stakeholders and other interested parties** to promote and practice responsible land, water and resource management, with a focus to reduce fuel loads on federal lands, prudently develop our natural resources to meet the nation's economic needs, improve local economies, enhance recreational access to public lands, and conserve our lands and waters for future generations
- With improved understanding of the unique role of America's county governments, **Congress invested record sums recently to support public lands counties**, including Payments In-Lieu of Taxes (PILT), Secure Rural Schools (SRS), direct investments through the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act, and other revenue sharing programs
- **Congress also granted new authorities and funding to federal lands agencies** to broaden the scope, pace and scale of their “on-the-ground” resource management work with local governments
- **YET, we must continue to address the mounting challenges and opportunities facing public lands counties**, by forging intergovernmental and multi-sector partnerships, telling the county story, collecting and disseminating evidence-based practices, and building solution-oriented peer networks

OUR PROCESS: FUNDRAISING

- For the National Center for Public Lands Counties to meet its mission and serve as a long-term tool for public lands counties, **a voluntary investment** from public lands counties was solicited in mid-2023
- NACo staff, state associations of counties executives and county officials set an ambitious **fundraising goal of \$15 million over the next two years** to build the staff capacity and partnerships to operate the Center on a sustainable and viable financial course – we are currently closer to \$5M in firm contributions and pledges
- **State association executives meet with their county members** and helped report back on the specific contributions and pledges for each county prior to and during the 2023 NACo Annual Conference
- These funds will be **managed under NACo’s 501(c)(3) entity, the NACo Research Foundation, in collaboration with WIR’s leadership**, under the brand the National Center for Public Lands Counties. Under federal law, these funds shall not be used for any partisan political purposes or specific lobbying activities

DECISION POINT: MENU OF POTENTIAL DELIVERABLES

Menu of Potential Work Plan Priorities in 2024

- **Federal Public Lands 101:** National Center staff will serve as the lead developer of the Federal Public Lands 101 workshop at the NACo Legislative Conference in February 2024. This will be an opportunity for the National Center's Advisory Board to discuss with fellow county officials the county role in resource management planning, NEPA and other critical processes that determine what practices are allowed or prohibited on federal lands.
- **Public Lands Counties Knowledge Hub:** New peer online portal, modeled after the NACo Technology Xchange and new NACo Workforce Network, for county officials to share county practices, policies and solutions related to public lands management.
- **County Economies Research:** Develop a baseline understanding of the economies and demographics of public lands counties.
- **Public Lands Management Practices Media Outreach and Forums:** A multi-media strategy of special reports, *County News* monthly supplement and podcasts/video interviews focused on county innovations and practices from public lands counties and partners. Additionally, host a DC-based symposium for public lands counties and conduct a national survey of public lands county officials on their conditions, policy views and priorities.
