Public Comment: Jean Doty asked a follow up question from the May

20th meeting about which agency to submit ADA complaints, Terri Stanley shared information. Positive comments were made about the Meals on Wheels food quality from various community members, which were shared with ADRC Board

Members.

Review of May 20, 2024, ADRC Board Minutes / Discussion – Action, Handout #1 – John Folstad motioned to approve the minutes as submitted. All in favor. None opposed.

ADRC Board Citizen Member Vacancy / Discussion – Action, Handout #2 – Bill Libberton reported that he did not receive a response from either applicant when he reached out to them. Discussion about the alignment of the ADRC By-Laws and the State of Wisconsin Statue in filling ADRC Board positions. John motioned to postpone action on vacancy until the July 15, 2024, meeting to allow ADRC staff time to contact both applicants for their continued interest in the board position and to check the state statue. All in favor. None opposed.

Transportation Updates – Linda Struck led the discussion on the Paratransit Program. The July $15^{\rm th}$ meeting will include a presentation on the Paratransit Program.

General ADRC Informational Training / Discussion, Handout #3 – Linda went over the main points of the handout and answered questions.

Confidentiality – Handout #4 – Linda explained the purpose of the Confidentiality Agreement and requested that each board member sign and turn into her either through email or by turning in at a future meeting. Discussion was held on the agreement and John asked who the Privacy Officer is in Eau Claire County. Linda will follow up and report at the July meeting who the Privacy Officer is within the County.

Nutrition Updates - Betsy reported that applications are being reviewed for the open part-time cook position. The Senior Farmers Market vouchers distribution events have been held, approximately 100 vouchers will be available until gone at the ADRC office.

Resource Center Updates/Advocacy Day - Linda informed the board that she will be on leave for a few weeks starting August 9, 2024. Linda reminded the Board about the upcoming In-District Advocacy Day on June 24.

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State Required ADRC Board Composition

The ADRC board must meet all of the following requirements:

- 1. The composition of the board must reflect the ethnic and economic diversity of the geographic area served by the ADRC. If the headquarters of a tribal government is located within an ADRC's service area, then that ADRC is expected to have a tribal member on its board. The tribal member does not need to be a formal representative of the tribal government.
- 2. ADRCs empower customers to make informed choices about options to live with dignity, security, independence, and a high quality of life. In order to achieve this mission in an equitable way, ADRCs must identify and consider disparities that affect each unique customer. ADRCs will represent these marginalized communities through their recruitment of governing board members.
- 3. At least one-fourth of the membership of the board will be people over the age of 60, adults with disabilities, or their family members, legal representatives, or other advocates, reflecting the ADRC's target populations.
- 4. To ensure adequate representation statewide, all ADRC boards must include at least one person with a physical disability or an acceptable representative, one person with an intellectual disability or an acceptable representative, and two people age 60 or older or acceptable representative(s).
- 5. A board member who may represent more than one ADRC client group, cannot be counted as a representative in more than one client group.
- 6. Representatives of groups receiving limited ADRC services, such as mental health or substance use disorders, may be included on the board, but these members will not count towards the one-fourth consumer representation.
- 7. To comply with these requirements, the ADRC may replace board members when positions become vacant, or sooner, at its discretion.

Suggested addition to the above state requirements, from current ADRC of Eau Claire County By-Laws is the inclusion of: The ADRC Board will consist of 11 members appointed by the County Board Chair, with confirmation by the County Board.

Current ADRC By-Laws Article III: ADRC Board Membership, Appointment and Tenure

Section 1:

- 1. The ADRC Board will consist of 11 members appointed by the County Board Chair, with confirmation by the County Board.
- 2. The ADRC Board will reflect the ethnic and economic diversity of the geographic area served by the resource center.
- 3. At least one-fourth of the membership of the board will consist of individuals who belong to an ADRC client group or their family members, guardians, or other advocates.
- 4. The proportion of board members representing older adults, individuals who are physically disabled, and individuals who are developmentally disabled shall be the same as the proportion of individuals in these target groups statewide that are enrolled in Medicaid managed long-term care programs. These individuals will each only represent one target group.
- 5. One member of the governing board will be an individual with a mental health or substance abuse issue, or their family member or other representative.
- 6. One member of the governing board may represent youth transitioning to the adult system.





WHEREAS, home-delivered meal services statewide are either experiencing waitlists or have implemented some sort of restrictions and limited services (e.g., reduced number of meals served and/or days of delivery); and WHEREAS, increased state and federal funding is needed to ensure no senior needs to wait for meals and essential safety checks; and WHEREAS, the program is challenged by: • Federal Funding Cuts: The Older Americans Act senior nutrition program sustained an \$8 million cut at the federal level in 2024. Local funding (29% of the funding in 2023) is also at risk; • Expiration of COVID Support (both funding and flexibilities): By 2025, Wisconsin's home-delivered meal program will have lost approximately \$10.5 million of COVIDrelief accounting for over 27% of total home-delivered meal expenditures in 2023; Unprecedented Levels of Need: Demand for services has increased by 54% from 2019 to 2023; • Increased Expenses driven by Inflation and a Lack of Resources: The average cost to provide a meal statewide is \$12.76/meal, a 17% increase over 2018 costs. Over one-third (36%) of programs surveyed indicated they are unable to service their entire geographic area due to lack of funding, insufficient volunteers or staff, and/or inadequate equipment to safely deliver meals; and WHEREAS, in 2023, only 17% of home-delivered meals services funding came from the OAA, and 2% came from state funds; and WHEREAS, voluntary participant contributions are decreasing due to lack of income.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Eau Claire County Board of Supervisors does hereby support an increase in the 2025-27 state biennial budget to ensure access to critical services provided by the home-delivered meals services program to Wisconsin's aging population by increasing the state contribution to home-delivered meals services from the current level of \$868,794 to \$13.5 million.

FACT SHEET

The Aging and Disability Resources (ADRC) Board supports an increase in funding for nutrition programs serving Wisconsin's aging population. The Older Americans Act (OAA) Nutrition Program is a federal program that supports the health and well-being of older adults through nutrition services. Although the demand for nutrition program services has increased, the amount of funding from the federal and state government has decreased while overhead costs have increased. The reduction in nutrition services due to limited funding means the aging population isn't getting nutritious meals as well as the reduction in safety and wellness checks and reduction in connections to other services in the community. The ADRC Board is requesting additional funding for nutrition programs as part of the 2025-27 state biennial budget from the current level of \$868,794 to \$13.5 million.
